ALUMNI CHAPTERS.

The future of Kappa Psi or any other fraternity depends chiefly on its alumni, for therein lies the real strength and power of the fraternity. The elaborate entertainment given at the last convention in New York goes to show what the alumni of one chapter can do when they are united. The active men need some one to back them up in their social functions and to keep the ball rolling for a chapter house. The passive men need something to stimulate and keep fresh their interest in the old fraternity. How better can they accomplish this than through organization. Our constitution provides for the issuing of charters to Alumni Chapters. Gamma has 150 or more graduate members, the majority of whom live in the vicinity of New York City. Why not organize these men into a permanent chapter, *and do it now*, so as to get enrolled the men who are graduating this year. In this way we can have a home of our own at which any Kappa Psi man may drop in at any time and be welcome. Many of the active men would like to live in a house of this kind, which would help out mightily on expenses. All "frats" with chapter houses have had to start in this way—by first perfecting an alumni organization and establishing a chapter house fund. "Great oaks from little acorns grow," and in this way, only, can we ever hope to have a home of our own and ultimately to own as good a Kappa Psi house as any fraternity on earth.

ART. VII, SEC. II.

I believe a little more time will bring matters to a focus.
