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## THE NEW FEDERAL REVENUE ACT

The new Federal Revenue Act is of extreme importance to every individual chapter of Kappa Psi. In order that you may have certain information about it we are reprinting the *Balfour Bulletin* received under the date of February 1, 1944.

In answer to the numerous inquiries we have received in regard to the present 990 returns and the pending Revenue Act, we are submitting herewith a statement issued by the present Chairman of the Legal Committee of the National Interfraternity Conference.

"When the regulations came out, calling for the filing of form 990, the former Chairman of the Legal Committee took the matter up with the Department through Maxwell McDowell, a quite well known tax practitioner, in an endeavor to get the college fraternities, or at least the local chapters, exempted from filing these returns. They were, however, unable to get any favorable consideration, whatsoever.

"As you doubtless know, the 1943 Act has now passed the Senate and is before the Conference Committee. The Senate made some minor changes in Section 112 (which inserts a new subsection (f) in Section 54 of the Internal Revenue Code). The Senate Finance Committee had inserted a provision exempting fraternal beneficiary societies, orders, or associations operating under the lodge system and providing for payment of life, sick, and accident benefits, but this additional exemption was killed on the floor of the Senate. You can imagine how much chance college fraternities would have had to get an exemption if the Senate was unwilling even to extend the exemption to semi-benevolent orders which are exempt from tax under Section 101 (3) of the Code.

"Since there are no substantial differences between the House and Senate bills, there would seem to be no question but that this provision of the Act will be unanimously accepted by the Conference Committee and will become a part of the law. Under it every organization specifically exempted from taxation will be required to file returns, except the somewhat narrowly defined religious, educational, and charitable corporations and exempt federal corporations operating as instrumentalities of the U. S. Government. This requirement extends even to the little 'clubs organized and operated exclusively for pleasure, recreation, and other nonprofitable purposes, no part of the net earnings of which inures to the benefit of any private shareholder.'

"Since the filing of information setting forth gross income, receipts and disbursements, and such other information as may be called for by

the Commissioner will be mandatory under the new Act, it will not be possible to secure any exemption through the Income Tax Unit. I mention this because in an earlier letter I had suggested that perhaps that question might be taken up later. The form in which the Act stands, however, precludes any such possibility.

"As I told you in an earlier letter, I do not regard the necessity of filing this information report as any tremendous hardship and I cannot get greatly excited about it. Furthermore, as I said before, it may even prove a blessing in disguise to the legitimate fraternities. In any event, I think there is no doubt that the returns will have to be filed and this time the failure to file will be subject to severe penalties. Accordingly, our organizations may as well make up their minds to accept the situation as it exists."

Since the Act did become a law, each Chapter Treasurer should obtain information from his local District Collector of Internal Revenue.

The latest information received at the Central Office (March 25, 1944) indicates the following procedure as advisable:

1. Request from the Collector of Internal Revenue in your district a copy of form questionnaire No. 1025 and 2 copies of form 990. These forms are a request to the Department for exemption from payment of income tax.

2. Complete these forms—copies of each should be retained by the chapter—and mail them to the address indicated on the forms.

3. Make certain that you have completed all forms necessary by requesting full and complete information from the office of your local Collector.

4. Sometime later the Chapter Treasurer will receive a letter from the Treasury Department stating the action taken upon the chapter's request for exemption.

5. Irrespective of the action taken by the Department, the individual chapter will be requested to file an Annual Report with the District Collector of Internal Revenue.

### LEWIS O. BARROWS

Mu chapter is very pleased and honored to announce that Lewis O. Barrows, former Governor of Maine, was made a Graduate Member of Kappa Psi Pharmaceutical Fraternity in ceremonies held at the chapter house, 220 Aspinwall Avenue, Brookline, on Wednesday evening, March 22.

Lewis O. Barrows, Governor of Maine from 1937 to 1941, was born in Newport, Maine on June 7, 1893. He was educated in the public schools of that town and, before entering college, graduated from Hebron Academy. In 1916 he graduated from the University of Maine with the degree of Bachelor of Science in Pharmacy. From 1916 to 1935 Mr. Barrows, in partnership with his father, conducted a retail pharmacy in Newport. He served as Secretary of State in Maine from 1935 to 1937, and before that was a member of the Governor's Council.

On June 14, 1937, the University of Maine conferred the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws upon Mr. Barrows, and on June 10, 1938, he received the same degree from Colby College. He is Past President of the Maine Pharmaceutical Association and also of the Maine Rexall Club. Among other organizations of which he is a member are Beta Theta Pi and the College Corporation of the Massachusetts College of Pharmacy.

Mr. Barrows is now Secretary of the Liberty Mutual Insurance Company and of the United Mutual Fire Insurance Company in Boston. His home is at 54 Valentine Park, West Newton, Massachusetts.

DEAR BROTHERS:




