

You Should Know . . .

HAROLD G. HEWITT, dean of The University of Connecticut School of Pharmacy for the past eight years, was born in Milwaukee, Wisconsin on October 14, 1901. He received his early education in Milwaukee schools and entered the University of Wisconsin School of Pharmacy in 1919. In 1920 he was initiated into Beta Psi Chapter of Kappa Psi and has been an ardent supporter of the Fraternity ever since. Brother Hewitt graduated with the degree of bachelor of science in 1923 and enrolled immediately in the Graduate School of the same university where he received the degree of master of science in 1925 and the Ph.D. degree in 1926. While at the University, Dr. Hewitt served as a research assistant in the University's Pharmaceutical Experiment Station for several years and also as an assistant instructor in pharmaceutical chemistry, plant chemistry, and alkaloidal assay. On August 18, 1926, Brother Hewitt and Miss Martha Cummings Alexander were married.

From Wisconsin, Brother Hewitt moved east to the University of Buffalo School of Pharmacy where he served as professor of chemistry and head of the division of pharmaceutical chemistry until he came to Connecticut.

In 1947, Dr. Hewitt came to New Haven, Connecticut, to serve as dean of the School of Pharmacy. In four short years he realized part of his dream for a new pharmacy building when the school moved from its quarters once used by the Yale Medical School to the campus in Storrs. In 1952 the school moved from temporary campus quarters to the beautiful new pharmacy building located on the same quadrangle as the Engineering School and the new Student Union building.

Some other organizations which can claim Brother Hewitt as a member include: the Milwaukee Graduate Chapter of Kappa Psi (now a graduate Chapter of Theta Kappa Psi), Gamma Alpha, a graduate scientific fraternity, Phi Sigma, Rho Chi Society and the Society of Sigma Xi and Phi Lambda Upsilon. He is a member of the A.Ph.A., A.C.S., Connecticut Academy of Arts and Sciences, A.A.A.S., New England Association of Chemistry Teachers, C.P.A., and a registered pharmacist in Wisconsin since 1924 and in Connecticut since 1948.

Dean Hewitt served as vice president of the American Association of Colleges of Pharmacy in 1950-51, and ably guided, as chairman, the 6th Annual Teachers Seminar of the A.A.C.P. held last summer on the University of Connecticut campus. He was largely responsible for the granting to Kappa Psi and each of the other three pharmaceutical fraternities housing in the newest and most modern dormitory facilities just being completed on the campus. The fraternities move into their new quarters in the fall semester.

Chapters at St. Louis, Albuquerque, and Tucson Visited by Grand Secretary-Treasurer Frank H. Eby

Arriving at St. Louis early in the afternoon of January 19, 1955, Grand Secretary-Treasurer Frank H. Eby found awaiting him, Regent Walter Ito, Secretary Jerry Smith, and several other members of Gamma Pi Chapter who escorted him to the St. Louis College of Pharmacy and Allied Sciences. At the College the Grand S-T had a very pleasant visit with Dean A. F. Schlichting, Grand Council Deputy C. Lee Huyck, and several other members of the faculty. Members of the Chapter acted as guides on a tour of the very spacious and well equipped college building. This was followed by a two hour session with the Chapter officers, in which many problems and plans for the future were discussed. In the early evening, Regent Ito presided at an excellent dinner at one of the local hotels with a full attendance of Chapter members and Facultate Members including Grand Counselor James R. Thayer. The dinner was followed by an address by the Grand S-T and a constructive discussion on Chapter problems. Gamma Pi is potentially strong and we look for it to be one of our best Chapters in the years ahead. While it was cold with some snow, when we were in St. Louis, the Kappa Psi spirit was high and we say thanks to all of you in Gamma Pi for your splendid reception and cooperation.

The campus at the University of New Mexico in Albuquerque was delightful although somewhat cool when the Grand S-T arrived early on the morning of January 21. He was escorted through the fine building which houses the School of Pharmacy, by Dean E. L. Cataline and members of Gamma Rho Chapter. At noon the Chapter held a luncheon for the visiting Grand Officer at one of Albuquerque's fine restaurants. Although this visit came at a time when examinations were in progress, there was a full attendance of members and the luncheon was most enjoyable. In the afternoon a three hour session with Chapter officers, resulted in the clarification of many chapter problems which should help the Chapter in its future activities. Special thanks go to Dean Cataline for his kindness in helping to make the visit of the Grand S-T so very pleasant and to Regent Ronald W. Roberson, Treasurer Alan R. Aldous, and Secretary James B. Nickell, and the other Gamma Rho officers for their helpful cooperation during the long conference. Our appreciation is expressed to all of the members of the Chapter for their hospitality and good Kappa Psi spirit.

On January 22, the Grand S.T arrived in Tucson at 6 A.M. and was given a hearty welcome by three loyal Kappa Psi's, Dean Willis R. Brewer, Dr. Albert Picchioni (G.C.D.), and Regent William A. Burnson of Gamma Upsilon Chapter. Within several hours after arrival Dr. Picchioni had us in tow (not hard to take in an Olds 88) for a view of the beautiful University of Arizona campus. Later, a tour of the School of Pharmacy and then a visit to the Saguaro National Monument, the nearby mountains and orange groves completed a wonderful day. On Sunday, as guest of Dean and Mrs. Brewer, the Grand S-T visited Nogales, Mexico, and some outstanding historical places including the San Xavier Mission near Tucson. On Monday, an old Sigma Chapter alumnus, and one of Tucson's outstanding citizens, G. Benner Kelly, was our host and once again we were off to see more of the wonders of the Tucson area. In the evening (January 24) members of Gamma Upsilon Chapter and the Arizona Graduate Chapter held a dinner and meeting at the La Cucina, with the Grand S-T reporting on the activities of the Fraternity. It was an enjoyable evening and special thanks go to those who had a part in planning the dinner and to the loyal brothers who traveled about 125 miles from Phoenix to take part in the evening's meeting and festivities. All the Brothers in Tucson were fine hosts but the

Grand S-T is especially grateful to Brothers Brewer, Picchioni, and Kelly who demonstrated Arizona hospitality at its best. Of course the freedom from the ice and snow of Philadelphia was also a wonderful treat.

Grand Officers Confer in St. Louis

Following the visit to Gamma Pi Chapter in St. Louis on January 19, Grand Secretary-Treasurer Frank H. Eby and Grand Counselor James R. Thayer met to discuss problems relating to Chapter By-Laws.

At the present time the Central Office does not have any record of approved By-Laws for a number of Chapters. There is also no record of revisions and amendments of the By-Laws made by some of the Chapters in recent years. It was agreed at the St. Louis meeting that a survey would be made in the near future to determine the extent to which new By-Laws and revised By-Laws would be necessary by some of the Chapters. At this time it is urged that all Chapters which have not had their By-Laws approved by the Legislative Committee of the Fraternity, to do so at once. Important Information from the Legislative Committee

James R. Thayer, Chairman

In Kappa Psi as in everything else—growth introduces complications. As we have grown in numbers we have quite naturally expanded geographically and this expansion together with the changing society in which we live has introduced some heterogeneity into Kappa Psi. This is—in general good—but it is only good so long as we have a solid core of homogeneity. We want and need all types of thinking, all shades of personality, but it is certainly equally true that we must speak a common language.

There are two lexicons from which the Language of Kappa Psi may be learned (1) the Spirit of Kappa Psi which you can read from the lives of your Brothers and (2) the formal Language of Kappa Psi as expressed in the Constitution and the various By-Laws

of its Segments.

While these are like all codes—of human origin—and therefore not perfect, we must also remember that they are evolutionary and represent the best thinking of many men over many years. I feel sure that honest compliance with this Constitution and these By-Laws is tantamount to living in the true Spirit of Kappa Psi.

Because of the greater urgency of other matters facing other Officers of Alpha Chapter and because of arrant shiftlessness on the part of the writer—the adoption of By-Laws by Chapters and Provinces—has been on an essentially voluntary basis. Now we feel it is time to solicit your cooperation to the end that every unit of Kappa Psi is operating under approved By-Laws. For the mutual benefit of yourselves and the organization as a whole, will you please determine in the next few months whether your unit has approved By-Laws? If not—using the Model By-Laws in the Constitution as a guide and adapting them to your local conditions—draw up By-Laws and submit them for approval. Send three copies of these proposed By-Laws to the Grand Secretary-Treasurer who in turn will funnel them to the Legislative Committee, which in turn, will give them consideration.

It is my earnest wish that at the next Grand Council Convention I can bust the buttons off my vest by announcing that everyone has approved By-Laws.

Province I Assembly

Henry S. Johnson, Retiring-Secretary Boston, April 9, 1955

A Province I Convention was held on Saturday, April 9, 1955 at the Massachusetts College of Pharmacy, Boston. Representatives of all Collegiate Chapters (Mu, Nu, Beta Delta, and Beta Epsilon) and of the Boston and the Connecticut Graduate Chapters were in attendance. Mu Chapter and the Boston Graduate Chapter were the hosts.

Satrap William E. Hassan, Jr., called the meeting to order at 10:20 A.M., followed by the invocation delivered by the Chaplain of Mu Chapter, Colburn Demro. A welcome to the Massachusetts College of Pharmacy was given by Dean Howard Newton of that school and for Mu Chapter by their Regent, Samuel Koorajian.

Minutes of the last meeting were read by the Secretary, Henry S. Johnson and the Treasurer's Report was given by John W. Schermerhorn. The latter report showed a healthy condition of the Province I treasury. Grand Historian Walter R. Williams brought greetings from the Alpha Chapter and the Editor of The Mask, Maynard W. Quimby, spoke briefly. Vice Satrap Theodore Lemeshka was introduced, as were the following visiting Brothers—Robert Grieb, Connecticut Narcotic Agent; Joseph Moran, Regent of Connecticut Graduate Chapter; Roman Panek, Secretary of Connecticut Graduate Chapter, and Edmund Goodmaster, Chief Inspector for the Connecticut Pharmacy Commission. This was followed by a report of a representative of each Chapter on the activities of the Chapter during the past year. These were given by Samuel Koorajian for Mu; Joseph Samorski for Nu; Lawrence Gibbs for Beta Delta; and Richard Lafond for Beta Epsilon. John Schermerhorn reported for the Boston Graduate Chapter and Raymond Smith for the Connecticut Graduate Chapter.

A delicious luncheon was provided by the host Chapters at the 1200 Beacon Street Hotel, a newly constructed motel and restaurant of modern design. About 50 were in attendance at the meetings and at the luncheon.

After the luncheon the second session was opened back at the Massachusetts College of Pharmacy with an open discussion pertaining to Province I and the Fraternity. Among the suggestions were (1) that some provision be made for visitation of Province Chapters by the Province officers in the future; (2) that meetings of the Province be held annually; (3) that the next meeting be held in the fall of 1956, rather than in the spring of 1957; and (4) that the Province make a contribution to the Ray S. Kelley Memorial Fund. In accordance with the last suggestion a motion was made and passed that the Province contribute \$100 to this fund.

Reports of the Province officers were made and then elections of new officers were held. The following were elected: Satrap, Theodore Lemeshka of Beta Epsilon Chapter; Vice Satrap, Vincent Coniglio of the Albany Graduate Chapter; Secretary, Kenneth Griswold of the Albany and Connecticut Graduate Chapters; Treasurer, John Schermerhorn of the Boston Graduate Chapter; and Chaplain, John Barberian of the Boston Graduate Chapter. Election of delegates from Province I to the next National Convention in December was then held, with the result that William Lowell of the Boston Graduate Chapter was named the delegate and Henry S. Johnson of the Connecticut Graduate Chapter the alternate.

A report of the Time and Place Committee for the next Province Convention named Providence as the recommended site, with the time to be determined by the local committee and the Executive Committee of the Province. The afternoon meeting was adjourned at 4:25 P.M.

The third and final session was a banquet meeting, held at the Statler Hotel through the



kindness of the local committee and the contributors to their fund. About 75 were at the dinner. Howard W. Expressions of appreciation to Satrap Hassan and his committee were given and the meeting adjourned with the sentiment that it was one of the best Province I Assemblies ever held.

Province IV Assembly

Province Number V Assembly

Karl J. Goldner, Retiring-Secretary

Memphis, Tennessee, December 27, 1954

The meeting was called to order at 9:15 A.M. at the Psi Chapter House, 242 South Pauline, by Satrap C. Lee Huyck.

The invocation was given by Brother Goldner.

The roll of the delegates was called and the number of votes determined for each chapter. Those answering roll call were as follows: Rho, Wayne Wagers; Psi, David Cunningham, Jack Bilyeu, Cary Lanier; Beta Rho, Joe Oliver, James Ward; Gamma Gamma, Robert Parker; Gamma Pi, Jerry Smith, Douglas Chachere; Gamma Omicron, Ellis Jeter.

No delegates were present from Beta Chi, Gamma Epsilon, and Gamma Zeta Chapters. Others present were the Supervising Grand Officer, Glen Sperandio; the Satrap, C. Lee Huyck; the Secretary, Karl Goldner; the Treasurer, pro tem, James Thayer; and guests, Douglas Crotts, W. Howard Hassler, Kenneth Rowe, and William Swafford.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

Grand Ritualist Sperandio spoke on plans for making Kappa Psi a stronger organization and promised each chapter an annual visit from one or more grand officers. He urged the delegates to consider having the Grand Council Convention in Province V.

Grand Counselor Thayer spoke on the importance of careful selection of members and of officers.

The following committees were appointed: Nominating: Oliver, chairman; Cunningham, Parker. Time and Place: Goldner, Chairman; Jeter, Smith. Auditing: Cunningham, chairman; Cachere, Parker.

Brother Thayer announced the resignation of Leland McNeill as treasurer. He reported a balance in a Des Moines bank of \$685.87 and a check on hand of \$12.00, making total assets of \$697.87. A motion was made, seconded, and passed that the treasurer's report be accepted.

As a guide for the nominating committee, the delegates discussed the qualifications of eligible men for Province officers.

A report was called for from the delegates as to the activities of their various Chapters. These fell under the headings of social, professional, and scholastic. No details were recorded.

Suggestions for province activities were called for. One was that a time be set aside at the Grand Council Convention for a Province meeting. The concensus was that this, while it had some merits, would not add to the national meeting and that an unofficial, informal, evening meeting would accomplish the same purpose.

It was suggested that the Secretary obtain news items from the Chapters and edit a newsletter at intervals. The concensus was that this would duplicate the efforts of THE MASK. The difficulty of obtaining news items from the Chapter Secretaries was pointed out.

It was moved, seconded, and carried that the Province minutes be sent to the Secretaries and Grand Council Deputies of the Chapters in the Province, and to the Secretaries of the other Provinces.

It was moved, seconded, and carried that the Secretary send out forms to the Chapters requesting nominations for Province officers and giving their qualifications. These nominations are to be in the hands of the Secretary one month before the Province Assembly. It was pointed out that this procedure would result in more nominations and would also afford the prospective office-holder an opportunity to decline the nomination, should he not be in a position to accept it.

A recess was called and Psi Chapter entertained at a luncheon in the fraternity house. Following lunch, the group made a visit to the Pharmacy School and inspected its facilities.

At 1:30 P.M. the group reconvened. It was moved, seconded, and passed that \$100 of the province funds be given to the Ray S. Kelley Memorial Fund. There was unanimous agreement as to the invaluable services which Brother Kelley had made to Kappa Psi.

The nominations committee reported and the following officers were elected: Satrap, Louis Nobles of Mississippi; Vice Satrap, R. D. Bienfang of Oklahoma; Secretary, William Swafford of Tennessee; Treasurer, Wayne Wagers of Kansas; Historian, Vernon A. Green of Texas.

The time and place committee suggested that the next Assembly be held during Christmas vacation and set a tentative date on December 28, 1956 and the exact date be set by the executive committee. It was recommended that the Chapters be written requesting invitations for the Assembly not less than 8 months prior to the Assembly. It was moved, seconded, and carried that the committee's report be accepted. The consensus was that a Christmas vacation meeting resulted in poor attendance and that annual meetings would preserve the continuity of the province deliberations. It was moved, seconded, and passed that the meetings should be held annually, so far as finances permitted, on a Saturday during the second or third week in October.

The auditing committee reported that the balance on hand was \$12.00 more than the books showed, and that this was presumably due to interest not having been entered on the books. The report was accepted.

It was announced that the next Grand Council Delegate was to be from Kansas and the alternate from Mississippi. The delegates are to be elected by the members of their own Chapters.

Problems of the various Chapters were brought out, discussed, and suggestions made for their solution.

The problem of the payment of national dues for members who had been suspended for non-payment of dues was discussed. The opinion of the undergraduate delegates was that the present regulation was unjust and placed a financial burden on the chapter. It was moved, seconded, and passed that the Legislative Committee be informed of the sentiment of the members and petitioning for relief.

A panel discussion led by Brothers Lanier and Parker was held on "How the Fraternity can help to improve the scholastic average of its members."

Another discussion was led by Brothers Rowe and Oliver on "The choice of a pledge."

The new Secretary and Treasurer were installed in their offices.

There being no further business the meeting was adjourned with a rising vote of thanks to the past officers and the local committee.

Dr. Arthur Osol was initiated as a Facultate Member of Eta Chapter, Kappa Psi Pharmaceutical Fraternity on February 28, 1955.

Dr. Osol was born in Riga, Latvia on December 1, 1905. In 1906 he came to Philadelphia with his parents and he has resided in this city or its environs since that time. Following graduation from Northeast High School he attended the Philadelphia College of Pharmacy and Science, receiving degrees of Ph.G. (1925), B.Sc. in Chemistry (1928), and M.Sc. in Chemistry (1930). From the University of Pennsylvania he received degrees of M.Sc. (1931) and Ph.D. (1933). He has also completed specialized studies at New York University, University of Pennsylvania, and Oak Ridge Institute of Nuclear Studies.

Dr. Osol started his professional career as assistant in Chemistry at Philadelphia College of Pharmacy and Science and is now professor of chemistry and director of the chemistry department.

In 1950 he was elected a member of the committee of revision of the United States Pharmacopeia. Since 1945 he has been editor-in-chief of the United States Dispensatory. He is also chemical editor of Blakiston's Medical Dictionary, and associate editor of Remington's Practice of Pharmacy. All three books will appear in new editions in 1955.

Dr. Osol finds time to participate in many professional and civic assignments and is a well known consultant in pharmaceutical chemistry.

Table of Antidotes for Poisons

Responding to an insistent demand on the part of pharmacists for a Table of Antidotes for Poisons to be used as a basis for information in emergencies and to make such a table constantly and readily available in the pharmacies of the United States, the Council of the American Pharmaceutical Association at a meeting held in Washington on February 4, voted to issue a Table of Antidotes for Poisons to be prepared by a special committee (not the Committee on National Formulary) for distribution to all purchasers of the National Formulary X. This table is not to be bound with the pages of the National Formulary, but will be distributed as a separate pamphlet with each copy of the National Formulary X.

Edmund Norris Gathercoal 1874-1954

In a life time of eighty years, Edmund Norris Gathercoal, professor emeritus of pharmacognosy at the University of Illinois College of Pharmacy, demonstrated many capacities. Pharmacist, teacher, researcher, author, administrator, and family man, he gave to each the best of himself. With his death at his home in Pentwater, Michigan, on December 27, 1954, just four days after reaching his eightieth birthday, his life came to an end, but the influences of his teaching and counciling will continue to influence those with whom he came in contact.

Born of English parentage at Sycamore, Illinois, on December 23, 1874, he graduated with special honors in botany and pharmacognosy from the Chicago College of Pharmacy, in 1895. Practicing retail pharmacy as a clerk and later as the owner of a store, his love for teaching caused him to return to his alma mater in the fall of 1907, which by this time had become the School of Pharmacy of the University of Illinois. During the succeeding thirty-four years, he was successively instructor, assistant professor, and professor of pharmacognosy.

He was author or coauthor of fourteen books and fifty-six published articles as well as numerous reports, reviews, and abstracts. A recital of the honors which came to him as the result of his demonstrated abilities, would include: the Ebert Prize, in 1915; the Joseph P. Remington Honor Medal, in 1936; honorary degree of master in pharmacy awarded by the Philadelphia College of Pharmacy and Science, in 1934; election as first vice president of the American Pharmaceutical Association, in 1922; and as president, in 1937.

His family life was deeply satisfying to him except for the loss of his only son in early manhood. His wife, his two daughters and a number of grandchildren survive him. The family maintained a summer home at Pentwater, on the shores of Lake Michigan, which upon his retirement, became the permanent home although, for a number of years, he and Mrs. Gathercoal traveled rather extensively.


Members in the Service






GAMMA—COLUMBIA UNIVERSITY





A hectic—never to be forgotten—initiation of pledges along with the giving of the first degree took place on January 26 after the stress of exams had passed.






