



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
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From the Desk of the Grand Regent

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THE PROVINCE—DODO, DOZER, OR DEBUTANT

A lot of people will answer in the affirmative to each of the above descriptive titles. They will honestly believe what they say. I would not describe it as the major problem of Kappa Psi, but it is certainly high on the list. It is important enough to demand our best efforts to try to find the right solution. It is a difficult problem to analyze or discuss because our individual reactions are conditioned by our personal experiences. In some cases our experiences have been favorable and we think it is a vital part of our Fraternity. In some cases our experience has been unhappy and we think it is sterile. Of course we have all possible shades of intermediate reactions. I am not enough of a genius to solve the problem. All I can do is discuss it and hope that collectively we will find a solution.

I would like to follow three lines of thought—the past, the present and the potential. I would like to do this in an effort to determine the desirability of maintaining the province as one of the representative segments of Kappa Psi. I will try to be as objective as possible in this discussion.

I should, but I do not, know the historical background of the province. I would guess that at the time of its birth there were definite, constructive reasons for bringing it into existence. I would guess that geography and the usual social dissimilarities, which will always exist in the United States, may have been one of the reasons. I have underscored the word united because, while thank God we are united, we are a better nation because our behavior patterns and our thinking depend somewhat upon our birthplace and our inheritance. I would guess that some sincere individuals felt that our biennial conventions did not furnish enough contacts. I would guess that in some cases politically ambitious people found the province a convenient stepping stone. I would guess that it occurred to some people that the province would represent the system of checks and balances so important to our Democracy. I would guess that there were many other reasons. I would guess that many of the original reasons are no longer valid. I would guess that some of them are just as valid as they were originally. I would guess that many new reasons for and against have arisen. We should analyze these reasons and then accept or discard.

The present is an unscheduled, unpremeditated blend of the experiences of the past and the generally unconscious thinking as to what the future will be. I think we should examine the status of our province activities from a number of standpoints. First from that of need. This again depends considerably upon geography. In areas of dense population and small area we have an entirely different situation than where distances are great between the various units—active chapters, graduate chapters and national representation. In the former, province activities are more easily carried on but probably the need is less because of easier and more frequent communication. Of course the reverse of this is true of those areas in the latter category. I do believe this continuous communication is the

The Golden Anniversary National Interfraternity Conference*

Dr. Frank H. Eby Represents PIC

The Golden Anniversary meeting of the National Interfraternity Conference was held at the Waldorf Astoria Hotel in New York, November 26, 27 and 28, 1959. It was unanimously agreed that the program was strong and effective and a proper observation of the 50 years of activity of the Conference.

"GOLDEN ANNIVERSARY DECLARATION OF PRINCIPLES"

"On this Golden Anniversary of the founding of the National Interfraternity Conference we, the member fraternities of the Conference, reaffirm our acceptance of the responsibility for a positive contribution to the educational functions of the sheltering institutions, recognizing that the fraternity is under an obligation to promote the most complete personal development of its members—intellectually, morally, physically, and socially. We, therefore, declare that:

"1. The college social fraternity, conceived in 1776 and perpetuated as a system of service to higher education in 1825, believes in the cardinal traditions of the United States of America and the Dominion of Canada—reverence to God, allegiance to country, fidelity to representative government, and devotion to personal liberty.

"2. The Fraternity considers superior intellectual achievement and impeccable behavior as being incumbent upon all fraternity men.

"3. The Fraternity accepts the obligation that the association of any group of students as one of its chapters involves the responsibility of the group for the conduct of its members.

"4. The Fraternity is committed to the purpose of training its members in the arts and practices of living together, culturally and socially, and of giving them as much responsibility as they can carry with dignity and success, as a supplement to the curricular aims of the college and university.

"5. The Fraternity, created and developed by self-governing means, and being dependent upon voluntary methods for its continuing successful operation, deems self-determination in the selection of its membership to be implicit in its organization.

"6. The Fraternity, recognizing the need for organized, positive and responsible rapprochement between students and administrators of colleges and universities, promotes constructive leadership by its members in such matters as scholarship, housing standards, extra-curricular values, training for successful citizenship, and sound business practice both in chapter finances and in business relations of its members.

"In pursuit of the effective and complete fulfillment of these Principles, the fraternities of the Conference and their members renew their pledges of loyalty to the colleges and universities which have long extended to them the privileges and responsibilities of a home."

THE GOLDEN ANNIVERSARY

The Golden Anniversary Banquet held in the Grand Ballroom of the Waldorf-Astoria was a magnificent affair and a great tribute to L. G. Balfour and his Committee who planned and executed all details. Especially selected adornments of gold and white were tastefully arranged to give a breathless beauty to this golden occasion. The entire program was entertaining and inspiring and the completeness of careful planning gave each and every guest an evening to remember. The program opened with a presentation of colors by an honor guard from New York University. Miss Mildred Miller, star of the Metropolitan Opera Association, captivated her audience with a beautiful rendition of the Star Spangled Banner. Miss Annagene Brown, also of the Metropolitan Opera Association and substituting for Rose Bampton, sang the Maple Leaf Forever. Both Miss Miller and Miss Brown are members of Sigma Alpha Iota. Invocation was offered by the Reverend Doctor Franklin Clark Fry, Theta Delta Chi, President of the United Luthern Church in America. Mr. Lowell Thomas, scheduled to be the Toastmaster, was unable to serve due to illness and this function was ably performed by Doctor Robert W. Selig, Kappa Sigma, President of the Board of Trustees of the University of Denver. Guests at the head table included Judge Frank H. and Mrs. Myers, representing the Interfraternity Research and Advisory Council; Dr. and Mrs. Joseph D. Grigsby, Mrs. Grigsby, Delta Delta Delta, representing NPC; Dr. Frank H. Eby, Kappa Psi, representing PIC; and Mrs. Kathleen Davison, Sigma Alpha Iota, representing PPA. During dinner Miss Miller and Miss Brown and the Varsity Quartet of New York University Alumni provided additional entertainment.

Doctor John A. Krout, Alpha Tau Omega, Provost and Vice President of Columbia University, chose as the topic of his address "The College Fraternities' Contribution to American Democracy." Doctor Krout, a brilliant orator, stated that most of the criticisms of fraternities can be directed to non-members who are unable to explain the meaning of a Fraternity. Doctor Krout emphasized the opportunities for service by fraternities; the need to solve problems on the basis of understanding and good will, the recognized fact that operation of a fraternity chapter cannot be learned from a text, and the need to reconcile problems of local autonomy with central authority. "The greatest service," Dr. Krout stated, "is in the realm of the spiritual, beginning with the ritual which gives courage where it is needed, specifically the 'courage of the commonplace to stand and be counted'."

Mr. Eric A. Johnston, Theta Delta Chi, President of the Motion Picture Association of America, chose for his address, "The World Looks to America." "Leadership in the world of today," Mr. Johnston stated, "is difficult; it is filled with diverse problems; it necessitates patience and understanding; and above all it requires the courage for self-criticism." Mr. Johnston identified what he termed "The Seven Deadly Sins of America" which are: (1) softness, (2) inflexibility, (3) fear of taking the initiative, (4) neglect of education, (5) failure to plan for the future, (6) provincialism, and (7) the lack of national thrust or drive.



One of the resolutions approved at the 1959 Grand Council Convention recognized the important contributions that are made by our Grand Council Deputies, commonly called Faculty Advisors. On various occasions the Grand Officers have paid tribute to our many faculty brothers who have done so much to maintain the spirit and enthusiasm of our chapters. The approval of this resolution is the first time that formal recognition had been given to those whose many services and devotion to the Fraternity's ideals have been responsible, in a large measure, for the many fine chapters we have today. A copy of the resolution of appreciation suitable for framing has been forwarded to each of our Grand Council Deputies.

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ABOUT OUR FIFTY YEAR CHAPTERS—

During the present fraternity year a number of Kappa Psi Chapters have recognized the FIFTIETH ANNIVERSARIES of their founding. To each of these chapters this is an important milestone and one which Alpha Chapter recognizes as an outstanding achievement. A special CITATION OF HONOR in the form of a beautiful certificate has been prepared and will be presented to the following chapters before the end of the present college year: Chi Chapter, Psi Chapter, Omega Chapter, Beta Gamma Chapter and Beta Delta Chapter. Chapters which have already passed their Fiftieth Anniversaries and will receive the special certificate include: Gamma Chapter, Eta Chapter, Theta Chapter, Mu Chapter and Upsilon Chapter. To each of these fine chapters, the Grand Officers and the membership of the Fraternity extend warm congratulations for their loyalty, their many years of devotion to the ideals of Kappa Psi and for the many services they have contributed to their profession.

ABOUT THE RECOGNITION OF SCHOLARSHIP ACHIEVEMENT—

Kappa Psi Fraternity now sponsors two very fine awards which are presented annually for scholarship achievement on a national level: (1) the Grand Council Scholarship Key and Certificate for the member who receives first honors in the entire graduating class in the school of pharmacy and (2) the recently established Scholarship Honors Certificate for junior and senior students who achieve a grade point average of three (3) or the equivalent B grade for the entire year. Both awards are supplied to the members without cost to the chapters and both are designed to promote recognition for significant scholarship achievement. In addition to the awards, suitable recognition is given to the recipients in the Scholarship Issue of THE MASK in November of each year. It is important that each member of the Fraternity, who has qualified for either of the national awards, brings this to the attention of the Grand Council Deputy in order that proper certification may be obtained. Failure to report the names of those who have earned recognition for excellence in scholarship deprives the member of a deserved honor and the Fraternity fails to receive full recognition for the achievements of its members.

Some Highlights in the History of Kappa Psi*

We have used the above title intentionally to illustrate the point that what we know, honor and revere today as Kappa Psi Pharmaceutical Fraternity was not always known by that title. Like many a great organization this Fraternity had its humble origin in the form of a Greek Letter Society with chapters in two Military Academies in Connecticut, in the year 1879. Just before the turn of the century, in 1898, a few zealous members carried the ideals and tenets of the academic society over into the formation of a professional greek letter society. Thus from 1898 to 1924 the organization was a professional society whose members were comprised of students in and graduates of both medical and pharmacy schools. During this period the title was Kappa Psi Fraternity and as such was it incorporated in 1903. Only after the medical group severed connections in 1924, to become Theta Kappa Psi, did the pharmaceutical chapters become the Kappa Psi Pharmaceutical Fraternity.

Some time ago the Grand Sec'y-Treas., Brother Frank H. Eby made the very excellent suggestion that the Grand Historian might gather together some of the interesting facets in the history of our Beloved Fraternity, this to act as a sort of companion piece to the article published in the Jan.-Mar. 1958 issue of THE MASK under the title "The Grand Officers of Kappa Psi Pharmaceutical Fraternity 1925-1958."

After considerable searching of the material available, we concluded that a brief historical sketch of the past Grand Council Conventions would be most apropos to the occasion in view of the fact that we are here celebrating the 80th Anniversary of the founding of our Fraternity. Records of the very early conventions are non-existent as far as the writer is able to ascertain hence the first real records are the reports and references found in the earliest issues of THE MASK which was first published in January 1904.

Before proceeding any further in our report let us list the past conventions, their location, dates and the sponsoring (or host) chapter or chapters. Then we can recount a few of the events and transactions which occurred at some of the less recent ones.

In 1932, 1936, and 1940 no conventions were held, mainly due to financial inadvisability. Nominations and elections of officers and other important business was taken care of at meetings of the Alpha Chapter and Executive Committee. For example, in 1934 in conjunction with the A. Ph. A. Convention; in 1937 in a separate meeting after the chapters had been polled by mail whereupon the officers were installed at a meeting held at the subsequent A. Ph. A. Convention.

In the years 1896 to 1899 we have no way of knowing just how many conventions were held, or whether these conclaves were worthy of the name "Convention." Evidently, judging from the designation of 8th. for the 1905 Convention, only one convention of any consequence was held and that probably in 1899. At most we do know that some of the members of the reactivated chapter at Chesire Military Academy along with some from the Russell Military Academy and recently formed Hillhouse Military Academy chapters got together and organized a parent chapter called Alpha. This was done about 1898 in anticipation of the fact that some of the brothers intended to go on in their schooling and were planning to enter medical or pharmacy schools. There is no doubt in the writer's mind that this sort of organization, namely the formation of an Alpha Chapter to act as a sort of "Grand Lodge" which was empowered to charter and install subordinate chapters, proved to be one of the strongest supporting features of Kappa Psi Fraternity in the years that followed.

Time and space will not allow even a few comments on each of the past Kappa Psi Conventions so we shall merely spotcheck a small number of them. At the first recorded Convention, that of 1903, but seven chapters, including Alpha, made up the roster. They were:

All but one of the Grand Officers were present and all subordinate chapters had delegates in attendance. There were but three Grand Officers in those days: Grand Alpha (later changed to Grand Regent), Grand Omega (later changed to Grand Vice Regent) and Grand Secretary and Treasurer. Some of the delegates arrived on Wednesday, Thanksgiving Eve. The social program included a football game between Georgetown U. and Lehigh on Thanksgiving afternoon, a Banquet (at 10:00 p.m.) following an 8:15 p.m. business session and a Theatre Party on Friday evening. Two features common to these earlier day conventions were the ritual of offering "Toasts" at the traditional banquet, and the engagement of a photographer to take a group picture of the delegates and brothers in attendance. At this particular convention the delegates were quartered at two different hotels and the meetings were held at the Zeta Chapter House. There were seventeen delegates at this convention.

At the 1904 Convention in Philadelphia, the first business session was held on Thanksgiving morning in the Eta Chapter Room. Among the items dispensed with was the adoption of a "burial service" and an Official Fraternity Flag. At 12:30 a Thanksgiving Dinner at the Hotel Hanover and at 3:00 p.m. reconvened for business. This year there were four Grand Officers to be elected, the new one being the Editor in Chief of THE MASK. Social program included a sightseeing tour, a Theatre Party provided by the hosts—the brothers of Eta Chapter. In the event that any of our readers might be laboring under the illusion that only with modern day conveniences can a host chapter really show the visiting brothers a good time, let us quote excerpts from a few chapter letters in the issue of THE MASK following the 1904 Convention. Beta: "—returned with glowing descriptions of a good time, and of much good work done." Gamma: "—our delegates report the 'Time of Their Lives'—being royally entertained by Eta." Delta: "—since their return they have done nothing but sing the praises of our Philadelphia brothers whom they class as 'Princes of the First Water.'" Epsilon: "They firmly agree that Eta has captured the pennant as entertainers." and Eta: "—our sister chapters, no doubt, have had a report of the convention. We were indeed glad to be able to entertain such an enthusiastic crowd, typical Kappa Psi men—"

At the 1905 Convention a brand new constitution, consisting of 27 articles and over 100 sections was adopted after eleven hours of debate—each article and section being discussed separately. It was also at this convention that the name of this gathering was changed from that of "Grand Chapter" to Grand Council, a Grand Council per capita assessment was initiated so as to insure the financial soundness of future conventions, the Official Colors of Scarlet & Cadet Grey were adopted and provisions were made for the chartering of Alumni Chapters.

By the time of the 1910 Convention (12th Convention) there were 22 Active (now designated Collegiate) Chapters and 4 Alumni Chapters on the chapter rolls. Those registered included 45 delegates and 65 guests and non-delegates. Twenty-two States, two Foreign Countries and 65 Cities were represented by the delegates.

At the 1913 Convention the delegates included four of the five Grand Officers, representatives from 34 Collegiate Chapters and 9 Graduate Chapters. The Grand Officers voted upon at this Convention were: Grand Regent, Grand Vice Regent, Grand Secretary-Treasurer, Grand Historian and Editor and Grand Registrar. It is interesting to note at this time that the roster of chapters in THE MASK includes a group designated as "Academic Chapters (Out of Existence)" listed as follows:

Russell—Russell Military Academy (founded in 1879)—New Haven, Conn.

Cheshire—Cheshire Military Academy (installed in 1879)—Cheshire, Conn.

Hillhouse—Hillhouse High School (installed in 1894)—New Haven, Conn.

At the 1916 Convention the Grand Officers suggested that the social program of future conventions be reduced to "two or at most three features—1) an auto sightseeing trip, 2) a theatre party or Dance and 3) a final Convention Banquet." I wish you could see some of the menus of those banquets of 40 and 50 years ago, they would really make your mouth water. Among the items acted upon at this convention were the following: That the time for G.C. Conventions be changed to the Christmas Holidays, that L. G. Balfour Co. be made the Official Kappa Psi Jeweler and that a Scholarship Award be made annually to be known as the Grand Council Scholarship Key Award with essentially the same qualifications required as are in existence today. Due to a proposal at the 1913 Convention that any

Biennial Meeting Held by Professional Interfraternity Conference

Dr. Frank H. Eby Presented Certificate of Appreciation

The Biennial Meeting of the Professional Interfraternity Conference was held in Chicago, Illinois, at the Pick-Congress Hotel on Saturday and Sunday, March 19 and 20, with an attendance of 55 delegates and 6 guests. A total of 24 professional fraternities was represented at this meeting.

Highlights of the meeting were many as lively discussions developed following reports of the Law Committee by Meredith Daubin of Delta Theta Phi, the Committee on Alumni Relations by Richard S. Passmore of Alpha Kappa Psi, the Committee on Public Relations by Rand P. Hollenback of Phi Delta Chi, and the Committee on Professional Interfraternity Councils by J. D. Sparks of Alpha Kappa Psi.

One of the most interesting portions of the meeting was the afternoon devoted to a workshop which covered the subjects of "Central Office Operation," "National Dues and Source of Income," "Alumni Participation," and "Publications." This panel was ably conducted by Frank E. Gray of Phi Alpha Delta. Papers were presented by J. D. Thomson of Delta Sigma Pi, S. G. Applegate of Delta Sigma Delta, Alden L. Doud of Delta Theta Phi, C. W. Britzius of Theta Tau, Frank E. Gray of Phi Alpha Delta, Richard S. Passmore of Alpha Kappa Psi, Roy W. Loan of Alpha Chi Sigma, Frank H. Eby of Kappa Psi, Price Doyle of Phi Mu Alpha, and J. W. Pless of Phi Delta Phi.

At the Biennial Banquet held on Saturday evening, President-Elect Adelor J. Petit served as toast-master and Dean Fred H. Turner of the University of Illinois and editor of the IRAC Bulletin was the guest speaker. Dean Turner gave his impressions of the role of the professional fraternity on campuses today and predicted that this would be even more important in the future. Also in attendance at this Banquet was Mrs. Betty Hinkle Dunn, president of the Professional Panhellenic Association.

The Sunday morning session was devoted to the election of new officers and a discussion of hazing which brought about a vote by the Conference reaffirming the stand taken in 1956 against such practices. The new officers of the Professional Interfraternity Conference are President Adelor J. Petit of Phi Delta Phi, President-Elect Rand P. Hollenback of Phi Delta Chi, Vice President Meredith M. Daubin of Delta Theta Phi, Secretary James D. Thomson of Delta Sigma Pi, Treasurer S. G. Applegate of Delta Sigma Delta, and Directors Frank H. Eby of Kappa Psi, Roy W. Loan of Alpha Chi Sigma, C. H. William Ruhe of Phi Rho Sigma, and Edward L. Scheufler of Delta Theta Phi.

The meeting was concluded with the presentation of a certificate to Frank H. Eby in appreciation for the splendid job he had done as president of the Conference over the past two years.

In the January-March, 1960, THE MASK (Number 57), an item appeared on page 27 concerning the appointment of Dr. Allen I. White as dean of the school of pharmacy at Washington State University in Pullman. The title of the article stated that he was appointed dean of pharmacy at the University of Washington. This is an error and should have read—"Appointed Dean of Pharmacy at Washington State University."

Province V Assembly

Toledo, Ohio, April 9, 1960

The Province V Assembly started Friday evening, April 1 by the chapters of the province registering at the Fort-Meigs Hotel and then going from there to a stag party. The politicians were busy trying to get enough votes for their candidates, and the other brothers were singing and making new acquaintances. Everybody seemed to have a very good time.

The next morning with the sun shining too-too bright the Province V Assembly got into full swing. The Assembly was held in the student union on the University of Toledo campus at 11:00 A.M. The Assembly was called to order by Satrap James Tallman, Gamma Delta, with the invocation given by Chaplain Andy Kindle, Beta Lambda. The welcoming address was given by Dorsey Sergeant, Regent of Beta Lambda. Communications were then read and roll was taken. The following chapters were represented: Gamma Delta, Ohio Northern University; Gamma Chi, Ferris Institute; Xi, Ohio State University; and Beta Lambda, University of Toledo. The following chapters were absent: Gamma Iota, University of Buffalo; Buffalo Graduate Chapter; Beta Phi, University of Cincinnati; Mu Omicron Pi, Wayne State University; Columbus Graduate; and Detroit Graduate.

The report of the Secretary-Treasurer was given and Beta Phi and Mu Omicron Pi chapters owe dues from back years. The committees were appointed: Time and Place—Dave Gaydos, Xi chapter—chairman.

A report from the chapters of the province followed, which pointed out the various activities of these chapters. Adjournment of the first business session was at 12:30 and luncheon was served in the Auditorium Room of The Toledo University Student Union.

The second business session began at 2:30 P.M. The Call to Order came and roll call was taken. The Secretary-Treasurer then read his report of the first business session.

Committee reports were then presented to the assembly. Legislative Committee report: Brother Paul Volk, chairman of the committee brought forth a revision of the old constitution of the Province V Assembly. The changes were brought forth to the assembly and discussion followed. A motion to accept the revised constitution was seconded and passed. Auditing Committee report: a motion to accept the audit report submitted by Brother Dave Rodgers (chairman) was seconded and passed. Nomination Committee report: it presented no specific nominations. Nominations were then opened from the floor. The following officers were elected for the 1960-61 term:

Vice Satrap—Ed Hissam (Gamma Delta)
Secretary-Treasurer—Jim Weiss (Gamma Delta)
Historian—Andy Kindle (Beta Lambda)
Chaplain—Dave Gaydos (Xi)

Installation of officers was conducted by Satrap Tallman. New business was now conducted by Satrap Lajiness. Time and Place Committee report: the committee recommended that Xi chapter be the host chapter for the next Province Assembly. This was received as a motion, seconded and unanimously approved. Resolution Committee report: that Brother Paul Volk and his committee be given a vote of thanks for the swell job done on the revision of the constitution.

The floor was now open for new business. It seemed as if everybody had something

to put forth that would benefit the brotherhood of Province V. The first business was that of a sports tournament in basketball, football, and softball in which the final games would be played the night before the Province Assembly. A committee was appointed with Brother John Lajiness as chairman and a short recess was called. The meeting was then called to order and the committee reported that the sports tournament would be put upon a trial basis. A motion was made to accept the sports tournament on a trial basis; it was seconded and unanimously approved. Committee appointments were made by Satrap Lajiness and they included: Legislative Committee—Gamma Delta; Extension Committee—Gamma Chi; Auditing Committee—Xi; Scholarship Committee—Beta Lambda and Nomination Committee—Gamma Chi.

A discussion followed on how different functions could be improved by the Province, but nothing was put into a motion. A motion to adjourn was recognized and seconded at 5:30 P.M. Then there was a tour of the College of Pharmacy which was guided by Brother Ron Johnston and Brother Russell Miller.

This closes the doors on another successful Province V Assembly. So, till next year at Xi Chapter best of luck and may God be with you.

chapter whose delegates were absent at roll call be fined \$1.00, of the 104 delegates at the 1916 meeting there were but two absences at all of the business session of this Convention.

No convention was held in 1918 due mainly to the fact that the First World War had seriously decimated our ranks and too the medical schools were undergoing a decrease in numbers. Many schools were closing their doors or merging with other schools in order to meet stricter accreditation requirements. As a consequence many chapters found themselves without an Alma Mater and thus became dormant. It was at this time that two other Medical Fraternities merged with Kappa Psi Fraternity—Delta Omicron Alpha and Phi Delta. The Grand Officers and The Executive Committee did meet alone in New York City that year, however.

In 1920 and 1924 the Grand Council Conventions were held in divided sections, three in number, each section meeting at about the same time and each acting upon the same items of business. It was by act of the 1920 Convention that a Central Office under the jurisdiction of the Grand Editor and Registrar was first set up. Among the thirty some odd other items disposed of—not all were passed incidentally!—was that of initiating the office of Grand Council Deputy. At the latter Convention occurred the parting of the ways for the Medical and Pharmaceutical segments of Kappa Psi, all accomplished under the most amicable of terms.

Records of the more recent conventions—those of 1928, 1941 and 1947 thru 1957 (biennially) are more accessible to the reader. Many of our chapters, as was advised many years ago, have built up a series of bound volumes of THE MASK which serve as an invaluable source of such information as we are extracting here.

There are literally hundreds of interesting sidelights which we would very much like to comment upon, but which space does not allow. Items such as how the present Kappa Psi Breakfast at the A. Ph. A. started as a dinner or luncheon at the annual A. Ph. A. Conventions back in 1919, or how many chapters of Kappa Psi were instrumental in originating Student Branches of the American Pharmaceutical Association at many Pharmacy Schools, of how our own conventions were changed from annual affairs to once every four years and then in 1941 to biennial meetings, of how such diseases as Yellow Fever and Typhoid Fever prevented many a delegate from attending an early convention and so on and on.

Thruout the search of old copies of THE MASK one cannot help but become impressed at the great amount of unselfish devotion to the cause of Kappa Psi (and hence to our chosen Profession) with which a countless number of men have served. In the dark times of the depression and during the Two World Conflicts, our past Grand Officers, Committee members, many a G.C.D. and many a facultate or graduate brother struggled to keep the Spark of Kappa Psi alive. One very important building force and guiding light has ever been our publication THE MASK which has enjoyed a continuous existence since its very inception in 1904. But that is another story best told at some other time in a separate article.

Former Grand Regent Fischer Appointed Associate Dean of Pharmacy

Dr. Louis Fischer, professor of pharmacy and a former Grand Regent of Kappa Psi Pharmaceutical Fraternity, was appointed associate dean of pharmacy at the University of Washington effective March 28.

Professor Fischer, 54, had been a member of the University faculty since 1929, and he has been chairman of the pharmaceutical chemistry program of the College for the past 10 years. He has devoted his research efforts to the study of food and drug chemistry and he is a recognized authority on volatile oils.

As associate dean, Professor Fischer will assist Dean Jack Orr in the College's advising and counseling program, in addition to consulting with high school and junior college personnel on pre-pharmacy programs and with students seeking entrance to the College.

From 1955 to 1957, Professor Fischer was national Grand Regent of Kappa Psi after having served as Vice Regent for six years. He is a member of the Revision Committee of the U.S. Pharmacopoeia, and he is the author of numerous articles for professional journals.

life blood of Kappa Psi. We need much more of it. Yet it would be very difficult to confine the Provinces to those areas where the need is acute. We can not disenfranchise other areas. Certainly we do not want dummy provinces voting in our Conventions. We do not want to ask our busy people to spend their time and money going to meetings which are entirely sterile. I am sure that this has happened too frequently. I suppose like everything else the productivity of these meetings depends upon the age old factors—leadership and self-sacrifice. Where these have been abundant meetings have been constructive. You people in the provinces are the only ones who can resolve this problem. There are only three possible solutions—kill it, culture it or live with it until we learn more about its potential.

I find myself in the position where the province may have a future but mine is pretty dim in discussing it. I think that there are some pertinent features. Number one I believe our active, effective leadership is increasing rapidly. There are two things we should consider here. Most important utilizing this interest and leadership in some way and two the effect of this leadership upon the quality of province activities. I think the need for activity beyond minimum requirements is a must for Kappa Psi as it is for any other organization or any human activity. I believe we are becoming more conscious of this and more willing to make the sacrifice. I believe in our Democracy but I also believe it needs to restore the decency, the integrity and the role played by the individual. I repeat—one reason for my reluctance to destroy the province is that we have this capable, effective manpower and we need places in which it can express itself and therefore grow—even as we will grow. I would guess that the greatest weaknesses of the provinces are geography and inadequate planning and preparation. We could lick geography by realigning the provinces. This would result in certain inequalities. Groups having two or three chapters would have the same voting strength as would the larger groups. This may not be too serious.

There were enough unsolved problems discussed at the last Grand Council Convention for a dozen fruitful province meetings. There exist many more equally important problems which might be discussed. Even problems not directly related to Kappa Psi. I think it would be of untold significance to the whole organization if these were discussed locally before they were discussed nationally. To close in a fog of venom—we can make the province significant or we can forget it.
