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

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The Fraternity breakfast was held March 28, in the Camellia Room, Thunderbird Hotel, at the 109th annual meeting of the American Pharmaceutical Association in Las Vegas, Nevada. One hundred and twenty-five brothers attended. Traditionally the breakfast has a very limited formal program associated with it. J. Warren Lansdowne, president of the American Pharmaceutical Association, and our fraternity brother, was introduced. His presidential duties were tremendous during the week of the convention. He had many askings of his time. Even so, he was able to be with the group for breakfast.

Special recognition was given to Captain George F. Archambault, United States Public Health Service and president-elect of the A.Ph.A. He was awarded a Certificate of Appreciation. This is the highest award given by the Fraternity to a member. The brother who was most influential in encouraging Dr. Archambault into fraternity membership some thirty-three years ago was also present. He is Brother Lucien H. LeMaitre.

PROVINCE ASSEMBLIES

The Constitution of our Fraternity provides for a geographical division into Provinces each of which is composed of all the chapters within the boundaries of that Province. Each Province is empowered to adopt whatever rules and regulations are deemed necessary to govern the chapters encompassed in the territory provided that such legislation does not conflict with the Constitution or legal edicts of the Grand Council. It is necessary, and most important, that each Province meet every two years, or more often if necessary. These meetings are to alternate with the conventions of the Grand Council. Many of the most worthwhile efforts of the Fraternity are carried out at the Province meetings. It is an opportunity to share ideas, to cultivate brotherhood and to nurture the philosophy of fraternalism. Such meetings may enable one to evaluate the activities and the program of one chapter with those of another chapter. One can better evaluate the contribution that an individual member and a chapter member is making in the way of service to his university and community.

Your Province officers may already have initiated plans for such a meeting sometime in the coming year. Give your complete support and attention to the advantages of a well-attended and planned Province meeting. The best helping hand you can find is at the end of your arm.

Province V Assembly

ADA, OHIO, MARCH 30 & 31, 1962

Representatives of Gamma Delta, Beta Lambda, Mu Omicron Pi, Gamma Chi, Beta Phi, and Buffalo Graduate Chapters were in attendance at the Province V Assembly held at Ohio Northern University, Ada, Ohio, on March 30 and 31, 1962.

Friday, March 30, registration for all Brothers attending was held at the Argonne Hotel in Lima, Ohio, from 5:30 to 8:00 P.M. A banquet for approximately 65 brothers began at 8.00 in the hotel. Speaker for the evening was Brother Roger Cain, past Satrap of Province V, and president-elect of the Miami Valley Pharmaceutical Association. The topic of his speech was "Blueprint for Professionalism in Pharmacy." He warned us against the evils of the entrance of unions in Pharmacy, and how we should build ourselves to be more ethical pharmacists. There was a short stag party after the banquet.

Saturday Morning, March 31, Satrap Andrew Kindle called the first business meeting to order at the Dukes Pharmacy Building. A welcome was given to the convention by Brother James C. Newcomb, professor of pharmacy preparations at O.N.U. Chapter reports were given, and Brother Jake Caroatta, Buffalo Graduate Chapter, told of the first Province V Newsletter. The meeting was adjourned and a luncheon was given at the Gamma Delta Chapter House.

The second business meeting was held at the Gamma Delta Chapter House. A motion was passed making Brother Caroatta editor of the Province V Newsletter, with Brother Al Fischer of Beta Lambda as his assistant. Several amendments to the constitution were made. The site of the 1962 Assembly was given to Gamma Chi Chapter at Ferris Institute.





What Is Your Trait-Rating?*

Supposing your parents received a report on your standing at school some day like the following. Would you think it worthy of you? At any rate, it is the sort of record some pharmacy students are making.

Honesty	F	Courtesy	D
Accuracy	F	Judgment	D
Cleanliness	D	Tact	F
Dependability	F	Professional Interest	D

Scholastic reports are issued regularly; professional trait reports are not prepared and distributed, but nevertheless they are mentally, if not visibly, recorded and are likely to have an even greater bearing on your future than your scholastic report. Certainly a student with all A's in the above list and C's in all his studies will be a better pharmacist than a student who rated all A's scholastically and C's in the list above. No one expects every professional man to be a mental giant, but the professional man who has lost his reputation for honesty and accuracy is a failure.

No grade is important enough to risk a reputation for dishonesty to achieve; the reputation will survive long after the mark is forgotten. And yet there are some students foolish enough not to appreciate this!

A study made some years ago, and based on the judgment of a group of pharmacists, teachers, and customers, showed that twelve of the most important traits for a successful pharmacist to have are Accuracy, Honesty, Dependability, Professional Technique, Cleanliness, Ability to Gain Confidence, Service, Intelligence, Courtesy, Judgment, Professional Interest, and Industry. Some of these, of course, are dependent upon others—Ability to Gain Confidence, for instance, is dependent upon most of the others. One can think of other desirable traits not included in this list. I think Consideration for Others and Thoughtfulness are very important. Possibly they would come under Courtesy and Service.

I am glad to say that I believe almost all Kappa Psi Brothers already rate A in Honesty, Courtesy, and Cleanliness, but I believe there is still room for considerable improvement for many of them in most of the other traits, such as, Accuracy, Dependability, Professional Interest, etc. In stating this, I do not think I am being unfair to Kappa Psi, for I might say that the same holds, though to a somewhat lesser extent because of greater experience and maturity for most faculty members. My reason for stating it is as a basis for improvement. Most of these traits can be developed. The pharmacist with a desire to make something of himself steadily improves in those traits in which he is weak.

What do you honestly think *YOUR* rating on the above traits would be? What can you do to improve your standing in these in which you are weak?

Although trait reports are not given to students they are often asked for by prospective employees, and in connection with ratings and commissions in the armed forces. A student has no more reason to expect a faculty member to falsify a character report than he would a scholarship report.

Don't let your desire to achieve scholastic success cause you to lose sight of the fact that you are constantly under observation concerning something even more important—your ranking on professional traits, such as those listed above. Your regularity of attendance, your alertness in class, your manner during written work, how you conduct yourself in the laboratory, your attitude toward assignments, the care you take in your

personal appearance—all these and many other things you do every day count more than any of you ever realize in the reputation you are making for yourselves. And remember that a grade of F in Honesty is far more difficult to convert to an A than an F in any subject of our entire curriculum. Once you are found to be dishonest even in small things, it takes overwhelming evidence on the other side just to bring you back to par.

Not every Kappa Psi Brother can achieve an all B scholastic average, try as he may. Perhaps not every student can achieve an all B professional trait average either, but it is even more worthwhile trying for than the other—if you can't do both!

Program Committee Report of a Collegiate Chapter

(Editor's Note: The following article was prepared by Russell R. Miller, Chairman of the Program Committee of Beta Lambda Chapter during 1960-61. It expresses some important ideas showing how one chapter organizes its programs and it contains some suggestions that may be helpful to other chapters in this important area.)

This report has been prepared with two purposes in mind: 1—To give a report of the work of the Committee during the last year and a half, and 2—To serve as a guide to the functions and objectives of the Program Committee.

In accordance with the provisions of the Constitution and the Chapter By-Laws, the primary purpose of the Program Committee is to sponsor and make all the necessary arrangements for at least two professional meetings during the school year. Beta Lambda Chapter has met this objective during the past year and a half by presenting three distinguished speakers to the College of Pharmacy and the general public on behalf of the Fraternity. Individual brochures from each of these meetings have been included with this report.

The professional meeting is one of the distinctive features of our Fraternity. It sets us aside from and above other fraternal organizations. It serves to show others and ourselves that our objectives as a fraternity are not only to provide social activity during our college days but also to provide some professional orientation. For this and other reasons, the professional meeting is of vital importance and should not be neglected. It might be appropriate to point out here that Kappa Psi is not and was not intended to be a professional organization in the real sense of the words. Our sole objective is not the advancement of the profession. Rather, we hope to develop each of our persons for service in the profession of pharmacy and we can do this best by having a well-rounded calendar of activities, part of which emphasizes the professional aspects of our college training.

Most of the remaining portion of this report deals with the planning of a professional meeting and has been prepared to serve as a partial pattern for future undertakings of the Program Committee.

The first consideration in organizing a professional meeting is the selection of a speaker. The Committee should find someone who is outstanding in his particular field and a person who has the rather exceptional ability of being able to deliver a speech in a manner which will interest everyone. Such a speaker is usually a member of the health professions but not always necessarily so. As an example, Dr. John Turin, a physicist, recently presented a talk to the Rho Chi Society on "The Impact of Physics on Other Sciences"; this was a most stimulating and interesting topic and was well presented.

Some speakers are well qualified to speak on general topics which, although not directly related to the health sciences, are nevertheless of great interest to us. An example

of this type of speaker is Douglas E. Harding, architect, lecturer and author of "The Universe Revalued" which appeared as an "Adventure of the Mind" in a recent edition of the *Saturday Evening Post*. As scientific and intellectual individuals this type of speaker should be welcome to us.

A second consideration is the availability of the individual for a speaking engagement. Since the Chapter cannot afford the expenses of long distance travel and accommodations, the Program Committee is limited in its choice of speakers to those living within a reasonable distance. Usually this is not as limiting as one might think. There is always the possibility that an important person and qualified speaker may be passing through the area during the school year; this should be kept in mind when selecting speakers.

Often a speaker may not be available on the desired date so it is advisable to have several people in mind if a date for the professional meeting definitely has been set. Usually if arrangements are made well ahead of time a date can be selected which will be suitable for both the speaker and the Committee. Good planning calls for making arrangements three to six months in advance, depending on the speaker. The planning of professional meetings should be considered a long-range project; arrangements were made for this school year during the early part of last summer.

Further preparation for the professional meeting involves publicity for the most part. Reservation of a room in the Student Union and provision for refreshments are matters which require little time and effort but which should be done well in advance.

During the past year the practice of printing biographical brochures has been instituted as a part of the publicity program. They serve to inform the students on what to expect and when and where the professional meeting will be held. Posters and displays on the speaker's topic are also very important publicity aids. The local newspapers should always be given full details at least 10 days in advance through the Public Relations Office of the University.

When the speaker is invited his wife should be invited, also, and as a courtesy to the speaker, he and his wife usually are taken to dinner the evening of the professional meeting. By having his wife with him usually the speaker is much more at ease and a dinner prior to the meeting also serves to make him feel he is welcome and helps to put him at ease. By showing the speaker and his wife every courtesy the Chapter and the College are sure to benefit from this brief contact.

The professional meeting serves to provide the Fraternity and the College with some information or thought which they previously were not fully aware of. By so doing the professional meeting in itself partially serves a very important function: to keep the students, as future members of the profession, fully aware of their obligations to pharmacy, to other health professions and to mankind. If this objective is fulfilled, then the professional meeting has served its purpose.

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GRAND REGENT FORSLUND MAKES VISITATION

On February 1, 1962, Grand Regent Herman C. Forslund visited the Beta Omicron Chapter. He was the banquet speaker following the initiation of thirteen members. His talk was on fraternal responsibilities.

Our Moral Obligations as Ethical Pharmacists

(Editor's Note: The following article represents the text of a talk presented at a recent meeting of Gamma Gamma Xi Chapter by its Chaplain, Brother Larrison Vickery.)

An ethical pharmacist has his aims set high. If applied to a pharmacist's professional activities and business transactions, pharmaceutical ethics serve as a set of excellent professional and business principles. It is essential that pharmacists have a code for self-government because they are entrusted with a share of public health and welfare. A good code will have a positive effect on the profession as a whole, as well as on pharmacists as individuals.

The properly motivated person who is resourceful and courageous will develop the virtues essential in the character of a good pharmacist. Such a code has to do with moral values and proper conduct. It serves the pharmacist as a basis for judgment in his social, professional, and business life.

The virtues of a code which form the basis of ethical character are wisdom, courage, self-control, honesty, and justice. We know that a pharmacist is obligated to be well informed. This infers a knowledge of science and how it is applied in pharmacy. But wisdom as a virtue means much more than knowledge. Wisdom means intelligent differentiation between right and wrong. It is not intellectual brilliance alone, but knowledge plus understanding, and the practical application of these two virtues is what constitutes wisdom. A pharmacist may be an expert as far as knowledge and skill are concerned, but he may lack the ability to apply his knowledge wisely. Wisdom is not acquired by reading books entirely. It is a virtue which must be cultivated.

A courageous pharmacist will pursue or defend that which he holds as his conviction of what ought to be done. More loyal pharmacists with courage are always in great demand by the profession. It takes courage to carry out improvements under obstacles and in the face of opposition.

Self-control is the virtue which implies moderation. Self-control means the control of impulses and desires in the interest of the individual, his profession and the public.

The importance of honesty as a cardinal virtue for a pharmacist may be emphasized by considering the results of deceit. Deception or fraud has no place in the profession. The person who comes to a pharmacist for advice believes the pharmacist possesses a knowledge and wisdom beyond his own. Such a trusting person may suffer personal injury directly, or indirectly if he postpones seeking competent medical advice. It is important for the pharmacist to be honest and truthful, since he counsels his customers regarding their health.

Justice has been considered the supreme virtue. It represents a combination of other virtues. Wisdom, courage, self-control, and honesty by themselves do not make a person completely ethical. They must be tempered with justice. Justice must be included in the practice of pharmacy by applying all the virtues as they affect other persons, since it means respecting the rights of others. Justice is the virtue that makes a pharmacist a completely ethical human being. If he deals with his customers unselfishly, with wisdom, with self-control, and with truthfulness, he will earn and deserve a good reputation as a man and as a pharmacist.

MacCartney Succeeds Sickels as Parke-Davis Director of Public Relations

John A. MacCartney (Kappa Psi), director of professional relations for Parke, Davis & Company since 1946, has been appointed director of public relations for the world-wide pharmaceutical firm.

In his new position, MacCartney succeeds Ralph G. Sickels, who will remain with the firm in an advisory capacity until the end of this year, according to Carl Johnson, vice-president, advertising and public relations.

Sickels will retire Dec. 31, after 40 years of service in an advertising-public relations capacity with Parke-Davis.

A successor to fill the vacancy created by MacCartney's appointment has not been named.

MacCartney, 54, is a professional pharmacist; a past president (1956-57) of the 30,000-member American Pharmaceutical Association; a fluent speaker who has delivered some 800 talks in behalf of pharmacy and Parke-Davis throughout the U.S.; a World War II veteran and a colonel in the U.S. Army Reserve.

He has been with Parke-Davis for 31 years.

A native of Claysville, Pa., MacCartney worked his way through the University of Pittsburgh College of Pharmacy, graduating in 1928, the same year he joined Parke-Davis as a sales representative.

His first assignment was a territory in Western Pennsylvania which included his father's drug store and about 200 others. Two years later he became a medical service representative with headquarters at Erie, Pa. Starting in 1935, he held the same post with headquarters at Rochester, N.Y., remaining there until called to active duty with the U.S. Army in January, 1942.

MacCartney served with the Medical Corps in St. Louis and the Surgeon General's office in Washington before attending the Naval School of Military Government at Princeton. There he was trained for duty in the Far East and learned the Japanese language.

Late in 1944, he was ordered overseas and assigned to the 77th Infantry Division. He took part in the Philippine and Okinawa campaigns and later served as chief of medical supply in Korea, which included management of a number of Korean manufacturing plants—pharmaceutical and surgical, as well as tobacco, oil, and fertilizer.

MacCartney returned to the U.S. in 1946 and rejoined Parke-Davis at its main offices at Detroit in July of that year. The pharmaceutical firm created a new professional relations department in 1946, and MacCartney was made its first director, the post he held until his public relations appointment.

In addition to being a member and past president of the American Pharmaceutical Association, he is a member of the American Association for the Advancement of Science; the Federation Internationale Pharmaceutique; the U.S. Department of Commerce National Defense Executive Reserve; the American Legion; Veterans of Foreign Wars; a member of the Michigan Academy of Pharmacy and Michigan Pharmaceutical Association.

He and Mrs. MacCartney live in (917 University Place) Grosse Pointe, Mich., a Detroit suburb.

Our chapter looks forward to a year of unlimited achievements for Kappa Psi.




