

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From the Desk of the Grand Regent

A number of chapters have expressed concern over the recent action of the Executive Committee in announcing a change in province structure, with the realignment to become effective two years after our Grand Council Convention this December, and I would like to comment on this situation.

The Constitution, of course, is our Fraternity's final authority. It states that the Fraternity shall be divided geographically into provinces whose boundaries are to be decided by the Executive Committee; and the intent was that the provinces would be related to the Fraternity as a whole in the same general way that the individual states are related to the Federal Government.

Within each province the member chapters are expected to communicate, meet biennially as provided for in the Constitution, and work together to strengthen each other and the entire national structure. Some provinces have been able to develop strong bonds of fraternalism between their chapters while others have not even been able to have meetings. Since the provinces were last laid out by the Executive Committee, a number of new chapters have been chartered and several have been inactivated, so the "population" of the provinces has changed.

Since the main purpose of the provinces is to help make the individual chapters stronger and to help them play a stronger role in the national picture, it is necessary that the provinces themselves be strong and active. In recent years about half of our provinces have shown considerable progress and growth in respect to their activity, but almost an equal number of provinces have either been inactive or have, through no fault of their own, lacked the needed strength to be of benefit to the member chapters.

The Executive Committee, reviewing the situation, has been anxious to establish the best possible province arrangement which would help all chapters. In the past four years, three different committees have been appointed to study the situation. None of the three has agreed with the findings of the other two. However, a special committee composed of three members of the Executive Committee, based on an impartial appraisal of all province activities, and of previous committee reports, recommended a new province alignment. This was discussed and considered in detail by the entire Executive Committee and approved as being the alignment which should benefit the most chapters and the Fraternity as a whole.

The announcement of the change has been made two years in advance to permit all chapters to consider their new location, to make arrangements for any changes which may be necessary, and to make their objections known, *supported by valid reasons*, to the Grand Council if they have any. If, in any instance, a predominately strong individual chapter has been placed in what is now a weak province, I would hope that the members of that chapter would practice one of the cardinal virtues of Kappa Psi—Fellowship—and strive to strengthen the province

A COLLEGE PRESIDENT'S VIEWS ON FRATERNITIES

The Franklin and Marshall Alumni Magazine for April, 1964, publishes several articles on fraternities at that institution. Included is an excellent statement by Doctor Keith Spalding, President of Franklin and Marshall, on "The College and Fraternity Life." The following paragraphs conclude his very good article:

"It is clear that the fraternities, generally, are affected by criticism they receive. They want greater self-esteem; they seek a better understanding of their purpose or purposes. Finally, they want some assurances from the College—some assurances of a kind which they have a right to receive. . . .

"As president of the College, I feel bound to be supportive of the fraternity system and to continue to offer my assistance to the fraternities in their efforts to maintain their financial, social and academic health. I will continue to offer my advice, whenever it is wanted, as to how fraternities can relate themselves better to the College.

"I hold this position willingly because I think fraternities can be a force for good on the campus. As President of the College, I support the College's policies. Consider these facts: The existence of fraternities on this campus is a fact. They have been welcomed and recognized by the College. They have existed here for many years. They have become an integral part of the residential nature of the College. They provide social and recreational outlets for students. Some of them are cultural assets and in the broader sense of the word, provide an educational social experience for students. Most of them, with some lamentable exceptions which distress me greatly, are concerned with their academic records and care about the educational functions of the College. Thus, I must and will support and seek to improve the fraternity system so long as it is the College policy to have them here. I must add further that there is no plan to change that policy.

"So that I will not be misunderstood, let me make sure you understand that I do not feel bound to defend fraternities for their shortcomings, nor to tolerate any facets of their activities which are harmful to the College. And there are some shortcomings and harmful activities which the College will do all it can to assure that the fraternities overcome.

"In short, I think the future of fraternities on this campus depends on the fraternity themselves.

"If they are not responsible to changing social attitudes; if they cannot offer to prospective members anything more than a supposed freedom from College restraint; if they offer only conviviality rather than true association and fellowship; if they become egocentric and defensive and isolated—then they will surely fail.

"By contrast, if they take on a feeling of responsibility toward the College equal to that feeling of obligation the College has for fraternities; if their members are perceptive and earnest in their effort to relate their institutions to the College community; if they do provide for their members programs and purpose germane to modern life (as all institutions are having to do)—then I think they have a bright future. And in this course they would have my enthusiastic support."

by giving of their time and energies. I would also hope that provinces which have not been active in the past will take a new lease on life, elect aggressive officers, and make themselves recognized by the rest of the Fraternity.

I would emphasize that the new alignment has been announced because it is the sincere opinion of those of us who have studied our organization *from a national viewpoint* that the new province assignments will make a better integrated and stronger Kappa Psi. It will help us build and grow, and will give new life to some of our weaker chapters. There is no intent to break down any province simply because it is a big one, or because it is becoming too powerful. We want all of our provinces to be strong, and we hope that the next few years will see an increased spirit of regional and province cooperation. We must stand united if we are to maintain our position as the most respected pharmaceutical fraternity in the world.

Grand Regent Sperandio has instructed me to prepare this report of the income and expenses of our Fraternity so that the brothers may have a better idea of just how their money is being spent. It is important to note that from July 1, 1960 to December 31, 1965 the net assets of Kappa Psi were increased from \$49,266.05 to \$60,372.89, an increase of almost 20% while there was no reduction in the services offered by the Central Office under Dr. Frank H. Eby's direction. It is significant also to note that only one per capita assessment increase occurred, and this was not until July 1, 1964. The audit for the six-month period July 1-December 31, 1964, shows that Kappa Psi is in excellent financial condition. It is important to

note that the audit is for a six-month period because (1) Kappa Psi has changed its fiscal affairs to a calendar year (January 1-December 31), and (2) the audit was required to bring Dr. Eby's tenure in office to a close.

Inasmuch as the last full fiscal report was issued as of June 30, 1964, the income and expense analysis is based on that report. Income for the July 1, 1963-June 30, 1964 fiscal period was received from eight different sources:

1. Initiation Fees	52.8%	5. Investment Income	2.0%

Expenses were distributed in six major areas. The largest single expenditure was the publications of THE MASK, 27.2% of total expenses. The expenses breakdown is as follows:

1. Publication of THE MASK	27.2%
2. Operation of the Central Office	24.1%
3. Honorariums	19.2%
4. Chapter Visitations and Meetings	11.1%
5. Convention Expenses from Current Income	10.1%
6. Miscellaneous Expenditures:	8.7%

- a. Chapter supplies
- b. Miscellaneous expenses
- c. Dues and subscriptions, etc.

In view of the services which have been rendered by the Fraternity to its members, and the secure financial position which has been developed over the last decade, it is more than fair to say that the Officers and Executive Committee have prudently and wisely administered the funds of Kappa Psi.

Province Realignment Takes Effect

January—1968

In the final session, on November 7, 1964, in meeting assembled in Washington, D.C., the Executive Committee of Kappa Psi Pharmaceutical Fraternity voted that a new Province Realignment will become effective on January 1, 1968. Every chapter of our Fraternity and all members should be given the opportunity to share in the fellowship and exchange of ideas which attendance at a province assembly offers, by traveling a minimum distance from the home campus. In the interests of the continued welfare and growth of Kappa Psi Pharmaceutical Fraternity, the membership of the present eleven provinces of our Fraternity will be reapportioned as follows:

Upon the recommendation of a special subcommittee appointed to study the reapportionment, the Executive Committee voted that:

1. Any reapportionment of Kappa Psi Chapter into provinces must be based upon the greatest benefit to the whole Fraternity as well as on the desires of the individual and respective chapters involved.
2. Notice of this Executive Committee Action be distributed, in writing, to each collegiate chapter at least six months prior to the December 1965 Grand Council Convention.
3. In view of the adjustments in dues paid, in province officers etc. occasioned by the movement of some chapters from one province to another province, the new alignment shall become effective two years from the time of the 1965 Grand Council Convention or on January 1, 1968.


HONORED BY FRATERNITY

Province V Assembly

On April 2, brothers representing six of the nine Province V chapters gathered in Lima, Ohio for the annual Province V Assembly. Those chapters represented were: Gamma Chi (Ferris Institute), Beta Lambda (University of Toledo), Mu Omicron Pi (Wayne State University), Gamma Delta (Ohio Northern University), Beta Phi (University of Cincinnati), and Detroit Graduate. The program officially started at 7:00 p.m. that night with a banquet and speech by Dr. Robert P. Fischelis, dean of Ohio Northern University, College of Pharmacy, followed by a party.

At 8:00 a.m. on April 3, 1965 the assembly was called to order by Satrap Joe Cavouto (Beta Lambda) in the Ohio Northern University Student Union. Following the invocation by Province V Chaplain, Ron Sherman (Gamma Chi), Dr. A. C. Smith, Grand Council Deputy of Gamma Delta welcomed the representatives from the two states. Satrap Joe Cavouto then read the communications, followed by roll call of the delegates. Secretary-Treasurer, Chuck Fowler (Gamma Delta) then read the minutes of the 1964 Province V Assembly. The minutes were approved. Chapter reports were then presented from the respective chapters. Adjournment for lunch followed.

At 1:00 p.m. the second business meeting was called to order by Satrap Joe Cavouto at the Gamma Delta House. Roll call of the delegates and the reading and acceptance of the secretary's report of the first business meeting followed. The Time and Place Committee recommended that the 1966 Province V Assembly be held at the University of Cincinnati with Beta Phi as the host chapter. Elections of new officers found: Chuck Fowler (Gamma Delta), Satrap; Robert Byrnes (Gamma Chi), Vice Satrap; Frank Facione (Detroit Graduate), Secretary-Treasurer; Robert Krell (Beta Lambda), Historian; Don Stein (Beta Lambda), Chaplain. The new officers were installed by Satrap Joe Cavouto according to the ritual. Bill Davidson (Gamma Chi) was elected to represent Province V at the 33rd National Convention. It was announced that Gamma Chi won the attendance trophy this year.

A number of resolutions were read and approved before the assembly. It was decided that the newsletter will remain at Gamma Delta. The attendance trophy will no longer be awarded on the basis of the most members present. It will be awarded to the chapter with the largest percentage of its membership present. After every chapter report there will be a discussion of the content of the report. It was resolved that the past Secretary-Treasurer will contact the new Secretary-Treasurer one month after the installation to acquaint the new Secretary-Treasurer with the office. It was also decided that Province V would give Chuck Fowler a well deserved thanks for the effective and enjoyable convention. There being no further business Province V Assembly was closed.

Province V would also like to thank Gamma Delta for the typical Kappa Psi hospitality extended to all brothers.

Province VII Assembly

The Province VII Assembly was held on November 6, and 7, 1964 at the University of Texas' Academic Center in Austin, Texas. Gamma Gamma Chapter of the University of Texas served as host. Registration and a Get-Acquainted Party were held on Friday.

The Assembly was called to order at 9:25 A.M. with Satrap August Danti presiding. The Invocation was given by Brother Don Thompson (Psi). The delegates, guests, and Province officers were welcomed to the Austin Campus by Lee F. Worrell, dean of the College of Pharmacy, of the University of Texas. Brother Keith Dunavant, Regent of Gamma Gamma, welcomed the Assembly also.

Satrap Danti recognized the delegates of Delta Beta Chapter, Southwestern State College, Weatherford, Oklahoma, and Delta Delta Chapter of the University of Houston as new members of Province VII.

Grand Officers Wallace L. Guess, Second Grand Vice Regent, Gerald Henney, Grand Counselor, and Richard M. Doughty, Grand Ritualist were recognized by Satrap Danti.

Province Secretary-Treasurer Richard Doughty officiated in the seating of delegates present. There were 26 official delegates representing nine chapters present.

Province officers then presented their Biennial Reports.

Brother Gerald Henney, official delegate to the Grand Council Convention from Province VII gave a report on that meeting. Brother Henney reported that Province VII was successful in electing three of its nominees to Grand Offices.

Satrap Danti appointed members to fill out the committee vacancies.

After a coffee break Dr. Gerald Henney spoke on "What Kappa Psi can Mean to You and Your College." Grand Ritualist Richard Doughty then gave a discussion on "Kappa Psi's Ritual."

After an adjournment for lunch the Assembly reconvened at 2:05 P.M. and the reports of the chapters were presented. All chapters are to be highly commended for their outstanding work.

Under "New Business" Dr. Henney reminded the Brothers of the increase in the Initiation Fee to National. Brother Doughty suggested that the Province Constitution be revised and reprinted with the Province bearing the cost.

The committee reports were next on the agenda. Scholarship Established to Honor Editor of *The Mask*


A new perpetual scholarship has been established at the University of Connecticut in honor of Brother Nicholas W. Fenney, professor of pharmacy and also Editor of *THE MASK* of Kappa Psi Fraternity.

To finance the Nicholas W. Fenney Annual Scholarship Award, the Connecticut Pharmaceutical Association has presented the University a gift of \$6,500.

In making the grant (April 21), representatives of the Association noted that the scholarship was in recognition of Professor Fenney's exceptional contributions to the pharmacy profession, both in the state and nationally.

Under terms of the scholarship, a \$250 award will be made each year to a pharmacy student entering either of the last two years of study at the U. of C. Other bases for selection include: Connecticut residency, financial need, character, scholastic attainment and promise of future contributions as a member of the profession.

Earlier this year, editor Fenney received one of two "Distinguished Faculty Awards" issued annually by the University of Connecticut Associated Student Government. His selection was made after a campus-wide poll of all 8,500 students. Voting was on the basis of the knowledge of the instructor in his field, course organization, selection of texts and outside readings, the ability of the instructor to encourage originality and creative thought, the general attitude of the instructor towards the students, and his ability to hold the intellectual interest of the class.





As the new *Historian* for Eta chapter, I believe this year will be one of great accomplishment both socially and professionally for our Chapter.




GAMMA UPSILON—UNIVERSITY OF ARIZONA

U.S. Pharmacopeia XVII Published

U.S.P. XVII the completely revised new *Pharmacopeia*, will be published in May, and will become effective September 1, 1965. Of the 898 monographs in U.S.P. XVII, 156 represent newly recognized articles. A total of 201 articles recognized in the previous revision have been omitted as no longer meeting the requirements for U.S.P. listing.

In meeting the new criteria of adequacy, U.S.P. XVII provides purity limits and assays for 26 drugs for which none had been required previously. For 62 other articles, substantial changes have been made in the assays in the interest of greater specificity or accuracy.

For pharmacist and physician alike, one of the most helpful innovations in U.S.P. XVII is the list of the drugs classified by their pharmacologic action or pharmaceutical utility. This list, including 165 category headings and subheadings, indicates the wide array of identifiable activities represented in today's important drugs as well as the variety of therapeutic purposes that the drugs serve.


Under the terms of the Drug Amendments of 1962, each drug is to be designated by only one nonproprietary name, a fact that attaches great importance to the titles in U.S.P. XVII, since the law requires that they be used in all labeling, advertising and promotional literature on drugs. Accordingly, the U.S.P. XVII monograph titles have been chosen with great care. Since all synonyms have been dropped from the U.S.P. monographs, an entire new chapter on nomenclature lists the synonyms together with other designations for purposes of reference and identification.

More new analytical procedures are introduced in U.S.P. XVII than in any earlier edition. Quantitative use is made of gas-liquid chromatography in the assay of Benzalkonium Chloride; several applications of infrared spectrophotometry are added; the use of polarography is extended; and oxygen flask combustion is employed for analyzing halogen-containing substances.
