



Community Pharmacist Involvement

Often I hear students say, "I am going to be a community pharmacist - I can't do much." Brother Dave Feeney has shown this is not the case. Read his article on Pocket Medical Profiles in this issue. It is a wonderful example of what pharmacists can do on their own to make pharmacy a better profession while truly serving the public.

David P. Feeney (Beta Epsilon) has been a practicing community pharmacist for 10 years. He is vice-president of the Rhode Island Pharmaceutical Association. Senior Citizens consume more drugs than any other age group. Some studies estimate that Seniors consume approximately 25% of all prescribed medications, while they represent only 10% of the population. Drug regimens consisting on the average of four to six drugs, non-compliance, multiple conditions or ailments, economics and the fact that Senior Citizens are for the most part a mobile population all tend to obscure or interfere with the community pharmacist's ability to adequately monitor a patient's medication profile and often has prevented community pharmacists from providing their patients with the best health care.

Senior Citizens living on fixed incomes realize through shopping around that prescription prices vary from pharmacy to pharmacy. Seniors rationalize having prescriptions filled at multiple pharmacies by believing that the physicians know what they are doing, that they would not prescribe anything that would interact with other medications; and that the pharmacist should be happy getting whatever money he gets. Seniors do not realize that different doctors treating seemingly unrelated conditions could unknowingly duplicate therapies and a resultant overdosing or some type of drug/drug interaction might occur. Seniors often do not realize that the pharmacist as a drug expert can identify drug problems, provide them with an increased quality of health care and in the long run save them money. These things can only be accomplished if the pharmacist can view the patient's total drug picture.

Emergency situations create another problem for senior citizens. Emergency paramedics and emergency room physicians often do not have the time to piece together a patient's drug history. There is not a record of medication and physical conditions accessible to the emergency room staff if the patient is unconscious or incoherent.

The Rhode Island Pharmaceutical Association in cooperation with the Rhode Island Department of Elderly Affairs designed a viable solution to the above dilemma. This solution could increase the senior citizen patient's quality of health care and at the same time aid the community pharmacist in obtaining and monitoring the total drug picture. Administrative support for the program comes from the Department of Elderly Affairs, while the success and implementation of the program is the responsibility of the Rhode Island Pharmaceutical Association and the pharmacists of Rhode Island. The Rhode Island Senior Citizen Pocket Medical Profile (P-M-P) enables the senior citizen and the community pharmacist to maintain a complete, convenient portable patient medication profile. The profile card, contained in its plastic case, provides for appropriate personal history (name; medicare/medicaid numbers; doctor's name; medical problems; allergies, etc.) and another section for medication regimen information. This area is the most integral part of the profile card and differs from the traditional pharmacy profile system. Refill information, or a compliance technique such as that, are not needed or warranted. The only items needed to be recorded are name and dosage of medications, and the date of initiation of the medication into the regimen. The patient presents the P-M-P to the pharmacist to review each time a prescription is filled. The pharmacist would then enter all new prescription information on the profile and return it to the patient to carry with them. This method provides all health care practitioners with concise drug therapy information, no matter what the circumstance. In the event of an emergency situation vital minutes can be

saved. It can quickly and easily provide information to an emergency room physician. It can inform one doctor on what medications another doctor has prescribed and thereby prevent duplication of therapies and unwanted drug interactions. This last reason makes it imperative for the patient to bring their P-M-P to the doctor's office and to have it reviewed before prescribing.

Senior Citizens obtain their Pocket Medical Profile by attending a presentation explaining the P-M-P. These are made at senior clubs or group meetings, or at Senior Center Meal Sites. This method of distribution provides the best opportunity to have seniors more fully understand how the program works and the importance of why they should utilize the program properly. This method has insured a better success rate of the program and has offered the community pharmacist an opportunity to demonstrate that pharmacists care about providing quality health care and are professionals in every sense of the word. **It has helped to erode the misconception that pharmacists can only "count-pour-lick-and-stick"**. It has demonstrated to the senior patient that the pharmacist's professional education enables him to monitor a drug regimen, identify and correct interactions and therefore should be entrusted with all of the patient's medication information.

Most often after the presentations on the P-M-P, questions arise regarding some other aspect of pharmacy and health care. Therefore, presenting pharmacists build-in discussions on various topics (ie-generic drugs, drug interactions, importance of compliance and/or compliance techniques. These discussions better educate the senior patient and correct misconceptions. University of Rhode Island Pharmacy student externs, as part of their course requirements give an oral inservice presentation. The P-M-P program provides a perfect opportunity to satisfy course requirements and motivate students to think of other aspects involved in the pharmacy profession besides the manipulative/clinical functions of a community pharmacist.

The pharmacists of Rhode Island are an integral part of the Pocket Medical Profile program and its success. All of the pharmacist making presentations, donate their time and effort. They represent the Rhode Island Pharmaceutical Association, not a particular pharmacy. The Pocket Medical Profile program is a community service program for the betterment of the senior citizen's health care and is not an advertising campaign. It has been proven that most senior citizens would take an interest in somebody taking an interest in them. The acceptance by the senior citizens has been very rewarding and enthusiasm for the program and their gratitude to the participating pharmacists exceeds all expectations. Seniors go out of their way to obtain extra copies of the profile for friends, explaining the importance of the program and relating actual case examples of how the utilization of the

1974

INTRODUCTION

The year of 1974 was one of change for Kappa Psi Pharmaceutical Fraternity. The Grand Ritualist, Dr. Patrick R. Wells, surveyed the membership with regard to changing the ritual of our fraternity. Jack Atkinson, Jr. was appointed acting-editor of the Mask.

THE 37TH GRAND COUNCIL CONVENTION

Kansas City served as the site for the Fraternity's 37th Grand Council Convention. The Dean of the College of Pharmacy, Dr. Donald Sorby (Gamma Epsilon), greeted the brothers at the opening session. Constitutional changes were considered and various panel discussions were held. Ewing

1975

The Kappa Psi Century Club more than doubled in membership and plans were well underway for the 38th Grand Council Convention which will be held in Philadelphia in July of 1976. Norman H. Kobayashi (Gamma Nu) became the new editor of the Mask and Michael Ira Smith (Epsilon) was appointed to the post of assistant editor.

For the first time in the last several years, four numbers of the Mask were published on time under the editorship of Norman Kobayashi.

SCHOLARSHIP ACTIVITIES

Almost 300 Brothers attained the 3.0 scholastic average which was necessary in order for them to receive recognition from the Fraternity, and its Scholarship "Honors Certificate."

REACTIVATION

Brother Eugene Lee of the Portland Graduate Chapter was instrumental in reactivating Beta Zeta Chapter at Oregon State University. The reactivation ceremony was conducted by past Grand Regent Herman Forslund (Beta Pi) on May 30th, 1975.

1976

Thoughts of Philadelphia, July 4, 1976, were on the minds of many Kappa Psi men as the new year began. The nation had been preparing for its bicentennial and Kappa Psi Pharmaceutical Fraternity had been planning its 38th Grand Council Convention to coincide with the national event.

APPOINTMENTS

The first appointment of the year was the promotion of Christopher Gong, Pharm. D. to the position of Assistant Executive Secretary.

Henry Lewis III, of Florida A&M University was named to replace Christopher Gong as Executive Committee Member. Brother Lewis was an initiate of Delta Iota Chapter.

Grand Regent William A. Fitzpatrick appointed three Brothers to positions on the Executive Council. Kenneth W. Kirk, PhD was selected as Graduate Member. Dr. Kirk is an initiate of Gamma Chi Chapter. Robert A. Louie (Gamma Nu Chapter) and Kenneth W. Monroe, Jr. (Mu Chapter) were appointed as Collegiate members to the Executive Council.

GOLDEN ANNIVERSARY

Regent William A. Fitzpatrick presented a plaque to the brothers of Beta Rho Chapter at the Province VII assembly in Oklahoma in April of 1976. Grand Council Deputy, Dewey D. Garner, First Grand Vice Regent, led the group of Mississippi Brothers to receive their award.

HONORARY MEMBER

On April 30, Dr. Lawrence C. Weaver, Dean of the University of Minnesota, College of Pharmacy, was inducted into Kappa Psi Pharmaceutical Fraternity. University President, C. Peter Magrath spoke at the presentation sponsored by Epsilon Chapter.

38TH GRAND COUNCIL CONVENTION

Amongst the excitement produced by the United States Bicentennial Celebration, the 38th Grand Council Convention convened in Philadelphia on July 4th, 1976. First Grand Vice Regent, John Atkinson, Jr. and his committee had arranged a

convention which was not only meaningful to the Brothers of Kappa Psi Pharmaceutical Fraternity, but one which permitted those at the convention to participate in a most unusual national celebration. The brothers of Eta Chapter and Beta Omega Chapter hosted the convention with the help of the Philadelphia Graduate Chapter. Dr. Frank H. Eby attended the convention along with other former Grand Regents; Glen O. Sperandio, Norman Campbell, and Herman Forslund.

The convention made constitutional changes which placed the fraternity in compliance with all governmental regulations. The following brothers were elected as officers for a three year period.

1977

INTRODUCTION

The year of 1977 was to be the first of two interim years between Grand Council Conventions. This was done in order to set the next convention to coincide with our Centennial Celebration of 1979.

In order to remain compliant with government regulations, female members were admitted to two chapters.

APPOINTMENTS

Two members were appointed by Grand Regent Fitzpatrick as collegiate representative to the Executive Committee. Robert Louie of Gamma Nu Chapter and Kenneth Monroe of Mu Chapter were appointed in October of 1976, along with Kenneth Kirk.

Past Grand Regent Norman A. Campbell (Beta Epsilon) was given the 1977 A. H. Robins Bowl of Hygeia Award.

Brother Kenneth N. Molthan (Gamma Omega Chapter) was elected President-Elect of the Student American Pharmaceutical Association.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING

The location of the 1977 Executive Committee Meeting was changed from Scottsdale to St. Louis. The meeting was held at the St. Louis College of Pharmacy on September 30 and October 1 with the entire committee in attendance. The committee conducted the necessary routine business and then voted to form a fund from which interest would be used to give an award to a brother at each Grand Council Convention in honor of Dr. Frank H. Eby. Dr. Wells was appointed chairman of a committee to establish criteria for this award.

In order to streamline operations of the fraternity, it was suggested that we consider reorganizing the executive committee. Dr. Glen Sperandio of Purdue University was assigned the duty.

CONCLUSION

The year of 1977 was designed to be a year of planning for Kappa Psi Pharmaceutical Fraternity. Gamma Nu Chapter had agreed to serve as host chapter for the Centennial Celebration and these brothers, working with the brothers of the Pacific Graduate Chapter, were hard at work preparing for the big event.

1978

INTRODUCTION

The second interim year between Grand Council Conventions was dominated by activities designed to make the Centennial Convention the most memorable ever. Many projects were completed or neared completion by the final months of 1978. The much anticipated 39th Grand Council Convention was soon to be a reality.

APPOINTMENTS

Grand Regent William A. Fitzpatrick appointed a new graduate and collegiate member to the executive committee. Johnny W. Porter (Delta Beta) was chosen as graduate representative while R. Brad Mote (Gamma Phi), a student at the University of Georgia, represented his collegiate brothers.

CENTURY CLUB

The Century Club continued to grow in 1978 under the direction of First Grand Vice Regent, Dr. Dewey D. Garner. The goal of 100 members by convention time was only half realized by the close of 1978. A renewed effort to stimulate interest in the Century Club was initiated and members of the Century Club Committee were confident that the goal would be reached by August of 1979.

GRAND COUNCIL CONVENTION

The 39th Grand Council Convention, more frequently known as the Centennial Convention, convened in Scottsdale, Arizona, at the Camelback Inn on August 5th. The program contained presentations by Irv Rubin, Editor of Pharmacy Times, and Robert Henry. Mary Runge, President of the American Pharmaceutical Association, gave the keynote address at the Centennial Banquet.

During the Century Club Reception and Dinner, a suggestion was made to continue the Century Club idea by instituting the Bicentennial Club. The funds collected would be divided into two categories, with 75% of the monies being placed in an endowment fund and the rest being used for general operating expenditures. Several members immediately pledged to join the club for the next five years.

Norman Kobayashi, who had served as Editor of the Mask for approximately 5 years, announced he was forced to resign this position due to job commitments. Norm was to remain active in Kappa Psi as Supervisor of Province IX.

Among the most significant changes made at the meeting was a decision to change the membership of the executive committee. The total number of members was reduced in order to facilitate operations and to reduce the expenditures associated with executive committee meetings. The executive committee met immediately after the convention. Committees were formed and a great number of ideas were exchanged. One of the suggestions which attracted great attention and concern was a proposal to move the central office to a less expensive location. Ted Gladson and Robert Magarian were selected to serve on the executive committee as graduate members and Tommy Thompson of Theta Chapter and Brian Benson of Gamma Nu Chapter were designated as collegiate members by Grand Regent Dewey D. Garner.



Dr. Karl A. Nieforth named Dean

Dr. Karl A. Nieforth, professor and associate dean for undergraduate affairs in the University of Connecticut School of Pharmacy, has been appointed Dean of that school.

Nieforth has been cited for his lengthy personal crusade in the field of drug abuse education by the U. Conn. Alumni Association. "His activities," stated the citation, "were undertaken at his own initiative and were conducted in addition to his full share of teaching, counseling, research and administrative work in the School of Pharmacy."

A graduate of the Massachusetts College of Pharmacy, Nieforth received his Master's and Ph.D. degrees from Purdue University. In addition to his teaching activity at UConn, he also has been a lecturer at Yale University's Psychiatry Department.

Nieforth succeeds Dr. Arthur E. Schwarting, who held the post for 10 years until his retirement in 1980 following 31 years of service to the University.

Sidney Reigelman dies, pharmacokinetics pioneer

Sidney Reigelman, professor of pharmacy and pharmaceutical chemistry at the University of California-San Francisco and a pioneer in the development of pharmacokinetics, died in early April of a scuba diving accident.

Dr. Reigelman was widely regarded as one of the "founding fathers" of pharmacokinetics and edited the first scholarly journal in that field.

Chairman of the department of pharmacy at the University of California-San Francisco from 1967-1978, he has since then served as associate dean for research services and headed the clinical pharmacokinetics laboratory and drug studies unit.

According to one of his colleagues, Dr. Reigelman was also a leader and innovator in the area of basic pharmaceuticals and was responsible for significant advances in the evolution of clinical pharmacy.

Dr. Reigelman earned his undergraduate and PhD degrees at the University of Wisconsin-Madison and became an instructor in pharmacy at the University of California in 1948.

Since that time he has been an active member of APhA and a leader in the APhA Academy of Pharmaceutical Sciences. At the time of his death, he served on the APS executive committee and was preparing a major report on dissolution for the Academy.

Dr. Reigelman had been honored several times by his colleagues. He was the recipient of the Ebert Medal in 1959, the APhA Foundation-APS Research Achievement Award in Physical Pharmacy in 1968 and the APhA Foundation-APS Research Achievement Award in Pharmacodynamics in 1970. He was selected Alumnus of the Year by the University of Wisconsin and a Fellow by APS that same year.

The University of California-San Francisco is establishing a Sidney Reigelman Lectureship to honor his leadership in pharmacy and the pharmaceutical sciences. 


There are many others, but my point is that one should get involved!
