

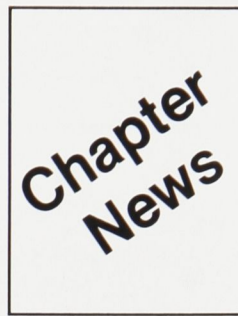

Garner Elected PFA President

Dr. Dewey D. Garner, Past Grand Regent of Kappa Psi Pharmaceutical Fraternity, was installed as the National President of the Professional Fraternity Association at its annual convention held in Indianapolis, Indiana on September 20-22, 1984.

The Professional Fraternity Association is composed of thirty seven professional oriented fraternities representing sixteen professional fields including five of the six pharmacy groups and has initiated over 1,500,000 professional men and women through its more than 2100 chapters.

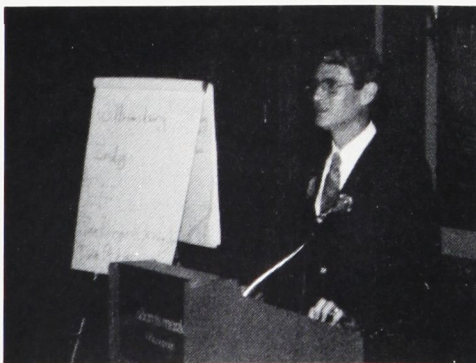
Primary objectives of the P.F.A. are: improving and strengthening the professional fraternities, advancing professional and inter-fraternity ethics, and encouraging cooperation among member fraternities for the advancement of fraternal ideals.

Dr. Garner served as Vice President and Program Chairman for this year's convention on "Imaging the Greek Connection." He has represented KΨ at six consecutive annual conventions of the P.F.A. serving as National Treasurer in 1981 and as Chairman of the Professional Career Achievement Award Committee in 1982. Other KΨ members who previously held

offices in the P.F.A. include Brother Ray Kelley as Treasurer in 1951 and Brother Frank Eby as President in 1958.

"The Professional Fraternity Association has been a tremendous asset to Kappa Psi," said Brother Dewey. "Many of the recent ideas for *The Mask's* content and

format, budgeting, and fund raising projects are directly attributable to P.F.A. member input. Furthermore, the favorable opinion of KΨ by other interfraternity colleagues in the P.F.A. has a positive snowballing affect for our national professional image," he relates.

How to be a Successful Pledge Do's and Don'ts—a satire

Face it—without good pledging skills you don't stand a shance of being inducted into Kappa Psi Pharmaceutical Fraternity, or any other fraternity. All the objective merit in Myrtle Beach won't matter if you can't persuade the brothers of your true desire to become a part of Kappa Psi or your willingness to live up to the ideals of the brotherhood. The bitter truths you'll read in this article are nuggets of wisdom designed to help you (the pledge/big brother) prevent making a fool of yourself in front of a group who can offer you the distinction of membership in Kappa Psi.

First Impressions Count Heavily.

As always, many superficial issues are very important in the evaluation process. Here is a guide to some of the most common mistakes you can't afford to make.

Personal Appearance. Simply stated, physical beauty is an obvious asset. Remember, beauty may only be skin deep but ugly goes to the bone. If you are unfortunate enough to be ugly, don't pledge a professional fraternity; join a social fraternity instead—many still need mascots. However, if you don't require extensive plastic surgery, the maxim "cleanliness is next to Godliness" is always a good rule to live by. Don't make the mistake of walking around on the first day of pledging with big stains on your clothing, and try to cover all weeping pustules with surgical gauze. Wash your hair daily with a heavy duty industrial solvent, like ethylene dibromide. Pluck your eyebrows, even males, particularly if you only have one eyebrow. For that matter, pluck all unsightly nostril and auditory canal hair as well. Men should be clean shaved or have well groomed facial hair. Women should shave their legs.

Personal Attire. since you will be pledging a professional fraternity, you should look the part. Don't wear polyesters as it is universally acknowledged that they are disgusting and loathsome pieces of fabric. Wool, cotton, woven chimpanzee hair, and Bald Eagle feathers, or any other natural source, are considered to be much more re-

fined. Many would be initiates have had to quit pledging because they made the unfortunate blunder of wearing a rayon leisure suit to the induction ceremonies. To look professional, your clothing should look conservative and expensive. For women this means looking tailored rather than feminine. Avoid the following common detractors: french cut skirts with high slits, deep plunging necklines, spandex bodysuits, hot pants in florescent colors, and tube tops. Likewise, men should look serious and somber. Plaid sport jackets should only be worn to the Kentucky Derby.

Promptness. Arrive on time for all your appointments. This will prove that you are a responsible person and a professional. While the brothers won't hesitate to keep you waiting for 2 to 3 hours, they truly resent late pledges. This is easier said than done. More often than not, while on your way to an important fraternity meeting, your car will suddenly develop a sixth gear, the bus you're riding will inadvertently run over a baby harbor seal, or some practical joker will place a .44 caliber bullet in occipital lobe. Although these may be sound reasons why you were late, none of them, no matter how plausible, will help your cause. The best thing to do, if you are late, is to lie. The Proof is in the Pudding.

Of course, you can not expect to be inducted into Kappa Psi based purely on superficial reasons. You must perform.

Pledge Assignments. Completing all your pledge assignments is paramount. Remember, your pledge handbook specifically states that "no task, no matter how big or small, is beyond achievement by a Kappa Psi pledge." Never give weak excuses. To say that you couldn't fulfill an assignment due to amputation of your limbs, destruction of your dormitory from a nuclear explosion, or even a malfunction in your television set are all considered feeble justifications and a sign of your

inability to uphold your obligations to others and the fraternity.

Meeting the brothers. At the beginning of pledging you'll have to get to know a lot of new people in a short period of time. When you meet a brother for the first time, offer a firm handshake, look him/her straight in the eyes and smile warmly. If the brother is the same sex as you, don't smile too warmly; he/she may get the wrong idea.

The brother will be interested in getting to know you as you should have the same interest in him/her. He/she will probably ask you a lot of questions. But sit still during the interview, otherwise the brother may think you suffer from incontinence. If you do have to evacuate your bladder, never whip out your travel all bed pan; politely excuse yourself to the restrooms instead. Never refer to the restrooms as the "potty".

If asked about your hobbies, never state that taking illicit drugs, reading *Hustler*, or burning the American flag are among your interests. Brothers like pledges who enjoy singing the "Kappa Psi Drinking Song", memorizing the dates of birth of all the brothers ever initiated into the Agora, or visiting old age homes to sponsor twister contests.

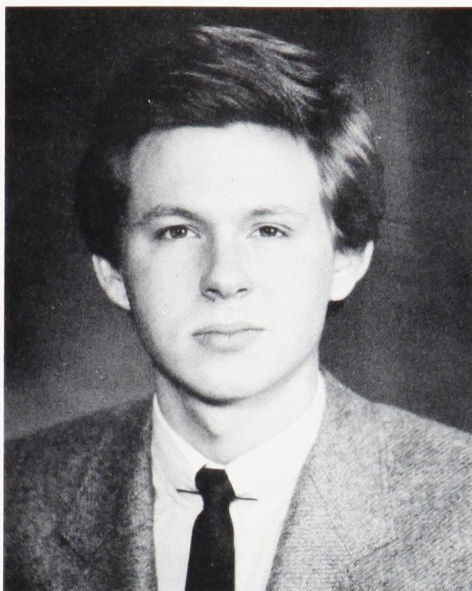
Always be polite and maintain good manners. Try not to curse and refrain from describing your past experiences in colorful but less than tasteful language. Always refer to the brother respectfully, using titles such as Mr., Ms., Sire, and Your Omnipotent Holiness. Never ever refer to the Regent as "Cheese", "Big Guy", "Bozo", or "Lizard Thighs" as this can assure that you will receive a few black balls.

Your pledge book. Your pledge book is your ticket for induction into Kappa Psi and represents the many hours of hard work that you have supposedly been putting into attaining that goal. Protect it with your life. The story goes that Ray S. Kelly, affectionately known as the Great Father of Kappa Psi, was once tortured and brutally beaten by LKS sisters who wanted to know the secrets written in his pledge book. With great courage, Pledge Kelly refused to divulge any in-

formation and was later rescued by Mu Chapter brothers during a midnight raid.

Your Obligations. Before you are inducted into Kappa Psi you will be asked if you can live up to the obligations and responsibilities of the fraternity. The four duties you will be expected to uphold as a brother are those of Fellowship, Industry, Sobriety, and High Ideals. Indeed, Fellowship will probably be the easiest of your obligations to uphold, unless of course you are a total antisocial or refuse to bathe due to the water shortage. Industry is a little tougher, but if you can maintain a 2.0 GPA while in pharmacy school, this is usually proof enough of your industriousness. Sobriety is a very difficult responsibility for some, but it is well known that all brothers in Kappa Psi are always unquestionably sober and are never inebriated. This is not, however, to say that the brothers never drink! The simple fact is the KΨ brothers have extremely high alcohol tolerance levels; unmatched by any other humans (see the research paper in the New England Journal of Medicine, August 30, 1981, "Superhuman Tolerance to Alcohol Observed in Kappa Psi Brothers."). Therefore, Sobriety can be developed with time and practice. However, the most difficult responsibility to attain is that of High Ideals. The willingness to strive to do his/her personal best and the encouragement of others to reach their full potential is the mark of a true Kappa Psi.

One last tip. Pledging can be a trying time and is a test of your aspirations to be a brother in Kappa Psi. You may become nervous at times but stay calm. Yet, don't take higher than recommended doses of sedative/hypnotics. Valium (10mg tid) or Xanax (1mg tid) are agents of choice pledging associated anxiety. If nervousness persists, sodium thiopental (75mg IV bolus) is adequate for refractory cases.

C. V. Stifano celebrates Kappa Psi 50 years!

Dr Stifano was born July 5th, 1896 in Providence, Rhode Island. He graduated in 1915 from the Rhode Island College of Pharmacy. It was here that he first became a member of Kappa Psi. In 1929, he received a Doctor of Osteopathy degree from Massachusetts College of Osteopathy.

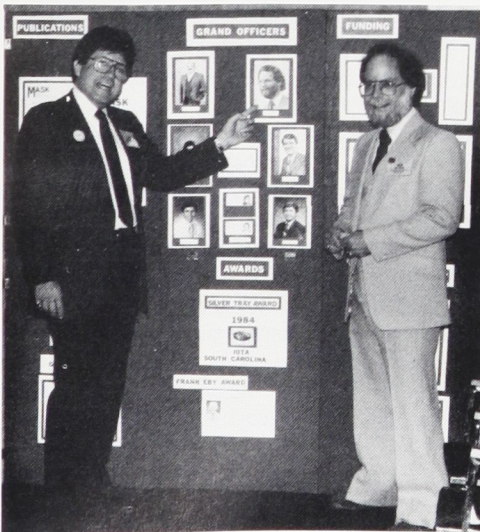
From 1922 to 1940 Dr. Stifano was owner of three pharmacies in Rhode Island, at which time he trained his two brothers who were also pharmacists.

In 1935 Dr. Stifano entered the Rhode Island Department of Health as Medical Investigator of Venereal Diseases in the Epidemiology division. In the 1940 Annual Report of the State of Rhode Island Department of Health there was a marked decrease in the number of early cases of VD reported and in the percentage of cases reported. The major part of this decrease was a direct result of the emphasis that was placed on the epidemiological phase of the program. "The success of this epidemiological work is due in no small measure to the efforts and ability of Dr. Cono V. Stifano, Medical Investigator, who has continued to demonstrate his ability in the difficult and delicate interrogation of persons unfortunately inflicted with syphilis and gonorrhea." He was again cited in the 1941 State Manual.



In 1971 he retired from the R.I. Department of Health after 36 years of service. He now lives in Providence with his wife of 69 years, Alvina. He has four children, eleven grandchildren and fourteen great-grandchildren.

Dr. Cono V. Stifano received the *Order of the Golden Mortar*, an award presented by Kappa Psi Pharmaceutical Fraternity for membership of 50 years or more at the Johnson and Wales Hospitality Center in Cranston on April 25, 1984. Dr. Stifano is a graduate of the class of 1915 Rhode Island College of Pharmacy.

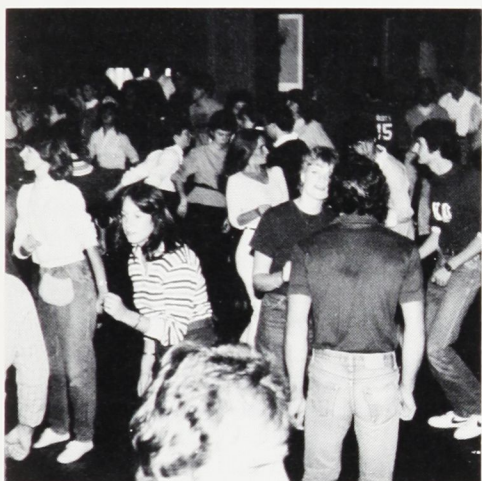

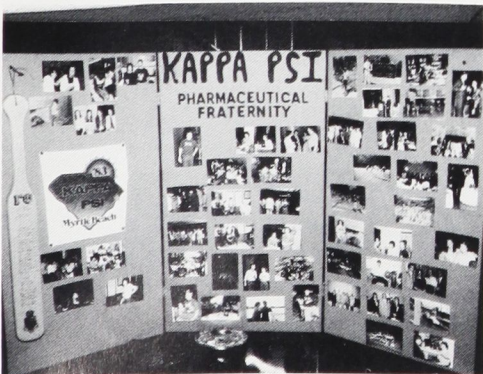

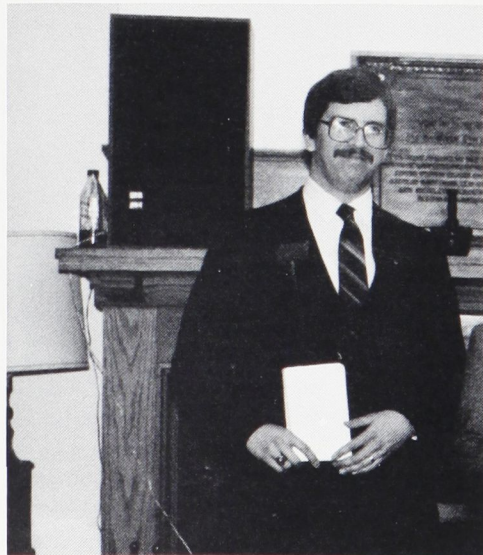

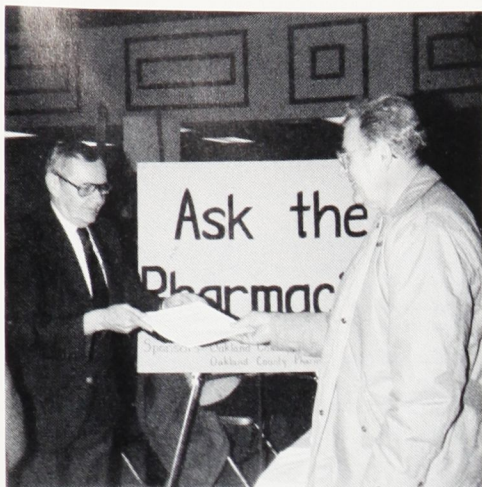

Brother Becker writes on 50 years in Kappa Psi

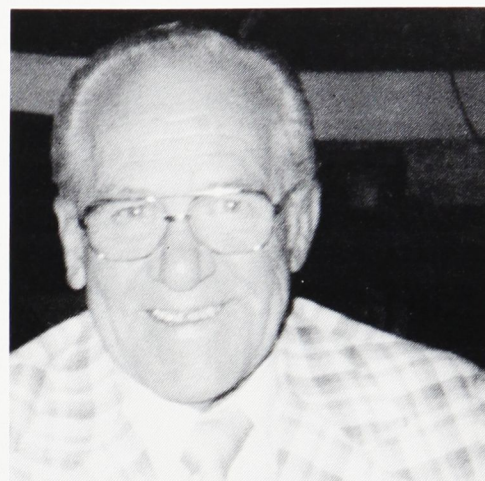
Yes it has been quite some time since my initiation into the Kappa Psi Frat. Either 1926 or 1927. Thank you very much for your very kind letter.
