Trom the Grand Regent

Seasons Greetings:

Little did I know, at that time, that I would later be privileged to serve in a number of leadership capacities in the Detroit Graduate Chapter, including three non-consecutive terms as Regent. The furthest thought from the mind of a twenty year old in 1962 was that I would eventually be allowed to serve the Brotherhood as a member of the Executive Committee of the Grand Council, and as a Grand Officer which I have had the pleasure of doing since July 8, 1976. But, how could I as a twenty year old ever image that one day the Brotherhood of Kappa Psi would have enough confidence to elect this shy kid, Grand Regent.

A few short months ago we gathered in Grand Council in Williamsburg, Virginia in the presence of our past to reflect upon what our future might be. We were refreshed and renewed; we left with our batteries fully charged! Now, you might ask: what does the future hold; where will I lead Kappa Psi? First, I do not know what the future holds. But, based upon the caliber of the team of Executive Committee members you have given me, I suspect whatever the future holds for Kappa Psi, it will be good. Second, I can lead Kappa Psi only where you, the members, choose to follow.

1) Executive Director Magarian and I shall be looking for new and innovative methods of fund raising, especially among our alumni brothers. We shall emphasize that membership in our beloved order is a "Lifelong Commitment!"

2) Past Grand Regent Norman A. Campbell has agreed to chair the Foundation Committee, a new special committee. We will attempt to have our "Kappa Psi Foundation" up and running before

the 45th Grand Council Convention in 1991.

3) Brother Kenneth W. Kirk has agreed to chair the Office Technology Committee, another new special committee. We will analyze our current central office equipment utilization, predict our future needs over the next ten years, and up-grade our electronic equipment accordingly.

4) Brother Edward Sypnewski, Jr.; has agreed to chair, still another new special committee, the Retirement Committee. The great influx of new Brothers following World War II is now reaching retirement age. How can we make their membership in Kappa Psi more meaningful? What unique contributions might retired Brothers be making to the Fraternity? We will attempt to address this situation before the 45th Grand Council Convention in 1991.

5) Past Grand Regent Kenneth B. Roberts has agreed to chair, yet another new special committee, the Leadership Training Committee. We shall attempt to offer leadership training at a level never seen before! We shall increase our efforts to develop an international leadership training program for the edification of chapter leaders. Additionally, we shall attempt to develop the talents of our chapter leaders so that they shall become regional and international leaders.

6) Time excellent presentation by Brother Nathan Rawls at the 44th Grand Council Convention, "Impairment: Time Health Professional's Role and Responsibility" was not an end product, rather, just a beginning! Brother Douglas Cozad has agreed to chair our final new special committee, the Guardians of Life Committee. This committee will carefully study how we as individuals, chapters, provinces, and as an international organization can assist in the fight against substance/drug/alcohol abuse. We shall attempt to develop model programs and projects before the 45th Grand Council Convention in this vital area.

7) Grand Historian-Ritualist Dewey D. Garner (Past Grand Regent) has started work on a new "History of Kappa Psi." The rest of the Executive Committee will be figuring out how to fund it;

but, fund it we will!

8) Grand Vice Regent Johnny W. Porter is working on the final compilation and completion of the first Kappa Psi Policy Manual, the basic outline of which I presented at the 44th Grand Council Convention. When published, it will be the best fraternal policy manual in the profession!

9) We are addressing the fact that not enough of our chapters were represented at the 44th Grand Council Convention. We are seeking solutions and will, hopefully, rectify the situation by the 45th Grand Council Convention in 1991.

10) We will, with the help of our Province Supervisors, be emphasizing a back to basics approach of A) Ritual, B) History, and C) Planning for the future at all Province Assemblies.

11) We will increase the number of chapter visitations and extend the helping hands of our Grand Officers and other noble brothers wherever needed.

12) During the next year and a half I shall attempt to personally visit each Province at least one time at a Province Assembly.

On a personal note I should like to thank all the Brothers for their many kind wishes following my heart attack on September 20, 1989. My progress is good; I'm mending well! We have many tall orders to fill. With the fine team of Grand Officers and Executive Committee members you have given me, fill them we will! Remembering a Visionary Leader: **Mickey Leland**

Since my friend, Pat Wells, asked me to reflect on the life of Congressman Mickey Leland, a passage from the Old Testament prophet, Joel, has pervaded by thoughts: "... Your old men shall dream dreams, and your young men shall see visions." (Joel 2:28). If there were a visionary, it was George Thomas "Mickey" Leland.

On Sunday, August 13, the wreckage of the plane carrying Leland and 15 others on a fact finding mission to an Ethiopian refugee camp was found "disintegrated" following a head-on crash into a mountain. His untimely death at age 44 prompted South African Anglican Archbishop Desmond Tutu to exclaim, "Why do we always seem to lose our best and brightest?"

I saw Mickey only twice in the late '70's but my memory is of a mature national leader. On one occasion he was the consummate politician relishing the campaign ritual of handshaking and cheekpecking. On the other occasion he was inveighing against some local incident of injustice to a gathering of single adults at Houston's Wheeler Avenue Baptist church. On his left wrist he wore a Mickey Mouse watch as if to convey that he did not take himself seriously but the

Mickey Leland was a child of the '60's. Born on November 27, 1944, in Lubbock, Texas, he came of age during that turbulent decade which included the peak of the civil rights movement and the anti-war, farmworker, Native American redress, and women's movements. "Unlike so many men and women who came of age in the '60's, Mickey Leland never became infected by the cynicism and despair spawned by the Vietnam War, racism, pollution and overpopulation, HOUSTON POST columnist Paul Harasin wrote in the paper's August 14 memorial edition. Nothing in recent memory confirms Harasin's assertion more profoundly than the qualitative difference between Mickey's nobel death and the ignominious death of Leland's hero, Huey Newton.

Leland's plane was found about 16 miles from Gambela, a village near the border of Ethiopia and Sudan. He and his entourage were traveling to Fugnido Refugee Camp. His plane attempted to scale a mountain in inclement weather and crashed, disintegrating upon impact. Personal belongings, mutilated bodies, and plane parts fell 5500 feet into a ravine. The wreckage was discovered by a



U.S. Air Force search helicopter; there was no doubt that all passengers had been killed instantly. Reacting to his death, President George Bush commented: "I have known, admired and worked with Mickey Leland for many years. His sense of compassion . . . has aided millions of people from Houston to Addis Adaba . . . Everyone from Texas knew of his lively nature and his commitment to helping others.'

Mickey's commitment to solving world hunger was long standing. In 1984 he helped establish the House Select Committee on Hunger and became its chairman. That same year he toured Ethiopia and led an effort to gain a \$1.2 billion congressional appropriation for emergency aid to that drought-stricken and war-ravaged country. The Rev. Jesse Jackson recalls watching Leland literally burst into tears as he tried to convince colleagues to send more food to sub-Saharan Africa. An Ethiopian child in the camps had died at Leland's feet and he could not forget her face.

Longtime friends describe an altruistic bent which had begun to manifest itelf as early as Leland's adolescence. His high school football coach describes Mickey as "the most determined youngster I've ever worked with . . . and he was always for what was right." Other school friends describe him as extremely popular because he treated people fairly and did not think ill of anyone. Colleagues describe him as an elected official who "opened many doors and united people and neighborhoods." Ethiopian radio and television broadcast the news of his death repeatedly. An Ethiopian cab driver expressed

his country's sadness: "We feel so bad because he was killed trying to help our people."

The altruism and political activism came into full flower during his student years at Texas Southern University (TSU) in Houston, Texas. He received the Bachelor of Science degree in pharmacy in 1970 and was an instructor of clinical pharmacy during 1970 to 1971. But politics and health advocacy were his

great callings.

In 1969 he had taken a year off from TSU to run the successful campaign of a Black Houston minister seeking election to the School Board. Two years after his graduation, he won election to the Texas Houston of Representatives; he was reelected to second and third terms. He distinguished himself as both a firebrand and shrewd student of the system. Colleagues were stunned by his negotiating skills.

In 1978 he was elected to the U.S. House of Representatives, succeeding the legendary Barbara Jordan. "He came to Congress in 1979 under what for many young politicians could have proved an overwhelming shadow," one journalist has written. But he sought out congressional stalwarts such as Speaker Tip O'Neill and fellow Texan, Jim Wright. He made them his mentors and they taught him to use the system. Once again, his habit of treating people fairly won him kudos from both the Republican and Democratic sides of the aisle. Following his election, he was re-elected almost routinely. He was in the midst of his sixth term when he died.

In addition to his activism around African famine relief, Leland's health priorities included infant mortality and care for the homeless. In 1979 he established the Texas Task Force on Infant Mortality. Two years ago, he spent a cold Washington, D.C. night sleeping outside to dramatize the plight of the nation's homeless.

He raised the skill of bridge building to the level of an art form. His admirers included Cuban revolutionary leader, Fidel Castro, and an ultra-conservative fellow Texas Representative with whom he played basketball. He was a lifelong Roman Catholic whose beloved son's baptismal sermon was delivered by an Anglican. Every year he accompanied a multi-cultural group of high school students from Houston to an Israeli kibbutz. (In fact, the program is named the Leland Kibbutz International Internship Program.)

He opposed Jesse Jackson's 1984 presidential candidacy, yet they remained so close that it was Jackson who kept vigil with Leland's Washington staff during the week of waiting, counseling and praying with them. He hobnobbed with the rich and famous but never forgot his roots in Houston's impoverished Fifth Ward.

A popular and attractive figure, his devotion to wife, Alison, and son, Jarrett, was palpable. Before he left for Ethiopia, he had learned that his wife was expecting the couple's second child.

Finally Leland was a proud brother of Kappa Psi. He was elected to Honorary Membership in 1987 and honored by the Delta Theta Chapter. *The MASK* of De-

cember, 1987, is graced by a cover photo of Mickey receiving his membership plaque from past Grand Regent Patrick R. Wells.

In an article commemorating the late President John F. Kennedy on the twentieth anniversary of his assassination, his widow, Jacqueline, wrote that more than anything else, she missed his influence on world affairs during the two decades which had passed. I understand her sentiment. I have cried many times during the weeks since Mickey's death as I've considered the loss of this visionary leader at a time when the world is convulsed with pain.

Perhaps Senator Edward M. Kennedy's statement is the appropriate epitaph:

"Mickey Leland died as he lived—on a mission of mercy and hope for victims of poverty, injustice, racism, and hunger. Wherever suffering people existed on our planet, Mickey Leland wanted to be there to help. He represented not only the people of Houston, but the best in America and all humanity."


Meet the Collegiate-Member at Large Brian Furbush

Editor's Note: This was Brother Garner's keynote address to the 44th GCC

The theme of this 44th Grand Council is: Brotherhood—Our Spirit Unites Us. So let us begin by examining this concept of Brotherhood. Did you know that there are many different types of brotherhood. For example, there is the type of brotherhood demonstrated by Damon and Pythias—the willingness of one brother to give his life for the other. Another type of brotherhood is illustrated in the Bible the story of Cain and Able, in which one brother killed the other. What is your attitude toward vour Kappa Psi Brother? What is your "Spirit of Brotherhood"? Is it the loving caring tradition of Damon and Pythias or is it the hate and mistrust attitude of Cain toward Able? As a pharmacy student is it supporting each other through good times and bad? When a brother needs a little moral support is someone always there? (Task Force on Drug Impairment) As a graduate brother does it still mean supporting each other; socially, morally, and professionally? Do you want to keep it that way?

Fraternities have lasted for a long time under intense pressure. Why do you think they have survived? The slogan of the French Revolution was: Liberty, Equality, and Fraternity. The slogan was later espoused by Jefferson and was associated with the American Revolution.

Liberty—Individual is not a servant of the state

Equality—in opportunity and self respect

Fraternity—commitment to stand together

It is fraternity that holds the country together—liberty and equality do not. So, as you can see, fraternity is one of the earliest elements of a patriotic society. And in a very real sense you are contributing to country when you are committed to fraternity and the spirit of brotherhood. The premise of fraternity being what is good for others is also good for you. (Hence, one for all and all for one). This is the spirit of fraternity. It creates a social unity. It is the cement of society.

Phi Beta Kappa was the first fraternity founded in the United States; right here in Williamsburg, Virginia, on December 5, 1776 at William and Mary, more specifically at the Raleigh Tavern. What made it a national fraternity was that the members of the group corresponded with brothers at other campuses—Harvard and Yale. Phi Beta Kappa was created to keep individuals from being lonely in col-

lege. It was against this historical backdrop that the college fraternity system was born. Long since recognized as a microcosm of the larger society, fraternities have a history that reflects the trends of the times. For example, early on, college fraternities were regarded as family subcultures on campus. So it was no coincidence that members addressed each other as brothers. We still do. A belief in the supreme being was fundamental to fraternity ideals; hence, it was no happenstance that the Bible was present at formal chapter meetings and used in initiation ceremonies. This too hasn't changed. And the pursuit of broader intellectual experiences beyond the classroom was the hallmark of the earliest fraternities; so it was only natural that they were founded at colleges and universities.

Rituals prior to 1900 drew from the religions of the day. To make men out of boys; To develop men of character. They evoked a brotherly commitment to good behavior. Honorable men. Fraternity houses did not come into being until 1890 and University facilities for fraternities in the early 1900's. Likewise, the social emphasis in fraternities is a byproduct of the 20th century.

How does all of this apply to the practical problems of fraternity life? Let us examine some situations.

1. Think about your chapter and the people who comprise it. We oftentimes become so engrossed in the physical tangible things; the house, our activities, how our money is being utilized that we forget our fraternity is not the tangible things—it is the brotherhood. WE learned all of the cliches in pledging; One for all and all for one: Industry, sobriety, fellowship, and high ideals; but we aren't living what we learned and too an oath to follow. It is the Kappa Psi spirit of brotherhood for which our fraternity stands and it is the spirit of brotherhood which unites us, which gives us that sparkle of loyalty, devotion, and commitment to one another. Let us know your heart is in the fraternity.

2. Second practical problem associated with fraternity life. BROTHERHOOD is most intense in a small group. Small numbers connote brotherhood. What impact does size have on brotherhood? For example, Beta Eta and Delta Gamma experienced enormous growth during the past year. Delta Zeta and Gamma Zeta have seen significant growth over the past four years.

The emphasis of Province realignment

has been on consolidation rather than on dissolution into smaller units. Greater numbers lead to less closeness. Eventually we become a social club instead of a fraternity. This is true in life. Fortunately fraternities are in a better position to deal with this than society in general because:

1. Strong commitment to brotherhood tradition

2. Although our groups are larger they still are small compared to business, government, and urban life. We are still small enough to know what is happening and to adapt accordingly.

and to adapt accordingly

3. 3rd advantage relates to the unique aspect of fraternities in that brothers of all ages and generations are commonplace in the Fraternity. The notion of brotherhood goes vertically as well as horizontally over time. Some of us "seasoned" veterans now have kids in college. We want someone in school to be committed to Brotherhood. Our graduate chapters and graduate members have a vested interest in the collegiate chapters.

So, for at least these three reasons it is easier for our chapters to keep a sense of love and brotherhood even as they grow larger.

4. A 4th practical problem associated with fraternity life. The development of factions and cliques in the fraternity—a province—a chapter. One side wins and the other side goes inactive. A strong commitment to brotherhood suggests we meet and solve problems without the loser quitting. Apply the principles of brotherhood (loving, caring) to conducting our programs and to solving our problems.

5. We should respond to the challenges of brotherhood by practicing the virtues

of the square:

INDUSTRY; diligence and perseverance

SOBRIETY; Sober minded. Moderate in habits. Considerate of others.

FELLOWSHIP; The great bond of our fraternity for which we place a high value and consider a prime necessity. Respect for each other.

HIGH IDEALS; Loyalty to our members.

Remember it is a square of friendship and brotherly ideals. These values are like stars. Although we cannot reach them we chart our course by them. For example, is it within the spirit of brotherhood to help a brother cheat on an exam? I think not. Most important is the spirit and the attitude with which we seek ways to promote and maintain scholarship. A lack of interest in the fraternity follows in the wake of poor scholarship. Nor should we use the square as a cloak to exploit others. Hazing is the greatest enemy of the college fraternity. Some of our chapters that brag about a close-knit brotherhood, that claim to have a deep love for one another make their pledges do ridiculous things in order to prove their worthiness. Initiates are not better people: superior to pledges. This seemingly harmless activity does not develop better chapter unity. Nor does it produce dedicated active members. It does in fact contradict our ideal of fellowship, of respect and consideration for one another. Others would argue that hazing is not the number one problem of the fraternity; Rather it is drinking since 80% of the serious hazing incidents are alcohol related. Sobriety means being sober minded and moderate in habits, being considerate of others.

The Fraternity Executives Association and the National Interfraternity Conference recently made announcements questioning the appropriateness of a traditional pledge program in the fraternity system. Delta Sigma Pi business fraternity is organizing a study of this issue and are asking all interested professional fraternities to participate. It is not just coincidence that your executive committee has recently revised the Fraternity's policy on hazing and developed a policy on alcohol and substance abuse. (The 1989 version of the *Handbook and Pledge Manual*)

6. Parties oftentimes become a problem of fraternity life. While I enjoy a good party as much as anyone a fraternity that is all party does not attract the serious minded student into membership. Remember, I told you earlier that the social emphasis within the fraternity system is a product of the 20th century. The social party side is the dessert to the main dinner. You get sick on dessert only. The main meal is the fraternity's primary concern. Dessert only rots the teeth and it rots the fraternity. You justify the parties with positive achievements to match. Character, brotherhood. You prove yourself before you concentrate on the parties. Otherwise we are only a social club. And we loose the support of the University, our parents, and from those serious minded people who run society. The faculty and society in general are not against

fraternities but only when they misbehave. We need to eliminate the gap between fraternal ideals and fraternity behavior. In Kappa Psi good relations with members comes first. You are familiar with the expression: Don't get the cart before the horse? Parties are the cart. Brotherhood is the horse. We are social incidentally but not primarily.

7. Finally, Brotherhood and its application to this 44th Grand Council. Do you know what the Grand Council is? It is the supreme legislative, judicial and executive body of our Fraternity. Despite the many changes that have occurred in the College and Fraternity World, the right of the chapters to determine the course of the Fraternity has never changed for almost 100 years. We function in national unity through a democratic form of fraternity government. Most of the significant changes in Kappa Psi have occurred at the Grand Council Conventions. For example, during the first decade of the Grand Council the delegates adopted a new constitution which with revisions has remained the basic law of the fraternity, the delegates authorized the publication of The Agora, our fraternity directory, and The MASK, our official publication. The delegates adopted scarlet and gray as the fraternity colors for all chapters, provided for establishing alumni chapters, an Executive and Legislative Committee. It was the delegates that developed a model set of chapter Bylaws, approved an official pledge button, that designated the scarlet carnation as the official flower, who established the province structure and created the office known today as the Executive Director of Kappa Psi. All of these achievements took place at the Grand Council Conventions between 1900 and 1910.

It will be a rare Grand Council if you do not go away with a broader prospective, a greater enthusiasm, and a deeper appreciation of what fraternalism is all about. I encourage you to speak out on the issues with fairness and intelligence in the spirit of brotherhood. Be concerned about how others feel and think about the legislative issues. Work together. This is fraternalism in its purest sense.

I close with a quote from the Declaration of Principles of Kappa Psi and a brief comment: We believe that the essential elements of true brotherhood are love, charity, and esteem; love, that binds our hearts in fraternal affection; charity, that is quick to see virtues in a Brother and slow to reprove faults in each other; esteem, that is respectful to the honest convictions of others and that refrains from treading upon that which is sacred to spirit and conscience.

We as Kappa Psi Brothers believe in the development of the human spirit through the relationships we share. It is through the values expressed in our ritual that we share this belief. It is through our actions that we exemplify this belief. May God bless each of you and this 44th Grand Council Convention.

Corbett Louis Ourso Becomes Brother During 44th GCC




We have also been actively involved in activities around the University of Pittsburgh campus, including the Student Health Fair. Brother-participation was excellent this year, as it is every year.


