



Again, the Chapter displayed its vitality and for a few years was a strong Chapter.

The spirit is now back. Their Kappa Psi Brothers welcome the Brothers of Gamma Omicron into the ranks as the sixtieth Collegiate Chapter and wish them much success as they begin their efforts toward once again becoming the most active student organization on their campus.

Hello, my Brothers:

I want to relate to you how exceptionally proud I am of the membership of this great Fraternity for their cooperation and deeds during this past year. There has been a display of brotherly concern and togetherness which may well be compared to the "esprit de corps" on which this nation was built. *YOU* have taken the near disastrous blows that could possibly be dealt to an organization and with concern, understanding, and perseverance turned the blows into "powder-puff taps". The critics were few and the doers of deeds were many. Theodore Roosevelt once pointed out most emphatically that, "it is not the critic who counts, not the man who points out how the strong man stumbled, or where the doer of deeds could have done better. THE CREDIT BELONGS TO THE MAN WHO IS ACTUALLY IN THE ARENA; whose face is marred by dust and sweat and blood; who strives valiantly; who errs and comes short again and again because there is no effort without error and shortcoming; who does actually strive to do the deeds; who knows the great enthusiasm; the great devotions, spends himself in a worthy cause; who at the best knows in the end of the triumph of high achievement; and who at the worst, if he fails at least fails while daring greatly, so that his place shall never be with those cold and timid souls who know neither victory nor defeat". My dear Brothers, this quotation is my salute to the men of Kappa Psi who are constantly in the arena meeting all challenges and, in spite of errors and shortcomings, are victorious in overcoming what at times seem to be insurmountable odds.

One area which has contributed greatly toward realizing a measure of success is improved communications. There's that word again — however, it bears repeating a hundred fold since a lack of it contributes to misunderstanding and disenchantment which lead to apathy and failure. In spite of our "measure of success", we must never become complacent with regard to this critical area. We must endeavor to stay abreast of Fraternity activities from coast to coast. It behooves us to always allow "the right hand to know what the left hand is doing". Our progress in both the matters of the Fraternity and our profession is directly proportional to the success of our improving communications.

The most effective tools by which we may be able to improve the above would be highly informative and productive newsletters of the provinces and chapters and a modern and well planned MASK bringing to the Brothers news of innovative ways and means toward attempting to achieve "the acme of perfection" in both our Fraternity and the profession of pharmacy. This calls for maximum effort in cooperating with the editors of these organs. Punctual response to critical correspondence from the editor's desk and meeting planned deadlines are mandatory in order to maintain a smooth and trouble-free printing and consequently the dissemination of vital news, data, and issues at hand.

The communication of ideas, activities and progress of our organization is paramount to our very existence. The Brothers do not believe in joining just to have Greek letters behind their names. The only condition that is self evident is that we give consideration to the abandonment of some of our past criteria which at present are impossible to meet and chart new courses from time to time which are realistic and meaningful. A word of caution, however, that we maintain our ideals and principles which will attract into Kappa Psi men who will bring dignity to the Fraternity.



William S. Bucke Awarded Honorary Degree

For outstanding service to the profession of pharmacy, Brother William S. Bucke, President of Lafayette Pharmacal Inc., has been conferred the Honorary Degree, Doctor of Pharmacy by the St. Louis College of Pharmacy. Dr. Bucke, an initiate of Chi Chapter, holds degrees from the University of Illinois and Northwestern University and is a fifty-five year member of Kappa Psi. He is also the first Brother to become a member of the Order of the Golden Mortar.

Brother Bucke was born and reared in Chicago and owned three pharmacies in that city before organizing the Ford Hopkins Drug Company. After supervising the establishment of 43 pharmacies for Ford Hopkins, he joined Lafayette Pharmacal as sales manager in 1937. He has served Lafayette Pharmacal as general manager and president for many years.

Constant in his interest to further the profession in serving the public health, Dr. Bucke maintains active membership in numerous professional organizations. Among these, are the Parenteral Drug Association, which he served for two terms as president and currently acts as a member of the Board of Directors. He is a past president of the Western Pharmaceutical Marketing Group as well as the Midwest Pharmaceutical Advertising Club. In addition to membership in the American Pharmaceutical Association and the Illinois and Indiana Pharmaceutical Associations, Brother Bucke holds membership in the American Medical Association, the Academy for the Advancement of Science, the American Chemical Society and the Pharmaceutical Manufacturers' Association.

Dr. Bucke is a generous exponent of the development of innovative educational programs. The fine facilities in the Department of Clinical Pharmacy at Purdue University, among others, stand as excellent witness to this patronage.

His concern for young people has resulted in a policy of his company to employ students in part time positions while pursuing their education. Countless young men and women can credit completion of their studies in part to the assistance afforded them by Brother Bucke. His interest in helping others has led Bill to serve the YWCA Foundation of Greater Lafayette as president and director. Prominent in Chicago business circles, he is member and director of the Lake Shore Club of Chicago.

Bill and his wife Edith are accomplished musicians, and Mrs. Bucke is also a talented pianist. Involved in promoting the arts, he is a director of the Board of the Lafayette Symphony Society.

Whether philanthropist, pharmacist, pharmaceutical industrialist, or benefactor of education, Dr. William S. Bucke is a man who perfectly exemplifies the principles of Kappa Psi. His industry, and high ideals, fellowship and sobriety are such that we might well emulate.

His Kappa Psi Brothers salute Brother Bucke and wish him "Ad Multos Annos".

What Makes Us Different


In Memorium

JAMES RUSSELL THAYER

How does one do justice in words to the memory of a noble man? Were Jim Thayer alive, he would say: Paint not the lily; perish the pious platitudes! That was James Russell Thayer: honest, tough, loyal, unpretentious; a loving husband and father. During his illustrious career his students, colleagues, and friends knew him as a considerate man who endowed even the undeserving with dignity when he spoke to them, putting his confidence in them, so that they climbed just a bit higher by endeavoring to live up to it. Jim Thayer knew himself; hence he was eminently capable of understanding, loving, helping, and forgiving others. As mentor, colleague, and friend, Jim Thayer occupies an honored place in the hearts of the thousands whose lives were enriched by his touch. He was a man; his example inspired many a callow youth to strive to achieve that status.

A philanthropist in the true meaning of the word, James Thayer liked you because you were another human being, and thus it was axiomatic that you had problems. Jim, an unassuming man, would never have presumed to solve your problems for you; yet, after you had bared your soul to him, you were somehow much better able to find your own solutions. As Dean of the St. Louis College of Pharmacy, Jim's philosophy was laissez faire. Once appointed, a professor was unfettered, hence free to do his best. Students were treated as adults; they grew up fast. Colleagues received and returned respect. At his funeral services one of his students of some years ago, tears in her eyes, expressed her esteem in current parlance: "He was beautiful!"

The Brothers of Kappa Psi Mourn the Loss of Past Grand Regent

Dr. James R. Thayer, former Dean of St. Louis College of Pharmacy passed away August 6, 1971 during a fire at his home in Camdenton, Missouri. Brother Thayer was born September 7, 1897 in Medina, Ohio where he taught school after graduation from Ohio University (AB, 1922).

Upon completion of graduate studies at the University of Wisconsin (Master of Science – 1926, Doctor of Philosophy (Chemistry) – 1928), Dr. Thayer was appointed to the faculty of California College of Pharmacy (now part of the University of California) and was initiated into Kappa Psi by Beta Gamma Chapter. He joined the faculty at St. Louis College of Pharmacy as Professor of Chemistry in 1930 and served as Dean from 1958 until his retirement in July 1964.

"Doc" Thayer, ever maintaining a keen interest in the affairs of Kappa Psi first became a Grand Officer with his election as Grand Counselor at the 25th Grand Council in Richmond, Virginia (1949). He served in this Office six years, when in 1955 he succeeded Dr. Milton Neuroth as Second Grand Vice Regent. The Grand Council elected him First Grand Vice

Regent in 1957. He became the 18th Grand Regent at the Cincinnati Grand Council (1959), serving through December, 1961.

Jim Thayer has left his mark on American Pharmacy by his sincere concern for the proper education of countless students in thirty-six years of service to pharmaceutical education. Likewise, he leaves an indelible impression on the hearts of all Kappa Psi men who were privileged to know and respect him.

In spite of the myriad problems of academic administration, he always found time for Kappa Psi and the cause of fraternalism both of which he championed throughout his career. Brother Thayer was truly one of the "Kappa Psi Boys", who enjoyed to the fullest all of the activities associated with fraternal life; Jim's Boys will miss him.

"Doc" Thayer's wit, wisdom and concern will be sorely missed by all Kappa Psi men. We extend our sympathy to his wife, Ruby and daughters, Miss Cheryl Thayer and Mrs. Robert Bennett.

Dr. George E. Osborne (Pi), Professor of Pharmacy, University of Rhode Island College of Pharmacy, was recently unanimously selected from among eleven nominees by the Committee on Awards of the American Institute of the History of Pharmacy to receive the Institute's 1971 Certificate of Commendation.

The selection was based upon a wide range of achievements, including writing, lecturing, collecting, organizing or supporting pharmaceutico-historical endeavors.

This award cites Brother Osborne "for distinguished historical contributions enriching pharmacy, through his teaching, writing, and preservation endeavors, especially commendable for humanistic service to the West and New England."

Dr. Heber W. Youngken, Jr. (Beta Omicron), Provost for Health Science Affairs and Dean of the College of Pharmacy, University of Rhode Island, made the presentation September 17, 1971 on behalf of the Institute.

Columbia University College of Pharmaceutical Sciences, in celebration of its centennial anniversary, has scheduled a conference in NYC Nov. 15 on a major QC subject: "Problem of Drug Product Equivalence." Speakers include USP & NF Revision Directors Macek and Bergen, PMA VP John Adams, and FDA Associate Commissioner for Medical Affairs, Dr. John Jennings.

FDA (reportedly their administrative experts and not their quality control experts) are formulating proposals for batch certification of **ALL** drugs. Five options for best method are currently being discussed — range from FDA testing of every batch to self-certification by manufacturers.

* * *

The Ritts Committee report (review of all scientific activities of the FDA) suggests that (1) all drugs be placed under FDA batch certification, and (2), hopefully, that the rapport and communications among FDA scientists will be enhanced, as related especially to quality control, plus the interrelationships of scientists in industry/academia/FDA.

* * *

Centralized drug testing by the government in St. Louis appears to be a definite possibility. Industry OC men and scientists tend to favor this move.

* * *

The American Foundation for Pharmaceutical Education has announced that Colman M. Herman has been named a Foundation Fellow for the 1971-72 academic year.

Brother Herman, an initiate of Mu Chapter, is a doctoral student in pharmaceutical administration at Ohio State University and an administrative assistant in Pharmacy Extension Services at the University. He is a graduate of Massachusetts College of Pharmacy (B.S. 1966; M.S. — (Pharmacy) 1970) and a member of Boston and Columbus Graduate Chapters.

The Pharmacist's Professional Responsibility

Privilege has been variously defined as "a particular and peculiar benefit or advantage enjoyed by a person, company, or class, beyond the common advantages of other citizens . . . An exceptional or extraordinary power or exemption."¹ Running with each privilege is an associated responsibility. The term responsible has among its synonyms the term answerable. Thus we have established a relationship whereby each privilege carries with it some responsibility or responsibilities.

One such privilege afforded to a particular class of people is the practice of pharmacy. It is this privilege and the responsibilities flowing therefrom which will form the basis for the balance of this presentation.

A pharmacist should ask first "What are my responsibilities?" and "What are the consequences of my not satisfying these responsibilities?"

At the risk of appearing to take a negative approach one should look at what a plaintiff in a tort action must show in order to prevail against the defendant. First the plaintiff must show a duty running from the defendant to that plaintiff. Secondly, the plaintiff must show the defendant breached that duty. Third, as a result of that breach (causation) harm came to the plaintiff — *duty, breach, causation, and harm.*

Legal duty has been defined as follows: "That which the law requires to be done or forbore to a determinate person or the public at large, correlative to a vested and coextensive right in such person or the public, and the breach of which constitutes negligence."² In the Restatement of Torts, Section 282, the following appears: "Negligence is any conduct, except conduct recklessly disregardful of an interest of others, which falls below the standard established by law for the protection of others against unreasonable risk of harm." Depending upon the facts related to a given specific situation, it can generally be said negligence amounts to lack of due diligence and care.

While all torts are private injuries or wrongs arising from breaches of duty created by law, negligence is the most important area of tort law to the pharmacist. Courts have long been faced with consideration of what constitutes negligence in the practice of pharmacy.

In Law for the Pharmacy Student, Hassan has the following quote from Tombari vs. Connors (85 Conn. 231): A pharmacist is required by law, in the first place to possess a reasonable and ordinary degree of knowledge and skill with respect to the pharmaceutical duties which he professes to be competent to perform.

In the second place, the law imposes upon the pharmacist the obligation to exercise all the reasonable and ordinary care and prudence in applying his knowledge and skill in compounding medicine, filling prescriptions, and performing all the other duties of an apothecary.

'Ordinary care' with reference to the business of a pharmacist must therefore be held to signify the highest practicable degree of prudence, thoughtfulness, and vigilance, and the most exact and reliable safeguard consistent with the reasonable conduct of the business.³

Until fairly recent times the question of just how much diligence and care a pharmacist would be held to was generally covered in what is referred to as the "community rule." In essence this held that a pharmacist, or for that matter any other professional, need only perform to the level of like professionals in his geographic environs. In recent years, however, courts in many jurisdictions have expanded the geographic area involved. It now seems generally accepted that pharmacists and other professionals might well be held accountable for standards of care far beyond what is considered *local*.

What might all this background mean to pharmacists in an era of clinical pharmacy, pharmacist's drug selection, and greater patient involvement?

Perhaps only time will tell, but it is imperative that the pharmacy student and practitioner alike recognize the potential liability with which they are faced should they fail to meet the new and higher standards of diligence and care developed within the profession. It is one thing to argue as some have against medication records in pharmacies on the grounds they increase a pharmacist's liability, but it should be noted that when and if use of such a system becomes the standard of care for the profession failure to conform is likely to bring about greater liability than erroneous use of the system.

Similarly, one should consider the prospect of no longer having per se negligence for violation of substitution statutes or regulations. Does this mean immunity for pharmacists from the requirement of due care and diligence? Absolutely not! It is reasonable to assume the likelihood to be greater diligence and care necessitated under drug selectivity processes . . . when in effect the pharmacist says to the patient: "The dosage form I am dispensing to you is drug X and is *equivalent* (in all the ways that are important) to the dosage form of drug X prescribed by your physician." Being mindful of that the pharmacist's duty may now be greater under such a scheme, his responsibility for breaching that duty should also be greater.

Keeping these general considerations in mind it would be well to consider in closing the need or necessity for professional malpractice insurance. While it was not stated earlier, all persons are primarily responsible for their own torts. This includes certain categories of minors as well as employees. Irrespective to the fact one's employer may have professional liability insurance, it is highly desirable for the individual practitioner to have his own personal policy.

The benefits accruing to one who has malpractice insurance obviously only manifest themselves at the time a suit is brought. This is an analogous situation to most types of insurance coverage. Essentially, the insurance companies provide legal counsel to aid in the defense of the case when and if it is brought as well as reimbursement or payment of the judgement should the plaintiff sustain the action against defendant pharmacist.

PROVINCE I ASSEMBLY

The 1971 Province I Assembly opened informally with registration at the Mt. Vernon Motel in East Greenbush, N.Y. on Friday evening, November 5, 1971. This was followed by a lavish social hour and buffet dinner at the adjacent Howard Johnson's Restaurant.

On Saturday, November 6, the business sessions were called to order at 1 P.M. at the Albany College of Pharmacy. Satrap Gary D. Hall and First Grand Vice Regent Norman A. Campbell, Supervising Grand Officer, opened the Assembly with appropriate ritual. Following invocation, Grand Council Deputy Rinaldo A. DeNuzzo of Beta Delta Chapter extended the welcome to the Albany College of Pharmacy. Beta Delta Regent, David Sellis, welcomed the Brothers on behalf of his chapter. Satrap Hall then recognized First Grand Vice Regent Campbell who presented a grand officer pin to the newly elected Grand Counselor Benjamin R. Hershenson. Dr. Hershenson was elected Grand Counselor by the Executive Committee the previous week-end at its St. Louis meeting.

Secretary-Treasurer David H. Crombe supervised roll call and seating of delegates.

First Grand Vice Grand Regent Campbell then brought greetings of Alpha Chapter and provided a detailed report of the current status of Kappa Psi Pharmaceutical Fraternity on the national level.

Secretary-Treasurer Crombe then gave his report and appropriate correspondence of interest to the Assembly. Following chapter reports and old and new business a symposium entitled "The Relationship of the Fraternity to the Community and Pharmacy" was conducted. This was a most informative and worthwhile participatory program.

One should be advised, however, malpractice insurance does not protect the practitioner when the injury to the plaintiff arises out of an act committed in contravention of federal or state law or for errors in judgement, commission, or omission while the pharmacist is acting under the influence of drugs, alcohol, etc. Despite what constitutes minor exclusions, malpractice insurance for pharmacists and for pharmacy students is very worthwhile and a nominal investment.

Every thinking member of the profession of pharmacy should familiarize himself with particular applications of tort law in his own jurisdiction keeping in mind some of the general principles eluded to above, and by all means he should guard against what could be a catastrophic event in his professional practice by purchasing malpractice insurance. Needless to say, the best insurance one can have is the exercise of due care and diligence in his day to day activities. Continuing education programs; constant reading and updating; and evaluating materials in the literature; will help to keep the pharmacist at the highest possible level necessary for his to satisfy his legal duty to the people of his community . . . the pharmacist's most important obligation.


Donnelly and his wife, Dorothy, live at 7039 Broadway, in Indianapolis.
