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From the Desk of the Grand Regent

As I sit here at my desk to write my first article for *THE MASK* in the capacity of Grand Regent I am moved by the thought that within only a few miles from where I am sitting the founders of Kappa Psi gathered together at the Russell Military Academy in New Haven in 1879. Little did these founders realize that the then-handful of Brothers would one day grow into a brotherhood of professional men in the fields of pharmacy and medicine so that today in the field of pharmacy alone there are almost 20,000 members. Of course this figure represents the total of collegiate and graduate members throughout the United States.

TWENTY-THOUSAND STRONG

No organized group could continue for seventy-five years with a gradual growth to that of 20,000 members unless it has justified its existence by a contribution to its members and to society. However, we cannot sit back and rest on our laurels, believing that because of our size in numbers our strength must be parallel.

Each of us will have his own considered thoughts that Kappa Psi should do or refrain from doing in order to remain vibrant and alive, and to continue in growth. In these considered thoughts we must not forget that today, perhaps more than ever before, fraternities are being called upon to justify their existence so that special privileges fall to their members. Fraternities in 1954 will come under the pressure of new factors and new attitudes. The social and economic environment will not be the same as when Kappa Psi was founded in 1879—nor, even, as it was within the experience of many of our living members. We must ever be alert to adjust ourselves to changes in our environment so that we may continue to exist and progress.

THE TWENTY-SEVENTH GRAND COUNCIL CONVENTION

The Twenty-Seventh Grand Council Convention of Kappa Psi Pharmaceutical Fraternity is now history, having been held at the Sheraton-Park Hotel in Washington, D.C., on December 28, 29, and 30, 1953. Perhaps this was one of the most successful and enjoyable conventions ever held by the Fraternity. However, there was one disappointment in that illness of our beloved Grand Secretary-Treasurer, Ray S. Kelley, prevented his attendance. The total registration was 311 with 259 delegates and other Kappa Psi Brothers present. Forty-three out of forty-six Collegiate Chapters and twelve out of twenty-two Graduate Chapters had delegates in attendance. In addition, all of the seven Provinces reported. Members came from as far west as the States of Washington, Oregon, and California. This greatest attendance of any previously held Grand Council Conventions is probably some indication of the brotherly spirit and the close integration of the chapters that exist in our fraternity today.

During the three days that the convention was in session so many events occurred that it is difficult to mention all of them. Alpha Chapter and the Executive Committee held two important joint meetings one on the morning of the first day, before the convention officially opened, and one after the last business session of the Grand Council Convention was adjourned on early Wednesday afternoon, December 30. Two business sessions were held on Tuesday December 29, and one business session was held on Wednesday. On Monday evening the Brothers were dinner-guests of the Gamma Tau Chapter and the District of Columbia Graduate Chapter, after which short addresses were delivered by Brother F. Royce Franzoni, President of the American Pharmaceutical Association, and Brother

The 27th National Grand Council Convention—A Brief Report*

The Twenty-Seventh National Grand Council Convention of Kappa Psi Pharmaceutical Fraternity took place at the Sheraton-Park Hotel in Washington, D.C., on December 28, 29, and 30, 1953. Members of Gamma Tau Chapter at George Washington University and the District of Columbia Graduate Chapter served as hosts. These meetings marked the seventy-fourth anniversary of the founding of the organization.

Gunther K. Kessler and F. Richard Malzone, members of the alumni group in the host city, served as general convention chairman and general co-chairman respectively. Regent James A. Fink, Jr. of Gamma Tau Chapter served as chairman of the program committee, and Richard W. Foate, secretary of the same chapter was chairman of the committee on entertainment. To these members and to the many others who did so much to make this the largest convention in the history of Kappa Psi, the entire organization owes a deep debt of gratitude.

In addition to a large number of guests there were 259 members registered for the meetings. Of this number 150 were delegates and alternate delegates. Forty-three of the 46 Collegiate Chapters were represented as were twelve of the 22 Graduate Chapters. Record numbers were in attendance at the opening dinner held in the Burgundy Room of the convention hotel on the evening of December 28, at the luncheon in the Caribar Room on the following day, and at the Seventy-Fourth Anniversary Banquet on the final evening, December 30.

Grand Regent Frank H. Eby presided over the business sessions which were held on Tuesday and Wednesday, the 29th and 30th. During the meetings there were reports of national officers, various committees, delegates of chapters, as well as other official business. Grand Officers were elected at the final session on December 30. Those who are to serve for the next two years are as follows: Nicholas W. Fenney of the University of Connecticut, Grand Regent; Louis Fischer of the University of Washington, First Grand Vice Regent; Milton L. Neuroth of the Medical College of Virginia, Second Grand Vice Regent; Herman C. Forslund of Oregon State College, Third Grand Vice Regent; Ray S. Kelley of the Massachusetts College of Pharmacy, Grand Secretary-Treasurer; Walter R.

Williams of the University of Connecticut, Grand Historian; James R. Thayer of the St. Louis College of Pharmacy and Allied Sciences, Grand Counselor; and Glen J. Sperandio of Purdue University, Grand Ritualist. Maynard W. Quimby of the Massachusetts College of Pharmacy was reappointed Editor of THE MASK by the Executive Committee.

During the program which followed the banquet on the closing evening, retiring Grand Regent and Mrs. Eby were presented with gifts of appreciation from the membership. Collegiate Delegate, Stanley J. Blanchfield, Regent of Mu Chapter at the Massachusetts College of Pharmacy, made the presentations.

W. Paul Briggs, Executive Director of the American Foundation for Pharmaceutical Education. Following the luncheon on Tuesday, Brother George H. Frates, Washington representative of the N.A.R.D., spoke to the assembled Brothers on the value and meaning of a fraternity. The Seventy-Fourth Anniversary Dinner was held on Wednesday evening, following which dancing was held and this brought to a close the convention program. A feature of the Anniversary Dinner was the presentation by the Brothers of Kappa Psi of a gift to Mrs. Eby and a number of gifts to retiring Grand Regent Eby as a small token of appreciation for the excellent leadership displayed during his tenure of office.

One of the most interesting business sessions occurred on the afternoon of the second day when the reports of the forty-three Chapters and seven Provinces were rendered. This session was considered, by many, not only the highlight but also the most valuable part of the convention. These reports were inspiring because they revealed that the Chapters are making a real contribution to the schools and on the campuses where they exist. Many chapters are performing fine community or charitable services; many carry on excellent scholarship programs; and practically all chapters support numerous campus or school activities.

Any successful convention requires the contribution and cooperation of a large number of people and, in Washington many persons contributed toward the success of this Kappa Psi Grand Council Convention. I hesitate to mention the names of the many Brothers who had some part in the successful planning for fear that I may omit some. However, thanks go to Brother Gunther K. Kessler, general convention chairman and to Brother F. Richard Malzone, general co-chairman, and to all their committee members.

I am certain that every Brother who came to this convention gained an experience that will never be forgotten. To each who attended, I wish to express the gratitude of Alpha Chapter.







Biographical Sketches of New Grand Officers*

THIRD GRAND VICE REGENT HERMAN C. FORSLUND

GRAND HISTORIAN WALTER R. WILLIAMS

Kappa Psi's new Grand Historian, Walter R. Williams (better known as "Roy" Williams by his associates) was born in New Britain, Connecticut on January 30, 1908. He attended the public schools of his home city through the sophomore year of high school. He then moved with his folks to Milford, Connecticut, and he completed his high school education there.



REPORTS OF GRAND OFFICERS AND COMMITTEES

Report of the Grand Regent

Frank H. Eby

Brothers in Kappa Psi Pharmaceutical Fraternity:

It is an honor to greet officially all of you as you gather here in Washington to participate in the 27th National Grand Council Convention of our fraternity. The records reveal that the last Kappa Psi convention to be held here was the one of fifty years ago. This certainly indicates a rather long interval between official visits of our fraternity to our Nation's Capital.

I have enjoyed the unusual privilege of presiding at the last three Grand Council Conventions and I am deeply grateful for the honor which I have in being able to serve as the presiding officer at this meeting which marks the 74th anniversary in the history of Kappa Psi Fraternity.

Most of you are attending a Grand Council Convention for the first time and I am sure you will find it a warm and stimulating experience with fraternalism at its best. It will be a most unusual convention if you do not take away from it a new perspective, a greater enthusiasm, and a deeper appreciation of what your fraternity is now accomplishing on a national level.

The plans and preparations of a large convention such as this requires considerable work and cooperation on the part of the local representatives, in this case Gamma Tau Chapter and the District of Columbia Graduate Chapter. I know that the Brothers here in Washington have not spared any effort in their plans and work, and have done all that is possible to assure a convention that will be enjoyable and profitable. I am sure that all of you who have sacrificed some of your Christmas vacation so that you could attend this convention will always regard this meeting as one of your finest fraternity experiences and be most grateful to those who helped to make it possible.

To the members of the fraternity here in Washington and to all of our friends in the drug industry who contributed in any way toward the success of this convention, I express the grateful thanks of Alpha Chapter and the fraternity membership as a whole.

Having served somewhat more than seven years as Grand Regent of this fraternity, I can look back on the greatest period of reorganization and progress that our fraternity has ever enjoyed. We are still growing and much remains to be accomplished by those who will direct the activities of the fraternity in the years to come. As we review some of the accomplishments of our fraternity, I want you to know that I make no special claim for these accomplishments but report them out of pride for the splendid spirit and wonderful loyalty and cooperation of the members. This includes the Grand Officers who have served with me, the many Executive Committee and other committee members, numerous chapter officers, Grand Council Deputies, deans and faculty members of our colleges, and hundreds of devoted Collegiate and Graduate Members. Without all of these working in harmony in the interest of Kappa Psi Fraternity, we could not report the substantial accomplishments which I shall mention briefly.

MEMBERSHIP

One of the outstanding achievements of our fraternity in recent years has been the substantial increase in the number of Collegiate and Graduate Chapters. Since October 1946, eighteen active Collegiate Chapters have been added to the roll. Of this increase seven are new chapters and the remainder represents reactivated chapters. We now have twenty-two Graduate Chapters which includes six chapters to which we issued charters during the last several years. The evident activity in the important Graduate Chapter area of our fraternity demonstrates the fine spirit and loyalty of the Brothers which has continued through the years following their college days.

In keeping with the traditional Kappa Psi policy, we have refrained from using pressure methods to establish new Chapters. I believe that most of you know that charters are granted to new chapters only when there has been a strong demand for a chapter from a local group of qualified persons in a recognized school or college of pharmacy. We are always certain that there is a need for a new chapter and that those interested in organizing a new chapter are always likely to maintain the interest of Kappa Psi at heart. It is evident that this policy has been sound because we have continued to grow since the war and we have not had one delinquent chapter.

PUBLICATIONS

Kappa Psi Fraternity has had three important publications for many years, *The Constitution and Model By-Laws*, *The Ritual* and *THE MASK*. Since 1946 *The Constitution and Model By-Laws* have been revised, *The Ritual* has been completely rewritten and the entire format of *THE MASK* has been changed so that it does not even closely resemble *THE MASK* we had in 1946. Our most recent publication, *The Handbook for Pledges*, is now recognized as a very important publication and we are hopeful that in the near future we will add a *Pledge Training Manual*.

We are especially proud of *THE MASK* because it has played an important part in building a strong national organization through the contacts it establishes between the forty-six Collegiate Chapters, the twenty-two Graduate Chapters, and the thousands of Graduate Brothers throughout our country and other parts of the world who are not identified with any Graduate Chapter.

To you Brother Quimby, we express our gratitude and thanks for your devotion to the very difficult but important job as Editor of *THE MASK*. Your interest in the development of a finer publication has contributed substantially to the present prestige and success of the fraternity.

The completion of *The Handbook for Pledges* since our last convention is a very important accomplishment. When it is revised and published in a more permanent form and under the title, *Handbook of*

Kappa Psi Pharmaceutical Fraternity, it will be a valuable source of information not previously available to the average member. Its value as an aid in pledge training has already been demonstrated in most of our chapters.

For some time I have been concerned with the lack of uniformity in our pledge training program and I am sure you will agree that we should make an effort to improve this condition. In order that we could present something definite for your consideration at this convention, I appointed a committee representing Eta, Omega, and Beta Omega Chapters to study some of the material which could be used in a good pledge training program. The chairman of the committee will present a report at this convention which I believe you will find constructive and worth your careful study in the individual chapters. At a later time I hope that the fraternity will publish a recommended *Pledge Training Manual*.

PROVINCE CONVENTIONS

Since full accounts of the six Province Conventions held since December 1951 have been published in *THE MASK* and will also be reported on by the Province Delegates, I shall refrain from commenting other than to express my appreciation to the Satraps, Secretaries, and others who contributed to the success of these meetings.

In the future I urge that well planned programs be formulated for the Province Assemblies so that these meetings will serve the useful purpose for which they are intended.

THE CENTRAL OFFICE

In each of my previous addresses at Grand Council Conventions I have lauded the work of our Grand Secretary-Treasurer Kelley who has directed the activities of our Central Office for the last thirteen years. I am sure there is nothing that I could say today that would add to my deep respect and admiration for him and his splendid handling of the most important job in the fraternity. Few of you realize just how much the activities of the Central Office have expanded over recent years as a result of the great increase in the number of members and active chapters. All of you must be conscious of the efficiency of our Central Office because of the manner in which memberships and other chapter business is handled.

All of us deeply regret that illness has made it inadvisable for Brother Ray S. Kelley to make the trip to Washington and I know that our prayers are expressed for a sound and complete recovery. If he were here I would say that words seem inadequate to express our personal feelings and those of the entire fraternity, but I speak for the fraternity when I say to you, Brother Kelley, that we shall always be indebted to you for your untiring and devoted services and grateful that you have directed our fraternity through so many prosperous years. It is our hope that you may continue to serve Kappa Psi for many years to come.

THE GRAND REGENT'S REPORT ON COLLEGIATE CHAPTERS

For this convention the Grand Regent assumed the responsibility of preparing and presenting a detailed report covering some of the many activities and other matters pertaining to the individual Collegiate Chapters. It is the first time that a report such as this has been presented at a Grand Council Convention. If you find it as informative and constructive as I have found it, I recommend that a similar report be presented at each Grand Council Convention in the future.

All of you are cognizant of the fact that our forty-six Collegiate Chapters are scattered through thirty-four states and the District of Columbia. This has always made it difficult for the chapters to become fully acquainted with each other and to know how the various chapters operate and how they carry on their activities. It is true that the chapter letters which appear in *THE MASK* and the verbal reports that are made at the National Conventions by the delegates have given some idea of chapter activities but the picture has been incomplete. For this reason I believe a detailed report on each chapter, so far as the most important matters are concerned, will result in a more thorough understanding and better appreciation of what your fraternity is doing and what it is trying to accomplish.

On October 1 of this year the Grand Regent sent to the Secretary of each Collegiate Chapter, a two page questionnaire calling for information touching on a number of aspects of Kappa Psi Fraternity life. Through the splendid responses of the secretaries, an abundance of valuable material was obtained from which the most important facts were embodied in a report which I will present at this convention at a later time. I want to state that I believe many important items were not reported either as a result of some secretaries not being thoroughly familiar with what the chapter members have done and are doing, or as a result of a failure to recognize the great importance of this report, but there is a possibility that modesty may have been an important factor. Since the report will speak for itself I shall elaborate only on such parts of it that merit consideration.

When we look at the growth of the fraternity during the last few years we are likely to think largely of the increase in chapters and members. However, when one looks closely at our chapters we see the real strength and importance of the fraternity. Here we observe how the chapters through their own serious efforts are accomplishing something worth while for their own members and at the same time are demonstrating that they are conscious of their responsibilities to their profession, college and community.

I know that several years ago, few if any chapters participated in any community or charitable activities or services, while the records today show that thirty-three chapters have participated in some activity of this kind since our last convention. Two years from now I am hopeful that the Grand Regent can report that every one of our chapters has performed some unselfish service or has contributed something substantial to the college or local community.

It is very gratifying to note that twenty-seven chapters report some kind of scholarship program which I am sure is a very substantial gain over the last two years. I shall not discuss this subject because I know the Chairman of the Scholarship Committee will report on it later. I do feel however, that every chapter should have a scholarship program even though it may be quite modest. I commend the chapters which have well organized scholarship programs.

The survey shows that nineteen chapters hold two or more scientific meetings each year. Although this is certainly a definite improvement over past years, I believe that all chapters must look forward to organizing scientific programs in the future. Since many of our chapters are associated with universities, a variety of speakers are available in many scientific fields, both related and unrelated to pharmacy. Our Grand Council Deputies are in a good position to secure speakers and I urge that they give serious consideration to the matter of scientific programs for those chapters in which no programs are held at present.

Very satisfactory progress has been made in the publication of Newsletters with fifteen chapters reporting the publication and distribution to the Graduate Members, of one or more issues annually. Newsletters not only maintain a close contact between the chapter and the Graduate Members but they also help to develop a closer relation with the college and promote a better alumni spirit. When edited in a constructive manner, the Newsletter is a very valuable public relations medium.

While the above mentioned accomplishments refer only to several phases of my report on the Collegiate Chapters, I believe they offer good evidence of the sound growth that is taking place in our fraternity.

THE FUTURE OF THE FRATERNITY

During the last few years we have been concerned largely with the problems of growth, in the future we must look more closely toward the improvement of the internal operation of the Collegiate Chapters and their development of a deeper consciousness toward their professional and community responsibilities. We must strengthen our Graduate Chapters and encourage these important fraternity units to aid the Collegiate Chapters in their scholarship and house programs.

As fraternity members we must always be vigilant in defending the American way of life because the fraternity system is an important part of the social composite that has helped to make America great. For many years fraternities have borne the brunt of vicious attacks by those who would replace the American system with foreign ideologies. We must combat these attacks whether inspired by Communists or others but we must also live our Americanism every day, outside as well as within our chapters, so that it becomes an integral part of each of us. As part of our Americanism program within the chapters I feel that every chapter should display an American flag at all meetings, that the Pledge of Allegiance should be a part of the opening ceremony at meetings and that proper recognition is given in honor of the members now serving in the armed forces of our country.

I believe that we must give serious consideration to a sound pledge training program if membership is to mean anything. During the post war years when chapters were over-crowded with members, some of the true fraternity spirit was lost because the pledge training program and the ritual of initiation were not treated with serious consideration. If we are to inculcate in our new members the true spirit of fraternalism with its sound personal values, we must develop a purposeful pledge program and make the ritual of initiation the serious and meaningful ceremony it is intended to be. Even though we live in an age when great emphasis is placed on materialistic and social prestige, we can hope to maintain our fraternity existence only if we place Greater emphasis on spiritual and human values. It is the responsibility of all of us who have any part in directing the activities of our fraternity and its chapters to see that we never forget the principles of Kappa Psi and that those who embrace membership in our fraternity are thoroughly instructed in the real meaning of Industry, Sobriety, Fellowship and High Ideals.

In closing this report I can say that I am very proud of the many accomplishments of the fraternity during the past seven years that I have served as Grand Regent. The splendid cooperation of so many brothers who were willing to work and share the responsibilities of rebuilding Kappa Psi is ample proof of our national solidarity.

To each brother who contributed in any manner toward the success of the fraternity, I shall always be grateful. I trust that your fine spirit and enthusiasm for our fraternity will continue through the years ahead because no fraternity can grow and attain any worthwhile objectives without the loyalty of a large segment of its membership.

Serving as Grand Regent of Kappa Psi Pharmaceutical Fraternity has been one of my richest experiences, and I am thankful that your confidence and respect made it possible for me to enjoy this great honor for so many years.

Report of First Grand Vice Regent

It has been a privilege and an honor to serve as First Grand Vice Regent of Kappa Psi for the past four years and to attend my third National Grand Council Convention. To all of you, especially those attending for the first time, this national Kappa Psi convention, I sincerely hope you enjoy yourself and that you will find these gatherings both enlightening and inspiring.

During the past two years your Vice Regent was fortunate in being able to visit and to participate to a limited extent in various functions of the Collegiate and Graduate Chapters on the West Coast. On May 9, 1952, he attended a joint dinner and business meeting of Beta Zeta (Oregon State College) and the Portland Graduate Chapter. On March 13, 1953, he visited with Beta Zeta, the Collegiate group at Corvallis, Oregon and on May 4 a visitation was made to Beta Gamma, University of California and the Graduate Chapter both in San Francisco. Report of the Third Grand Vice Regent

Report of the Grand Secretary-Treasurer

Ray S. Kelley

Fifty years ago, on November 26-27, 1903, the annual Convention of Kappa Psi Fraternity was held in Washington, D.C. At that time, being eight years of age, my parents insisted upon my remaining at home with them. In those days one obeyed his parents and thus I did not attend that Convention of 1903. Fifty years later the biennial Convention of the Kappa Psi Pharmaceutical Fraternity is being held in Washington, D.C. At the tender age of fifty plus eight, two physicians issue the orders and their orders, like those given by my parents in 1903, must be obeyed and again we remain at home. Please invite us to hold our Grand Council Convention in Washington fifty years hence and we will endeavor to meet with you and participate in your deliberations.

We are assembled for this convention as the guests of the Gamma Tau and District of Columbia Chapters. All of us are most grateful for the many things our hosts have done to insure the success of our business meetings and our social gatherings. To Brother Kessler and his co-workers our sincere thanks for their splendid work in making this a Convention that will always remain as a happy memory to the delegates and guests here assembled.

The purpose of this report is to acquaint you with past events and suggest plans which we hope may insure future progress.

Membership. Since December 15, 1951 we have added 1620 members to the ranks of Kappa Psi. Our total membership as of December 1, 1953 is 19,586. For the college year 1951-1952 our maximum Collegiate Membership was 2025 and for 1952-1953 it totaled 1941. The Collegiate Membership as of December 1, 1953 was 1334. We may well be proud of the quality of our membership. It is my belief that, with a little extra effort and still maintaining the high standards for membership, we should exceed 2000 Collegiate Members for the present academic year.

Finances. The Fraternity is in excellent financial condition. An audited financial report for the fiscal year July 1, 1952-June 30, 1953 was mailed in September to the secretary of each Collegiate and Graduate Chapter. On December 1, 1953 our cash assets were \$24,371.25 with all accounts paid. The Reserve Fund showed a balance of \$13,524.33, the Convention Fund balance was \$9,459.04 and the remaining assets divided between a U.S. Bond, the Life Mask Fund and checking account. With less than six exceptions all Per Capita and Graduate Chapter Fees are paid in full through December 1953.

THE MASK. The genial Editor of THE MASK is expected to present this report of your Grand Secretary-Treasurer. Despite this fact, it seems entirely proper to tell you, Brother Quimby, that all of us appreciate the wonderful contribution you have made to Kappa Psi by giving us a fraternity quarterly of which we are extremely proud. We feel that any brother who does not receive his MASK is missing a great deal of information concerning our Fraternity and our profession. Every new member is asked to give his *permanent home address* on the membership card he prepares at the time of initiation. Let your MASK go to that home address and ask your family to forward it to you. Your college address or your service address is prone to change rather frequently. When this happens the Post Office reports that you have moved and we are forced to remove your name from THE MASK Subscription List. Please carry this information to your respective chapters.

Inactive Members. The statement that a Collegiate Member desires to become "Inactive" is giving us some concern. Members do not resign from Kappa Psi at any time neither do they become Inactive Members while an undergraduate student at a college of pharmacy at which there is a Chapter of Kappa Psi. The Collegiate Chapter may suspend a member, but that Chapter is responsible to Grand Council for the payment of all dues for the member suspended. If the Chapter prefers to expel the member, this expulsion must be made in the manner prescribed by our Constitution and the Grand Secretary-Treasurer notified of the action taken by the Chapter. The financial obligations of the Chapter for an expelled member cease on the date of expulsion. We suggest that you resort to expulsion only as an extreme punishment. Suspend the member from Chapter activities, pay his Per Capita to Grand Council and you will find your kindness will be repaid at a later date. We would emphasize the fact that each Collegiate Chapter is responsible to Grand Council for the Per Capita of all undergraduate members and for the Initiation Fees of all new members, Collegiate, Graduate and Facultate.

Grand Council Conventions. Certain expenses of one delegate from each Collegiate Chapter are paid from the Grand Council Convention Fund as provided in our Constitution. During the past summer these expenses were determined by the Travel Bureau of the New York Central Railroad. We requested them to submit the cost of round trip railroad fare between the cities in which our forty-six Collegiate Chapters are located and Chicago, Illinois, Cincinnati, Ohio, Portland, Oregon and Washington, D.C. The total cost was calculated and the results were as follows:

Chicago, Ill.	\$ 4,345.19
Cincinnati, Ohio	4,408.70
Portland, Ore.	10,404.80
Washington, D.C.	5,419.51

These figures should indicate why it is necessary to hold our Grand Council Convention either in the East or Mid-West until such time as our Convention Fund reaches a sum to permit us to hold our Convention on the West Coast and leave a balance of between three and four thousand dollars in our Grand Council Convention Fund. It would seem to me that a balance less than the sum indicated would be economically not sound.

Another matter of concern is the mounting cost of our Conventions to our host chapter. It is suggested that the incoming Grand Regent appoint a committee from among the members of the Executive Committee and Alpha Chapter to study this problem. The report of this Committee should be submitted to the Executive Committee on or before January 1, 1955.

Constitutions. The present revised Constitution was distributed during February 1953. Approximately 2500 copies of this revision are still in stock and we trust that changes in our Constitution await the next Grand Council Convention. Proposed changes should be in the form of recommendations which would become effective upon passage by the Grand Council but would be reconsidered as a permanent constitutional change at our next Grand Council Convention. Following this line of thought your Grand Secretary-Treasurer submits the following recommendation:

That the immediate Past Grand Regent, the First Grand Vice Regent and the Editor of THE MASK shall be *ex officio* members, without vote, of the Executive Committee. This recommendation to become effective upon passage by this Convention and referred to the next Grand Council Convention for its consideration and inclusion in our Constitution.

Few of our members realize the many hours of service given to Kappa Psi by our Grand Officers and the various Committees of Grand Council. You, as individuals and the chapters you represent, have cooperated with us in a wholehearted manner and made our work a genuine pleasure. Upon the individual depends the calibre of his chapter and from the various chapters comes our growth and prestige. Keep your high standards of membership.

During the past few months we have received many kind messages from our brothers of Kappa Psi. The members of the Executive Committee and Alpha Chapter have been most kind in their offers to assist us in our work at the Central Office. We appreciate this kindness. Our calls for assistance have primarily gone to Grand Regent Eby, Editor Quimby, and to a non-member of Kappa Psi, my personal secretary. The many hours of work which they have and are continuing to contribute to the affairs of the Central Office are very great. To each of them my personal thanks.

I am sure that each of you and every member of our fraternity have realized the unselfish devotion of Brother Eby to Kappa Psi. He has served as your Grand Regent for more than seven years and his efforts have been instrumental in the success and growth of our Fraternity. While he is retiring as our Grand Regent, we can not afford to lose his sound advice and inspiration. Brother Eby, you may be retiring as Grand Regent but your work for Kappa Psi must continue.

I sincerely trust that each delegate and member present at this convention will take back to his own chapter the inspiration derived from this meeting and impress upon his brothers the fact that we are a national fraternity. Being a member of a national fraternity, the individual chapter should not perform any act that would not be acceptable to the other chapters within our brotherhood. To each of you, my sincere wish for personal happiness and success during the New Year.

Report of Grand Historian

Nicholas W. Fenney

With this report your present Grand Historian has completed twelve years as a Grand Officer of our fraternity, the last six years of which have been in the capacity of Grand Historian. I have enjoyed every moment in the performance of my duties in this office.

Six years ago at our convention in Chicago, which marked the 68th year of the founding of Kappa Psi Pharmaceutical Fraternity, this Grand Council honored me by election to the present office. At that time I was charged with the responsibility of reviewing available data and making thorough investigations wherever possible so as to put the history of Kappa Psi in order. This was necessary because for some years previous to that time our early history was in somewhat of a chaotic state and not too accurate. As a result of this study which took almost four years to complete we now enjoy a true history of the beginnings of Kappa Psi. This history has been printed in THE MASK (47:48, 1951) and also appears in an abbreviated form in our *Handbook for Pledges* that was issued last year.

During these past two years the office of your Grand Historian has mailed out information to a number of chapters who requested material relative to their own founding and local history. In each case the request was fulfilled since the Grand Historian's office has a somewhat complete history of most of our chapters in its files. Several requests were also made for the use of the fraternity owned 16 mm. moving picture film illustrating the exemplification of the Ritual in full ceremonial form which was enacted by the brothers of Theta chapter during our national convention in Richmond, Virginia, in 1949.

The other duties fulfilled by your Grand Historian included several chapter visitations and the awarding of an honorary membership. In March of 1952, it was my privilege to journey to this city to the Gamma Tau chapter, and along with our Third Grand Vice Regent Milton L. Neuroth, present an honorary membership in Kappa Psi to Dr. W. Paul Briggs, secretary and executive director of the American Foundation for Pharmaceutical Education. Leaving Washington, my visitations took me to the Theta Chapter at the Medical College of Virginia and the Beta Xi Chapter at the University of North Carolina.

Both chapters were found functioning in excellent order with a high spirit of brotherly love in evidence. On March 5, 1953, in company with our Grand Regent Eby, it was my privilege to journey to Atlanta, Georgia, to help install the Gamma Psi Chapter at the Southern College of Pharmacy.

In reviewing these past two years of the history of Kappa Psi Pharmaceutical Fraternity, it is apparent to me that we have progressed in a very successful way due in great part to the spirit of brotherly love among our members and to the cooperation of many loyal Graduate and Facultate Brothers. In addition, we can point out among other things, the excellent leadership shown by our Grand Regent, the remarkable work accomplished by the Editor of THE MASK, namely Brother Quimby, the excellent cooperation given all of us and the efficiency evidenced by the office of the Grand Secretary-Treasurer, Brother Kelley. With the close and continued cooperation of every chapter in our fraternity with the Grand Officers and the Central Office, Kappa Psi cannot fail to continue as a leader in the field of National Pharmaceutical Fraternities.

Report of the Grand Counselor

Once again time has failed to help me solve my problems. I had just begun to recover from my embarrassment of two years ago—at which time I had to conjure up a report to this convention out of extremely dilute air—and now an encore is demanded. If anything, the air is more dilute today than it was two years ago. That is not intended as a reflection against the Detroit atmosphere.

It would seem that an office with such a sonorous name as Grand Counselor would inevitably serve as honey for a lot of bees with projecting stingers. It would seem that in a world in which so much uncertainty and confusion exists, that even a very mediocre person could give away a little merchandise. Not so in Kappa Psi. In two years I have been unable to peddle enough advice to satisfy the longings of a kindergarten vocational guidance director.

True I have voted a few times to admit or refuse admission to a new chapter. True as a result of or in spite of being Grand Counselor, I have served on the Legislative Committee. True I have attended a number of Kappa Psi gatherings where my title lent dignity to the occasion so long as I kept my mouth shut. True I have been consumed with an ardent desire to give counsel to all and sundry. True I have tried to perform honestly and well all the tasks assigned me. But—as you will admit—even when this is extensively padded, as I am doing now, there is room for reasonable doubt as to whether my total contribution adds up to more than 0.000001.

There must be reasons for this uselessness. Three causes of this futility suggest themselves to me. The first two make me very resentful and the third I refuse to mention like all faithful adherents of the Fifth Amendment. With respect to the first two I would like to say that I have been undermined possibly even sabotaged. Your *other* officers—the word *other* is underscored in the manuscript—have been so darned zealous and efficient that no problems have trickled down to the Grand Counselor. Secondly the affairs of the Chapters and Provinces have been handled so intelligently and so efficiently by local luminaries that there haven't been any problems for me to solve.

Now to be entirely serious for just a minute or two. I believe that those two reasons for my inactivity of which I spoke very flippantly—are very real reasons. I believe we have had a fine group of National Officers. I think they have performed many real services for Kappa Psi. I believe also that we have been fortunate in having able and willing officers and groups looking after the welfare of the various groups—locally. I believe also—and I certainly feel that it should be that way—that most of your problems are local problems and should be solved in most cases at least—locally. That facility is the core of the strength of any fraternity. I believe that the Office of Grand Counselor—not the individual occupying it—is a desirable and probably necessary reserve. The fact that a cop walks his beat for a month without making an arrest does not justify the abolishment of the police force. It is always a fine thing to have reserves and it is an even finer thing—not to need them.

Report of the Grand Ritualist

The duties of the Grand Ritualist, according to Article XVII, section 7 of the Constitution, are concerned primarily with editing and revising the Ritual and directing the ritualistic work of the Order. Inasmuch as a revision of the Ritual had been completed prior to the 26th National Grand Council Convention in Detroit, your Grand Ritualist has not been greatly overburdened with work during the past two years. However, one major project remained to be completed at the close of the last convention; this was the *Pledge Handbook*. On April 18, 1952, the handbook which was completed with the help of the other Grand officers was submitted to the Grand Secretary-Treasurer. The handbook was then printed and became available for general distribution to the individual chapters on December 22, 1952. Thus, a long-felt need on the part of the collegiate chapters for guidance in pledge work was at last satisfied.

It was the pleasure and privilege of the Grand Ritualist, along with Second Grand Vice Regent Goldner, to participate in the installation ceremony of the Minnesota Graduate Chapter in Minneapolis, Minnesota on April 13, 1953, and to attend the Kappa Psi Pharmaceutical Fraternity annual breakfast at the A. Ph. A. Convention on August 19, 1953, in Salt Lake City, Utah. Other chapter visitations included the annual breakfast-meetings of the Wisconsin Graduate Chapter in Milwaukee, Wisconsin on September 27, 1952, and September 30, 1953.

In closing this short report I wish to say that it has been an honor and a privilege for your Grand Ritualist to have served in this capacity for the past two years and to have had a part in the writings and teachings of Kappa Psi Pharmaceutical Fraternity. It is my sincere hope that this Order will continue to progress and prosper as greatly in the immediate years ahead as it has done in the past under the very able leadership of our Grand Regent Eby and Grand Secretary-Treasurer Kelley.

Report of the Editor of "The Mask"

THE MASK has recently completed fifty years of existence. During that time 204 issues have appeared, the most recent one dated November, 1953. On page 164 of this latest number there appears a reproduction showing the cover design used on the original MASK which appeared in January of 1904. A brief discussion of the early volumes accompanies the picture of the cover and explains that six (6) numbers of our magazine were issued in 1904 and again in 1905.

Since the recent article was prepared for the November MASK it has been learned that only four (4) numbers appeared in 1906, and from that time to this the magazine has been a quarterly publication.

Over the years the appearance of the publication has changed on a number of occasions, often with a change in editor. Types of material have also varied. At one time THE MASK took on the appearance of a technical journal because of the inclusion within its pages of numerous scientific papers. Such articles occupied a large part of the space in a considerable number of issues.

Examination of a complete file will show that eight different members have been assigned the task of editing THE MASK during the fifty year period. It is interesting to observe that Brother A. Richard Bliss, for many years a Grand Officer, edited the largest number of issues. He served as Editor from 1911 through 1929, and from 1931 until his death some 9 or 10 years later. During these two periods he edited 115 numbers of THE MASK.

During prosperous as well as lean times THE MASK has survived even though some volumes which have appeared in the mid-Thirties and during World War II were, of necessity, very small. From the late Forties until the present there has been an opportunity to make various changes which were thought to be desirable.

This report is the fourth one which I have had the privilege of presenting before a National Grand Council Convention. During this period of time, and mainly through the excellent work of the Grand Officers and the membership as a whole, an unprecedented growth has taken place in Kappa Psi. THE MASK circulation has shown a tremendous increase as a result. As mentioned in my report of two years ago, the circulation per issue in 1941 was approximately 3000. The average circulation per issue for 1953 was about 8500.

The eight numbers which have appeared since the last Grand Council Convention constitute the forty-ninth and fiftieth volumes. These two volumes contain a total of 428 pages, 228 for 1952, and 200 for the current year. By odd coincidence these figures are exactly the same as for the volumes issued in 1950 and 1951.

Fourth and fifth supplements of the National Honor Roll appeared in the November issues of THE MASK in 1952 and 1953. With this addition of nearly 230 names the number of World War II veterans so recorded reached a total of well over three thousand.

It is hoped that other materials which have appeared in recent volumes of our quarterly have or will prove to be worth while.

Please let me express my appreciation to all who have aided in so many ways in making THE MASK a valued publication. Read your MASK, suggest ways of improving it, and submit material for inclusion in it.

Report of the Executive Committee

The Executive Committee met in Boston, Massachusetts on May 15 and 16, 1953. Grand Regent Frank H. Eby presided with members Ray S. Kelley, Rudolph H. Blythe, John J. Dayton, Jr., Peter C. Regrut and Pierre F. Smith attending. The Editor of THE MASK, Maynard W. Quimby was present by invitation.

Since only routine matters were considered and the fact that complete proceedings of the meeting were published in Volume L, No. 3, July 1953 issue of THE MASK, further comment at this time is not necessary.

A combined meeting of Alpha Chapters and the Executive Committee of the Kappa Psi Pharmaceutical Fraternity was held at the Hotel Sheraton-Park, Washington, D.C. on Monday, December 28, 1953 at 10:15 A.M.

Grand Regent Frank H. Eby presided with Grand Vice Regent Milton L. Neuroth as Acting Secretary. The following members were present: Brothers James R. Thayer, Louis Fischer, Nicholas W. Fenney, Karl J. Goldner, Dennis Dzikowski and Edward H. Stonis. The Editor of THE MASK, Maynard W. Quimby, was present by invitation.

Brother Quimby reported on the condition of Grand Secretary-Treasurer Ray S. Kelley. There is every reason to believe that his health is improving satisfactorily. Brother Kelley sent word that at any time he felt that he could not handle the duties of the office, the Executive Committee would be notified.

It was agreed that greetings be sent to Brother Kelley in some form to be decided on later during the Convention, the idea being to have each Chapter represented.

The report of Grand Regent Frank H. Eby included reference to the following:

1. A survey of Chapter activities, which will be presented on the floor during the Convention;
2. A pledge training program;
3. A record of visitations to Chapters and Provinces;
4. The installation of two new Chapters.

Brother Eby reported that 1,355 pieces of first class mail have been sent from his office since the 1951 Convention.

It was recommended that the selection of the date and place of the Grand Council Convention in the future be established at an earlier time than has been the custom in the past.

It was recommended that the Executive Committee assume some responsibility in the solicitation of funds for underwriting some of the Convention expenses in the future.

It was recommended that the name of the *Handbook for Pledges* be changed to *The Handbook of the Kappa Psi Pharmaceutical Fraternity*.

The above recommendations were approved and passed unanimously by motion of the members in attendance at the joint meeting.

The report of Grand Secretary-Treasurer Ray S. Kelley was presented in his absence by the Grand Regent.

A complete financial statement covering the period from July 31, 1941 to June 30, 1953 was submitted by Brother Kelley.

It was suggested by James S. Gove, Certified Public Accountant for the Fraternity that for the purposes of the record, the financial statements covering the period from July 31, 1941 to June 30, 1953 be approved as a whole by the Executive Committee. Said report covering information contained in the financial reports certified by Public Accountants was properly approved on the floor of each Convention over the stated period.

Upon motion by Brother Dennis Dzikowski, duly made, and seconded by Brother Edward H. Stonis, it was unanimously VOTED: That the acts of the officers and Executive Committee of the Kappa Psi Pharmaceutical Fraternity for the period July 31, 1941 and ending June 30, 1953 and all payments made for and on behalf of the corporation for the years then ended be and the same are hereby ratified and approved.

Upon recommendation of Brother Kelley, it was moved by Brother Fenney, duly seconded by Brother Fischer and unanimously VOTED that the \$500.00 Defense Bond which matures in 1954 be redeemed and the assets derived therefrom be deposited in the Reserve Fund of the Fraternity.

Upon recommendation of Brother Kelley, it was moved by Brother Fischer, seconded by Brother Thayer and carried unanimously that a Committee on Publications (exclusive of THE MASK) be appointed by the incoming Grand Regent, consisting of the Grand Regent, Grand Secretary-Treasurer and any three other members of the Fraternity to edit the following:

1. *The Handbook of the Fraternity*
2. *A Manual for Pledge Training*
3. A program for the installation of Chapters of the Fraternity
4. And such other future publications not already included in the Constitution.

First Grand Vice Regent Fischer stressed the necessity and importance of visitations by Grand Officers, especially the Grand Regent, to the Chapters in the far west.

Grand Counselor Thayer called for any suggested revisions in the Constitution. None were offered. Grand Regent Eby distributed mimeographed reports on Chapter activities which will also be available at the Tuesday meeting of the Convention.

The meeting adjourned at 12 o'clock noon.

Report of the Legislative Committee

James R. Thayer

Lacking the wit to start in better style I would like to say—I half quote—all that I am or ever hope to be, I owe to my darling mothers on the Legislative Committee—Walter Williams and Lauren Hamner. They have taken me by my dirty little hand and led me out of the wilderness so many times that it has become normal routine.

In this task which I am now undertaking I am placed in double jeopardy—I have a dual responsibility—I have to justify my conduct and efficiency in an office—Grand Counselor—in which I have already failed to justify my existence—and today I am under the urgency of proving that diligent search might have produced a worse chairman for the Legislative Committee.

Ever since infancy with the peasant like desire to eat my dessert first and the cold peasant-like necessity of eating my beans and potatoes first. This has been mainly inspired by the absence of dessert. Following that lifelong urgency I am going to first recite a few very boring facts and figures and then by the grace of God we may enjoy a little pie. I have a dual objective in citing these facts and figures. In the first place I want to conjure up a vision in your minds in which you can clearly see that for the past two years I have been working twenty-six hours a day in your behalf. In the second place I want to conjure up a vision in the mind of the Grand Secretary-Treasurer which will wring his stony heart and will persuade him—ultimately—to validate at least half of the bill which I intend to submit for postage and other necessary expenses.

And now to get at and over the sordid facts. During the past two years, despite my best efforts to sabotage the program, The Legislative Committee has considered and approved granting charters to

two new undergraduate chapters and to three new graduate chapters. Actually this task is not too arduous. If standards are met and need and success are demonstrated favorable action is automatic. There is only the task of appraising the above factors and in the performance of this the Legislative Committee has been conscientious.

During the same period By-Laws for five undergraduate chapters, two Provinces and one graduate chapter have been processed and approved. Of minor importance but perhaps worth mentioning amendments to three or four sets of By-Laws have been processed and approved. During the past four years By-Laws have been adopted by thirteen undergraduate chapters, one graduate chapter and six provinces. I think this represents excellent progress and I feel that Kappa Psi owes a debt of gratitude to Grand Regent Eby, Grand Secretary-Treasurer Kelley and the individual groups who have contributed to this achievement.

To return to the labors of the Legislative Committee. The approval of By-Laws, as we have practiced it is a somewhat formidable undertaking. We have followed a rather cumbersome and time consuming routine. I have always felt that in the functioning of a committee, three things should be observed.

(1) Equal weight ascribed to the opinions of all members of the committee.

(2) No inhibition on the part of any member to express his honest opinions.

(3) That each member have free and complete access to all of the ideas of the other members.

I will not bore you with the details of the mechanism by which these things have been accomplished but I am sincere in saying that I believe they have.

I would like to encroach upon your time a little further by pin-pointing our thinking as practiced in the consideration of proposed By-Laws. As we have visualized it, our responsibility has been fairly heavy. I would like to clarify this as completely as possible because I am sure that some of you feel that you have been victimized by the over-diligence and under-intelligence of our committee. We have felt that in the treatment of these applications the following things should be kept in mind,

(1) no essential divergence from the spirit and the letter of the Constitution and By-Laws of the National Chapter, (2) clarity of wording to minimize the possibility of misinterpretation, (3) avoidance of situations which might seem temporarily expedient but which might prove inept or embarrassing in the future, (4) elimination in so far as is possible elements of potential dissent and (5) insistence upon reasonably high standards of literary excellence with regard to phraseology, punctuation, spelling and other amenities. Obviously this is rather heroic treatment and the Committee wishes to express its gratitude to the victims of our crusade for their patience, understanding and cooperation.

In the interim between this and the nineteen hundred and fifty-one Grand Council Convention the Constitution and By-Laws of the Fraternity have been revised. I suspect that many of you feel that the mountain has labored and brought forth a mouse. No doubt an equal number feel that the mice have labored and brought forth an earthquake. Actually—and very wisely so—these organs under which great organizations operate are not subject to sudden or ill advised and temporary changes. In this revision which we undertook we tried to accomplish certain things: (1) of necessity we have included the necessary changes which time and practical urgency have dictated, in the guise of officially adopted amendments to the Constitution and By-Laws (2) we have tried to reword a number of segments in such a way as to lead to greater clarity, less possibility of misinterpretation and better possibility of understanding the real objectives of these By-Laws (3) injecting a little more spit and polish and (4) contributing at least in a small way to the permanence and success of the Fraternity. I wish you would keep in mind also that—all these things must be accomplished within the framework of the present Constitution and By-Laws—all these things must be done by mere mortals of different degrees of intelligence, different breeding and different instincts—this automatically spells compromise. Lastly that all this had to be done under the bright, unrelenting, incorrigible eye of one of the most beloved members of our fraternity, Ray S. Kelley. (Much of it was performed in the presence of a second handicap, a most unusual but easily recognizable Boston blizzard.)

And now to peter out as most things and men do after expressing aspirations to climb to Valhalla. There have been X amendments to By-Laws of Chapters and Provinces. There have been questions with respect to interpretation of By-Laws—there have been a few problems dealing with personality clashes. It is inevitable that so long as human beings are working together misunderstandings of motives and objectives will arise and a little oil will need to be spilled on the troubled waters.

As non-contributory to the welfare of Kappa Psi but infinitely pleasing and satisfying to me, I would like to mention breaking bread and bending liquids in a number of different places with a number of different groups of Kappa Psi Brothers.

As final proof of my good intentions and possibly fruitless efforts, I might mention that during the last two years I have written one hundred and six miserable letters.

I feel a little like the blob of clay on the potters wheel—dull, uninteresting, almost ugly and I pray God that under the sentient fingers of Kappa Psi—something of utility if not of beauty has been shaped.

Report of the Scholarship Committee

This report will deal with two phases of the Scholarship Committee's activities. The first part is a brief summary of the scholarship activity of the forty-five collegiate chapters who have sent in reports to our Grand Regent for the two year period, 1952-1953.

Generally speaking, the status quo of scholastic excellence in the fraternity has been maintained. However, there are some facts which give us serious concern. For example, eighteen chapters have reported nothing being done at present to promote scholarship, although three of these chapters have plans for the future under consideration. This compares unfavorably with the facts presented in our report two years ago.

On the bright side, we are pleased to present the following summary of data relative to the scholarship activity of the fraternity.

1. Thirteen chapters gave scholarship keys with or without a cash award to seventeen different recipients.
2. Thirteen chapters gave cash or scholarship awards to twenty-one different recipients.
3. Four chapters gave book awards such as *Remington's Practice of Pharmacy*.
4. Ten chapters reported eleven Grand Council Scholarship Key and Certificate winners. A perusal of THE MASK for 1952 and 1953 reveals thirteen winners. This represents a sizeable decline in the number of winners as compared with the period 1950-1951.
5. The fraternity shows outstanding excellence in the number of awards, fellowships, or scholarships offered by outside agencies but won by collegiate brothers. Typical is the Borden Scholarship Award.
6. Two chapters reported highest scholastic averages for their total chapter membership in competition with all other professional fraternities of their respective universities.
7. Ten chapters reported twenty-three members belonging to the Rho Chi Honor Society or its local equivalent. Although this figure seems low in comparison to our previous report, it is most probable that many chapters did not consider reporting such membership as honors earned by their local brothers.

The Mu Chapter and the Beta Delta Chapter are to be congratulated for their exceptional activity in the promotion of scholarship among their brothers.

The following chapters merit the greatest praise for the outstanding scholastic excellence of their members: Mu Chapter, Xi Chapter, Beta Delta Chapter, Beta Xi Chapter, Beta Chi Chapter, Gamma Tau Chapter and Gamma Gamma Chapter.

As stated in our last report to the Grand Council Convention, the fraternity is in the very fortunate position of having many members who are doing an excellent job of promoting and achieving good scholarship. They serve to set the example for all members, be they collegiate, graduate or facultate. It is recommended that those chapters desirous of promoting scholarship follow the examples of the chapters cited above and that they read our previous report already referred to.

The second part of this report is concerned with the Kappa Psi Research Award which we were instructed to set up by the Executive Committee. Copies of the detailed program are in the hands of the Executive Committee and are available for inspection.

The purpose of the award is to encourage graduate study in the various branches of pharmacy by Kappa Psi brothers.

It is planned that \$500 will be given yearly to a brother in good standing who has just completed his undergraduate Pharmacy schooling and has been accepted for graduate work in a college or school of pharmacy. There would be a new winner every year.

The formal eligibility requirements are set forth in the detailed program. Briefly, a Kappa Psi member planning to be graduated from a school of Pharmacy by June 30 of that year will be eligible to compete for the prize. Sufficient time prior to graduation will be allowed to effect meeting all requirements.

The main basis of the award will be an original 10-15 page paper of library research on some aspect of bacteriology, biochemistry, pharmaceutical chemistry, pharmacognosy, pharmacology, pharmacy, pharmacy administration or pharmacy history. Supplementary material for judging will include easy to fill references from the Dean of the School of Pharmacy and a faculty member.

The main responsibility of administering the award, publicizing it, and judging the winners will rest upon the Scholarship Committee subject to final approval by the Executive Committee or Alpha Chapter.

It is planned that the award would be made by the Grand Regent preferably at the Kappa Psi Breakfast during the A.Ph.A. national convention.

The underwriting of the award would be done by the Alpha Chapter.

The mechanics of carrying out the Kappa Psi Research Award program are as set forth in the detailed program prepared by the committee and available for inspection by interested brothers.

It is hoped that members of the Grand Council Convention will approve this program designed to further scholastic excellence in our professional fraternity.

Public acknowledgement must be made to Brother Rudolph H. Blythe for his inestimable help in the drawing up of the questionnaires and to Brothers Blake Putney and Louis King for their idea of having a library research paper as a main basis of the award.

Report of the Nominations Committee




Fifty-five members were duly nominated by thirty-three chapters which returned lists of nominees

to the Grand Secretary-Treasurer. A complete list of these nominees was published in the November, 1953 issue of THE MASK. Copies of this issue are available for consultation.

After all nominations had been tabulated the Nominations Committee requested the Grand Secretary-Treasurer to inform all of the nominees of the offices for which they had been named. It was also requested that each nominee answer the following three questions and return a signed questionnaire to the committee chairman. The questions asked of each nominee were:

1. Do you accept the nomination for the office or offices stated in the enclosed letter?
2. If nominated for more than one office, do you have a preference?
3. If elected a Grand Officer by the Grand Council, will your regular work permit you to give some time to the Fraternity for chapter visitations, meetings of Alpha Chapter, and other duties of your office as indicated in Article XVII of our Constitution?

This was done to make it easier for the Committee to select the proposed candidates who are being submitted to the delegates of this Convention on the official ballot.

Fifty-three of the fifty-five members who had been nominated by the various chapters returned their completed questionnaires to the Nominations Committee Chairman. The results obtained from these questionnaires were tabulated and sent to the other two members of the Committee, namely Charles B. Granberg of Drake University College of Pharmacy and J. R. Rosenquist of the Seattle Graduate Chapter. Brothers Granberg and Rosenquist were asked to select one candidate for each of the eight Grand Offices, and to send their selections to the Chairman who had made a similar selection.

The official ballot which is being presented to the delegates at this Convention today bears the names selected from the lists proposed by the Committee Members. Wherever possible, two candidates for each office have been included on the ballot with provision for a write-in selection. In accordance with the Constitution, such write-ins may be made only if the name of the nominee appears in the November, 1953 issue of THE MASK.

The members of the Nominations Committee have given long and careful study to the selection of the candidates, and we present this ballot to you for your consideration.

Though our square is broken by the absence of our departed Brothers, let us with unity of thought and purpose again complete the square in each chapter and press onward as a strong square, loyal and true.



Two Graduates Join Eli Lilly and Company




Raymond A. Lavigne

Hope this new year will be the best for all of our Kappa Psi brothers everywhere. Oh yes, happy exams.




Well, I seem to be running out of news, so I guess the thing to do is close. So long until next time, and best wishes to everybody throughout 1954.






