





## Federal Loans for Fraternities\*

The following is an item from and quoted with the permission of the editor of the News Letter of the American Association of Land-Grant Colleges and State Universities:

### "FRATERNITY LOANS NO LONGER BARRED"

It is understood that the Housing and Home Finance Agency has approved a new policy under which, in certain circumstances, loans may be made under the College Housing Program for construction of facilities occupied by fraternities and sororities, facilities which have been barred for some time from construction under the program. Under the new plan:

"Whenever a college or university presents an over-all plan for student housing which includes a group of smaller facilities to be operated within its authority and direct responsibility, such units of housing may be grouped into a loan request and will be considered by Community Facilities Administration on the same basis as the larger units within the College's total housing program.

"The above policy would cover smaller facilities for the use of cooperatives, fraternities,

## ABOUT NEW GRADUATE CHAPTERS



# The Future Professional Fraternity

## OBJECTIVE SERVICE RESPONSIBILITY

As a sequel to an essay on The Professional Fraternity, these thoughts are presented. It seems reasonably clear that the professional fraternity, like any other organization in this modern era, must have modern reasons to exist. It is no longer possible to organize and to function, just for the purpose of having an organization for folks to belong to. It is insufficient to have as an objective the selfish attitude that membership benefits the individual through mutual association or prepares one for a life within a professional society. Survival of the professional fraternity is linked ever more closely to several factors of service with applications much broader than just within the particular profession. It is within these latter areas that professional fraternities must appraise themselves and establish goals with objectives that lead to concrete services to the profession involved, allied professions, and the community at large. Learning to live and to work together, a broadening of an individual through knowledge and understanding, and mutual efforts for the gain of a profession are the masonry for the building of a service to mankind available only through group efforts. Mutual interests, mutual understanding, and mutual personal benefits are the bricks cemented together with the mortar of group action that makes possible a kind of service not generally performed or anticipated through professional fraternity membership. Your attention is invited to some observations.

## PHARMACY RECRUITMENT

It is a well established fact that the professions have been concerned over the manpower situation. There was for a time when actually numbers were a problem. Too few chose to enter the program of study in professional schools. This is still a problem in some areas as evidenced by decreases in enrollment in schools of pharmacy, or other professional schools for that matter. Science subjects in high schools have been avoided, thus preparation for professional education and interests have been curtailed. Shortages of personnel exist in many areas, educationally and geographically. This has created problems of adequate service to the community, state or nation, and also to the legal control of professional services, particularly in the health fields.

More serious, however, is the concern for recruitment of qualified young men and young women to take up the study of a particular profession. Certain qualifications and adaptabilities are associated with the selection of men and women to be trained. Each profession has peculiarities inherent in the very nature of the service rendered. Personality and character as well as professional interests are qualities to be considered in recruitment of personnel to supply the needs of replacement and increased demands.

There are "High School Days" or "Career Days" at which college and university representatives appear in high schools to vie for the interests of high school graduates. College and university faculties have taken part by sending personnel to these programs that have been carried out in a variety of fashions. By and large this form of recruitment has been disappointing to the professions. Too few applicants for admission to a professional curriculum have been secured through this medium.

Professional and academic organizations have been active in recruitment programs, furnishing aids and in participation. Brochures, moving pictures, and booklets to high school principals and guidance counselors have all been tried. Excellent articles in leading

national lay journals have appeared from time to time. None have met with the degree of success deemed adequate.

Now we come to the area where the professional fraternity can be of great service. Dr. Don Franche, in his inaugural address as president of the American Pharmaceutical Association said, "It is in the local community where the pulse of pharmacy is felt." It is here where the mutual interests of individuals can be stimulated to participate in a recruitment program. Who knows the community better than the local resident? Who would know better, the qualified young people available or to contact? Mutual interests in the profession, in the school and in the professional fraternity can be combined to be a vital force in selection of qualified personnel. A service to the professional school and to the profession involved can come about through efforts of a professional fraternity. This is believed to be a responsibility of the professional fraternity.

Individual contacts by professional personnel in a community has proved to be more effective and less costly than other forms of recruitment. Mutual interests in the problems faced by a profession for effective service should be easily influenced through professional fraternity membership.

### THE PROFESSIONAL SCHOOL

One more area of service for the professional fraternity is to the educational program. In any profession the cost of education is borne only in part by the recipient of the training. The many people who are denied advanced education subsidize the total expense involved in preparation of professional personnel. Those who do benefit should be grateful and lend every effort to make a contribution to the educational program of the professional schools. The professional fraternity through mutual understanding, interests and obligations can, let us say, make certain scholarships, endowments and equipment aids available. Close liaison with the administration can lead to some mutual aids that would not accrue were not the "fraternity spirit" prevailed upon. There are ways in which this can be accomplished. One chapter of a professional fraternity known to the author has over the past twenty-five years accumulated a cash sum of over \$30,000. The method used is not outside the realm of any professional organization with foresight and vision. Let not the professional fraternity membership forget the obligations and vows taken when initiated.

The future of the professional fraternity on the campuses of American schools and colleges can be on a firmer foundation when such cooperation is forthcoming. The professional fraternity cannot afford to sit back and be complacent in the face of mounting needs for support in the schools. Let the professions face the responsibility and make a fair and equitable contribution. The existence of the professional organization can thus be effectively justified.

Certainly membership in a professional fraternity will be desired by those who recognize the value of the service of the organization involved.

### THE COMMUNITY

Still another area of service is involved in the professional fraternity future. Service to the community by way of cooperation in local projects is an effective way to enhance the status of a profession. It is good to recognize that already this is being done with significant results in a limited number of incidents.

There have been local chapters of professional fraternities that carried out programs for mass immunizations against poliomyelitis and Asiatic influenza. Here the membership arranged to procure the vaccine and furnish medical service to faculty families or even to the community citizens who would avail themselves of the service. The entire programs were organized and executed by the individual fraternity chapter. Greek letter professional fraternities are now known to many who before never heard of such organizations.

On one occasion a local chapter of a professional fraternity arranged to have the entire membership, some fifty men, to give a pint of blood to a hospital blood bank. Newspaper publicity was most favorable. Cooperation with local drives for the Community Chest, Heart Fund, Muscular Dystrophy, Multiple Sclerosis and Cerebral Palsy offer many opportunities to further justify the existence of professional fraternities. Is this not something worthwhile?

Membership in a professional fraternity, particularly in the professional schools, local collegiate chapters and graduate chapters, are in a position to lend a hand to the community.

So much satisfaction can come to the individual through help given to underprivileged people. Through welfare agencies there are available references to families in particular circumstances who deserve and need help. A winter coat for a child, a pair of shoes, maybe glasses or medical attention can be furnished when most needed. The local welfare agencies never have enough funds or personnel to care for all those who need help. Civic organizations do not fill the gap. There is forever the need for you and me. It takes only the care of someone to step forward and offer the services needed. Certainly the professional fraternities in the health services have a vital interest in the health needs of others.

The physical and health needs of mankind are many and varied. The population growth and the cost of living complicate and compound the needs of others less fortunate than ourselves. It is in this area that some of the greatest contributions can be made to a better world. Healthier happier people make for a stronger nation. A profession is only a part of a whole community and must share in the responsibility of meeting the needs of the community.

### CONCLUSION

Our great nation now basks in an atmosphere of plenty and prosperity, but as the world population increases there is concern for the welfare of mankind a few generations hence. To be snug in complacency is to invite deterioration and a weakened position. "Look ahead," is advice given to all who would prosper and succeed. The professional fraternity is in position to do just this.

More men and women embarking on a professional career find themselves married and involved in family obligations. There must be some impelling reasons to belong to a fraternity. The reasons must be other than social. Professional programs as a part of the fraternity meeting is not a strong solution to interest in membership, though it is a necessary part of the professional fraternity program.

Exploration of the future status of the professional fraternity would seem to indicate the opportunity for increased participation in services to the profession, to the school and to the community. The services rendered in these capacities would have far reaching effect and would bring back some of the prestige lost to fraternities through emphasis on the social aspects of membership which sometimes developed into indiscrete performances.

Off campus fraternities are disappearing which would seem to invite the need for other ways to bring the group together for united activity. Goodwill of college administrations can be encouraged by an effort directed to mutual benefit to the school and profession involved.

The professional fraternity future, in the opinion of the writer, is linked to the opportunities for services not heretofore a part of the objectives or interests of such groups. A forward look with adjustments to the changing professional world need be reckoned with. These recognized factors can go a long way toward a better future for professional fraternities. All of these factors must be based upon man's desire to organize, to be a part of society and to be a contributor to his fellowman. One without the other is like a hospital patient and a physician, without the nurse to administer the treatment.

# Dean Youngken Accepts Scholarship Cup Won by Beta Epsilon Chapter

Dr. Heber W. Youngken, Jr., dean of the college of pharmacy at the University of Rhode Island, was presented with the John C. Weldin Scholarship Cup by Walter J. Krochmal, Regent of Beta Epsilon Chapter of Kappa Psi Pharmaceutical Fraternity. The chapter received the highest collective scholastic average among all dormitories and fraternities at the university. Among those making the presentation were Richard Smith, chairman of the Kappa Psi Scholarship Committee; Fred J. Barrowclough, Vice Regent; Michael L. Arouth, who made the highest individual average within the fraternity; and Dr. George J. Cosmides, Grand Council Deputy of the chapter.

If Beta Epsilon Chapter can win this high scholarship award again for the next two years it will become a permanent possession of the college of pharmacy at URI. Dean Youngken promised the men of Kappa Psi that their trophy will be displayed in a place of honor and prominence in the college and wished them good luck in their future efforts to keep it permanently. Dean Youngken also announced that a pharmacy student, Miss Susan Hirsch, attained the highest individual scholastic average at the University of Rhode Island.

# Graduate Chapters—Present and Past

The frequent inquiries which reach the Central Office relative to the matter of establishing Graduate Chapters has prompted this brief review of the present and past status of Graduate Chapters in Kappa Psi Fraternity.

The present list of Graduate Chapters which is published in THE MASK includes those which are organized with the required officers, generally hold several meetings annually and pay the Graduate Chapter fee each year. Many of these Chapters maintain excellent records of service to pharmacy and the Fraternity year after year while in others the interest of the members fluctuates, but in general our active chapters are just what the name implies—active.

Up until 1947 THE MASK carried a long list of names of Graduate Chapters, and you may be concerned as to why these are no longer listed. The fact is, for many years no charters were required for Graduate Chapters. A group of members simply announced to the Central Office that a Graduate Chapter was being organized and an appropriate name of a state or city was applied. The Central Office in good faith, assumed that the chapter was organized and accordingly listed it in THE MASK chapter register. There are no records to show that many of these chapters were ever properly organized or that they held meetings, so we must assume that they never existed. Former Grand Secretary-Treasurer Ray S. Kelley made a thorough search of the records of every Graduate Chapter that was reported as having existed. He corresponded and made personal contacts with a number of members who were reported as officers and from his investigations the Executive Committee concluded that a large number of reported Graduate Chapters had not existed as organized groups and for this reason their names were removed from the chapter register.

Some Graduate Chapters which were given charters in recent years have become inactive but these may be restored to the active list by notifying the Central Office that they have been reorganized, that meetings are being held since the reorganization and that the chapter will pay the Graduate Chapter fee for the current year. There is no penalty for restoring a chapter to active status. Inactive Graduate Chapters which were issued charters in recent years and are eligible for immediate reactivation include:

(Group No. 1)

Akron	Atlanta	Harrisburg
Arizona	Buffalo	St. Louis

All of the above chapters were active until recent years and all are located in areas where there are a large number of Kappa Psi members.

In 1946 the names of all Graduate Chapters which were dormant and for which there were no Central Office records to justify their existence, were dropped from the chapter register. The following names are included in this group of dormant or non-existent chapters:

(Group No. 2)

It is possible that records may exist of which the Central Office has no knowledge, showing that some of the above (Group No. 2) were properly organized, elected officers and held meetings. Since charters were never issued to any of these chapters, in any instance where valid records are submitted in behalf of the reactivation of any of the above, approval of the reactivation will be granted without the necessity of applying for a charter.

Since 1940 all new Graduate Chapters that were organized as prescribed in the Constitution of the Fraternity, have received charters. Today it is a requirement that a Graduate Chapter must organize and function successfully for one year before a charter will be issued. This is intended to demonstrate that there is a need for a chapter and that it is properly organized.

The Central Office will gladly supply full information relative to the manner of organizing a Graduate Chapter and how to develop a sound program of worth while activities.

sororities, and other social living groups as long as they would continue to be the responsibility and property of the college or university during the life of the loan."

Philosophy behind the new approach, which was recommended by the finance subcommittee of the College Housing Advisory Committee, is that it is the responsibility of the college or university, rather than of the Housing Agency, to determine what groups may use housing facilities, so long as the *institution* takes that responsibility."

## Fraternity Growth\*

From the *Garnet and White* of Alpha Chi Rho, here is an interesting and useful statement of fraternity statistical material:

"Planned nationwide opposition would have it zero—the facts prove otherwise. In the year of 1956-1957 there were 3,304 chapters of members of the National Interfraternity Conference, up from 3,252 in the year previous, and 3,198 in 1954. The total number of members has also decidedly increased: 1,578,870 for 1956, a jump of more than 100,000 from the 1954 total. There are 196 more houses owned by chapters than in 1954.

"The 31 member sororities in the National Panhellenic Conference had a total membership at the beginning of the 1955-1956 college year of 815,695, a little more than 9% increase over the previous biennium. In that period 75 new undergraduate chapters had raised the total to 1,767, while 397 new alumnae groups made the total as of June 1, 1955, a record 4,202. There also were substantial increases between that date and the first of January, 1957.

"Thus there have been nearly two hundred chapters added in the past two years and an increase of approximately 175,000 members. Social fraternities and sororities not included in the two Conferences named have had similar increases, while locals are also maintaining their membership gains.

"Here is a statistical answer to the critics who through wishful thinking insist that present day college youth is not interested in fraternities and sororities."


## You Should Know . . .

Joseph Z. Krezanoski, serving on our Scholarship Committee, was born in Mundare, Alberta, Canada on April 14, 1927. 

Hall, Satrap; Dr. Paul Scott, Vice Satrap; and R. Franklin Hart, Secretary-Treasurer. Greetings from the Grand Council of the Fraternity were delivered by Professor Herman C. Forslund, 2nd Grand Vice Regent.

Reports on chapter activities during the past two years were presented by Roy Tiegs, Beta Pi Chapter; Keith Wilson, Beta Omicron Chapter; Steve Burton, Beta Zeta Chapter; Stan Hartman, Portland Graduate Chapter and Dr. Edward Krupski, Seattle Graduate Chapter. This section of the program was followed by a discussion of assigned topics. Ronald Boscow, Beta Pi, covered the topic "Social Activities" and pointed out some of the problems which confront chapters in this area. Keith Wilson, Beta Omicron, developed the subject "Chapter Finances." In evaluating systems employed in various chapters he presented the advantages and disadvantages of each and discussed their suitability for the chapters in Province X. Beta Zeta Chapter, through their representative, discussed the "Stimulation of Scholarship." As a result of this report and discussion pertaining to it originating from the floor, Dr. Leo Sciuchetti was appointed chairman of a committee organized to investigate the feasibility of establishing a Province X scholarship award.

"WHEREAS, The members of the Province are desirous of recognizing the efforts of Brother Nicholas W. Fenney, Editor of THE MASK, be it resolved that the secretary of Province X be instructed to convey the following to the editor of THE MASK: Be it known that the Chapters of Province X meeting in Portland, Oregon this 25th day of October do unanimously commend the editor of THE MASK for the excellence which has been achieved and is being maintained in the appearance and content of THE MASK."

The Committee on Time and Place selected the fall of 1960 in Pullman, Washington for the next meeting of the Province. Following installation of these officers the Assembly was adjourned, but most of the brothers proceeded to Multnomah Stadium to watch the annual football classic between the University of Washington and Oregon State College.

Notation was made if the store commonly uses preservatives, and if so, in what concentration. After the tests are complete, there will be an indication of the amount of contaminating

organisms in (1) the distilled water commonly used to fill ophthalmic prescriptions, (2) the empty dropper bottles obtained from the usual sources, (3) the compounding procedure, and (4) the prescriptions containing preservatives. The results of these tests should be quite interesting and will be part of the next Beta Kappa Newsletter in THE MASK.


