

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

MENTAL MEANDERINGS ON THE 30TH GRAND COUNCIL CONVENTION

Although the Grand Regent operates from four or five desks (none of them presentable) he will spare you the indignity of sending a message from each. A message should be constructive and I will immediately digress from that principle by expressing my sincere appreciation for the confidence you have placed in me.

I suppose the matter which is uppermost in our minds at the moment is the recent Grand Council Convention. I think this is as it should be. While these conventions are only one of several important factors contributing to our continuing fraternal health, I think that they are high on the list. As I have said before one of my greatest regrets is that every member of Kappa Psi cannot attend

at least one. I hope that somewhere I can find the genius to discuss this from your standpoint—not from mine. The important thing is the impact of the convention, on you, not my reaction to it. There are several things which must be accomplished at these conventions and I would like to call some of them to your attention.

On the practical side it is at these conventions that we have to solve existing problems and try to anticipate and be prepared for problems which have not yet arisen. To mention a few. We have to find adequate leadership. This is more important toward the bottom than it is at the top. It is important of course that we have adequate leadership for the next two years. It is very much more important that we find adequate leadership for the next twenty or thirty years. What better place to meet brothers who have this potential than at a convention. Many times the losers will be better prospects than the winners. We need to set up a progressively revised environment in which all of the elements in the Fraternity can survive and grow. This involves changes in the Constitution, the Ritual, pledging procedures, membership problems, our relationships with Education, the Community and the Profession. There are many others. In many cases they are essentially chores which must be done.

Then there are problems which might almost be called spiritual problems. These are the things which weld us as individuals, chapters, provinces, committees etc., into a unit. We need to learn each other's emotions and each other's material obligations. Each other's strengths and weaknesses. Each other's altruism and selfishness. Each other's ambitions and inertia. We need to learn that pleasure and contribution are the reverse sides of the same coin. We need to learn that Kappa Psi is an unrealized ideal toward which we are all groping and toward which we can all contribute. We need to achieve the belief that our Fraternity is a virile, contributing, factor in the endless struggle to build a better civilization for everyone.

The Thirtieth National Grand Council Convention of Kappa Psi Pharma- ceutical Fraternity*


The Thirtieth National Grand Council Convention of Kappa Psi Pharmaceutical Fraternity was held at the Netherland Hilton Hotel in Cincinnati, Ohio, on December 28, 29, and 30, 1959. This marked the Eightieth Anniversary of the Fraternity, having been founded in 1879 at the Russell Military Academy in New Haven, Connecticut. In addition to guests there were 153 members who registered for the three-day convention. Thirty-eight of the 50 Collegiate Chapters were represented as were 12 Graduate Chapters and 6 Provinces. Previous to the opening of the convention, joint meetings of Alpha Chapter and the Executive Committee were held on Sunday afternoon and evening of December 27, with Grand Regent Milton L. Neuroth presiding. Additional sessions of the joint groups were held on Tuesday evening and Wednesday afternoon of the convention week.

Chairman of the Convention was Grand Regent Milton L. Neuroth of the Medical College of Virginia and co-chairman was Grand Secretary-Treasurer Frank H. Eby of Temple University. Paul E. Ritter and James C. Geoppinger served as the local fraternity representatives. Other committees of the convention were: Registration, Editor of THE MASK Nicholas W. Fenney, Chairman; Reception, Jerry Braun, Chairman; and Credentials, Grand Historian Walter R. Williams, Chairman. Convention patrons were as follows: Eli Lilly and Company, Ortho Pharmaceutical Company, Mead Johnson and Company, Merck Sharp and Dohme, Charles Pfizer and Company, Smith Kline and French Laboratories, Upjohn Company and Warren Teed Products Company.


Three prominent persons addressed the convention sessions, Dean J. F. Kowalewski of the School of Pharmacy, University of Cincinnati, Mr. J. Warren Lansdowne of the Eli Lilly and Company and Dr. Robert W. Bishop, Dean of Men at the University of Cincinnati. Grand Regent Neuroth presided over the business sessions held on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, December 28, 29, and 30. In all, five regular business sessions were held where delegates were present to hear reports of National Officers and various committee reports. A report of the Service Awards Committee was presented by Dr. George E. Osborne of the University of Rhode Island. Papers were delivered by Alan P. Baker of Eta Chapter, Giles J. Belski of Beta Omega Chapter, Dr. Louis D. King of Rutgers University and Grand Officers Herman C. Forslund, Pierre F. Smith, James R. Thayer, Frank H. Eby and Editor of THE MASK Nicholas W. Fenney. A special Memorial Tribute to deceased members was delivered by immediate Past Grand Regent Louis Fischer of the University of Washington. Papers dealing with the operation and procedure of Kappa Psi Fraternity were presented and discussed by delegates. Each series of topics was lead by a discussion leader and followed by questions and comments from the floor. Representative of the topics presented were: "How Kappa Psi Fraternity Should Meet

Some of the Problems as a Result of the Five Year Program of Pharmaceutical Education," "A Sound Financial Program for Kappa Psi Chapters," "The Minimum Essentials in a Pledge Training Program," "A Broad Scholarship Program for Kappa Psi Fraternity," "The Responsibilities of Kappa Psi Fraternity in the Pharmacy Recruitment Program" and "How Kappa Psi Chapters Can Serve Their Communities More Effectively."

Certain changes in the Constitution of Kappa Psi Fraternity were voted upon by the membership on recommendation from the Legislative Committee headed by Grand Counselor John W. Schermerhorn. One special session was held under the direction of Grand Ritualist Glen T. Sperandio where members of Gamma Delta Chapter conducted an Exemplification of the First Degree of Initiation and also that of a proposed new First Degree.

The social program included the Grand Officer's Reception on Monday evening which was followed by the Annual Buffet Supper. On Tuesday morning the members convened for breakfast at 8:00 A.M., and the Eightieth Anniversary Dinner was held on Tuesday evening in the beautiful Pavillon Room of the Netherland Hilton Hotel. A fine program of entertainment followed the dinner. Special recognition for outstanding service to the Fraternity and profession was made at the Anniversary Dinner to Grand Secretary-Treasurer Eby, Grand Regent Neuroth and Editor of THE MASK Fenney.

The Grand Council Convention closed with the installation of the following officers for the 1959-1961 term: Grand Regent, James R. Thayer, Dean, St. Louis College of Pharmacy and Allied Sciences; First Grand Vice Regent Herman C. Forslund, Oregon State College; Second Grand Vice Regent, Glen T. Sperandio, Purdue University; Third Grand Vice Regent, Pierre F. Smith, University of Rhode Island; Grand Secretary-Treasurer, Frank H. Eby, Temple University; Grand Historian, Earl T. Brown, University of North Carolina; Grand Ritualist, John W. Martin, Butler University; and Grand Counselor, John W. Schermerhorn, Massachusetts College of Pharmacy. Nicholas W. Fenney, University of Connecticut, was re-appointed as Editor of THE MASK.

The Thirtieth Grand Council Convention adjourned Wednesday noon, December 30, 1959. The next convention will be held in 1961.

ABOUT THE 1959 GRAND COUNCIL CONVENTION . . .

Although the 1959 Grand Council Convention of Kappa Psi Fraternity is now history, for many members it will long be remembered as the high light of their fraternity experiences. Cincinnati supplied fine weather and the Netherland Hilton Hotel was a grand host with the warmest hospitality ever enjoyed at a Grand Council Convention.

The convention was a busy one with five general sessions, an exemplification of the ritual, a breakfast, buffet supper and the Anniversary Dinner. Members of Alpha Chapter and the Executive Committee met in three long and busy sessions with all members present but one.

It is always difficult to appraise such a busy convention but I believe we can list a few of the achievements as well as objectives of the future which are worthy of mention. We are not forgetting that the exchange of ideas, the development of new friendships and the enthusiasm engendered by fraternity men being together for several days, are probably more important to the collegiate members than most of the other accomplishments listed below.

(1) The election of two new Grand Officers, Brothers Earl T. Brown and John W. Martin, and the change in three other offices is a healthy condition. We will miss the enthusiasm and the splendid services of Brothers Milton L. Neuroth and Walter R. Williams who are no longer members of Alpha Chapter but we know we will continue to have their cooperation.

(2) Authority for organizing Alumni Clubs with only limited restrictions was granted. This will make possible the organization of small, informal groups of brothers in areas where Kappa Psi Graduate Chapters are not possible or desired.

(3) A special award in a form not yet determined, was authorized for chapters so that they can cite persons whose local contributions to the profession are noteworthy.

(4) Special duties were delegated to the three Grand Vice Regents as follows: The First Grand Vice Regent will be the Chairman of the Publications Committee. The Second Grand Vice Regent will be Chairman of the Scholarship Committee. The Third Grand Vice Regent will be Chairman of the Public Relations Committee.

(5) All Collegiate Chapters are required to elect their officers before April 1.

(6) Following a lengthy discussion on the advisability of continuing Province Assemblies, the Grand Regent and the Grand Secretary-Treasurer were directed to study (a) the value of Province Assemblies; (b) the length of meetings and (c) the type of program best suited for this kind of meeting.

(7) The participation of Kappa Psi Fraternity members in the recruitment of students for the profession of pharmacy was discussed at some length and a program was presented.

(8) The fine scholarship program of the fraternity was acknowledged and efforts will be devoted to improving and enlarging the program in the future.

(9) A special Service Award Committee presented an excellent report covering a program suggested for Kappa Psi Fraternity.

(10) The Grand Council Deputies were recognized for their splendid services to the chapters and their members, and a special resolution citing these important members was approved.

(11) The true significance of the Ritual of Initiation was demonstrated by the exemplification of the degrees at a special session of the Convention.

Now comes the termination of a ten year span for me in the official family of Kappa Psi Pharmaceutical Fraternity. Over the years many chapters have been visited, many meetings attended to discuss business of this outstanding professional pharmaceutical fraternity, as well as many hours spent on reports, correspondence and writing for *THE MASK*. In all of this there has been a personal satisfaction in the feeling that some good has come to the hundreds of Kappa Psi men who joined the ranks as permanent members of the Agora. Nothing, however, can dwarf the excitement and treasure of the scores of friends, faithful, loyal, and devoted men of pharmacy, who have come into my life and helped mold the pathway of this servant. To all, I am genuinely grateful and offer a humble, but sincere thank you.

One cannot help but be convincingly impressed with the fine service of Grand Secretary-Treasurer Frank H. Eby. The unselfishness of time and effort expended on behalf of Kappa Psi is unmatched in the eighty years of existence of this Fraternity. Though many obstacles beset Central Office performance, Brother Eby has never lost faith in the chapters and men who make up Kappa Psi. This is what makes our beloved Fraternity great and keeps it that way.

To Mrs. Eby goes our greatest admiration for the very essential help and support to the Secretary-Treasurer.

It would be my earnest recommendation that you, the delegates and representatives of our order, pledge your continued support and dedicated service to the Kappa Psi Principle of "ONE FOR ALL AND ALL FOR ONE."

THE FUTURE

"The old order gives way to the new" is a well known Emerson quote. So it is in the Fraternity system. Some observed changes which are taking place, are evident, and must be reckoned with. Pharmacy, the profession we represent, is soon to be a five year program. Membership in Kappa Psi will come from an age a bit advanced from that of the past. More of the prospective members will be married with interests competitive to fraternity support. Yet there is a basic need in man's life to fraternalize. This to me means that pledge programs, Chapter activity and direction must be geared to the future for survival. Service to the profession of pharmacy through support of organization, recruitment of men and women for pharmacy, cooperation with the school of pharmacy educational program, and community service are suggestions for well directed Kappa Psi chapter activity. Sister fraternity groups may well prove of valuable support for chapter activity.

The Central Office through the Grand Ritualist, has prepared a revision of the Ritual of initiation. This is an effort to modernize with the idea to recognize the dignity of the individual. There must be a meaning associated with the manner in which a pledge receives indoctrination into the professional fraternity system. Dr. Glen Sperandio of Pi Chapter, Purdue University, is to be commended for the preparation of the revised version.

Kappa Psi has been especially fortunate in the fact that Secretary-Treasurer, Frank H. Eby is currently serving as president of The Professional Interfraternity Conference. Our Fraternity is recognized favorably for this contribution. Once again the value of Dr. Eby to fraternalism is exemplified and Kappa Psi occupies a stronger position in fraternal matters nationally.

I would strongly urge that serious consideration be given to two areas of influence yet unexplored in professional fraternity programs. It would seem that support for all national pharmaceutical organizations could be stimulated at an early stage. Support for student body groups such as branches of the American Pharmaceutical Association or local individual groups develop interests and has carry-over value. Organized pharmacy needs such indoctrinational efforts. Another area of influence can come indirectly through organizational support. Here there can be effective stands taken as an organization, toward matters of national interest in the profession. Kappa Psi, through the executive offices could write for public consumption. Its stand on cost of medication, fair trade, pharmacy laws of federal or state level, and the host of other problems of pharmacy could be stated. Support of local small hospitals, clinics, nursing homes, etc., could be encouraged or at least, the opinion of a large segment of pharmacy could be expressed through a professional group such as Kappa Psi. In state legislations, or the United States Congress, Kappa Psi might express a position, such as the secretaries of our national organizations do. This effort would be done in cooperation and with the knowledge of the parent national pharmaceutical bodies.

EXTENSION

Kappa Psi continues to expand as three new chapters were installed during the past year. Gamma Kappa, South Dakota State College, Gamma Lambda, New England College of Pharmacy, and Gamma Mu, Northeastern Louisiana State College. A sincere welcome is extended these recent additions. The Square and Service of Kappa Psi is strengthened by your presence in our midst. Other additions are in progress, and you will hear of these extensions as they take place in the future. It is to be regretted that two chapters have become dormant during the past two years. There have been three graduate chapters activated in recent months, one is newly organized. This is further tribute to the efficient functioning of the Central Office.

ADDITIONAL SERVICES

Dr. Pierre Smith, University of Rhode Island, Third Grand Vice Regent has been responsible for a Scholarship Honors Certificate. This will be awarded to members of Kappa Psi Fraternity who maintain a grade average of 3 or the equivalent of a "B" average for the junior and senior years in pharmacy. Rules were outlined in *THE MASK* of April-June, 1959, Vol. 56, page 45. This is an added service of the Fraternity to Kappa Psi chapters.

A planned Chapter Award Program is to be reported upon by Dr. George Osborne of the University of Rhode Island.

In the Grand Secretary-Treasurer's message of THE MASK cited in a previous paragraph there is an enumeration of 1958-1959 achievements.

FINANCIAL STATUS

The financial condition of The Fraternity continues to be quite sound. There has been a steady increase in the treasury funds which reflects a good business operation directed by Dr. Eby. This favorable situation prompts a recommendation that a Committee on Investment be created to study investments of monies that could possibly bring greater returns. This could be responsible for more funds available for future chapter services by the national office. The duties of the Secretary-Treasurer do not permit time for investigation and this office is not expected to be an expert in investments.

THE CONSTITUTION

Careful study of the Constitution brings to light the need for thorough revision. There appears to be a number of inconsistencies and conflicts of procedure. This instrument is an important document in the smooth operation of this Fraternity. Misinterpretation can lead to unnecessary problems between chapters, the Central Office and operation of Grand Council rules and regulations. The Legislative Committee and Executive Committee are at a disadvantage. It is recommended the Legislative committee be charged with responsibility of seeking expert advice in the revision, where necessary, of The Constitution of Kappa Psi Fraternity. Dr. John Schermerhorn, of Mu Chapter, chairman of the Legislative Committee will bring in some recommended changes at this convention, but further study is advised.

THE MASK

The Editor of THE MASK, Professor Nicholas W. Fenney, of Nu Chapter, University of Connecticut is singled out for special commendation for his continued service in the publication of a good fraternity journal. This publication has been materially improved by broader coverage of fraternity news, use of pictures, and reports on special activities of fraternity committees. The cooperation of the Secretary-Treasurer in this effort is recognized.

CONCLUSION

Many more individuals deserve recognition for valuable service to Kappa Psi, including especially those involved in the successful arrangements for this assembly. Especially, it is proper The Fraternity express appreciation to Dean Joseph Kowalewski for his contribution toward preparation of this Grand Council Convention. Dean Kowalewski has also played an important part in the re-activation of Beta Phi Chapter and this group's participation in plans for this 30th Grand Council Convention. We are especially grateful to the committees that serve to keep the meetings moving along. The Grand Council Deputies have served well during my administration. The Executive Committee has carried out its duties with credit to The Fraternity.

Now I close with the deepest true desire for continued progress of Kappa Psi Fraternity in its position as a leading pharmaceutical fraternity. I am proud of the membership which includes a majority of the leading personalities in American Pharmacy. There is a place for professional fraternities in the educational experiences of students. This is an American heritage worthy of preservation and I wish God speed to the incoming officers as they carry on the best traditions of Kappa Psi Service.



Dr. James R. Thayer, Grand Regent, Kappa Psi Pharmaceutical Fraternity

Dr. James R. Thayer, dean of the St. Louis College of Pharmacy and Allied Sciences, was born on September 7, 1897 in northeastern Ohio. His early education was obtained in Medina, Ohio where he graduated as Class Prophet from the local high school. In the fall of that year he entered Ohio University at Athens (Ohio). Upon receiving the B.S. degree he taught at high school and later became principal of the Milford (Ohio) High School. Following this position he became a science teacher at Gibsonburg, Ohio High School. A return to university study at Wisconsin resulted in obtaining an M.S. and eventually the Ph.D. degree was awarded him in 1928. Dr. Thayer then joined the Parke, Davis and Company in Detroit as a researcher. In 1929 he accepted a position on the faculty at the California College of Pharmacy.

In 1930, Grand Regent Thayer assumed the position of professor of chemistry at the St. Louis College of Pharmacy and Allied Sciences. In 1957, he was appointed acting dean and a year later became dean.

Address to Grand Council Convention of Kappa Psi Pharmaceutical Fraternity December 29, 1959—Cincinnati, Ohio

I appreciate the honor and privilege of addressing you this morning on the occasion of your Grand Council Convention. This is especially so since—much as I should like it—I cannot count myself either a member of Kappa Psi or a teacher or practitioner of pharmaceutical science. However, I am, happily, associated with a great University where there is a splendid College of Pharmacy under the creative and inspiring leadership of one of your own members in Kappa Psi, Dean Joseph F. Kowalewski. And I should add that during the last 20 years I have had the privilege of being associated in various educational and professional meetings with a number of members of Kappa Psi, such as Dr. George L. Webster of Illinois, Dr. Lloyd M. Parks of Ohio State, Dr. Milton L. Neuroth of Richmond, and Dr. Frank H. Eby of Temple.

It has been suggested that I discuss a few ideas pertaining to quality in the educational process and the role of the professional fraternity in this process. It strikes me that a consideration of a subject such as this is very pertinent to the life and purpose of Kappa Psi.

In every direction we may look, whatever segment of human life we may analyze, the call is for competence, character and leadership. These are, indeed, three of the world's most precious human commodities. There is a persistent demand for the high quality assets of intelligence, resourcefulness, judgment and character. This is so because the nature of our society and the difficulty of our problems are such as to emphasize the pre-eminent need for quality in the product of higher education. Our colleges and universities are, then, the primary sources of quality and leadership and the combinations of ability, knowledge, judgment, character and training can be secured through no other existing medium.

The phenomenal development and impact of technology, industrial advancement and scientific research, and the oncoming tide of increased enrollment in schools and colleges of the nation emphasize in graphic manner the importance of increasing the quality as well as the quantity of higher education. Despite the largest student enrollment in history and the full flood of specialization programs available, the universities and colleges are not turning out enough scholars and trained personnel in the professions to take care of current needs. A critical situation of need for scholars and leaders also appears in the humanities, social sciences and the arts. The whole situation is the more serious when we consider the insufficient number of teachers available for the schools and colleges and the lack of financial resources and physical facilities.

Higher education faces the issue then of whether to devote its efforts to the education of the average of ability or to the higher capacities. American higher education for the many on popular democratic lines is unique in the world. It may be well to point out that its development has been at the price of a somewhat lower average product in quality in comparison with colleges and universities of other nations in which attendance is, in general, open only to those students of the higher potential.

While not suggesting for a moment that we shift all our emphasis from the many to the more gifted few, it is extremely important that higher education provide the best attainable for the gifted in striving to meet current and future needs. Now I know that any differentiation in such a provision in the abilities, aptitudes, motivation and personalities of individuals appears to some people to be undemocratic, according to our American way of life. In my judgment, it is, in fact, just the opposite. The wide availability of higher education in our country places upon society a special and compelling obligation to provide centers of superior quality for those of higher potential. It is a primary obligation of educational leadership to advance the public welfare by producing excellence in the product of our colleges and universities.

Such provision would serve industry and business as well as the professions. Recent studies made by a number of industrial and educational research agencies show that (1) there is a relation between years in school completed and the producing and consuming capacities of peoples, (2) that the material well-being of people—as reflected through such indices as per capita retail sales, median incomes, magazine circulation, and other economic factors—is directly related to their varying levels of education, and (3) the higher the level and quality of education the greater will be the economic understanding and the intelligent participation of people in the processes of self-government.

Quality in the product of higher education depends quite as much upon good teaching as upon the abilities and diligent work of the student. It is fair to assume, too, in this connection, that little real intellectual growth takes place unless the student is continually challenged by the best minds of the past and the present. It is charged that our colleges and universities make too little intellectual demand on students and place too little responsibility on them in the four or five years. It is not only essential to fix our standards and our expectations for students *high*; it is equally important to create an atmosphere of learning to stimulate and encourage students to play a more vigorous and creative role themselves in their own education. It is also important that students not allow their standards to be fixed or influenced by the usual level of achievement or measured by conformity to the general average.

To do this effectively will, I suggest, require the elimination or avoidance of some of the elementary, useless, trivial excesses in administrative, academic and extracurricular clutter which has grown up all about us. "Academic freedom" originally meant freedom for the student rather than for the professor. Today academic freedom *ought* to mean respect for the intelligence, the individuality and the

maturity of the student. If students are to join the adult world rather than linger on in the world of adolescents, the community of adult scholars and society in general, must treat them as young adults and not as adolescents.

All this implies closer student-faculty relationships, where faculty and students alike are working together. Education is not a process of passive absorption, but an activity in which the student participates *actively*. It is also discovery, not only of the ideas and skills of others, but also of his own new ideas and skills which grow out of his own reflection upon them. In such a process the student learns that the more he deals with ideas, the more skillful and useful he becomes and the more pleasure he derives from them. Great ideas, ideals, understanding and wisdom do not come together unanticipated upon minds totally or even partially unprepared. There is such a thing as an academic and professional attitude or preference for truth, understanding and wisdom which faculty members can help to create. This, it seems to me, must be a part of the student's sensitivity and spirit, and it must accompany the articulation of ideas and truth, and intelligent action. As a result, a great many students make college a profitable, enjoyable and stimulating experience; others let time slip by unprofitably and all too often, unhappily. Too many students simply endure the coercion of required courses such as English, chemistry, physics, biology, mathematics, and foreign language, hoping for the glad day when they can finish and forget them.

It is said that at least half of the students do only what their professors ask them to do, and nothing more. Too few students and teachers use class assignments and lectures as a starting point and as a means of fueling and tuning up the mental equipment. The process of thinking and reasoning cannot be carried on intelligently except on a solid foundation of factual knowledge. A mere accumulation of facts, however, is so much excess intellectual baggage unless the student understands their meaning and use.

A student should not only be willing, but should force himself, if necessary, to acquire sufficient background for his opinions and actions. He must not be content with learning the methods and techniques of using his mind without serious attention to the subject matter. The balance between knowledge and unsupported opinion, Professor Jasper Converse Barnes used to remind us, is closely analogous to the balance between ballast and sail. Without ballast, a boat will capsize; without sail, it will not get anywhere. The student himself should constantly be on the alert to remind himself that knowledge must precede opinion and practice and that familiarity of background is the only safe and sound basis for pronouncement regarding the foreground.

The members of Kappa Psi represented here today and others of similar purpose and standards, have been recognized by their respective fraternities and societies for achievement of quality in scholarship and of potential leadership in the college and university community and for a noble profession. Quality in the higher learning and in campus citizenship produces certain attributes in the participants for professional leadership. Higher education's chief obligation is to assist students and teachers to attain the best possible command and authority over their own talents and abilities so that they may become independent, responsible, creative, judicious, and self-governing citizens. In the attainment of these goals lies the very blood of our democracy.

The qualities or attributes which constitute excellence cannot be developed through a single device or course. Our total educational resources are involved in their attainment. Professional fraternities and societies represent a tremendous pool of man-power talent and have, as I see the problem of achieving quality in our work, a peculiar purpose, obligation and responsibility to contribute vitally toward its development and maintenance. They provide an excellent means of cross-fertilization of great ideas and ideals; for needed stimulation and encouragement of other students of ability and promise; for close cooperation with faculty and administration forces in striving for a spirit and sense of excellence in the work of the institution; and for pointing the way and calling young men and women to moral and spiritual and to intellectual responsibility. It is only in these ways that beneficial results can be expected to flow from your college experience and serve the needs of society.

Here, then, are attributes and standards which should be among the goals of professional fraternity members and an ever increasing band of students:

1. A good command of the fundamental skills. When we talk, read, listen or write, we use symbols—letters, words, sentences and phrases on the one hand, and numbers, signs, figures and formulae on the other. These symbols are the language of words and the language of numbers. They are the means of conveying thoughts to those around us. The educated person has developed the ability to read and speak easily in his own tongue and with pleasure and understanding in many fields. He speaks and writes properly, clearly and effectively in any of the areas of his knowledge.

2. Intellectual curiosity. Having this, students are motivated to an active search for truth in the fields of science, the humanities or of social relationships. The educated person does not close his books on leaving the campus at graduation. His eagerness for self-education will never be fully satisfied.

3. A sense of need for privacy. Philosopher-Dean Marten Ten Hoor emphasizes that students and faculty members, indeed all of us, need time for quiet thinking and systematic reflection, "the importance of which is to bring order out of the multiplicity and variety of things in which the human being is immersed," . . . "a steady vision of the good life, and serenity of spirit," and to "be able to live entertainingly with himself."

4. A demonstrated capacity for independent thought and productivity. Some piece of original work is generally produced in a major field of study during a student's senior year, and in subsequent years of study and work.

5. Sound judgment. The acquiring of knowledge, a disciplined mind, some experience and courage, are essential elements in making sound judgments.

6. Discovery of the wise use of freedom. This is not only the freedom from home discipline and school routine, but the freedom that a person has acquired with opportunity and knowledge offered through academic and extracurricular work. This idea and sense of freedom does not necessarily mean complete removal of all compulsion and restraint. Freedom and opportunity go hand in hand. You can-

not have one without the other. In university and college is found the greatest concentration of opportunity in our country and every student has the opportunity to prepare and build a free man.

7. A sense of responsibility. An educated person develops a sense of responsibility not only for his own freedom, welfare and happiness, but also for the freedom and welfare of his fellowman.

8. A sense of values. A person must evolve and build his own sense of values; no one can give it to him. Good teaching subtly imparts a sense of values. It enables a person to recognize and appreciate excellence and quality which he seeks.

9. A capacity and the resources to enjoy life. With the growing opportunity of leisure the capacity for enjoyment takes on greater importance in the ever expanding aesthetic, recreational and intellectual pleasures. When a person learns to derive joy from art, or literature, or drama, or music, or various forms of recreation, or his vocation, it appears that something invaluable has been added to human life.

10. Integrity. A person may have developed all of the attributes of which we have been speaking to some degree, but from the standpoint of society none of them has real and lasting meaning unless that person's life is grounded in conscience and honor. Higher education, I would respectfully argue, has a great deal to do with shaping of the character, as well as the mind, of the student.

The growth of modern pharmacy and pharmaceutical science have been phenomenally striking features of the development of professional education, and particularly in the science of medicine during the last 50 years. The demands made upon the scientific knowledge, technical skill, ethical integrity, conscientiousness and professional services of the pharmacist have increased at an amazing rate.

Since its purposeful inception 80 years ago when students of both pharmacy and medicine were admitted to membership, but particularly since 1925 when the fraternity was reorganized by mutual agreement as a professional pharmaceutical fraternity, Kappa Psi has greatly contributed to the development of the profession of pharmacy, and to the health and welfare of society generally.

There are many forces on the modern university campus that influence and affect student life and conduct. The growth, development, and recognition of all sorts of organizations since the turn of the century has been phenomenal. Two of the most important of these forces, certainly in the last 50 years, are the professional fraternity and the honor society. In sharp contrast to much of the earlier history and relationships of universities and fraternities and societies in general, there is today, notwithstanding a few exceptions, widespread and genuine recognition and encouragement of the professional fraternity, such as Kappa Psi, and of honor societies, such as Rho Chi and Omicron Delta Kappa. These organizations form an integral part of the educational process, and accordingly, have large and definite responsibilities and opportunities for practical education.

Professional fraternities, as well as our colleges and universities, have, since their inception, steadfastly proclaimed the high principles and purposes upon which they were founded. This is all well and good and necessary, but I venture to suggest to you this morning that what we desperately need just now on every college and university campus, in every professional fraternity, as well as in society generally, is not more learned papers and talks on the theory and desirability of serious study in the various professional fields, in individual productivity, in personal growth, but a little more of the simple, forthright and practical demonstration of the ideals, principles and truths we already know, openly subscribe to, and proclaim.

Happily, during recent years, university teachers and administrators, and most student leaders, have come face to face with this problem and the necessity of developing closer working relationships with each other, and are now fostering various cooperative programs to improve college life, with special emphasis upon educational objectives and future professional competence. Significant phases in this vital development are being encouraged by Kappa Psi. It is my belief that the effective student in pharmacy, with an active affiliation with Kappa Psi, would learn something vital about becoming a more competent professional man as well as a better citizen and leader in the larger world outside into which he soon goes, if he participated in vital program activities of the fraternity. Students in pharmacy benefit from this kind of professional education and emphasis. Kappa Psi is, in essence, a laboratory in human relationships and personal and professional development. The development of the art of getting along successfully with others in chapter discussions and activities, in cooperative enterprises with the faculty and administration of the University, can make a significant contribution to the ultimate success of the individual in his professional life.

I want to comment briefly on a few primary responsibilities of the professional fraternity. It has, it seems to me, the special responsibility of emphasizing and exemplifying the values of membership through the ideals and principles which motivated its founders. In doing so an important contribution is made to the total professional education process. A statement of creed or a ritual, while very important, is not enough. What happens in the hearts and minds and actions of men is more important. The strength and worth of a professional fraternity involves the responsibility of seeking men who show high promise as serious students and of a high standard of professional service. There are many intangible elements in these considerations, as you well know, but they constitute the hard, central core of your professional aspirations beyond the campus. If proper attitudes and ideals can be infused in the hearts and minds of men as students, and as active members of Kappa Psi, these will prove invaluable to our communities, in business and social life, as well as in professional activities.

Among the obligations of membership which one accepts when joining a professional fraternity are those of retaining his individuality and his personal responsibility rather than using the organization as a shield or an excuse for not assuming full responsibility for his own actions. It is said by many thoughtful people that a decline of western society is taking place because of the delegation of individual initiative and responsibility to the group, and to increased dependence on the group and the government to do what one should do and help do for oneself. The professional fraternity must strive to avoid internal decadence and lack of responsibility on the part of its members. It has the obligation to be a very significant medium for helping to strengthen our professional education structure, but also our social matrix.

Another area of professional fraternity strength and responsibility is that of good, sound scholarship

and intellectual achievement. Obviously, all members cannot be geniuses and it is well that this is so. Your fraternity should engage in activities that stimulate serious pharmaceutical study, a studious attitude independent of teacher requirements, for intellectual and professional growth. Members can help each other through association, discussion and study to a higher quality of performance than would be achieved if each individual were left entirely on his own.

All of us recognize the need for higher and worthier standards in all walks of life. We see and often experience the hazards of slipshod performance and lack of motivations and pride in workmanship on the part of many individuals. These conditions are weaknesses in our society and are absolutely ruinous in professional life.

The professional fraternity has enjoyed an unusually cordial relationship with college faculties. One of the chief reasons why many deans and faculty members encourage the professional fraternity is that it provides an organization where students, alumni and faculty members can work together professionally on a basis of equality and friendship for the advancement of its members, their college and profession. Such a mutual association gives assurance that its objectives will be developed and carried out in harmony with the latest educational and professional requirements and aims. Another primary responsibility of the professional fraternity, such as Kappa Psi, and I include the college and university, is to maintain close cooperative relationships for the improvement of student morale, for the stimulation of substantial intellectual progress and superior achievement, for creative chapter programs and activities of a professional nature, and for the cordial association with members of the pharmaceutical profession.

No member can expect to receive more than he is willing to contribute. It is well in this connection, I think, to remind ourselves occasionally, that the best in anyone cannot be challenged and influenced by anything less than the best. Membership carries the obligations of a life-long association in worthy professional, educational and community enterprises.

A few years ago I heard an eminent pharmacist-physician make the following significant statement about the professional man.


"The true servant of a profession," he said, "knows humility. He regards himself as an instrument of service, first to the profession itself and then to his fellowmen and the world in general. He is a guardian, an initiator, and a giver of light. He has committed himself to the public trust which is bigger and more important than himself; and it is in his selfless dedication to that trust that he differs from his neighbor who labors solely, and frankly, to acquire worldly goods."

The role and responsibility of the professional fraternity—of Kappa Psi—is to imbue its members with the spirit of the founders and elder statesmen; to tackle squarely the academic, technical and ethical problems facing the profession; to stimulate the best in the men who belong to it, and to assist the college and university where it is located, to develop the most able and honorable men who have ever held degrees in higher education in America. This is your all important role and responsibility in building a firm foundation for the future and a rich source of satisfaction and joy.

Now, in closing, I paraphrase the words of an old professor several years ago at the conclusion of his lectures for the session. He said, I would pray that we may be granted the wisdom to comprehend, the courage to endure, and the grace to adorn the business of life.

Raymond J. Dauphinais to Direct Newly Formed APhA Legal Division*

The American Pharmaceutical Association has established a Legal Division as an integral part of the ASSOCIATION Staff at Headquarters in Washington, D.C. Pharmacist-Lawyer Raymond J. Dauphinais, a member of Kappa Psi Pharmaceutical Fraternity, has been appointed Director of the new Division.

The announcement of the new Division and the appointment of Mr. Dauphinais to the Headquarters Staff was made by Dr. William S. Apple, Secretary and General Manager of the American Pharmaceutical Association. The APhA Legal Division will make it possible for the ASSOCIATION to more effectively inform its membership about Legislative and regulatory matters concerned with professional services, drug distribution, and public health. Special studies undertaken by the Legal Division will facilitate the development and implementation of ASSOCIATION policy in these fields.

The Director of the new Legal Division holds the B.S. degree in pharmacy from the University of Illinois and the LL.B. degree from the University of Florida School of Law. Under the direction of the late Charles Wesley Dunn, Mr. Dauphinais received the LL.M. (Trade Regulation) and completed additional study in food and drug law at the New York University Graduate School of Law.

Mr. Dauphinais, who assumed his new position on February 1, 1960 was the American Pharmaceutical Manufacturers Association Fellow in food and drug law during 1955-56. He also was the recipient of an American Jurisprudence award for scholarship in Constitutional Law at the University of Florida School of Law, and in 1956 received the Food Law Institute's award for original research in food and drug law.

Brother Dauphinais has served as assistant professor of pharmacy at the University of Connecticut from February of 1957 to the time of his present position and previously held teaching positions at the Columbia University College of Pharmacy and the University of Florida College of Pharmacy. He is a registered pharmacist in Florida and Illinois, a member of the Florida Bar, and has engaged in the practice of both retail and hospital pharmacy, as well as law.

The Director of the new Legal Division is a member of numerous professional organizations in pharmacy and in law, among which are Delta Theta Phi Legal Fraternity and Rho Chi Honor Society. He has also been a member of the Legislative Committee of Kappa Psi Pharmaceutical Fraternity since January of 1958.

You Should Know . . .

Brother Strommen entered Milton College and elected a Business Administration Course in 1940. An avid flying enthusiast he took Civilian Pilot Training at Milton College and in 1941 he volunteered for Army Air Force Service. Graduating as a fighter pilot in early 1943 he was assigned to the 5th Air Force, then in New Guinea, flying 105 combat missions.

Following his discharge as a 1st Lieutenant in 1945 he entered the University of Wisconsin School of Pharmacy, graduating in 1948. That same year the Wisconsin Graduate Chapter of Kappa Psi Pharmaceutical Fraternity was organized and he was elected Secretary-Treasurer, a post he has held since, with the exception of one two-year period. During this time a periodic newsletter has been mailed to all members. A scholarship program has been initiated and from \$200.00 to \$400.00 annually is devoted to this project. An emergency loan fund of \$250.00 has also been established with a \$50.00 per loan per student limit. These funds are administered by the School of Pharmacy Scholarship Committee. A directory was initiated three years ago and is published annually. The treasury also lists three \$500.00 government bonds which have tentatively been earmarked for a building fund. A committee has been appointed by the Regent to study a proposed building fund drive and will report at the annual Breakfast-Meeting in September 1960. Close cooperation is maintained with the Collegiate Chapter at all times. \$500.00 has just been given the Collegiate Chapter for their house.

Brother Strommen managed his father's pharmacy in Fort Atkinson, Wisconsin from 1948 to 1957. During that time he was active professionally on various Wisconsin Pharmaceutical Association Committees including the Board of Directors to which he was elected for three consecutive terms. In 1951 he was elected Honorary Vice-President and in 1955 President. He has served since on the Board, as its Chairman in 1956. In 1955 and 57 he served as the legislative representative of the W.Ph.A. at the Wisconsin State legislative sessions along with Jennings Murphy, Secretary of the W.Ph.A. He was appointed to the Advisory Committee of the School of Pharmacy in 1957 by Dean A. H. Uhl.

In February 1958 he was named to direct the Extension program of the School of Pharmacy of the University of Wisconsin. He is presently an Assistant Professor of Pharmacy.

Professional memberships include the W.Ph.A., A.Ph.A., A.S.H.P., W.S.H.P., A.C.A., A.I.H.P., N.A.R.D., Kappa Psi.

Civically he is a 7 year member of the Fort Atkinson City Council, serving as its President in 1957 and presently as president pro tem.; a past-president of the University of Wisconsin Alumni of Fort Atkinson and the H. S. Alumni, initiating scholarship programs for both organizations; a past-director of the Fort Atkinson Rotary Club, Community Chest and Chamber of Commerce; a past member of the Wisconsin Republican Party Board of Directors; the organizer and first President of the Fort Atkinson Toastmasters' Club; Director of two Dale Carnegie public speaking courses; and a member of the American Legion, VFW and 40 et 8.

Brother Strommen's time and efforts today are devoted almost solely to the development of the UW Pharmacy Extension Program which he says is a tremendous challenge to him personally, and to the profession if it is to achieve the stature it so rightly deserves. He admits that his wife, daughter Susan, 10, and son Barry, 7, see little of him.

Province VII Assembly

Memphis, Tennessee, November 7, 1959

William B. Swafford, *Secretary-Treasurer*

Welcoming address given by Dr. L. E. Bingenheimer, University of Tennessee College of Pharmacy, and by Bill Oldham, Regent of Psi Chapter.

Invocation was given by Chaplain of Psi Chapter.

Satrap Gerald C. Henney presided at the meeting.

Meeting was called to order by Brother Henney and a roll call of chapters represented was made by the Secretary.

The following chapters were represented at the meeting: Psi, University of Tennessee; Upsilon, University of Kentucky; Gamma Omega, University of Arkansas; Gamma Pi,

St. Louis College of Pharmacy and Allied Sciences; Kentucky Graduate Chapter, Louisville, Kentucky; St. Louis Graduate Chapter, St. Louis, Missouri.

The following chapters were absent: Beta Rho, University of Mississippi; Gamma Theta, University of Kansas City.

Letters from Grand Regent Neuroth and Grand Secretary-Treasurer Eby sending greetings to the province and expressing regret at being unable to attend the meeting were read at this time. Also First Grand Vice Regent Thayer sent regrets at being unable to attend.

The following committees were appointed: Time and Place, Resolutions, Legislative.

The Secretary-Treasurer reported a balance on hand, 7 November, 1959 of \$333.61.

A report from the chapters followed, which pointed out the various activities of these chapters.

A discussion of province activities was conducted by Vice Satrap Bob Barnett, Chaplain Walt Morrison and Satrap Henney. The need for better communications within the province was emphasized.

A tour of the University of Tennessee College of Pharmacy was conducted following adjournment for lunch.

The Time and Place Committee selected the Saturday before Thanksgiving Day in 1960 for our regular meeting, with the place to be the University of Kentucky, Lexington, Kentucky. Moved and seconded that report be approved. Motion carried.

The Legislative Committee presented the following proposed amendment to the Province constitution and by-laws:

Article VII, Para. 19, Section A, be amended to read as follows: . . . Province in regular session. In so far as possible, to pay the travel expense of one delegate from each chapter of the Province, to either a regular or interim meeting of Province VII. This shall be considered to consist of rail fare to and from the convention.

If there should not be in the Province treasury sufficient funds to pay this expense, then a pro rata share will be paid by each chapter for this expense.

Section B. The expense of arrangements for conventions or meetings of Province VII incurred by the host chapter, shall be covered by a registration fee to be paid by each delegate at time of registration. This fee shall not exceed ten dollars, and each chapter shall be notified in writing of the amount of this registration fee prior to the meeting or convention.

It was moved and seconded that these amendments be brought to a vote at the Province meeting to be held in November 1960, in accordance with our rules for amending the constitution and by-laws.

The Resolutions Committee presented the following resolutions which were approved.

WHEREAS, The value of Province organization is an established fact in Kappa Psi Pharmaceutical Fraternity, and

WHEREAS, The future of Kappa Psi Pharmaceutical Fraternity rests with an increase in the strength and value of its Provincial organization, and

WHEREAS, The strength and value of the province organization can only be increased through communication with exchange of thoughts and ideas between Chapters in that Province and with Chapters in the other Provinces, and

WHEREAS, The strength and value of the Province organization is dependent upon adequate representation in the Executive Committee of Kappa Psi Pharmaceutical Fraternity,

Be It Resolved, That Province VII urges that Article XIX, 149, Sec. 4. be revoked and that Article XIX, 152, Sec. 7 be amended to read: "The Satrap shall serve as the Grand Supervising Officer for the Province, and being responsible to the Grand Regent, shall serve as Deputy to the Grand Regent in all matters of grievance or interpretation of the law of the Fraternity in his Province; his decisions may be appealed to the Grand Regent, whose decision in all matters shall be final except as specified in the Constitution. The Satrap shall preside at all meetings of the Assembly and may perform such other duties as directed by the Grand Regent." and

Be It Resolved, That Article XVIII, 130, Sec. 2. be amended to read: "The Executive

Committee shall be composed of nine (9) members: The Grand Regent, The Grand Secretary-Treasurer, two (2) Collegiate Members, two (2) Graduate Members, one (1) which shall be selected at large and one (1) a Grand Supervising Officer representing the Provinces, neither of whom shall be members of Alpha Chapter, the immediate past Grand Regent, the First Grand Vice Regent and the Editor of THE MASK. The Collegiate and Graduate Members shall be appointed in July of each year.", and

Be It Resolved, That each Chapter of Province VII be urged to adopt this resolution and that each Chapter forward such resolution to the Legislative Committee for its consideration in time for presentation to the Grand Council.

WHEREAS, The Resolution Committee feels that adequate communications between the chapters in Province VII are lacking

Be It Resolved, That a province newsletter be published quarterly and each Chapter contribute to this newsletter by a written letter to the person or chapter designated to be in charge of this newsletter.

WHEREAS, The present system of membership elections represent an undesirable condition previous to such election, and

WHEREAS, A new and equitable system of election should be initiated to restore equality and dignity to our election process,

Be It Resolved, That a committee consisting of one chapter from Province VII be appointed by the Satrap to study the system of membership election and to devise a system which incorporates the desirable features of selectivity, and which will eliminate any undesirable features that may be present in our current method, and

Be It Resolved, That this committee shall make its report to a special Province Interim meeting during the G.C.C. in Cincinnati, Ohio from December 27-30, for consideration of the Province Chapters and presentation to the G.C.C.

Motion made by Brother Barnett, seconded by Brother Oldham, that the Secretary-Treasurer be directed to pay to each chapter sending delegates to this convention the sum of twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) to help defray expenses of the delegates. Motion passed.

Also moved that Province VII endorse the following candidates for election at the Grand Council meeting, December 27-30, 1959: Brother James R. Thayer for Grand Regent, Brother Karl J. Goldner for First Grand Vice Regent, Brother William B. Swafford for Third Grand Vice Regent. Motion passed.

Satrap Henney appointed Gamma Pi Chapter to make the study of the system of membership election and report to the special Province interim meeting at the Grand Council Convention, December 1959.

Meeting adjourned at 4:00 P.M.

Following the Province meeting a banquet was held at "The Stables." Dr. Seldon D. Feurt, Dean of the College of Pharmacy, University of Tennessee was the principal speaker.

Dr. Allen I. White Appointed Dean of University of Washington School of Pharmacy

Dr. Allen I. White (Kappa Psi), professor of pharmacy at Washington State University has been appointed dean of the institution's School of Pharmacy to take effect on February 1. The announcement of this appointment came from Washington State University President C. Clement French, who said the position was subject to the usual official confirmation by the Board of Regents.

Dr. White succeeds the present Dean Haakon Bang, who asked earlier this year to be relieved of administrative responsibility in order to return to teaching and research duties.


The new dean came originally to Washington State in 1940 as an instructor in pharmacy and by 1948 rose through the ranks to assume full professorship. He has had, in addition, considerable experience as a practicing pharmacist in Minnesota and Washington. At the present time he is pursuing research in the area of analgesic drugs which is being supported at Washington State University by a \$41,000 Public Health Service Grant.

Brother White holds three degrees, all from the University of Minnesota. He is a Fellow in the American Association for the Advancement of Science, holds membership in Sigma Xi (national scientific honorary), Phi Kappa Phi (national scholastic honorary), and several other honorary and professional societies.

While at Washington State University, he has been a member of numerous faculty and faculty-student committees, including a 12-year stint as a member of the institution's Athletic Council. He has also served a term as chairman of the faculty executive committee.

On the personal side, the new dean is 45 years of age, is married, and has three children.
