





your wishes and become much better acquainted with each other by our three days together in Atlanta.

In early November of last year, a questionnaire covering the survey of all the collegiate chapters was sent to each chapter. Forty-one of the fifty-two chapters responded. Each of the fifty-two chapters, the graduate chapters and members of Alpha chapter have received a three-page report on the findings of the survey. It seems proper to comment on the findings. These comments follow:

Total Membership: The chapters varied in membership from a low of ten to a high of ninety-four with an average membership of twenty-seven brothers. These figures do not include pledges. Forty-three out of every one hundred members of the collegiate chapters will graduate in June, 1963. The graduating group can do much for the Fraternity by proper use of their experience and wisdom to pledge worthy students to the Fraternity.

Fees: Too many chapters have maintained the initiation fee at the minimum seventeen dollar amount. In some cases this has been coupled with extremely low annual dues. When this combination occurs, a chapter is severely handicapped financially. It is certainly true that there is no logical reason to make total fees excessive; but, a chapter will exhibit extreme strain to operate with a budget that only permits a meager existence. It would seem the wise move to give thought seriously to an increase in dues above the minimum amount mentioned. The increase will not handicap your chapter in your pledging program. Review the survey findings.

Chapter Houses: A home on campus or near-by is a tremendous assist in the development of bonds of fraternalism. The annual rental charges, by the chapters who do not own a house, is a rather nominal one. Every chapter may wish to investigate, and investigate thoroughly, the idea of a chapter owned or a chapter rented domicile. The brothers actually spend this money anyway each year for rental wherever they live now. The officers of a chapter might profit by a serious consultation with graduate members of their chapter. Many alumni members are financially able to be of assistance by way of a long term loan for building purposes. Have you actually asked some of your alumni members about the situation? A well managed chapter house is not a financial drag. It can in fact be a financial blessing. The increased number of students who will enter

Watch for These *

Mr. J. Edgar Hoover, Director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, in his Annual Report and speaking of Communist activities with college students, makes the following statement:

"Most successful of all its efforts was its speaking campaign, especially before college groups. From late October, 1961, through May, 1962, leaders of the Communist Party, USA, made 48 speeches before groups of college students all across the Nation. Approximately 43,000 persons heard these talks.

"Encouraged by the early success of college appearances, the Party established a Lecture and Information Bureau and early in 1962 sent a letter to college newspaper editors offering speakers on communism. Near the end of the 1962 fiscal year, the Party already was lining up speeches for the coming academic year.

"The prime objective of all the public activity on the part of the communist leaders was to create a new image for the Party—an image which connotes respectability, legitimacy as a liberal political faction and freedom from foreign dictates. Their denial of subservience to the Soviet Union, however, was clearly branded as ridiculous by the fact that several Party officials were delegates to the 22nd Congress of the Communist Party, Soviet Union, in October, 1961. Heading the delegation was Elizabeth Gurley Flynn, National Chairman of the Communist Party, USA, who, in a speech before the Congress, brazenly predicted the United States would be in the communist orbit by 1980."

Along the same lines, Freedom's Facts for November, 1962, has this to say about the Communist on the campus:

"The 'Flying Bolsheviks' of the University of Chicago recently defeated the "Maoist Maulers' of the University of Wisconsin in a football game.

"Some of the large number of viewers attracted by the game later participated in the regular club meetings of the 'left-oriented' student groups which had set up the unofficial football event.

"This is one of the techniques Marxist student groups are using today to build campus membership in their organizations. Such organizations have taken the lead in inviting Communist speakers to campuses and in demonstrating in favor of Soviet foreign policies.

"The 'Worker' (October 7) characterizes programs of the 'left-oriented' student groups as educational programs, action programs, or combined educational programs leading to political action.

"Educational programs include inviting Communist speakers to student gatherings, conducting discussion groups, and publishing newsletters, newspapers or campus magazines."

Red Programs and Political Aims

"Action programs include such activities as peace demonstrations, anti-HUAC (House Un-American Activities Committee) demonstrations, pro-Cuba or 'Hands Off Cuba' rallies, and occasionally successful campaigns to gain control of student governments.

"Political aims Communists present to such campus groups include support of the

peaceful co-existence policy, the 'Hands Off Cuba' policy, and liquidation of ROTC and all compulsory military service.

"Red aims also include abolition of the House Un-American Activities Committee, repeal of the Internal Security Act of 1950, and a guarantee of academic license to students and professors.

"To build student and youth groups into a revolutionary factor, Communists are now setting up youth councils and coordinating committees. Plans may include a U.S. Assembly of Youth to unify and give central direction to all 'left-oriented' student activities."

higher educational institutions within the next five years will be extremely fortunate if the school of their choice can furnish the necessary amount of dormitory space needed for total enrollment. A chapter house should not be hard to sell to thinking alumni members. No one alumnus member needs to furnish all the finances necessary. It could be a venture in which many graduate members could participate. Why don't you investigate?

Community or charitable activities: The activities are widely varied. You are to be congratulated for your service and interest in others. Some of the most worthwhile events in your lives can result from your willingness to share with others. Activities of this kind are beyond money value. A number of chapters reported no activity in this area. It would seem logical to believe that all chapters have such activity but simply do not list them in their replies.

Scholarship awards: The total Fraternity has a good record here. Scholarship is the key to success to a professional man. Continue to work hard in promoting awards for such a worth-while endeavor.

Social events: Chapters have these well arranged. They are a necessary and important part in the activity of a school year.

Newsletters: One would not guess so many chapters have newsletters. What better tool can you use to contact your graduates?


Campus activities: It can be truly said that chapters of Kappa Psi have members involved in almost every kind of campus activity. Some of these can be classed as "fun" activities, but much is in the way of service to their entire university.

Two closing items are repeated from other parts of this message:

1. Come to Atlanta in December, 1963
2. Contact your alumni now to determine the feasibility and wisdom of your chapter purchasing or renting a chapter house.

Since we owe our existence to the institutions where our Chapters are located, our members must always conduct themselves so that they never bring dishonor in any way to the institutions they represent.

MAY 1963 BE GOOD TO ALL OF YOU

Once again the 1962 Holiday Season is a pleasant memory for our members. Christmas with the family and all of the wonderful things this means; a reunion with some of our old friends; the exchange of greeting cards and of gifts and many other joys are all a part of the great Christian observance and the warm memories it brings. We trust that the spirit of good will so evident during the Holiday Season will prevail in our Fraternity and in the hearts of the members throughout the year as we live and work together.

PLEDGE TRAINING

Many fraternity leaders believe that next to a sound financial program, pledge training is a chapter's most important and constructive activity. It is during a good pledge training program that the fraternity neophyte

Learns humility.

Begins to acquire poise and confidence.

Learns to be considerate of others.

Learns the importance of proper social conduct.

Develops respect for his fraternity and learns true meaning of fraternalism.

Is taught the meaning of responsibility.

Recognizes that good scholarship is one of his most important objectives.

Learns that loyalty to his college and profession are of primary importance.

In the pledge training program, each chapter should see that these objectives are attained so far as it is possible.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR OFFICERS AND GENERAL INFORMATION FOR CHAPTERS

This is the name of the booklet commonly designated OFFICERS' INSTRUCTION BOOKLET. Each chapter usually receives a supply for the principal officers when chapters report names of officers in April and May. Request a supply if your chapter does not have any.

JEWELRY ORDERS

It is important to note that jewelry and other items which are available through the L. G. BALFOUR COMPANY, should be ordered directly from this firm. All officers should read information relating to this matter in the OFFICERS' INSTRUCTION BOOKLET, pages 16, 17 and 18. Orders should never be sent to the Central Office for jewelry items since they will have to be returned to the chapters which will result in some delay in completing orders. *Anticipate chapter needs and order well in advance of the date desired so as to insure delivery when required.*

INITIATION HORSEPLAY

Since the initiation of many new members will occur during the next several months, we again call to the attention of all chapters the ruling of Kappa Psi Fraternity which prohibits initiation horseplay and unbecoming public exhibition of any kind. We are pleased to note that most of our chapters are cooperating in every way but this is an

area in which we must have 100% cooperation. Most of the unfavorable fraternity publicity of former years resulted from unbecoming fraternity initiation and other practices all of which can be avoided with a little careful thought. Conduct becoming of intelligent individuals must be the rule of our Fraternity at all times.

ATTENTION CHAPTER SECRETARY AND TREASURER

SECRETARY . . . You should forward the membership card (Form M) to the Central Office immediately after the initiation ceremony has been completed (when the third degree has been received). The correct date must appear on the membership card since this is included on the Membership Certificate. Have each member sign his card. The Secretary must also forward a special order for the Membership Certificates with the names typed or printed just as they are to appear on the certificate.

TREASURER . . . You should forward the initiation fee for each member immediately after the ceremony has been completed and preferably along with the membership cards. Payment of per capita fees (monthly dues) begins with the month immediately following the one in which the member was initiated.

Kappa Psi Brother Aids in Cuban Prisoner Exchange

The American Pharmaceutical Association, at the request of the American National Red Cross is aiding in the Cuban prisoner exchange program.

Brother James D. Hawkins (Xi-Ohio State) of APhA staff and his wife (also a pharmacist) left on January 3 to join the American National Red Cross team at Havana, Cuba to evaluate and confirm the inventory of the pharmaceuticals that have already been shipped in exchange for the Cuban invasion prisoners and to assist in making determination of the remainder of the shipments to be made.

At the same time the American Pharmaceutical Association is offering technical assistance to the American National Red Cross in Washington in classifying and evaluating pharmaceutical needs for the completion of the prisoner exchange agreement. This cooperative program is expected to continue for some time.

APhA Executive Director William S. Apple (Beta Psi-Wisconsin) commented that "We are pleased to be able to be of assistance to the American National Red Cross in this extremely important and challenging assignment."

Brother James D. Hawkins is a graduate of Ohio State University, joined APhA staff in September, 1962 and serves as assistant director of the membership division. Mrs. Hawkins is also a graduate of Ohio State University (June 1962).



Province VII Assembly

University of Kansas City, Kansas City, Missouri
October 20, 1962

Sixty delegates attended the October 20, 1962 Assembly of Province VII which was hosted by Gamma Theta, University of Kansas City, in Kansas City, Missouri. These delegates represented the following chapters: Upsilon (University of Kentucky); Psi (University of Tennessee); Gamma Gamma (University of Texas); Gamma Theta (University of Kansas City); Gamma Mu (Northeast Louisiana State College); Gamma Pi (St. Louis College of Pharmacy); Gamma Omega (University of Arkansas); Kentucky Graduate Chapter; St. Louis Graduate Chapter; and the Texas Graduate Chapter. Beta Rho (University of Mississippi) was not represented. This was the first meeting of the Province since its realignment to include Gamma Gamma, Gamma Mu and the Texas Graduate Chapter.

Satrap William B. Swafford of the University of Tennessee presided at the Assembly and the Province was privileged to have Grand Secretary-Treasurer Frank H. Eby participate in the meeting. National Executive Committee member Mark Harrison (Gamma Gamma) was also in attendance.

Business included biennial reports of the Satrap, Vice Satrap Robert L. Barnett, Jr., Secretary-Treasurer Richard M. Doughty and Historian Raymond Kennett, as well as chapter reports.

Panel discussions on "Pledging" led by Psi and Gamma Omega and "Initiation" by Gamma Pi and Gamma Gamma pooled the resources and ideas of all participants. A significant conclusion in regard to these aspects of the Fraternity's activities was that the purposes and functions of these programs should always be kept in mind in any consideration of them.

During the program of the convention, Brother Eby discussed pertinent aspects of

THE MASK and the cooperation of local officers with the national office in expediting the many transactions between them throughout the year.

Serving as chairmen of the committees were J. E. Haberle (Psi)—Legislative; Charles Haliburton (Gamma Omega)—Resolutions; Robert L. Barnett (Kentucky Graduate)—Time and Place; and Gerald C. Henney (St. Louis Graduate)—Nominations.

Significant amendments to the By-Laws of Province VII included an increase in chapter assessments to \$2.00 per year per collegiate member in support of expanding activities, including the Province VII Newsletter—a project which under the direction of Raymond Kennett has grown from the first province newsletter of the Fraternity to an extensive, well-organized and high-quality communication. In connection with this growth, an amendment was also adopted to direct the Satrap to appoint an Editor of the Newsletter which had been edited by the Historian in the past. Raymond Kennett was appointed to continue to serve in this capacity.

The Time and Place Committee reported that St. Louis (Gamma Pi, St. Louis College of Pharmacy) has been selected for the Fall 1963 interim meeting, and Austin (Gamma Gamma, The University of Texas) will be the meeting place for the Province Assembly in the Fall of 1964.

Elected to office and installed by Brother Eby were August Danti, Satrap; John Varo, Vice Satrap; Richard M. Doughty, Secretary-Treasurer; Luther Parker, Historian; and Richard Reeves, Chaplain.

Fellowship was provided at a welcome Get-Together hosted by Gamma Theta Graduates Friday evening, as well as coffee breaks, luncheon and a banquet on Saturday evening.

Province X Assembly

Spokane, Washington, October 20, 1962

Melvin R. Gibson, *Historian*

Satrap Dr. Leo Sciuchetti (Beta Zeta) called the Province X Assembly to order at 8:00 a.m. on October 20, 1962 at the Ridpath Hotel in Spokane, Washington. Present were thirty-three members representing six chapters—Beta Zeta (Oregon State University), Beta Omicron (University of Washington), Beta Pi (Washington State University), Gamma Eta (Montana State University), Portland Graduate Chapter, and Seattle Graduate Chapter. Grand Regent Herman Forslund was present for the Assembly as well as the entire slate of officers of the Province—Mr. John Cook, Vice Satrap; Dr. Lynn Brady, Secretary-Treasurer; and Dr. Frank Pettinato, Historian.

The Province X Assembly got underway with a few words of welcome from Satrap Sciuchetti, an invocation by Roy Bilile (Gamma Eta), and the introduction of Miss Spokane by Mr. Paul Pickette, a Spokane pharmacist. The minutes of the last Province X Assembly were read in abstract and approved. The Treasurer's report was read and approved. A balance of \$422.15 was reported. Words of greeting from Alpha Chapter and a report of the Grand Council Convention were given by Grand Regent Herman Forslund. On invitation from Satrap Sciuchetti, Dr. Melvin R. Gibson (Beta Pi) presented some comments on pharmacy and pharmaceutical education in Holland and Sweden. Dr. Gibson had just returned from a seven-month sabbatical leave in Europe.

Reports of individual chapter activities were given by Dennis Ellison (Beta Zeta), Lee Brashler (Beta Omicron), Dick Sherwood (Beta Pi), William Thoren (Gamma Eta), John E. Cook (Portland Graduate Chapter), and Dr. Edward Krupski (Seattle Graduate Chapter). This was followed by a coffee-break provided through the courtesy of Gamma Eta Chapter.

Discussion topics, which had been previously assigned the chapters, were presented by a representative from each chapter. The topics and responsible chapters were "Financing Chapter Activities" by Beta Omicron, "Stimulation of Scholarship" by Beta Zeta, "Promoting the Objectives of Kappa Psi" by Beta Pi, "Our Responsibilities to the Fraternity,"

School, and Profession" by Gamma Eta, and "Role of the Graduate Chapter" by Seattle Graduate Chapter. A general discussion followed the presentation of the topics.

The committee reports approved by the Province Assembly included a report from the Special Committee on Constitution and By-Laws. This report recommended a travel allowance within the capabilities of the Province treasury for the Province Delegate to the Grand Council Convention. It also recommended that the Province Delegate and Alternate shall be members in good standing of one of the chapters of the Province and shall be chosen by a majority vote of the members of the chapter to which they belong. The privilege of selecting these delegates shall be rotated throughout the chapters of the Province. The approval of this change of the By-Laws by the Province is subject to the approval of it by the Legislative Committee of the Grand Council. The Nominating Committee submitted the following slate of officers, and they were unanimously elected: Satrap: Mr. John E. Cook, Portland Graduate Chapter; Vice Satrap: Dr. Lynn Brady, Beta Omicron; Secretary-Treasurer: Dr. Frank A. Pettinato, Gamma Eta; and Historian: Dr. Melvin R. Gibson, Beta Pi. Dr. Leo Sciuchetti (Beta Zeta) was elected Delegate to the Grand Council Convention under the existing By-Laws with the proviso that this election would be cancelled when or if the Legislative Committee of the Grand Council approved the above-described changes in the By-Laws. The Time and Place Committee recommended that Beta Omicron Chapter be the host for the next Province Assembly and that it be held in Seattle during the autumn of 1964. This recommendation was approved by the Province Assembly.

The Resolutions Committee included in its report the recommendation that Gamma Eta Chapter (Montana State University) receive the appreciation of the Assembly for efficiently arranging the meeting, its program, and the luncheon which closed the 1962 Province X Assembly. After the luncheon many of the delegates attended the Washington State University-University of Indiana football game in Spokane's Albi Stadium.

Grand Secretary-Treasurer Eby Presented With "Active Member For Life" Certificate by APhA



The American Pharmaceutical Association is very proud of the individual accomplishment which the certificate symbolizes. In effect, it is a reward for continuous support of the APhA activities and policies. It indicates that the recipient has shouldered his full degree of profes-

Gamma Omega Chapter of Kappa Psi at the University of Arkansas. The chapter received its charter in 1955 and Dr. Grosicki has served as its Grand Council Deputy since that time.

Dr. Grosicki is a member of the A.Ph.A., Rho Chi, A.A.A.S., Sigma Xi and the AIHP. His field of specialization is Dispensing Pharmacy and his avocation the History of Pharmacy. He is married and he is registered in Missouri.

Dr. George E. Osborne is author of "The Responsibilities of Membership in Kappa Psi Fraternity," a paper recently published in pamphlet form by the Fraternity for distribution to the brothers and new initiates. The paper was prepared at the request of the Central Office and was presented to the Grand Council Convention in Philadelphia, December 30, 1961. Dr. Osborne's selection to do the paper stemmed from his long experience with student activities and with various elements of the fraternity system; he holds membership in ten Greek letter organizations.

Brother Osborne was born in Rochester, Indiana, where he received his elementary and secondary school training. He was graduated from the Purdue University School of Pharmacy in 1939 with the degree of Bachelor of Science and in 1941 with the degree of Master of Science. During his undergraduate years he became a member of Delta Chi, of Kappa Psi, and of Theta Alpha Phi (honorary dramatics).

In January, 1942, he was called to the United States Naval Academy, Annapolis, Maryland, for active service in the Naval Reserve in World War II. He participated in six campaigns in the Pacific Ocean theater, and was honorably separated from the Naval service in December, 1945, with the rank of Lieutenant, senior grade. In February, 1946, he went to the University of Kansas as an instructor, a position he resigned in June of

the same year to accept an appointment to the staff of Purdue University. At Kansas he was initiated into Alpha Chi Sigma (professional chemistry). During his three years at Purdue, he engaged in graduate work that led to the degree of Doctor of Philosophy in 1949; during this time he was initiated into Rho Chi, Phi Lambda Upsilon (honorary chemistry), and was made a full member in Sigma Xi (honorary research).

On completion of his doctorate, he went to the University of Utah as assistant professor of pharmacy. There he was made an honorary member of Phi Delta Chi, and he served the chapter as faculty advisor for three years. He was instrumental in the establishment of Beta Epsilon Chapter of Rho Chi at Utah. In addition, he served as faculty advisor for Utah Phi Chapter of Sigma Alpha Epsilon. His eight year term of service at the University of Utah was interrupted in 1954-1955 by a year's postdoctoral study at the University of Wisconsin under the auspices of the Fund for the Advancement of Education (Ford Foundation). There his interests in the history of pharmacy were deepened by concurrent studies in the history of science, of medicine, of chemistry, and of pharmacy, with supporting work in historical methodology and intellectual history. At this time, also, he became Director of Educational Activities, a national office in Delta Chi, which position he held until his resignation in 1960. He left Salt Lake City in 1957 to assume the post of professor of pharmacy at the University of Rhode Island College of Pharmacy.

At Rhode Island he has continued his associations with student government and with the fraternity system. He advised the Student Senate for three years and the Interfraternity Council for two years. He has been faculty advisor for Rhode Island Alpha Chapter of Sigma Alpha Epsilon since his arrival on campus; and two years ago he was elected to the Order of the Phoenix, an honor usually reserved for brothers in S.A.E. He was initiated into Phi Sigma (honorary biology) and served three years as adviser to that group. Last spring he became a member of Phi Kappa Phi (honorary scholastics). He advised Blue Key (local participation honor society) for two years; and he is presently serving his first of three years as advisor to Sachems (senior activities honorary). Again, largely through his efforts, Beta Pi Chapter of Rho Chi was established at the University of Rhode Island. He has been active in the Providence Graduate Chapter of Kappa Psi and has worked in an unofficial capacity with the brothers of Beta Epsilon. His familiarity with the problems of Greek letter fraternities and their members is reflected in the content of his paper on "The Responsibilities of Membership in Kappa Psi Fraternity."

Dr. Osborne is married and has five children. He is a registered pharmacist in Indiana and Rhode Island. He maintains membership in many professional pharmaceutical associations, including the American Pharmaceutical Association, the American Institute of the History of Pharmacy, the Conference of Teachers of the American Association of Colleges of Pharmacy. He has been elected or appointed to various offices in these organizations: Vice-Chairman and Chairman of the Section on Historical Pharmacy of the A.Ph.A.; Councilor of the A.I.H.P.; and Chairman of the Joint Committee on Pharmacy College Libraries of the A.A.C.P. He has served on many faculty committees in the different institutions where he has taught. His publications number more than seventy-five pieces, written chiefly in the areas of pharmaceutical education and in history of pharmacy.





Superintendent Stover believes that Brother Sladek's training in pharmacy has given both breadth and depth to his knowledge and procedures in the chemistry laboratory.

Steele (Gamma), chief pharmacist at the Greenwich Hospital in Greenwich, Connecticut, has been charged by the president of the Society of Cosmetic Chemists to write a history of the Cosmetic Industry during the twentieth century. It was recently pointed out to the Society that the cosmetic industry of today is almost entirely a twentieth century phenomenon.

We also held two functions during the month



The annual Kappa Psi Sweetheart Dinner-Dance is being planned for this spring with hopes for another delicious meal and a beautiful sweetheart.



Dr. Foran of the Oregon Primate Research Center staff was the guest speaker on the subject of the purposes of this first of twelve centers to be established for research and study under government endowment. The Center is a twelve million dollar plant which covers several acres with a staff of over one hundred persons. It is a permanent installation and will result in much information for medical advancement.
