

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The Grand Council Convention of 1963 is now past history. To those who met in Atlanta, the experience will be long remembered—but no person or organization today can afford to be complacent because of past performances; and the message that should go out to every chapter from this meeting is this: Kappa Psi must maintain its identity in each College of Pharmacy as a dominant force in the school. To do this, every chapter should review its complete operational and activities program. I would ask that this be made the first sustained activity of every Regent in 1964.

To be strong within our chapters is to be impregnable from without; and the strength of our Fraternity as a whole is directly dependent on that of its individual chapters. This strength is nurtured by unity of purpose and definite objectives. The first objective of each chapter should be to justify its existence—to its members, to the school, and to the public. This can be done only by giving that intangible product of every true profession: unselfish service. *Every chapter of Kappa Psi should have some program for a local service which is identified exclusively with Kappa Psi.*

This service, however, should be planned carefully. It should be one which is within the limits of the chapter's ability to handle competently. All too often an ambitious chapter can defeat its purpose by embarking on a project which is too extensive or elaborate for the limited time and personnel which can be devoted to it. Thus, a chapter should assess its "activity potential" critically with respect to a proposed project before it commits itself to action. It is better to have a few—or even just one—strong and continuous activity than to have a number of inactive or spasmodically active projects which plague the consciences of those who should be responsible for them. Be practical in planning, careful in starting, and then be positive in acting.

One final thought should be considered: the services performed by individuals or committees, although they may be associated with personalities, are basically contributions of Kappa Psi Fraternity and stand as examples of what can be done and as inspiration for additional worthwhile activities.

The Thirty-Second National Grand Council Convention of Kappa Psi Pharmaceutical Fraternity*

The Thirty-Second National Grand Council Convention of Kappa Psi Pharmaceutical Fraternity was held at the Dinkler Plaza Hotel in Atlanta, Georgia on December 27, 28, 29, and 30, 1963. This marked the Eighty-Fourth Anniversary of the Fraternity, having been founded at the Russell Military Academy in New Haven, Connecticut in 1879. In addition to guests there were 165 members who registered for the four-day convention. Forty-seven of the 55 Collegiate Chapters were represented as were 17 Graduate Chapters and 9 Provinces. Previous to the convention's opening, joint meetings of Alpha Chapter and the Executive Committee were held on December 27, with Grand Regent Herman C. Forslund presiding. Additional sessions of the joint groups were held on December 30 after the close of the convention.

General Convention Chairman was Grand Secretary-Treasurer Frank H. Eby and local convention co-chairman were Durward N. Entrekkin of the University of Georgia, and C. Larry Thomasson of Mercer University. Other committees of the convention were: Registration, Editor of *THE MASK*, Nicholas W. Fenny of the University of Connecticut, Chairman; Credentials, John W. Martin of Bridgewater College, Chairman; Nominations, Milton L. Neuroth of the Medical College of Virginia, Chairman; Program, Herman C. Forslund of Oregon State College, Chairman; and Reception, Glen J. Sperandio of Purdue University, Chairman.

Dean Kenneth L. Waters of the University of Georgia, School of Pharmacy addressed the convention at its opening session. In all, five regular business sessions were held where delegates were present to hear reports of National Officers and the various committee reports. A special Memorial Tribute to deceased members was delivered by Editor of *THE MASK* Nicholas W. Fenney of the University of Connecticut. In addition to three panel discussions dealing with chapter responsibilities, the chapter house, and rushing, a number of papers were presented concerning scholarship programs, functions and responsibilities of graduate chapters, and how to build a strong chapter. John Atkinson, Jr. and Louis J. Ravin of Smith Kline & French Laboratories delivered papers relative to the future of fraternities, and essential publications for effective communications, respectively.

One special session was held under the direction of Grand Ritualist John W. Martin where members of Mu Chapter conducted an Exemplification of the Ritual Initiation. Members of the convention also were afforded the opportunity of a sight-seeing tour of Atlanta.

The social program included a Grand Officer's Reception on Saturday evening followed by the Eighty-Fourth Anniversary Dinner on Sunday evening at the Dinkler Plaza Hotel. An excellent program of entertainment followed the dinner. Special recognition for outstanding leadership and performance as a dean was made

at the Anniversary Dinner to Dr. Kenneth L. Waters of the University of Georgia by the presentation of an Award Certificate.

The Grand Council Convention closed with the installation of the following officers for the 1963-1965 term: Grand Regent, Glen J. Sperandio, Purdue University; First Grand Vice Regent, Walter R. Williams, University of Connecticut; Second Grand Vice Regent, Wallace L. Guess, University of Texas; Third Grand Vice Regent, James P. Vacik, North Dakota State University; Grand Secretary-Treasurer, Frank H. Eby, Temple University; Grand Historian, Leo A. Sciuchetti, Oregon State University; Grand Counselor, Gerald C. Henney, St. Louis College of Pharmacy; and Grand Ritualist, Richard M. Doughty, University of Kentucky. Nicholas W. Fenney, University of Connecticut was re-appointed editor of the fraternity's publication, THE MASK.

The Thirty-Second Grand Council Convention adjourned Monday noon, December 30, 1963. The next convention will be held in 1965.

Grand Regent Sperandio's Acceptance Address

Brothers of Kappa Psi:

All too often, public speakers talk too much and say too little. This Convention has been an exception to this observation and I do not propose to change things by making a long and detailed address. However, I would like for each delegate in attendance to take back to his chapter this brief message: All of your Grand Officers are deeply appreciative of the trust you have placed in us by electing us to our respective positions, and we individually and collectively pledge to you our firm determination to make Kappa Psi ever stronger and more meaningful to its members.

It is significant that five of the seven Grand Officers just elected are new to the national scene; this, I think, is an indication of the expansion and acceptance of new ideas—and the intent to try them out, which is the chief characteristic of a vital and growing organization.

As your chief Executive Officer I intend to continue in general the policies set by my predecessors but we must and will take positive steps towards establishing a strong and clearly defined program for the growth which we must experience if we are to maintain our position as the leading pharmaceutical fraternity in the nation.

To do this, I propose to use the services of many of our capable brothers throughout the country. Through the Central Office we will request some of you to work on committees and special assignments. These appointments will be made with the expectation that the brothers named will *work* and work productively without delay. I would now advise all future appointees that in accepting an assignment they are committing themselves to as binding an agreement as if they were making a business contract. I will expect results.

The next two years will be devoted to a 3-point program:

1. Strengthening our organizational structure
2. Establishing a sound financial operations plan
3. Developing an improved communications system

The Constitution and By-Laws should be reviewed and rewritten to more specifically define authorities and delineate responsibilities.

An operational budget should be considered and established to provide for future operations. Specific requirements for the office of Grand Secretary-Treasurer will be set up and procuring a successor to Brother Eby, who has announced his desire to retire, will be one of the first tasks undertaken.

The Province structure and the communications between the Chapters, Provinces, and Central Office should be critically assessed and a practicable and acceptable solution to the problem be found.

Kappa Psi is coming of age. The problems which have arisen at this meeting—and have been or will be resolved, are growing pains only. We have all seen here a re-affirmation of our motto, "One For All and All For One." Let us look to the future with the confidence gained from past achievements.

Report of Grand Secretary-Treasurer Eby to the Grand Council Convention, 1963

The report of the Grand Secretary-Treasurer of Kappa Psi Pharmaceutical Fraternity on an occasion such as this is intended in a general way to review some of the activities of the past two years and also project some views relative to the future of the Fraternity.

Many activities of the Fraternity have been brought to your attention through *THE MASK* and special reports and bulletins that have been issued during the past two years. For this reason and the fact that various other persons will discuss many phases of Fraternity activity, this report will not be an exhaustive one.

It is a pleasure to meet here in Atlanta and enjoy the hospitality of this fine city and the great State of Georgia. While our visit will be rather brief, I am sure that it will be enjoyable and I believe that it will be profitable for the Fraternity and for you, its representatives.

I am sure that few of you know that Kappa Psi Fraternity held a convention here in Atlanta, November 13-15, 1916. That was 47 years ago. From a historical point of view this is not a very long period of time but it represents one of the greatest periods of development in our country's history and also in the growth of our Fraternity. In 1916 Atlanta was not only a different place but the world was also much different. The automobile and the airplane were both primitive, clumsy, untrustworthy mechanical contrivances and many of the things like home radio and television were unknown. The threat of war did not hang over the world, juvenile delinquency was no problem and Congress was not investigating everybody and everything. Pharmacists were dispensing three fluid ounce mixtures for 40 to 50 cents and twenty-four capsules of their own compounding were dispensed for 50 to 60 cents. Actually very little remains of the pharmacy that was the foundation of our profession 47 years ago and I am sure that there are no pharmacists who were living in 1916 who today would say "give me the good old days."

The 1916 convention appeared to have been dominated by representatives of the medical section of Kappa Psi. There were fifteen collegiate chapters representing pharmacy schools and some strong pharmacy fraternity leaders were present but Kappa Psi at this time was regarded by many primarily as a medical fraternity.

Although many of the early Kappa Psi Conventions were known for their lavish entertainment, the 1916 convention was outstanding in the number of accomplishments that had a lasting influence in the future of the Fraternity. I am sure that very few of you know how many important rules, regulations and objectives were established here in Atlanta 47 years ago. I think the following are significant:

1. A charter fee of \$25.00 was established. This is the fee still in effect today.
2. The time for the Grand Council Convention was established as the Christmas Holidays. For regular conventions, it has not been changed.
3. The first province, the North Atlantic Province, now Province I, was approved.
4. The L. G. Balfour Company was approved as the official jeweler.
5. The official coat-of-arms was approved. The design presented for the first time at the Atlanta Convention for approval was accepted by the delegates and the first picture, so far as I know, appeared in *THE MASK* in April 1917.
6. The Grand Council Scholarship Gold Key was established as an award for the top honor man in his class at graduation . . . the same fine award that we present today although in recent years we added a certificate.

Many other items were considered at the 1916 convention: Because of publication costs, serious consideration was given to discontinue *THE MASK* but this action was not approved. Likewise, an effort to approve a standard initiation fee for all chapters was voted down.

The 1916 Atlanta Convention was the last major convention in which the collegiate members of the medical and pharmacy chapters participated primarily, so this city holds a rather unique place in the convention history of Kappa Psi.

In the report which follows I will not attempt to discuss all phases of activity or problems which I believe should be considered at this Grand Council Convention. I know that others have important reports on a number of Fraternity activities and the proceedings of the Executive Committee will be presented for your consideration. Also, we plan to discuss chapter administration problems at the workshop tomorrow. Most of the topics which I will consider but briefly will not be discussed by others possibly with the exception of the part relating to the fraternity finances.

THE CENTRAL OFFICE

Since many of you are chapter officers and have had contact with the Central Office, I am sure you are familiar with some aspects of the services which are carried on. Many of you probably do not know that the Grand Secretary-Treasurer serves on a part-time basis with only one full-

time secretary. Although ten new collegiate chapters have been added since the present Grand S-T took office, the staff has not been increased . . . we just work faster and longer.

In addition to handling all of the finances of the Fraternity—and it is a real chore to collect money from some chapters, The Central Office maintains the membership records and THE MASK mailing records. During 1962-63 the Central Office dispatched over 9000 pieces of mail, much of it first class. During the same time, the office checked the various records and ordered the processing of 2123 certificates of all kinds. Many of these had to be engrossed in Philadelphia and were packed and shipped from the Central Office. To give you some idea of the work involved in keeping THE MASK mailing records up to date, the Secretary during February, March and April 1963 made 841 corrections in the June mailing list and corrections have to be made four times per year. The Central Office prepared eight special bulletins for distribution to the collegiate chapters during 1962-63. These bulletins contained 45 items of a confidential or urgent nature that could not be published in THE MASK. There are many other regular and special activities that need not be mentioned because some of you are familiar with the special problems that you have sent to the office for which a solution was requested. We recognize the fact that there are many things that the Central Office should do and some of our services are inadequate but we are doing our best under the conditions.

MEMBERSHIP

At the end of June 1963, we submitted a summary of the past year's membership as we have done annually since 1954. The 1963 report showed that we had registered 881 new members and that there were 2156 active members in our fifty-five chapters at the end of the college year. While there is some fluctuation in the number of new members registered each year, the average per year for the last ten years is about 790. Last year we had eight chapters that had a total membership at the end of the year of less than twenty. Eight chapters initiated only five members or less last year. This indicates that we have some small and rather weak chapters but these exist in schools with very low enrollments with not too much opportunity for improvement. Gamma Tau Chapter will be discontinued at the end of the year when the School of Pharmacy at George Washington University is discontinued. In a few of the eastern schools there has been some loss in student enrollment and several of our chapters have suffered sharp declines in membership but we believe this condition will improve. One bright spot in this picture is the emphasis now being placed on scholarship achievement in the selection of new members. Scholarship is becoming more respectable among fraternity members and most chapters now select only those that have good scholastic records, which is as it should be. In summary, we believe that we can reasonably expect to enroll approximately 800 new members each year under present national economic conditions but quality in membership must always be our major objective.

NEW COLLEGIATE CHAPTERS

All of you are familiar with the fact that three new collegiate chapters were added to the official family early this year, raising the total active chapters to fifty-five for a new record. The organization of a new chapter is always a challenge, involving much work and considerable detailed instruction. In setting up our three newest chapters, the Central Office worked closely with faculty brother Dr. Howard Mossberg and student leader Jerry L. Gibbons at Southwestern State College; with student leader Lamar M. Coe, the first Delta Gamma Regent at Auburn University; and with faculty brother Dr. Lindley A. Cates and student leader and first Delta Delta Chapter Regent, Earl C. Harvey, Jr. at the University of Houston. The Fraternity expresses its grateful thanks to these brothers for their fine leadership and valuable contributions which made the new chapters possible.

Although it has never been the policy of Kappa Psi Fraternity to use pressure in the establishment of a new chapter on the campus of any school or college of pharmacy and we have never approved the organization of a new chapter where we were not assured of its success, we have always been alert to the need for new chapters in schools where we feel the enrollment would justify new chapters. At present we can not predict the organization of any new chapters in the immediate future.

GRADUATE CHAPTERS

During 1962 the South Carolina Graduate Chapter was reactivated after many years of dormancy and in September this year, a charter was issued to a new graduate chapter at Kansas City. We congratulate those who were responsible for organizing these graduate chapters and wish them every success in the years to come.

Graduate chapters have been one of our problems for many years and probably always will be. Although we are cognizant of the fact that the Fraternity is intended primarily for college students, our Fraternity should instill in our members a sense of loyalty that should last a life time. Apparently we fail in this area but we differ very little from many other fraternities which also have problems with graduate chapters.

The fact that our members are busy people and that they become engaged in various new community and professional activities following graduation, leaves little time for the Fraternity. Thus the lack of leadership and in some instances, the lack of worthwhile objectives accounts for the failure of most graduate chapters. It is amazing how one or two devoted leaders can keep a chapter on its feet providing there is a worthy objective.

Several graduate chapters have demonstrated that their members will make modest contributions each year toward the support of scholarships. Other chapters have found worthwhile objectives in several other areas such as supporting a chapter house fund or working for and supporting important state legislation but the scholarship program probably holds the greatest appeal and will secure the cooperation of the greatest number of members in most instances.

I believe there should be a closer contact between our graduate and undergraduate chapter members. Successful graduates should meet and counsel with the collegiate chapters, not with the idea of assuming control of the collegiate chapter but to bring to it the benefits of experience and the wisdom which comes with age. Collegiate chapters should invite to their meetings successful members of the Fraternity, and graduate chapters should see to it that some of their successful members are required to meet with nearby collegiate chapters as frequently as it is possible, or seems desirable, to discuss problems and express their views on various aspects of the profession.

I do not believe that a graduate chapter should serve as a social club although I recognize the value and importance of social activities. We are professional people and our professional fraternity membership and our loyalty to Kappa Psi should motivate our chapters to accomplish something of value to the profession and its members. If a graduate chapter does not have a sound objective it is of little value to the Fraternity.

FRATERNITIES AND THE INTERNAL REVENUE SERVICE

Since college fraternities are classed as social clubs or organizations, they are required to file an annual income tax report. This has been brought to the attention of our chapter on several occasions in recent years. Two years ago in Philadelphia we emphasized the importance of this obligation and we supplied forms for applying for exemption. Many chapters have been filing these reports on Form 990 but I am sure there are some chapters that have neglected this obligation and probably have never filed a single report.

Fraternity chapters do not enjoy automatically, exemption from reporting their business activities to the I.R.S. Those who do have exempt status had to apply for it and were given a letter of exemption. This is the only way you can obtain it.

During the late summer of 1963, the Central Office prepared the necessary forms and organized the required information and applied for group exemption for the chapters of our Fraternity. The I.R.S. has not acted on this application but as late as last week I was informed that we would have a good chance to receive approval of our application. Meanwhile chapters should refrain from requesting individual exemption until we hear from our application for group exemption.

Should we be granted group exemption, you will be informed of this and given full instructions. I can inform you that you will be required to file an income tax form annually, using Form 990. Exemption if granted means exemption from paying income tax, not exemption from making an annual income tax return. With this information in mind, I am sure you understand that it will be most important that each chapter keep an accurate record of its income and expenditures. This is especially important where the chapter maintains a chapter house. In cases where the chapter maintains a chapter house through an incorporation, this group has to prepare its own income tax report.

I believe that all of you who employ domestic help in the chapter houses are aware of your Social Security obligations. You also have income tax withholding obligations where the chapter is an employer.

Chapters which have savings funds or house funds in banks that pay interest will have to obtain an identification number using application form SS 4. We will discuss tax matters further on the WORKSHOP for chapter administration.

KAPPA PSI OBJECTIVES

No organization such as ours can be successful if it does not have some primary objectives which serve as the spiritual inspiration for each member. As I see it, there are three principal things which the chapter must do in order that it may develop the qualities which are desirable and which we expect to find in the good fraternity man:

1. The ritual of initiation must be performed in a proper atmosphere with understanding and dignity.
2. The objectives of the Fraternity must be impressed on each member. At the time of initiation and also at the beginning of the fraternity year, the Regent should review the objectives as outlined in the Constitution and Handbook so that each member may be

impressed with the fact that the Fraternity has important goals which each member, as far as possible, should make an important part of his daily life.

3. The responsibilities of membership should be familiar to each member. These responsibilities are defined very clearly in a special brochure distributed by the Fraternity. They should be reviewed at frequent intervals so that every one is conscious of what is expected of each Kappa Psi Member.

CLOSING REMARKS

In closing this report, I want to commend all of the members but especially the chapter officers who have faithfully supported the Fraternity and cooperated fully with the Central Office during the past two years. We understand that all of you are in college primarily to obtain an education and we also appreciate the fact that the expanded curriculum is becoming more demanding on your time. We know that to serve a chapter well takes time and energy and we often marvel that so many of you serve your chapters so effectively. For this reason we want to pay special tribute to those chapters whose officers always perform their duties as required and who cooperate in every way with the national officers and committees.

During the past two years, I had splendid cooperation on the part of the Grand Officers and various committees. I am especially grateful to the Scholarship, Legislative, Publications, and Executive Committees for their valuable assistance which on various occasions relieved the Central Office of some of the expanding and demanding work. Their willingness to serve the Fraternity at times when their own professional activities were demanding, is greatly appreciated.

To each member of the Fraternity who has contributed in any way, and there are many who had a part in promoting the best interests of Kappa Psi, but especially those whose daily observance of a high standard of personal and professional conduct has brought esteem and honor to the Fraternity, I express the grateful thanks of Alpha Chapter and the Central Office.

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The Newly Elected Third Grand Vice Regent

James P. Vacik

James P. Vacik, the Third Grand Vice Regent, resides at 1434-20th Street South in Fargo, North Dakota, with his wife, Clara, and three children (Jim, 2; Pamella, 4; and Deborah, 6). His initial grade and high school education was obtained in San Pierre, Indiana, and he entered Purdue University in 1949, in the College of Pharmacy. His education was interrupted by the Korean War with a two-year tour of duty in the Army Medical Corps. He returned to Purdue in 1952 and received a B.S. in Pharmacy in 1955. In 1957, he obtained his M.S. in Pharmaceutical Chemistry and in 1959, his Ph.D. in Bionucleonics, both from Purdue University. Within his college, he serves as the American Pharmaceutical Association Student Branch Advisor and

as project director for a Public Health Service sponsored by the Radiation Health Physics Training Program.

Having held a previous office in Pi Chapter as Vice Regent, he affiliated himself with Beta Sigma Chapter early in 1961 and currently serves as a Secretary of the Beta Sigma Chapters Alumni Organization. He is actively engaged in the reorganization of this latter group and aided the alumni group and the active chapter in their efforts to secure a new chapter house on the North Dakota State University campus.

The Newly Elected Grand Historian

Leo A. Sciuchetti

Grand Historian Leo A. Sciuchetti was born in Harrison, Idaho, April 7, 1913. He graduated from the Kellogg (Idaho) High School in 1931. He received the B.S. degree (with honors) from Idaho State University in 1940, the M.S. in pharmacy from Washington State University in 1942, and Ph.D. degree with a major in pharmacognosy from the University of Washington in 1957.

Brother Sciuchetti has had widespread experience as a pharmaceutical educator. He was a laboratory assistant in pharmaceutical chemistry at Idaho State University; a teaching fellow in pharmacy at Washington State University; an instructor in pharmaceutical chemistry at Creighton University, 1942-43; and professor of pharmacy at the Louisville College of Pharmacy, 1943-46. He has been at Oregon State University since 1946 when he was appointed an assistant professor and is presently professor and head of the department of pharmacognosy. He was an AFPE Fellow while working for his doctorate at the University of Washington.

Brother Sciuchetti became a facultate member of Beta Zeta chapter of Kappa Psi in 1948. He has served as Vice Satrap and Satrap of Province X and is presently the Grand Council Deputy of Beta Zeta chapter.

Among the professional and scientific societies that Brother Sciuchetti belongs are: A.A.A.S. (fellow), American Society of Pharmacognosy, American Pharmaceutical Association, Sci. Section of A.Ph.A., Linn-Benton Pharmaceutical Association, Oregon State Pharmaceutical Association (a member of the Board of Trustees), Kentucky Pharmaceutical Association, Phi Kappa Phi, Sigma Xi, Rho Chi, Phi Sigma and the Teachers of Biological Sciences of the AACP. He is a registered pharmacist in Oregon, Washington and Kentucky.

Brother Sciuchetti has been and is still quite active in community affairs. He has served as first aid chairman of the Red Cross, editor of the Garden Gate for the garden club, secretary and president of the local stamp club, secretary-treasurer and president of several bowling leagues, secretary-treasurer of Toastmasters and on the Council of the Oregon State Employees Association. Brother Sciuchetti has over fifty publications including many scientific papers concerning the effect of growth regulators on medicinal plants. The former is a third-year pharmacy student at Oregon State University, and the latter a freshman in the School of Science at the same institution.

The Newly Elected Grand Counselor Gerald C. Henney

Gerald C. Henney, a native of St. Louis, is associate professor of pharmacy administration at the St. Louis College of Pharmacy. Educated in the parochial and public school systems of St. Louis, he received his B.S. degree in pharmacy from the St. Louis College of Pharmacy in 1952. While attending the St. Louis College of Pharmacy, Jerry, as he is best known, was initiated into Gamma Pi Chapter, and served as Regent in 1951. Grand Counselor Henney has worked in various fields of retail pharmacy and is currently consultant to the U.S. Veteran's Administration Hospital on problems of Pharmacy Administration and aids in the supervision of a residency program in hospital pharmacy at the Hospital in St. Louis. A bachelor, he resides at 1519 Swallow Drive in suburban St. Louis.

The Newly Elected Grand Ritualist Richard M. Doughty

Richard M. Doughty, Grand Ritualist, was born December 5, 1921 in Sewickley, Pennsylvania and was graduated from Sewickley High School. He matriculated at the University of Pittsburgh College of Pharmacy in September 1940, but enlisted in the Army and served in the Medics in September 1942. His tour of duty was served in this country, North Africa, and India. Upon discharge he returned to the University of Pittsburgh and received his B.S. and M.S. degrees. He was a graduate assistant at the University of Pittsburgh and in 1951 accepted the position of instructor of pharmacognosy and bacteriology at the University of Kentucky College of Pharmacy. In 1956 he was promoted to assistant professor. He received a fellowship to Indiana University pursuing his Ph.D. degree while on sabbatical leave from the University of Kentucky. He has returned to Kentucky and is in the final stages of completing his Ph.D. at the present time.

Brother Doughty was initiated as a facultate member into Upsilon Chapter of the University of Kentucky in 1951 and acted there as Grand Council Deputy from 1952 until 1958. He was elected Historian of Province IV in 1955 and of Province VII in 1956 when a realignment of provinces was carried out. Brother Doughty's hobbies include horticulture, ornamental fountains, classical music and photography.

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The Newly Elected Second Grand Vice Regent Wallace L. Guess

Wallace L. Guess was born in Durham, North Carolina, July 18, 1924. He attended the University of North Carolina for two years and after transferring to the University of Texas he received the B.S. in pharmacy in 1949. In 1951 he received the M.S. degree from the University of Texas and the Ph.D. degree from the University of Washington in 1959. Brother Guess has been a member of the faculty at the University of Texas since 1949 and presently holds the rank of Associate Professor in Pharmacy. Dr. Guess is a member of APhA, Sigma Xi, Rho Chi, Texas Pharmaceutical Association, and the Austin Pharmaceutical Association. 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Is The Future of Fraternities Secure?*

We find ourselves in a Southern city rich in heritage, bursting with history, a leader in many ways of American life and an example of friendliness and cordiality that is absent in many of our American cities. These same traits are very much a part of the fraternal existence of Kappa Psi, and other fraternities as well. The purposes for which all fraternities exist were formulated by their founders with the ideals of 'togetherness' and 'academic accomplishment' as the very minimum essentials. Have these minimum essentials been effective?

The simple 'Test of Time' has shown that fraternities as a mass have made contributions to the development of most of its membership and to the very campus life to which it is so closely allied in purpose and indebted for its mere presence.

Since a fraternity is an organization composed of humans, there have to be variables in the various chapters on various campuses which reflect right up to the national level. Some chapters of any fraternity are weak as compared to other fraternity chapters on the same campus. They can be weak numerically, morally, spiritually, purposefully—no fraternity stays long on a campus which does not correct these things quickly. Here we find the familiar 'Survival-of-The-Fittest' existing.

The purpose of this paper is to acquaint you with some of the 'Affirmative' and 'Negative' statements which are and have been used in an attempt to justify the existence or the death of the fraternity system. Any attack on any *one* fraternity or the *purpose* of the fraternity system is an attack on the fraternity system as a whole. In the battle, any inroads gained by those who would wish fraternities outlawed will ultimately affect the existence of all. Likewise, all successful efforts to justify the existence of fraternities increase their longevity. I hope you will listen attentively while I try to collect for you the *Pro* and *Con* arguments for the very existence of fraternities.

I challenge you to consider them seriously, but most of all, to take any ideas gleaned from this presentation back to your chapter and be an ambassador for the perpetuation of the fraternity system. You owe it to yourself and your brothers to keep informed on this vital issue of our times.

At the outset, let me acknowledge use of material which was gathered freely from the following publications:

- 1) *The Interfraternity Research and Advisory Council Reports*
- 2) *The Mask*, a publication of Kappa Psi Pharmaceutical Fraternity
- 3) *The Phi Gamma Delta*, a publication of Phi Gamma Delta Fraternity

- 6) *Baird's Manual of American College Fraternities*, 17th Edition, 1963

Let us start our critical evaluation with some basic information:

- 1) Kappa Psi is one of approximately 60 National fraternities on about 500 different campuses around the U.S.
- 2) Did you know that you are one of about 2,500,000 fraternity men on campus in about 4500 chapters?
- 3) On campuses where fraternities remain the center of social life and/or provide housing for the majority, the fraternity has not been subjected to severe criticism.
- 4) In addition to the various national fraternity offices, the organization most organized and capable of directing the fight for the fraternity system is called the Interfraternity Research and Advisory Council (hereafter referred to as the IRAC). It is composed (for organizational purposes) of four major groups:
 - a) National Interfraternity Conference (NIC)
 - b) National Panhellenic Conference (NPC)
 - c) Professional Interfraternity Conference (PIC)
 - d) Professional Panhellenic Association (PPA)

We have to be honest with ourselves—and as such make certain admissions. The so-called

'Liberal' attackers of the fraternity system and certain college administrations are constantly making progress because alumni and certain chapters have not remained modern or contributed to academic life of the student or college. Just participating in homecoming activities and having purely social events (however moderate or boisterous) is not enough to remain on campus today. Where fraternities are constantly undergoing self-evaluation—on such campuses as Gettysburg, Georgia Tech, Indiana, Oklahoma State, Washington State and North Dakota, to name a few—they are strong and are recognized by the academic administration. Some colleges recognize the valuable past contribution of fraternities in an effort to make them stronger—examples are Bowdoin, Syracuse, Duke, Cincinnati and Hampden-Sydney. Rutgers University has a committee composed of undergraduates, faculty, and alumni, representatives of fraternity and non-fraternity men who are making a thorough study of the future of fraternities on that campus.

Fraternities had their beginnings on college campuses—therefore, their aims and those of the schools must be inter-related. They were founded to encourage their members socially, spiritually, scholastically, professionally. Need it be said that the only people to benefit from such an association will be the fraternity, other associated fraternities, the college or university, the community, the nation and even the world. There will certainly be a proportionate harvest to the interest and effort put into one's fraternity life.

There should never be competition between a college and a fraternity for a student's talents. Rather, only as a result of the student's demonstration of academic proficiency should fraternities be allowed to bid for the student. First things must come first. The basic, the fundamental, the *MOST* important reason for attending a college or university is scholastic improvement and advancement. *Anything* that in any way hinders, obstructs or interferes with this primary objective should be eliminated. The student must use judgment and will power so that there is never the conflict of scholarship and social life. Demands of academics, leadership, social musts and human service tax the best undergraduate and take a great deal of time in administration rather than activity. Mass rushing, building expansion, large membership increases often work to the detriment of a chapter.

THE REACTION OF COLLEGES

Colleges do not appear 'out-to-get' the fraternity as long as the fraternity can contribute something to both the student and the college. Where fraternities have not responded to the challenge, they are eliminated. Fraternities must develop better selection programs, give more thorough pledge training, encourage and help develop leadership, stress the importance of good scholarship, encourage good conduct, help inspire the spiritual bondage, develop loyalty in meeting obligations, and provide desirable housing facilities when possible.

Listen to some quotes from several schools on the subject:

Colgate University: ". . . Whether the fraternity system responds to the challenge inherent in being a part of a forward-looking educational institution, or instead allows itself to become an 'active anachronism' . . . is a responsibility of the fraternities themselves. My guess would be that the University policy will be decisively shaped by the nature of that response."

University of Pennsylvania: "The future of fraternities on this campus will be determined by the fraternities themselves, and in particular by their demonstrated ability to contribute positively to high academic standards, good social behavior, and constructive extracurricular activities. They will also have non-discriminatory membership procedures, maintain a sound financial structure, satisfactory housing conditions, sanitary kitchen and health arrangements, be responsible residents of our University community neighborhood, and foster continued interest in the University by the alumni. . . . The University must constantly strive to see that the non-classroom environment is conducive to the over-all intellectual growth and maturation of its students; thus, it has and will continue to be anxious to be as helpful as possible in guiding and assisting student organizations including fraternities in their efforts to contribute to an appropriate environment. As a practical matter the effectiveness of fraternities in such endeavors is the greatest assurance which the fraternities may give themselves concerning their continued role as an influential factor at Pennsylvania."

From a "Survey of Social Fraternities and Sororities on Catholic College Campuses in the United States 1962-1963":

". . . If the national fraternities continue to hire outstanding trained field and executive secretaries, and if they give them more authority, there is no doubt that a bright new era of fraternity life in the colleges of this country is about to arrive. We are sure that student personnel workers, administrators, and the associations will welcome these men as partners in the college student personnel program. In this way we see a real future for fraternities in the latter part of this century. . . ."

Here we see the understanding viewpoint of two colleges and a survey. Now let us hear from a university which has not had such a favorable fraternity-administrative experience.

Brown University (1963): ". . . In four years they must raise the academic average of their members to the over-all college average, stabilize their own programs in accordance with 'the central

purposes of the university,' and register a minimum of 50 members (which none now do): Should any fail to meet all three requirements, it will be disbanded.

"University officials say they hope the fraternities will rise to the challenge, and provide more of the strength of the college in the future."

President Dr. Edward D. Eddy, Jr., long anti-fraternity, feels that historically fraternities have served a most useful purpose but in today's campus atmosphere they should be given a decent, respectable burial. He feels that fraternities have not adapted themselves to the new type student or to the changing social pattern. He suggests that intellectual centers such as found at Bowdoin College and planned at Williams College are preferable to the fraternity system.

THE AFFIRMATIVE SIDE

At this juncture, let us concisely list some of the more weighty arguments and suggestions for the perpetuation of the fraternity system.

1. The ratio of campus to private housing will decrease as enrollments increase, thus a greater need for fraternity housing.
2. The fraternity graduates a larger percentage than non-fraternity.
3. Institutions with no fraternities have a lower rate of graduates.
4. Institutions with national fraternities have a higher rate of graduates than schools with only local fraternities.
5. The fraternity system provides a majority of campus leaders.
6. Fraternity grades are generally above the average campus level (3% of schools with fraternities on campus show that the fraternity average is higher than the non-fraternity average).
7. Fraternity men support their alma maters in larger numbers and financially greater than non-fraternity men.

In order to reinforce these PRO's for the fraternity system, different sources have suggested that fraternities meet this challenge of school authority and outside sources by:

1. Establishing new educational, social, cultural & intellectual roles for its group.
2. Recognizing the many variables in a student body—single students, in-house livers, commuting students, married students, etc. is more essential (even to differentiating memberships, dues, privileges and responsibilities).
3. Doing a real public relations job by promoting seminars for their group and with others.
4. Concentrating on high level social, scholarship and speaker programs.
5. Keeping their membership *informed* accurately and timely with information on subjects that affect all fraternity life.
6. Doing a critical evaluation *periodically* of its function and progress.

You may be interested to know that a survey at Pennsylvania State of over 1000 students (fraternity and non-fraternity) showed that both groups overwhelmingly agreed that—

1. fraternities serve a useful purpose in the lives of all students
2. there were sufficient social activities for all groups
3. Depreciation of the academic experience
4. less than 10% felt that fraternities should be abolished

THE NEGATIVE SIDE

And now let's explore briefly the arguments advanced by so-called 'liberals' and some higher academic sources.

They are namely:

1. Unconstitutional discriminatory practices
2. Financial irresponsibility
3. Childish antics
4. Depreciation of the academic experience
5. Poor image created by its history
6. The need for fraternities has vanished

No one would be so naive as to say that in certain places at certain times the fraternal system has not lost prestige because of one of the above. Unfortunately the small group with an 'ax-to-grind' can muster more followers quicker and make more noise temporarily than a large, loyal, organized body. The pharmaceutical profession has, within the last two years, experienced such a damaging attack. It caused the profession to take stock of itself, organize and now it must sell itself to the public as a most honorable and respectable profession.

We, however, can say that the attacks noted above on the fraternity system have been examined and, in most cases, have been corrected so that an attack on the system as a whole is no longer valid. Each fraternity man must rededicate himself to the true purposes of the fraternity

system and equip himself with the logical, truthful arguments which justify its existence and expansion.

Here are three statements that none of us can afford to miss—

In a February address, President Harlan Hatcher of the University of Michigan stated, "I have always sponsored fraternities as an important and significant part of the life and tradition of the University; . . ." He noted irresponsible rowdiness, separation of fraternities from the main stream of college life, and 'Hell Week' as the matters of chief concern years ago, which are no longer serious problems. He cited such characteristics as selectivity, congeniality, discipline, loyalty, university citizenship and interest in important activities as laudable traits encouraged by fraternities. Dr. Hatcher cited booze, women, athletics and bias as the 'impregnable quadrilateral' which needs careful scrutiny. Dr. Hatcher then suggested four things fraternities should do—

- 1) get out of the bias controversy
- 2) plan carefully for fraternity growth
- 3) better atmosphere in fraternity houses
- 4) consideration of 'house mothers' for frat houses

Mr. Nathaniel Leverone, chairman of the Board of Automatic Canteen Company of America, a Phi Beta Kappa, and a fellow fraternity brother in Phi Gamma Delta, a Dartmouth alumnus and a loyal fraternity man feels the greatest menace of our time is mediocrity. He states "A demoralizing force has struck at the very roots of the American way of life. It brainwashes the young, it destroys initiative in industry, it frustrates the ambitious, it impedes our nation's progress, and it is a threat to our very existence in years to come. This force is the enthronement of mediocrity as the pattern to which all must conform.—We would expect this acceptance of mediocrity in a communistic or socialistic nation because that is the end result of oppression and extreme regimentation. But in a nation whose foundations rest on free enterprise and individual initiative, it is an astounding retrogression.—Mediocrity is contrary to nature's laws, and, far from ever being a goal to attain, must be considered a dire fate to be avoided at all costs."

President Rand P. Hollenback of the Professional Interfraternity Council states, "The PIC is conducting a survey of its member fraternities to obtain information regarding personnel and financial statistics, public relations problems and activities, central office operations, publications, etc., which should be of considerable value to these member fraternities.—On the subject of discriminatory clauses in organizations' constitutions that have been a source of so much difficulty, our Conference finds this is no longer an issue.—However, it is our belief that we have much in common with all Greek letter groups and that these common factors make it very necessary for all four Conferences to work together within the framework of IRAC.

The PIC Officers believe that the future existence of its chapters will be determined by their usefulness at a college or university. This usefulness to be determined by value and service to the individual member, the educational institution and the profession it serves."

We have cited the Pro's and Con's of the fraternity system problem with the hope that you will sincerely study them, discuss them and use them. We are Brothers in Kappa Psi today, but there are people all about us who are working diligently, by any method at their disposal, to destroy the fraternal system of which we are a part. Any advance by any group of outsiders makes us all vulnerable to an ultimate attack. Our best DEFENSE IS A STRONG OFFENSE. The fraternity system, in my opinion, depends upon what it can contribute to the student and the college *over-and-above* all past contributions.

Province III Assembly

The Province III Assembly was held on November 2, 1963, in the student's lounge of the Residence Halls of the Medical College of Virginia, Richmond, Virginia. Vice Satrap John Andrako presided over the meeting in the absence of Satrap Art Hermann, who is serving in the armed forces. Following the invocation, Regent Harrison Fridley of the host chapter, Theta, extended greetings to the assembled delegates. Representatives from the following chapters were present: Theta, Beta Eta, Gamma Xi, Beta Xi, Gamma Tau, and the South Carolina Graduate Chapter.

Following the reports of officers, the remainder of the morning session was highlighted by a talk from Grand-Secretary-Treasurer Frank H. Eby. Dr. Eby discussed the responsibilities of the Chapters to the Province and of the Province to the Chapters. Dr. Eby stated that the purpose of the Province meetings was for Chapters in the same geographical area to gather together to discuss mutual problems. He made the following recommendations to make the Province more effective:

- (1) Have a nominating committee
- (2) Have some objective
- (3) Have meetings annually rather than biennially
- (4) Publish a newsletter.

A motion was made and seconded that the next meeting be held in the spring of 1964 (exact date to be decided later). The motion carried.

The first session adjourned at 12:00 noon. The delegates reassembled for a luncheon at Wright's Townhouse in Richmond.

When the second session convened, Vice Satrap Andrako called for reports of the chapters. The reports of the activities and accomplishments of the represented chapters indicated they had an active and successful two years. Vice Satrap Andrako then introduced Dr. Franklin Bacon, dean of students at the Medical College of Virginia. Dean Bacon discussed the duties of his office as it pertained to professional fraternities such as Kappa Psi.

The report of the Time and Place Committee was given by Brother Richard Knapp. Some changes were made in the order of rotation decided upon at the 1959 meeting. The next meeting will be held at the University of South Carolina in the Spring of 1964.

The report of the resolutions committee was presented by Brother Wayne Pettit. The resolutions were discussed and accepted as amended by the delegates. Outstanding resolutions were those concerning a Province III Newsletter, annual meetings instead of biennial, and that officers elected would serve until the meeting in 1964, at which time there will be another election.

Vice Satrap Andrako then called for the report of the nominations previously presented to the secretary by the various chapters. There were no nominations made from the floor. The following officers were elected: Satrap, Robert L. Beamer (U.S.C.); Vice Satrap, James E. Wynn (Theta); Secretary, William S. Cameron (Beta Xi); Treasurer, Charles W. Hite (Beta Xi);* Historian, John W. Bailey (Beta Xi).

Vice Satrap Andrako then turned the meeting over to incoming Satrap Beamer. There being no further business to come before the Assembly, the meeting adjourned at 5:00 P.M.

* NOTE: Dr. Fred Semeniuk of Chapel Hill, N.C., was elected to the office of Treasurer. However, he chose to decline the position. Therefore the position was passed on to Charles Hite, who was second in the balloting.

Brother Melvin Gibson Elected President of American Society of Pharmacognosy

Members of the American Society of Pharmacognosy in an election by mail ballot have recently elected Dr. Melvin Gibson, professor of pharmacognosy at Washington State University, as president for 1964-1965. Dr. Gibson will assume his new duties following the Society's annual meeting which will be in Pittsburgh in June, 1964.

Dr. Gibson is a native of Nebraska and he received his B.S. in Pharmacy at the University of Nebraska in 1942. He received an M.S. from that institution in 1947 and in 1949 he received the Ph.D. degree in pharmacognosy from the University of Illinois. While at Illinois he was a Fellow of the American Foundation for Pharmaceutical Education. From 1942 to 1945 Gibson served as an officer, rising to the rank of Captain, in the Pacific Theater of Operations. Gibson holds both the Purple Heart and the Bronze Star.

In 1949 Brother Gibson was appointed assistant professor of pharmacognosy at Washington State University. In 1952 he was promoted to associate profes-


sor and in 1955 to full professor. Dr. Gibson made an outstanding contribution to pharmaceutical education when he accepted the editorship of the *American Journal of Pharmaceutical Education* in 1956. During five years in that position he made numerous improvements in format and content of that journal and much credit is due Dr. Gibson for the outstanding job he performed as editor. In 1960-1962 Brother Gibson was a member of the Executive Committee of the American Association of Colleges of Pharmacy. He has served as a member of the Committee on Education of the Pan-American Federation of Pharmacy and Biochemistry. In 1961 he received the Grand Council Award from Kappa Psi Pharmaceutical Fraternity for his outstanding contributions to pharmacy. In 1962 Dr. Gibson was one of eighteen senior scientists in the U.S. to be a Senior Visiting Fellow in Science in Europe by the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development. His advanced study was at the University of Leyden, Holland, and the Royal Pharmaceutical Institute in Stockholm, Sweden, during a seven month visit in Europe.

Honorary Brother Howard C. Newton Dies

All pharmacy mourned the sudden passing of Dean Howard C. Newton of the Massachusetts College of Pharmacy on January 5, 1964. He was 71.

Dedicated pharmacist, educator and administrator, Dean Newton exemplified throughout his life that: "A quitter never wins, A winner never quits."

A native of Southborough, Massachusetts, he received the degrees of Graduate in Pharmacy in 1914 and Doctor of Pharmacy in 1940 from M.C.P. He also earned the degrees of Bachelor of Philosophy, Bachelor of Science, and Master of Arts at Creighton University.

From 1916 to 1935, Dr. Newton served as dean of the Creighton University College of Pharmacy. He held that position at M.C.P. from 1936 until his death.

Dean Newton was president of the A.A.C.P., 1942-1943; president of the A.Ph.A., 1959-1960; and had been serving as president of the A.Ph.A. Foundation and as a member of the A.Ph.A. Council since 1960. A fellow of the American College of Apothecaries and of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, he had received many honors during his long and active professional career. On October 17, 1962, a new laboratory building at M.C.P. was dedicated in his name.



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
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
