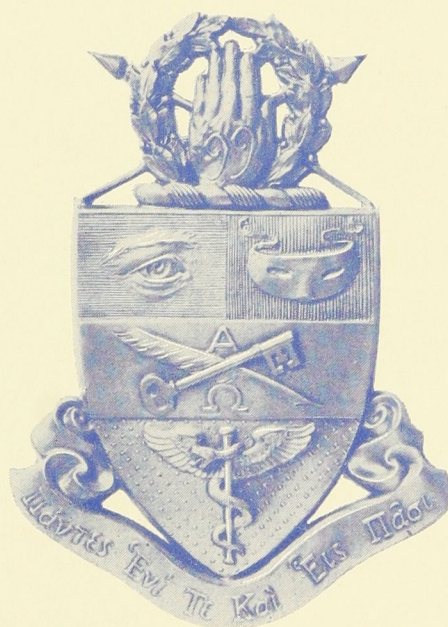

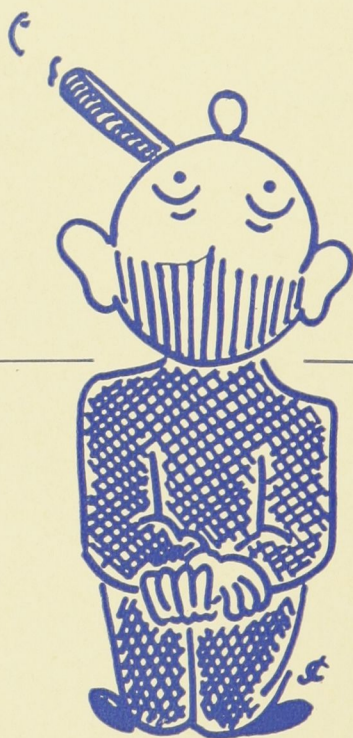

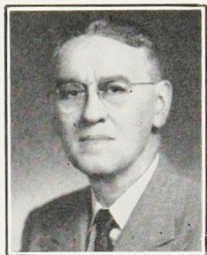
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# From the Desk of the Grand Regent

## CHAPTER VISITATIONS

March, April, and May were busy months for the Grand Regent. Fraternity activities in which he participated included chapter visitations, attendance at Province Assemblies, installation of new chapters and attendance at an important meeting of the Professional Interfraternity Conference in Washington, D.C., all involving about eight thousand miles of travel. Because so many affairs were attended, descriptions of some activities will be brief and descriptions of others will appear under separate titles in this issue of *THE MASK*.

It is with considerable pride that I report a fine spirit of loyalty and devotion to the principles of Kappa Psi in every chapter I visited.

On March 10, the Grand Regent and Mrs. Eby departed from Philadelphia for what we hoped would be a combined vacation and tour of chapters in the warm and sunny south. Before we returned home almost two weeks later we had seen more snow than we had in Philadelphia all winter and more rain than on any previous trip in the south. The winter clothes we had hoped to discard south of Richmond were worn with comfort on our return to Philadelphia although we did enjoy about three warm days in Mississippi, Alabama and Florida. The warmth of our reception by the chapters we visited compensated for the unpleasant weather and the hospitality by our good southern brothers will always be remembered.

Our first stop on March 10 occurred at Richmond where we had dinner with Grand Vice Regent Milton L. Neuroth and Mrs. Neuroth, charming people whose company we always enjoy. Important fraternity matters were discussed following the dinner.

On the morning of March 12, we arrived in Athens, Georgia, where we had a pleasant visit with Dean Kenneth L. Waters and Brother Woodrow R. Byrum of the faculty of the University of Georgia School of Pharmacy. Dean Waters kindly conducted us on a tour of inspection of the Pharmacy building which is being modernized and when completed will have fine new Pharmacology and Dispensing Pharmacy Laboratories. We had a pleasant discussion on fraternity matters which may lead eventually to the development of a Kappa Psi Chapter at this old southern University.

During the afternoon of March 12, we arrived in Atlanta and called on acting Dean M. M. Meyer of the Southern College of Pharmacy. We enjoyed a tour of the Pharmacy building with Dean Meyer and Mr. Joseph N. Sedor of the Faculty and later with these two fine hosts and Mr. Robert Oliver (Psi), Lilly representative in Atlanta, we had dinner at Emile's. In the evening we discussed fraternity matters with a group of students who are interested in organizing a chapter of Kappa Psi in the Southern College of Pharmacy.

Leaving Atlanta for Memphis, we encountered our first touch of southern winter and during this and the following day, saw considerable snow. On the way to Memphis we had the pleasure of visiting Charles E. Wilson (Sigma) in his fine store in Corinth, Mississippi. Brother Wilson was assistant Editor of *THE MASK* for many years and has always been a loyal Kappa Psi member.

Grand Vice Regent Karl J. Goldner was on hand to welcome us on our arrival in Memphis on the afternoon of March 14. It is always a pleasure to visit Brother Goldner who has directed the activities of Psi Chapter at the University of Tennessee for many years. We also spent a pleasant hour with Brother William B. Swafford, G.C.D., former Psi Regent and now a member of the Pharmacy Faculty. A well attended dinner in the evening permitted the Grand Regent to meet and speak to most of the members of Psi Chapter and some of the pledges. Memphis hospitality is always fine and this visit with Psi chapter showed no exception.

At the University of Mississippi on March 15, the grand weather for which Dean E. L. Hammond claimed responsibility, made the visit to "Ole Miss" and Beta Rho Chapter just about perfect. During the afternoon while the Grand Regent spent some time at the School of Pharmacy and at the home of Brother John L. Voight, Mrs. Eby was a guest of the wives of the Faculty members at a tea held in the home of Mrs. W. W. Johnson. A dinner meeting held in one of the University buildings during the early evening was a very delightful affair. In addition to the members of the chapter and a number of

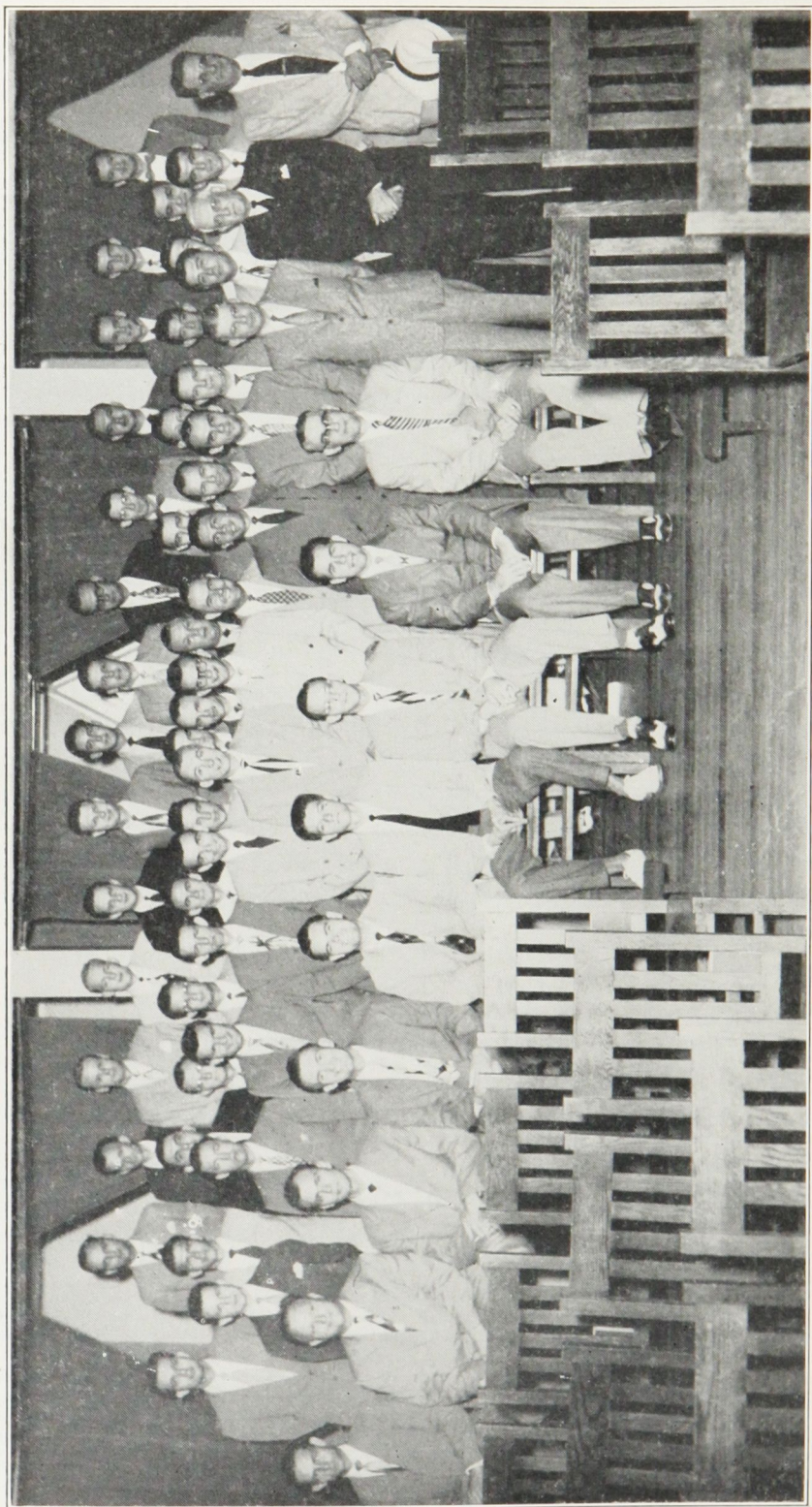

We should all try to select, for inclusion in our quarterly, that material and information which is of significance and of greatest importance as we see it.

Grand Historian Nicholas W. Fenney has been searching for years for information concerning the early history of Kappa Psi. He has gathered a large amount of material and has organized it well. Brother Fenney deserves a lot of credit for his diligence and hard work.

Let's hope that other Grand Historians and all other members will have less trouble in the somewhat distant future when they attempt to locate and compile historical data of the mid-Twentieth Century, whether these data have to do with individuals, Grand Officer visitations, Collegiate or Graduate Chapters, Provinces, National Grand Council Conventions, or any other phases of Kappa Psi activity.

Supplying material for inclusion in THE MASK should not be left exclusively to Chapter Historians and Secretaries, Grand Officers, and a few others. Every single member, regardless of his station, should consider THE MASK as his publication. At the same time every member should feel free to submit material for publishing at any and all times. It will be welcomed. This office will also welcome, from the Brothers, suggestions of ways of improving our quarterly.

# Installation of Gamma Phi Chapter, University of Georgia

On May 23, 1951 Grand Regent Frank H. Eby presented the charter and installed Gamma Phi Chapter, Kappa Psi Pharmaceutical Fraternity at the University of Georgia, School of Pharmacy in Athens.

Plans for the organization of the chapter began shortly after the Grand Regent visited the University of Georgia on March 12 while on a tour of Kappa Psi chapters in the southern states. The application for a charter was received in the Central Office early in May and it was approved promptly by the Grand Officers and Legislative Committee. Much of the credit for organizing Gamma Phi Chapter goes to one of our very loyal brothers, Dr. Woodrow R. Byrum, head of the Department of Pharmacology in the School of Pharmacy. Dean Kenneth L. Waters gave valuable assistance and a number of students including D. O. Pearce, Jr., Don Hall, and Ray D. Webb made valuable contributions and devoted much time to preliminary ground work in organizing the large group of charter members.

The installation of the forty-fourth active Collegiate Chapter of Kappa Psi was an important part of the Sesquicentennial Pharmacy Day exercises at the University of Georgia. The dedication of the new Pharmacy School Laboratories took place in the morning, the installation of the Gamma Phi Chapter occurred during the afternoon and the Third Annual Student-Faculty-Alumni Day dinner and presentation of awards was held during the evening. Many prominent persons were present and had a part in the exercises of the day which was probably one of the most important in the history of this well-known School of Pharmacy.

The installation exercises were held at 2:30 P.M. in the Parish House of the Episcopal Church. Grand Regent Eby reviewed the history of Kappa Psi Fraternity, then presented the charter to Regent D. O. Pearce, Jr., and Brother Byrum. The charter contains the names of the following collegiate and facultate members:

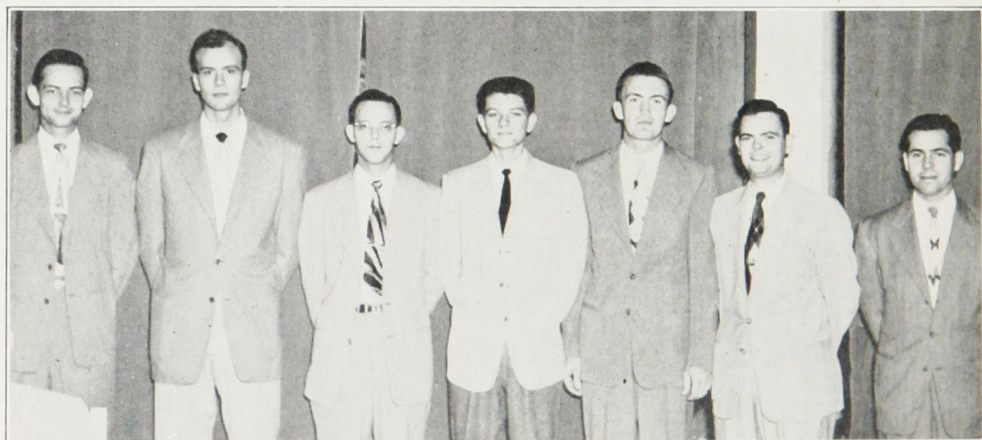

The Grand Regent reviewed the ritual of initiation and other parts of the ritual and administered the Vow of Allegiance to the Charter Members and the following Graduate Members: Charles H. Evans, Jr., H. L. Chichester, Jr., Tom Deen, and W. A. Blasingame. Two other candidates for Graduate Membership were absent.

Membership certificates, copies of the Constitution, and Kappa Psi badges were presented to the new members by Regent Pearce and Grand Regent Eby, and this completed the first session of the chapter installation exercises.

A second session was held later in the afternoon when a detailed review of the Kappa Psi Constitution was given and the government of Kappa Psi Fraternity was explained by the Grand Regent.

In the evening following the Student-Faculty-Alumni dinner, a third session was held with members of the degree team, the present officers and the officers-elect in attendance. To the degree team, Grand Regent Eby explained the manner in which the degree is presented and demonstrated the work relating to this part of the ritual. The officers received information relative to their regular and special duties. Special emphasis was placed on the importance of the duties of the most important committees and the new officers were instructed how to proceed in conducting the affairs of the chapter on their return to college next fall.

It will be of special interest to all brothers in Kappa Psi to learn that many of the new brothers are outstanding students and a number of them have made contributions of considerable importance on the campus of the University of Georgia. Michael E. Stebler is the Valedictorian of the Class of 1951, University of Georgia, the first time a student in the School of Pharmacy has attained this distinguished honor. Brother Stebler is also a member of Rho Chi Society as are Brothers M. H. Belcher, Jr., J. Dennis Sullivan, Chester A. Hanberry, H. L. Sutton, Jimmy Thomas, Creed Taylor, Robert W. Robbins, Herman B. Daniell, Milton I. Johnson, Jr., C. Ray Ivey, Jr., and William H. Sharpe. J. Dennis Sullivan is Past President of Rho Chi; Ray D. Webb is Vice Chairman of the Student Council, Robert W. Robbins is Editor of the Student publication *The Georgian Pharmacist*, and his assistants include Dennis Sullivan, Michael E. Stebler, Creed Taylor, Milton I. Johnson, Jr., M. H. Belcher, C. R. Ivey, Jr., and Emory Daniell.

While it has been the pleasure of the Grand Regent to install a number of new chapters of Kappa Psi Fraternity, at no time has he met a more outstanding group of fine young men. With their excellent spirit and the fine leadership of the Regent-elect, Don Hall and the excellent faculty supervision which they will receive from Brother Woodrow R. Byrum, Gamma Phi Chapter should be one of Kappa Psi's strongest chapters within the next several years.

The Grand Regent is especially grateful to Brother Byrum who did so many kind things to help make the visit to the University of Georgia so very delightful. Dean Kenneth Waters was a splendid host and although the Sesquicentennial program kept him busy, his interest in the new chapter was one of the factors which helped to make the installation so successful. To Brothers D. O. Pearce, Jr., the first chapter Regent, Don Hall, the Secretary and Regent-elect, and to the other new chapter members who had a part, however small, in the installation of Gamma Phi Chapter, I express my appreciation and thanks.

# Installation of Gamma Phi Chapter at the University of Georgia

A hale and hearty "hello" to all you Kappa Psis everywhere from Gamma Phi—the newest chapter of the fraternity—here at The University of Georgia—"the oldest chartered state university"—in Athens "the classic city"—Georgia—"the Empire state of the South." We had the good fortune and great pleasure to become the forty-fourth active collegiate chapter of Kappa Psi on the now historical date of May 23, 1951, under the leadership and guidance of Dr. Frank H. Eby, Grand Regent.

It all started in March of this year when Grand Regent Eby visited our school and talked casually with Dr. Woodrow R. Byrum, head of our Department of Pharmacology and Pharmacognosy, and then the only Kappa Psi member on the campus, concerning the possibility of establishing a chapter here at our school of pharmacy. Plans remained dormant until the first of May when a group of students approached Dr. Byrum with the same thought in mind. A telephone call to Grand Secretary-Treasurer Ray S. Kelley brought forth the information that time was rather short but that he would do his best to assist us in obtaining approval from the legislative committee of the Grand Council for the establishment of a chapter. Then, overnight, with the gusto of a hurricane, a small group of interested students circulated over the school and spread the gospel of Kappa Psi. The prospect of establishing a chapter here on the campus met with very enthusiastic response on the part of the student body and a charter group of fifty-nine students was selected. After something less than five hundred air-mail specials, telegrams, and telephone calls, the plans were crystallized and we were informed that Brother Eby could be here on the 23rd to present the charter and install the Chapter. This was perhaps the fastest action in the history of Kappa Psi pertaining to the establishment and installation of a chapter. The installation fitted in very nicely with other activities planned for the day. May 23 is the date of the annual Student-Faculty-Alumni Banquet, and the observance of Robert Cumming Wilson Day.

Dr. Eby arrived on the campus on Wednesday morning just in time to hear the chapel address by Dr. George D. Beal, president of the American Council on Pharmaceutical Education, entitled "Fifty Years' Progress in Pharmacy." This address was part of the Pharmacy School's contribution to the Sesquicentennial Celebration of the University. After the chapel address, Dr. Eby was present for the dedication of the newly completed facilities of the Pharmacy School. Then he was entertained at a luncheon given by Dean Waters for the guests of the School of Pharmacy who were on the campus for the festivities.

That afternoon at 2:30 P.M. we all gathered at the Parish House of the Episcopal Church—a nice quiet place suitable to the gravity of the occasion—where Dr. Eby administered the installation ritual. He first of all presented the Charter to Dr. Byrum and Regent D. O. Pearce. Then, after a few well chosen words as to the history of Kappa Psi, he installed the charter officers: Regent, D. O. Pearce; Vice Regent, H. L. Chichester, Jr.; Secretary, Ray Webb; Assistant Secretary, James Dorsey; Treasurer, Don Hall; Historian, Dennis Sullivan; and Chaplain, Robert Robbins.

After the installation of the charter officers, Dr. Eby discussed the constitution of Kappa Psi and instructed us on the government of the Fraternity. Then, after a brief intermission to the Prince Avenue Soda Shop for refreshments from the heat, we completed the remainder of the ritual which included the taking of the oath. With the group repeating the Fraternity Code of Ethics, we were dismissed until the banquet.



The banquet was held in Snelling Hall on the South Campus of the University of Georgia at 7:00 P.M. The meal consisted of stuffed pork chops with all the trimmings. Regent D. O. Pearce was the master of ceremonies and did a fine job of introducing the speakers and what-have-you.

After the banquet, the newly installed officers—as well as Dr. Byrum and a few more who were interested—met with Brother Eby for another session to discuss the finer points of the ritual and to find out their specific duties for the different offices. That brought to a close a day full of activity of which every minute was enjoyed. Brother Eby endeared himself to everyone with his jovial mannerisms and his devotion to Kappa Psi. He is truly a fine man and we feel that Kappa Psi is very lucky to have a person of his character as their Grand Regent.

Gamma Phi Chapter has great plans for the future and although—as with all new organizations—our treasury is still limited, we hope to start the next quarter off with a bang. Since most of the Charter officers are graduating Seniors, we have already elected the new officers for the coming year. They are: Regent, Don Hall; Vice Regent, Ray Webb; Secretary, George Lipscomb; Treasurer, Joe Maxwell; Historian, John Matthews; and Chaplain, Bill Gausman.

We would like to publicly express our sincere appreciation to all the chapters of Kappa Psi for their congratulatory messages and telegrams. The thoughts and sentiments which were expressed were very nice and we want to thank you and invite each of you to come down to Dixieland to see us. Also we would like to thank Dean Waters whose cooperation was of invaluable aid to the cause.\*

Although our Chapter is the “baby” of the group, we hope that we can grow into an organization which will stack up with the finest in turning out good Pharmacists.

Until we see you again—“Here’s to Kappa Psi, a great organization.”

### A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE UNIVERSITY OF GEORGIA

The University of Georgia was incorporated by an Act of the General Assembly on January 27, 1785. In the preceding year the General Assembly had set aside 40,000 acres of land to endow a college or seminary of learning. Georgia was the first state to provide for the establishment of a state-supported University.

The first meeting of the Board of Trustees was held in Augusta on February 13, 1786. At this meeting the trustees selected Abraham Baldwin as president of the University. Baldwin, a native of Connecticut and a graduate of Yale University, had come to Georgia in 1784. It was he who drafted the charter adopted by the General Assembly.

The University was not actually established until 1801. In that year a committee of the Board of Trustees selected a site for the new institution. John Milledge, later a governor of the state, purchased the site chosen, a tract of 663 acres on the banks of the Oconee River in northeast Georgia and gave it to the Board of Trustees. In the fall of 1801 Josiah Meigs was named president of the University and work was begun on the first building. This building, originally called Franklin College in honor of Benjamin Franklin, is still standing and is now known as Old College. The University opened its doors to students in 1801 and graduated its first class in 1804.

The teaching and research work of the University is now carried on by eleven colleges and schools and by two divisions that are integral parts of the University. These colleges and schools and the dates of their establishment as separate administrative units are as follows: College of Arts and Sciences, 1801; School of Law, 1859; School of Pharmacy, 1903; College of Agriculture, 1906; School of Forestry, 1906; College of Education, 1908; Graduate School, 1910; College of Business Administration, 1912; School of Journalism, 1915; School of Home Economics, 1933; School of Veterinary Medicine, 1946. The Atlanta Division and the Division of General Extension were incorporated into the University, July 1, 1947.

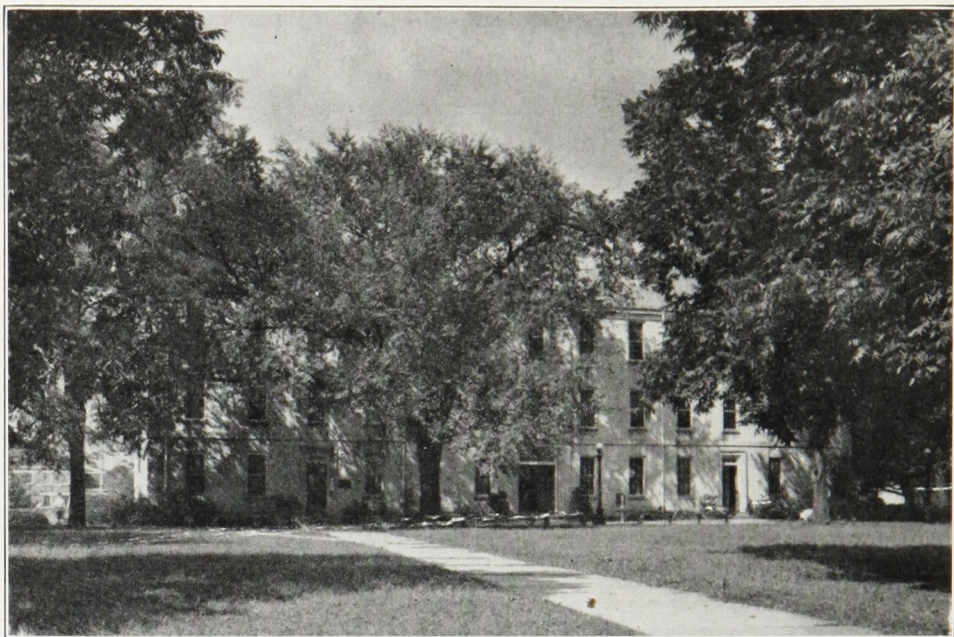

SCHOOL OF PHARMACY, UNIVERSITY OF GEORGIA

## History of the School of Pharmacy, University of Georgia

The School of Pharmacy of the University of Georgia was created by the Board of Trustees in June, 1903. The first dean was Dr. Samuel C. Benedict, a practicing physician of Athens. At this time Arthur J. Palmer, an Athen's pharmacist was elected as Professor of Pharmacy.

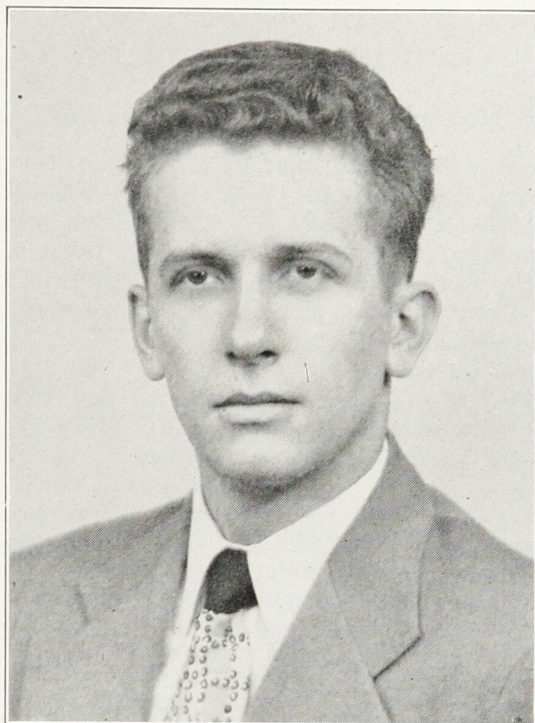
In 1907, the Board of Trustees decided to employ the first full time staff member. This position was offered to Robert C. Wilson, a pharmacist in Athens. Dean Wilson as he is now known, accepted the position and on the death of Dr. Benedict, was appointed Dean of the School of Pharmacy.

In 1926 the School of Pharmacy discontinued the two year course of study and instituted a four year program leading to the degree of Bachelor of Science in Pharmacy. The success of the school both in physical growth and in academic standards is a tribute to the fine leadership of Dean Wilson.

The School of Pharmacy holds membership in the American Association of Colleges of Pharmacy and is accredited by the American Council on Pharmaceutical Education. The primary function of the school is to train young men and women for positions of responsibility in retail and other branches of pharmacy. The academic and allied scientific courses are coordinated with those of other departments of the University which makes it possible to give thorough and practical training in all subjects related to pharmacy.

In the fall of 1948, Dr. Kenneth L. Waters was appointed dean of the School of Pharmacy and Dr. Wilson became Dean Emeritus and retired the following summer. Under Dean Water's leadership a new curriculum has been adopted and additional courses including accounting and veterinary products are now included. In January 1951 work was started on the Pharmacy Building which when finished will almost double the facilities. At present the school consists of: a galenical pharmacy laboratory, a pharmaceutical chemistry laboratory, a dispensing pharmacy laboratory, a graduate research laboratory, a manufacturing laboratory, a pharmacology laboratory, four large class rooms, a large and well stocked library, an animal room, a store room and a recreation room.

Extracurricular activities include: a Student Branch, A.Ph.A., Alpha Kappa Chapter of Rho Chi Society and the student paper, *The Georgia Pharmacist*.

# University of Georgia Chapter Initiates Graduate Members

# Doctor Urdang Becomes Honorary Member at Beta Psi, University of Wisconsin, May 6, 1951\*

George Urdang was born in Tilsit (Germany) on June 13, 1882. He went through the required education of a German "Apotheker," studied at the University of Leipzig under the well known Pharmaceutical chemist Ernst Beckmann and the botanist Wilhelm Pfeffer and passed his examination with the best mark. Besides his professional studies, he took up the study of history, philosophy, and literature. For 9 years he was the owner of a

small-town pharmacy (Rosenberg, West Prussia), making himself known during this time as an author of articles in pharmaceutical and other journals. In 1919 he was appointed editor of *Pharmazeutische Zeitung* (published by Julius Springer, Berlin), one of the best known pharmaceutical journals on the European continent. This position he held until the political uproar in Germany forced his resignation.

Besides his editorial work, Urdang took up graduate study in history of science, pharmaceutical chemistry, and economics at the Universities of Berlin and Halle-Wittenberg, earning his Doctor of Natural Science degree at Halle-Wittenberg, "with distinction." He was the first in Germany to receive a Doctor's degree with pharmacy as a major on the

basis of a pharmaceutico-historical doctor thesis; and he was the only one to receive his degree under the world famous historian of science, E. von Lippmann, author of the most profound history of alchemy ever written.

In 1926 Urdang founded, together with four friends, the first Society of the History of Pharmacy intended to become an international center in the field concerned. He was the director of this society until 1934. Under his leadership, the membership grew to more than one thousand, among them the most prominent pharmacists in all countries of the world. He helped to establish the Library of the Society within the Institute of the History of Medicine and Natural Sciences at the University of Berlin in 1931 and was one of its trustees. Upon his resignation after the establishment of the Nazi regime in Germany, he was made an honorary corresponding member at the international convention of the Society of the History of Pharmacy ("*Gesellschaft für Geschichte der Pharmazie*"), held in 1934 in Basel. On its first meeting after the war, held at Hamburg in 1949, the same Society made Dr. Urdang an honorary member and awarded him the "Schelenz Plaque." In the same year he received the Urban Medal and in 1950 the Güther Schmid Medal (both German distinctions). In 1951 the American College of Apothecaries bestowed upon him the J. Leon Lascoff Award.

Furthermore, Urdang holds the honorary corresponding membership of the Austrian Pharmaceutical Society (1928) and the honorary membership of the American Pharmaceutical Association (1932).

After his arrival in the United States of America in 1938, Urdang took the last-year course in the Brooklyn College of Pharmacy and passed the College examination in May, 1939, and the New York State Board of Pharmacy examination in June of the same year. He was given an honorary Doctor of Science degree by the Philadelphia College of Pharmacy and Science in 1946. In 1947 he became a Fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science. In 1948 the Brazilian Society for the History of Medicine appointed Urdang a corresponding member, in the same year he was elected a corresponding member of the Colegio De Farmaceuticos at Rosario, Argentine, and in 1950 he was made an honorary member of the Brazilian National Academy of Pharmacy. Likewise in 1950 he was made an honorary member of the Peruvian Society of the History of Pharmacy and of the Spanish Society of the History of Pharmacy. In 1951 the Mexican Society of Natural History appointed him a corresponding member.

In January, 1941 the American Institute of the History of Pharmacy was founded with Urdang as its Director, a position he continues to hold. Urdang has been a member of the bibliography committee of the American Association of the History of Medicine since 1941, historian of the American Association of Colleges of Pharmacy since 1942, a member of the Committee on Publications for 1947 and 1948 of the History of Science Society (after having been a member of the Society Council for the period 1932-1946), a consulting editor of the *Journal of the History of Medicine and Allied Sciences* (since 1947) and of *Chymia*, Annual Studies in the History of Chemistry (since 1947) an associate editor of *Isis*, the official journal of the History of Science Society, and a contributor to the *United States Quarterly Book List*, issued by the Library of Congress (since 1947). Urdang was appointed an "Honorary Consultant to the U. S. Army Medical Library" in 1948.

In the fall of 1947 the University of Wisconsin created a chair for the History of Pharmacy and appointed Dr. Urdang the first occupant of this chair with the rank of full professor.

Published books and brochures number more than twenty-one. Addresses and articles published either in German or in English amount to about two hundred. In the U.S.A. they appeared mainly in the *American Journal of Pharmacy*, *American Journal of Pharmaceutical Education*, *American Professional Pharmacist*, *American Druggist*, *Bul-*

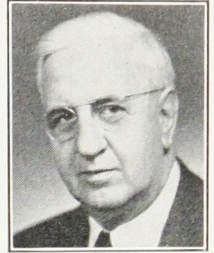

This meeting will celebrate the 175th Anniversary of the founding of Phi Beta Kappa and the birth of the American College Fraternity. Kappa Psi, as a member of the Professional Interfraternity Conference, will have representatives at this meeting.

The Grand Council Scholarship Committee composed of Brother Roy A. Bowers, Edward P. Claus, Austin A. Dodge, Earl P. Guth, and Pierre F. Smith, Chairman, has done outstanding work this year. In March each Collegiate Chapter received a letter from the Committee. This letter contained information relative to the Grand Council Scholarship Key award and suggestions for the development of a sound scholarship program within the individual chapter. This letter should remain as a part of the permanent records of each chapter and the information and suggestions accompanying the letter should be called to the attention of the members at least twice during each year. # Province I Assembly

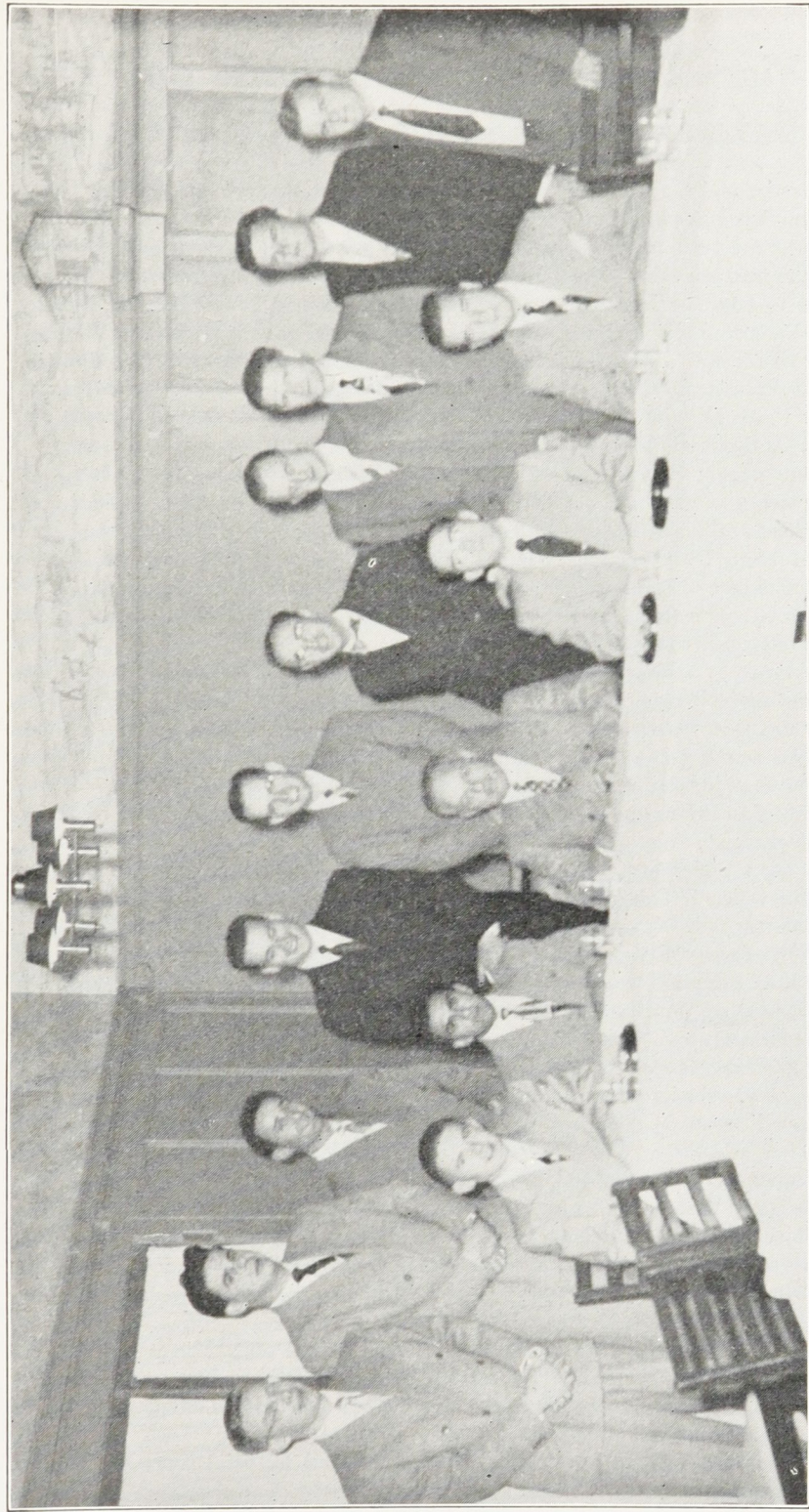
### Pocatello, Idaho, May 5, 1951

# The Fraternity-Advisor Relationship

The position of faculty-advisor or counselor to a fraternity is probably one of the least understood duties that a faculty member can assume. The opportunities, functions, and duties of this office are sometimes not appreciated by both the faculty advisor and the organization.

The purpose of this is to throw some light on the subject and to stimulate some thought as to the benefits to be derived from a closer relationship between the advisor and the fraternity.

The rules and regulations for students in most colleges and universities require the appointment of an advisor or counsellor for all student organizations. One of the basic reasons for this requirement is to insure that the objectives and functions of the organization are not in conflict with, or do not work to the detriment of, the objectives of the college or university. It is perhaps this rule which has caused many fraternities to look upon their advisor as a policeman appointed to curb their activities and keep them on the straight and narrow path.

It is not the belief of school administrators that student organizations in general would wilfully carry on any function or activity which would harm their school. It is believed that in the few cases which have resulted in bad publicity for a school, proper advice and counseling would have prevented the adoption of a misguided program.

In most colleges the appointment of an advisor is a function of the dean of the college or director of the school. The choice of the proper man for this job is a task requiring considerable thought and usually consultation with several persons interested in the welfare of the fraternity as well as the school concerned. The persons selected for advisors are those who have shown a desire to aid the fraternity in its plans and programs and to take part in its functions whenever possible.

Acceptance of appointment as advisor to a fraternity is not required of any faculty member. A fraternity advisor accepts this job because he enjoys working with students and appreciates the opportunities to promote the growth and betterment of his fraternity and in a broader sense the profession in which he is engaged. By accepting an appointment as a faculty counselor for a student organization, the person appointed agrees to maintain contact with the student organization to such a degree as to be familiar with its program and personnel, having in mind not only the objectives of the particular group but the responsibility of the college or university as a whole to the city or state which it serves. It should be remembered, however, that an advisor does not like to regard himself as a policeman. He is not an enforcement officer in any sense.

In the constitution of Kappa Psi we find that the executive officers of each collegiate chapter consist of the regent, vice regent, secretary, treasurer, historian, chaplain, and grand council deputy. These officers are chosen from the collegiate chapter with the exception of the grand council deputy, who is chosen from the graduate or facultate membership. These officers are elected annually. In many cases collegiate chapters have chosen the faculty advisor to serve also as grand council deputy. This practice is not required by the constitution, however, because it has become a rather widely used procedure, it is well to note here the similarities in duties between the advisor and grand council deputy.

It is the duty of the grand council deputy to act as the advisory and supervisory official of the chapter. He is to see that the chapter is carrying out the provisions of the constitution and by-laws and is properly conducting the work of the ritual, that officers and committees are functioning properly, that the books and records are being properly kept. He is to encourage the chapter in making every effort to insure its successful continuation. He is authorized to act as an official representative or deputy of the Grand Regent and the Grand Council, conducting such investigations and making such reports concerning the chapter as may be requested by the grand regent or the council.

It is evident that the office of the grand council deputy carries a major responsibility in promoting the welfare of Kappa Psi. This same responsibility is shared by the faculty-advisor. However, responsibility, alone does not guarantee efficient or successful completion of a job. In order to properly counsel and advise a fraternity, the counselor needs the full cooperation of all members of that fraternity. The chapter should be sure to keep its advisor informed of all meetings, functions, and activities in which it is engaged and programs which it plans for the future. The officers should feel obligated to periodically report on the health and progress of the chapter. The officers should remember that the advisor will offer advice but he will not act as a director. He can be of little assistance unless the chapter brings its problems to him. He is not going to snoop around and tell the chapter how it can improve itself unless the chapter seeks his aid. Chapter officers should recognize their responsibility to seek the advice and experience of their faculty advisor at frequent intervals.

Every chapter that takes full advantage of this opportunity is certain to enjoy a greater degree of success and Kappa Psi will be a still better fraternity.

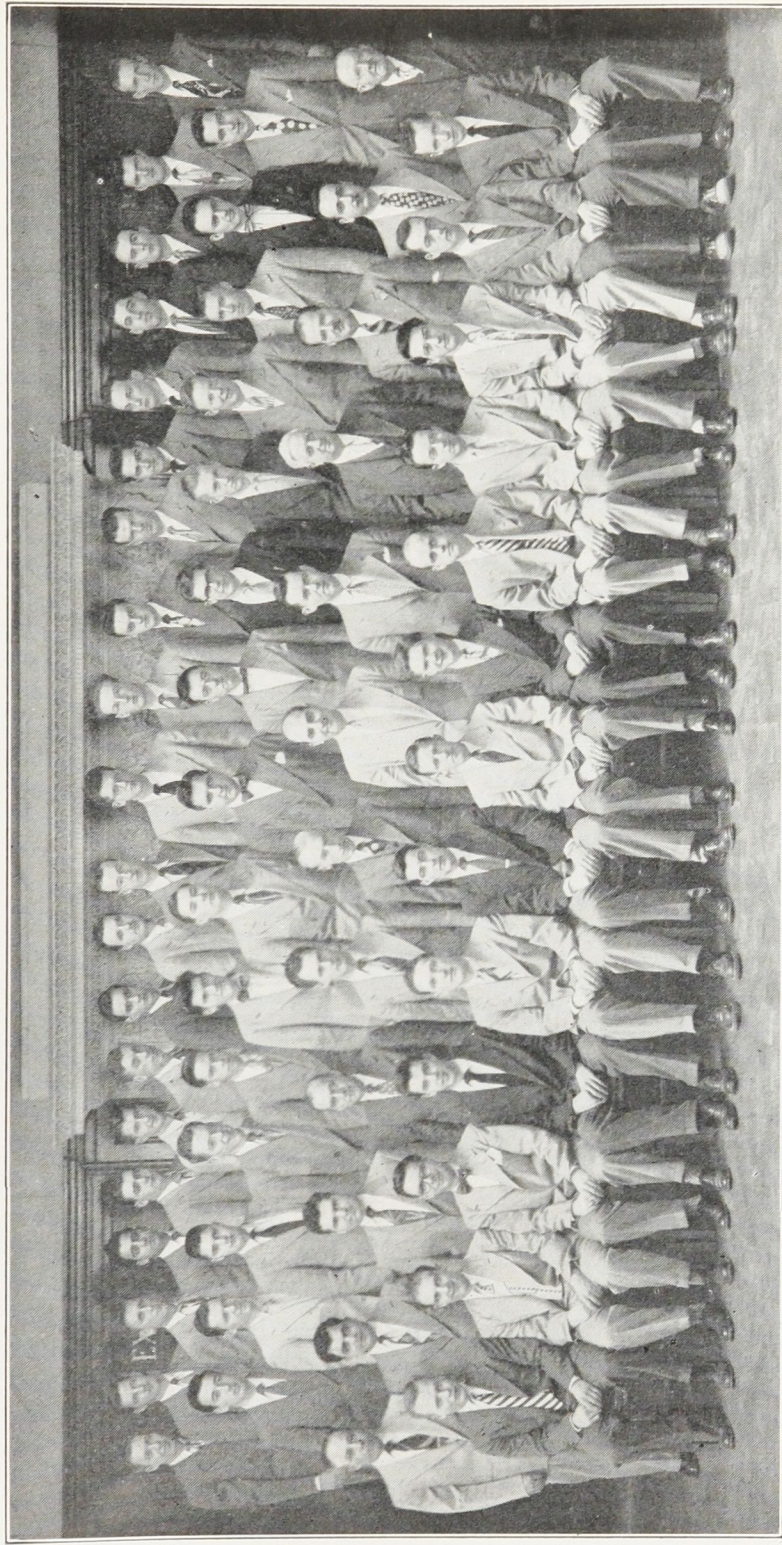

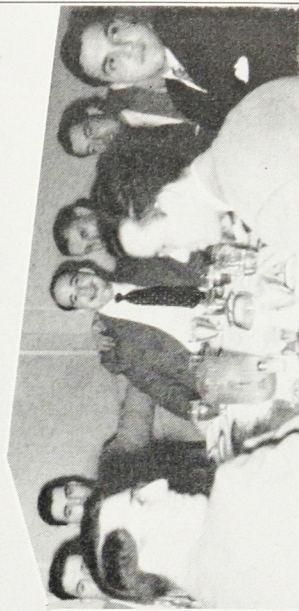
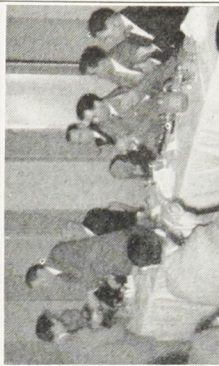
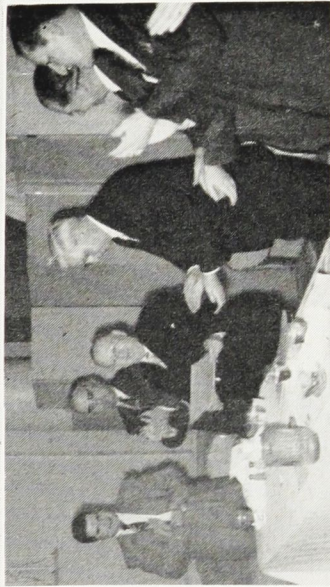
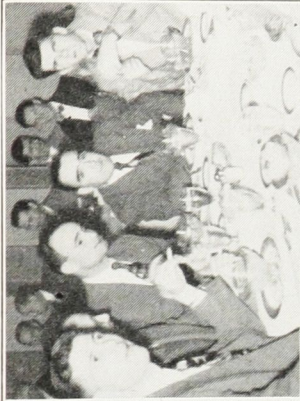
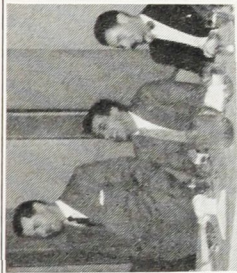
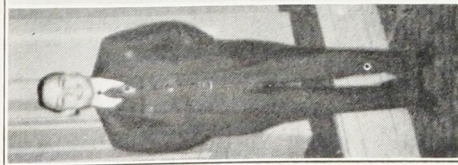
## PI—PURDUE UNIVERSITY

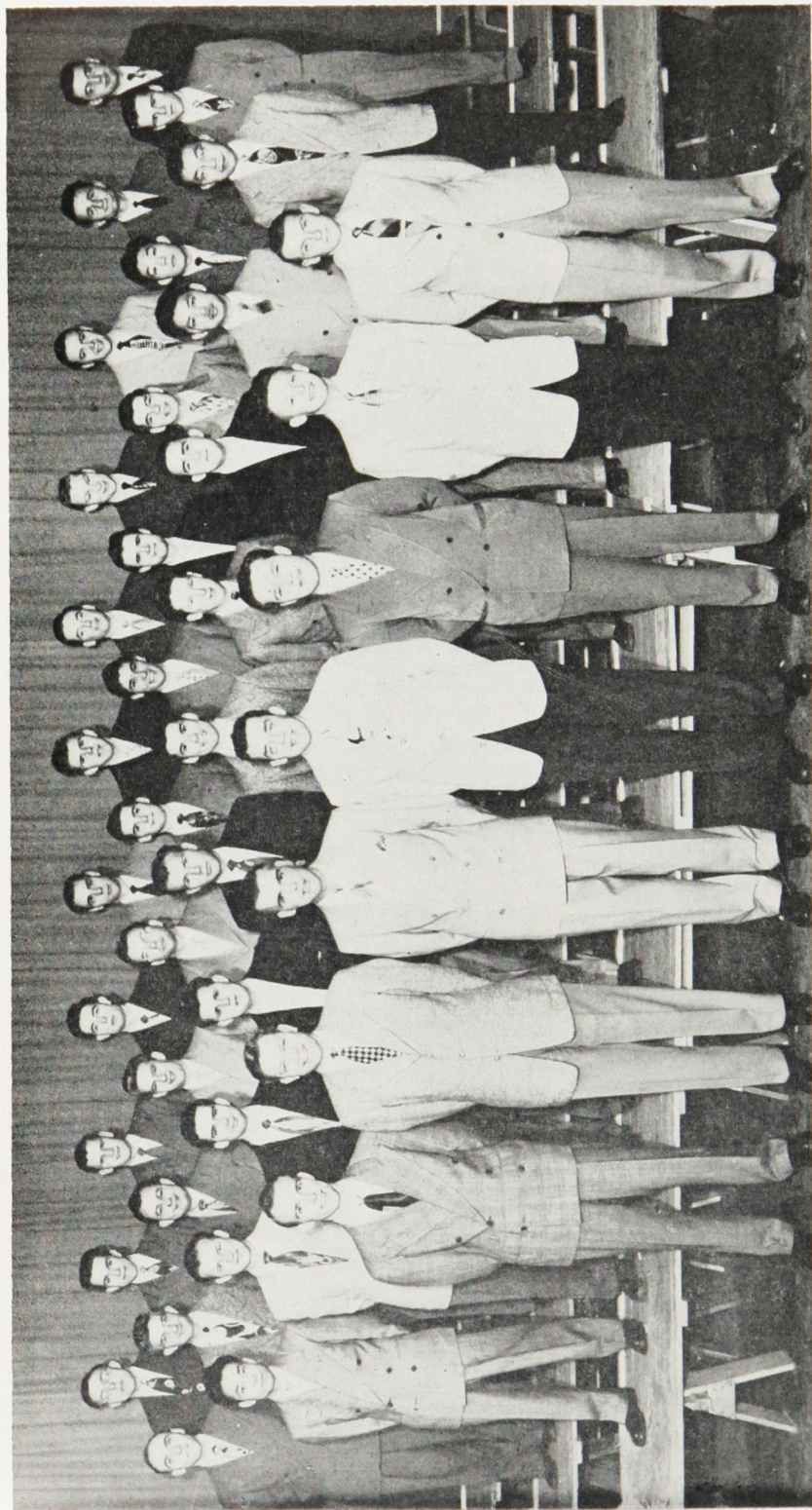

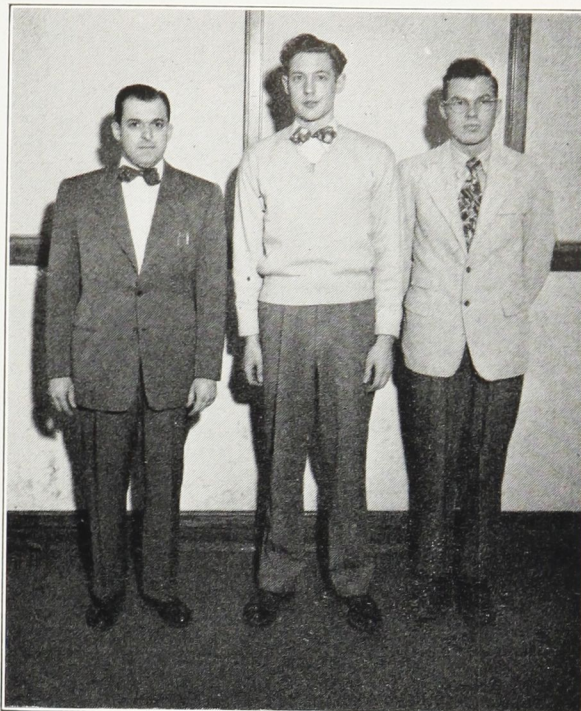

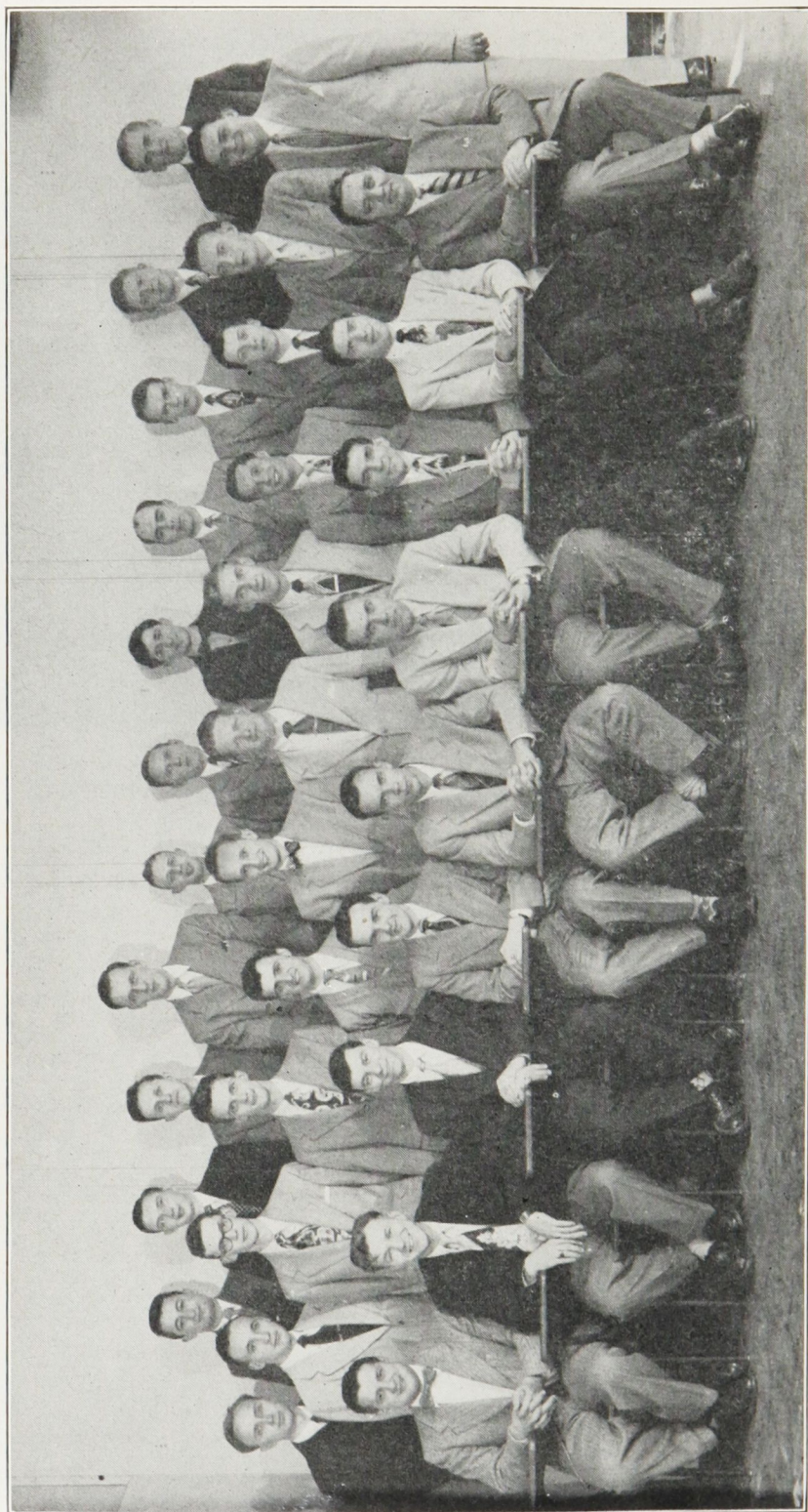

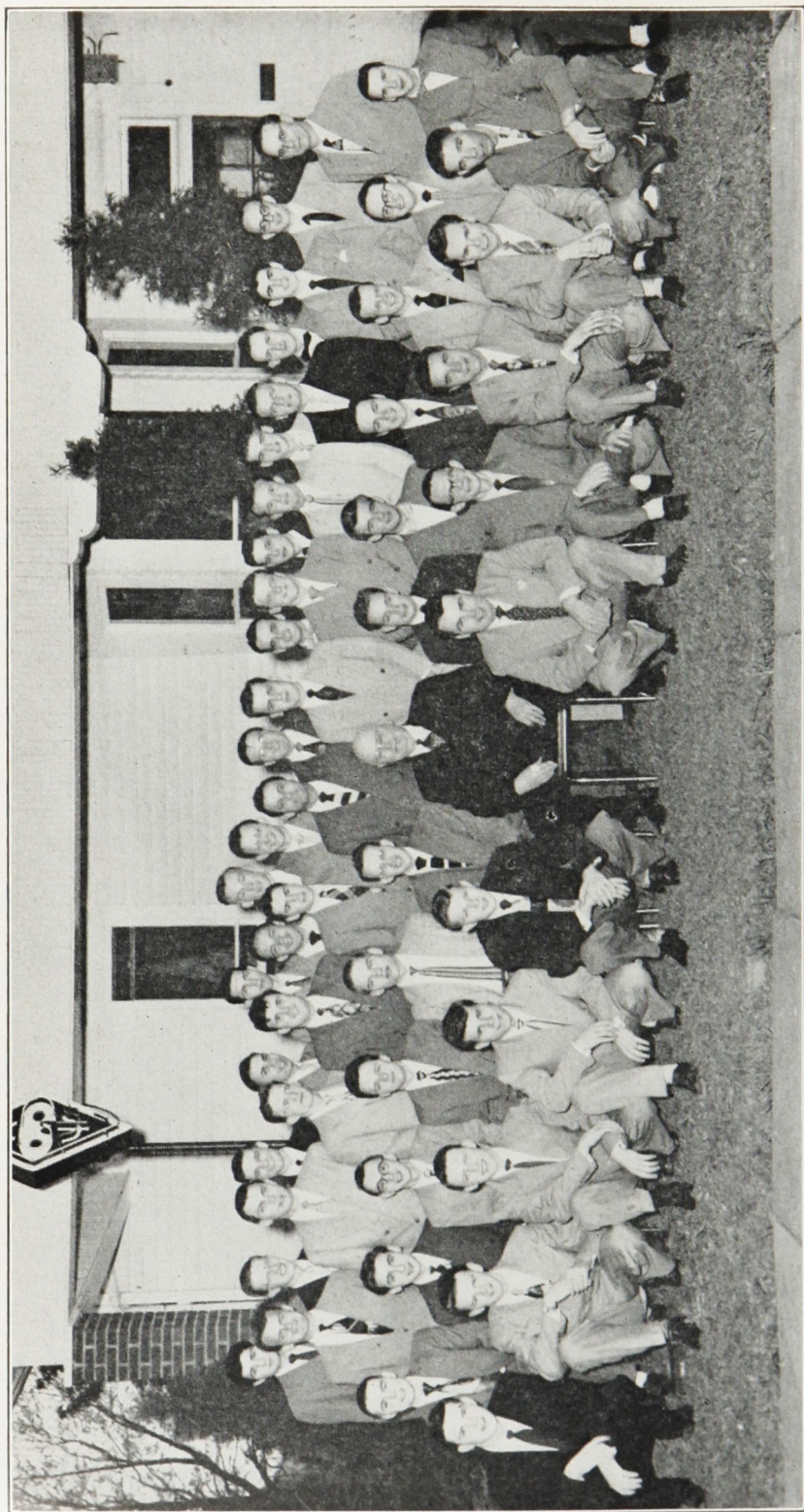

### GAMMA ETA—MONTANA STATE UNIVERSITY

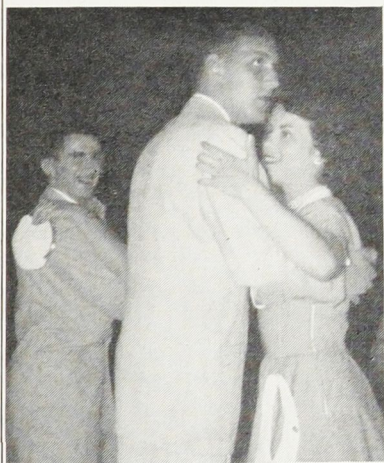
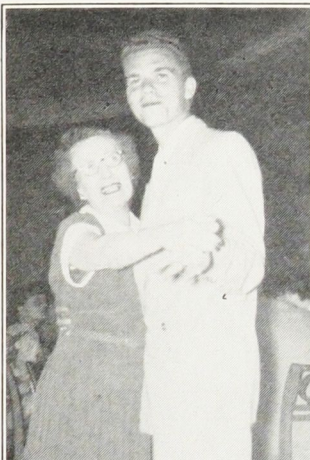

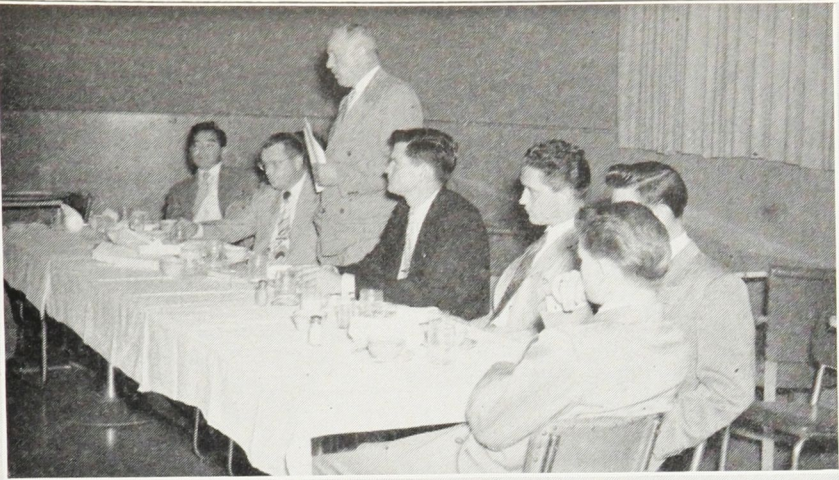
At this time we would also like to congratulate Dr. O. K. DeFoe, a member of the faculty, who also joined the fraternity at this time.

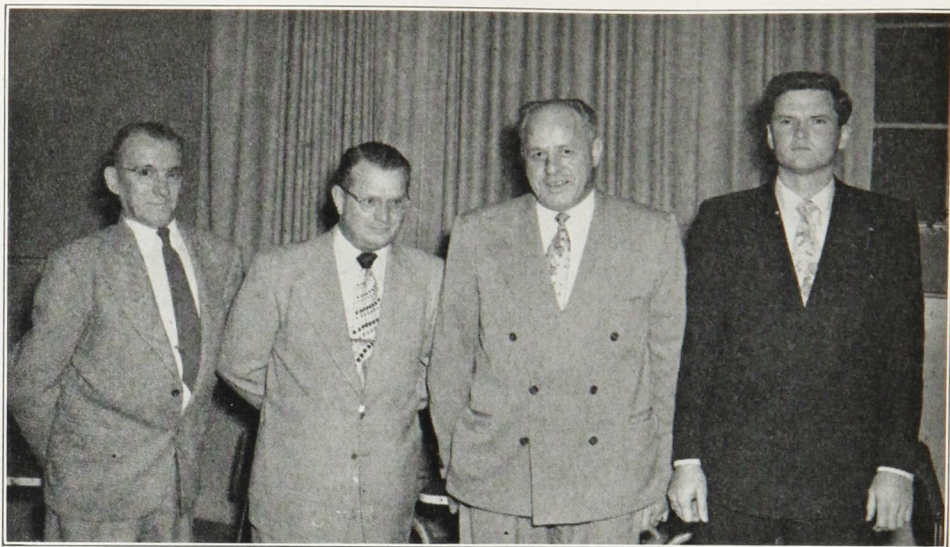
