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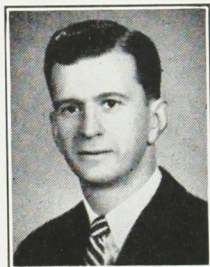
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From the Desk of the Grand Regent

The University of Arkansas and Its School of Pharmacy

I. UNIVERSITY OF ARKANSAS

History—The University of Arkansas owes its origin to a public land grant act of the Federal Congress which was accepted by the General Assembly of the State, March 27, 1871, in an act which provided for the location, organization, and maintenance of the institution. Fayetteville was selected as the seat, and the University was opened January 22, 1872. The first class, consisting of five men and four women, was graduated in 1876.

Standing—The University of Arkansas is a member of the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. All its colleges and schools are approved by their respective professional accrediting associations.

Divisions—The University of Arkansas is composed of the following divisions: The College of Arts and Sciences, the College of Education, the College of Business Administration, the School of Law, the School of Nursing, the School of Pharmacy, the School of Medicine, the Graduate School, the General Extension Service, the Institute of Science and Technology, and the Graduate Center at Little Rock. The College of Engineering includes the Engineering Experiment Station, and the College of Agriculture includes the Agricultural Experiment Stations and the Agricultural Extension Service.

The Medical School, the School of Nursing, the School of Pharmacy, the Headquarters of the Agricultural Extension Service, and the Graduate Center are located at Little Rock. All other divisions of the University are located at Fayetteville which is situated in Washington County in the northwestern part of the state, in the heart of the Ozark Mountains at an elevation of 1,500 feet. The surroundings are of great natural beauty and the excellent climate of the region in all seasons is known throughout the Southwest.

Physical Facilities—The campus at Fayetteville is located on a wooded hill overlooking the town. It comprises approximately three hundred acres, which together with twenty-six buildings and their equipment represent a value of more than \$12,000,000.00. Fourteen

buildings, mostly of modern construction, are given to administration and instruction of students. The departments of Engineering and Agriculture and the various science departments of the College of Arts and Sciences are amply supplied with modern equipment which enables them to provide excellent training in these fields. A new Fine Arts Building, completed in the summer of 1950, provides the most modern, up-to-date facilities for music, art, speech and dramatic art.

At the new University Medical Center in Little Rock there is under construction an eight and one-half million dollar teaching hospital and out-patient clinic. The recent legislature provided for a new four million dollar Medical Education Building, which will be attached to the Hospital. This new building which is now on the drawing board, will provide facilities for the Schools of Medicine, Pharmacy, and Nursing. At the present time physical facilities are provided for the Pharmacy School at the Graduate Center. Six new modern laboratories equipped with stainless steel furniture are provided for in a temporary building at the Center. Adequate classrooms, offices, and library facilities are maintained in this area.

The Libraries—The University Libraries include—in addition to the main library on the Fayetteville campus—college and departmental libraries for agriculture, business administration, chemistry, education, engineering, fine arts, the graduate center, law, medicine and pharmacy. The graduate center library, the medical library and the pharmacy library are located in Little Rock in connection with the divisions of the University there.

II. SCHOOL OF PHARMACY

History—Acting upon specific authority from the 1951 session of the General Assembly of Arkansas, the University of Arkansas formulated plans for and opened a School of Pharmacy beginning with the 1951-52 academic year. The act providing for the establishment of a School of Pharmacy is as follows:

"Section 1. The Board of Trustees of the University of Arkansas is hereby authorized to establish an accredited School of Pharmacy at the University or the Medical School of the University. The Board is further authorized and empowered to receive any grant, aid, gift, donation, or endowment for the use of said school and to do all things necessary for the establishment of an accredited School of Pharmacy. Approved March 19, 1951."

The School of Pharmacy, organized as a new major division of the University, offers its students accredited work leading to the degree of Bachelor of Science in Pharmacy.

The University's course in pharmacy is organized on the modern concept of pharmaceutical education, in which a basic education in the physical and biological sciences and in the humanities are merged with highly specialized professional training in pharmacy. Furthermore, the University recognized that pharmacy is a member of the health team which includes medicine, dentistry, nursing and public health.

The pre-pharmacy work of the course leading to the degree of Bachelor of Science in Pharmacy is given on the main campus at Fayetteville, as well as other accredited colleges and universities, with the advanced professional training being given at the University's Medical Center in Little Rock.

The student thus receives all of the advantages of contact with college or university life and completes his professional training in the medical atmosphere which will characterize much of his later professional environment.

Physical Facilities of School of Pharmacy—The School of Pharmacy has the use of the classrooms within the University. The main offices of the school are in the Graduate Center located in Little Rock pending completion of the new twelve million dollar Medical Center.

The Graduate Center—The Graduate Center has very modern classrooms all equipped with fluorescent lights and all adequately ventilated. All the offices of this school are located in this building, and equipped with metal office furniture. Laboratory instruction is provided in adjoining temporary pre-fabricated steel buildings. These buildings contain

the pharmacognosy laboratory, the pharmaceutical chemistry laboratory, the instrumentation laboratory, the animal room, the dispensing laboratory, the pharmacy laboratory, stock rooms, and rest rooms. All the laboratories are equipped with stainless steel furniture and fixtures, fluorescent lighting, adequate heating, and ventilation. In addition, the instrumentation laboratory is regulated with controlled air conditioning.

The teaching hospital of the new Medical Center is well on its way towards completion. The 1953 session of the General Assembly of Arkansas provided the means necessary for the completion of the new Medical Education Building. Incorporated in this new building will be adequate physical facilities for the School of Pharmacy.

The pharmacy library is housed in the Graduate Center Library, which is staffed by a full time librarian and her assistant. In addition, all pharmacy students have access to the extensive resources of the University School of Medicine library, which contains approximately 23,000 catalogued volumes and 397 of the more important periodicals. The pharmacy library has 1,052 books and 96 periodicals.

Each year an appropriation of \$3,000.00 is allocated for the purchase of books and periodicals and the binding of journals and periodicals.

Gamma Tau Chapter Celebrates Fifth Anniversary

Gamma Tau Chapter of the George Washington University School of Pharmacy and members of the District of Columbia Graduate Chapter, celebrated the Fifth Anniversary of the collegiate group on Thursday evening, June 2, 1955. More than one hundred members of the Fraternity and their friends met in Falls Church, Virginia and enjoyed a delightful dinner-dance.

Regent Philip J. Simon of the Graduate Chapter and one of Gamma Tau's charter members presided. Grand Secretary-Treasurer Frank H. Eby was the principal speaker. He discussed the growth and prestige of Kappa Psi Fraternity locally and nationally. Special guests included Dean Charles Bliven, Professors Salvatore J. Greco and Robert M. Leonard, faculty members of the George Washington University School of Pharmacy. Also present were Gunther K. Kessler who served as chairman of the 1953 National Convention and F. Richard Malzone, co-chairman. Clifford W. Haack, chairman of the anniversary celebration, deserves a special compliment for his work in helping to make the celebration so successful. As usual the wives and dates of the Brothers added the colorful touch that always makes Kappa Psi parties so wonderful.

NOMINATIONS FOR GRAND OFFICERS

Early in March the Central Office sent to each Chapter an official ballot and a letter giving details regarding the procedure for making nominations for Grand Officers. To date many Chapter have failed to return their ballots and these Chapters are hereby notified that the last day on which a ballot may be returned is September 26, 1955. Before returning a ballot it must be certified by the Chapter Regent and Secretary.

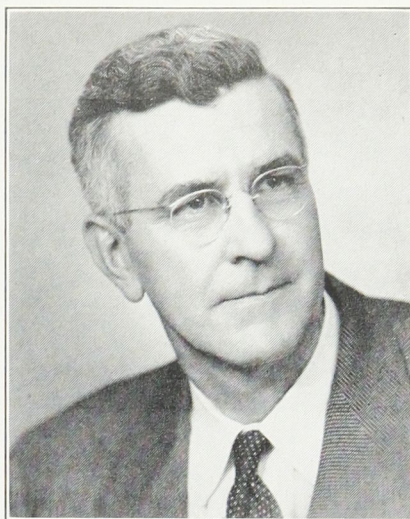

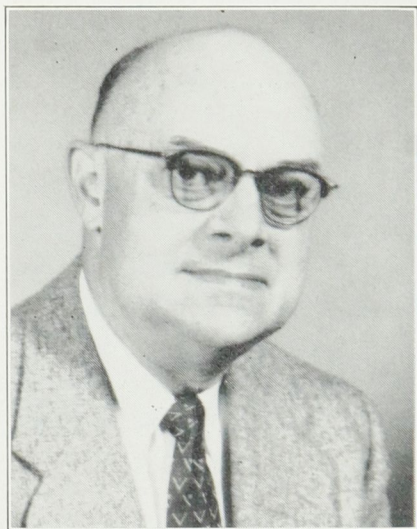
HENRY MATTHEW BURLAGE, dean and professor of pharmacy and pharmaceutical chemistry at the College of Pharmacy, University of Texas, joined Beta Omicron Chapter of Kappa Psi in 1925, while a graduate student at the University of Washington.

Dean Burlage is a member of many organizations. Among them are the American Pharmaceutical Association, American Chemical Society, American Association for the Advancement of Science, Texas Pharmaceutical Association, Sigma Xi Society, Phi Lambda Upsilon, Alpha Chi Sigma, Rho Chi Society, and Phi Beta Kappa. He is a past president of Rho Chi.

You Should Know . . .

WILLIAM ALLEN PROUT, dean of the School of Pharmacy at the Medical College of South Carolina, is a native of Kentucky. He was born in the town of Webster on June 21, 1897, and his early schooling was received in the country grammar school there and at Breckenridge County High School.

He attended the University of North Carolina from 1919 to 1922, joining Beta Xi Chapter of Kappa Psi while a student there. At this institution he earned the degrees of graduate in pharmacy (1921) and pharmaceutical chemist (1922). After this he studied at the University of Nebraska and earned a bachelor of science degree in 1923, and a master of arts degree with a major in pharmacology in 1924. His marriage to Charlotte Engberg took place on June 4, 1926. In 1935 he received the degree of doctor of pharmacy from the Philadelphia College of Pharmacy and Science.

Brother Prout has served on the faculties of a number of schools. Some years ago he held the position of assistant professor of materia medica at Tulane University. Later he served as assistant professor of pharmacy at the University of Tennessee and then instructor in pharmacy at the University of Georgia.

Dean Prout's hobbies are music and the growing of camellias and azaleas.

Those present were Grand Regent Nicholas W. Fenney, Second Grand Vice Regent Milton L. Neuroth, Third Grand Vice Regent Herman C. Forslund, Grand Secretary-Treasurer Frank H. Eby, and Grand Counselor James R. Thayer. Executive Committee Member Rudolph H. Blythe was also in attendance.

Following the consideration of a number of important matters, it was concluded that substantial benefit would result as a whole if the following items and recommendations were studied and, where possible, made effective at once where Grand Council approval is not required.

(1) It was proposed that a set of instructions for Grand Council Deputies be formulated so that they may understand more completely the duties and responsibilities of this important office.

(2) It was proposed that a format be studied and if possible, developed for Province Assemblies in order to insure maximum benefit from these important meetings.

(3) It was recommended that consideration be given to the reevaluation of the position of the Fraternity regarding the pledging of pre-pharmacy students.

(4) It was recommended that a short biographical sketch, including most important Fraternity activities, be required of each candidate who accepts a place on the ballot for national office and that these be published and distributed at the National Convention of the Grand Council.

(5) Give consideration to the preparation of a set of standard instructions for all Chapter officers and supply each Grand Council Deputy with a set of these instructions.

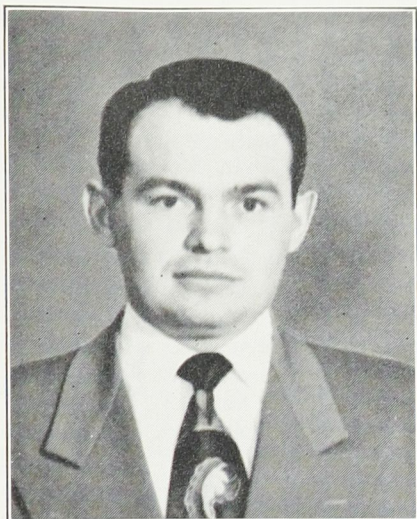
The 32nd Annual Plant Science Seminar, Gainesville, Florida, August 15-19, 1955

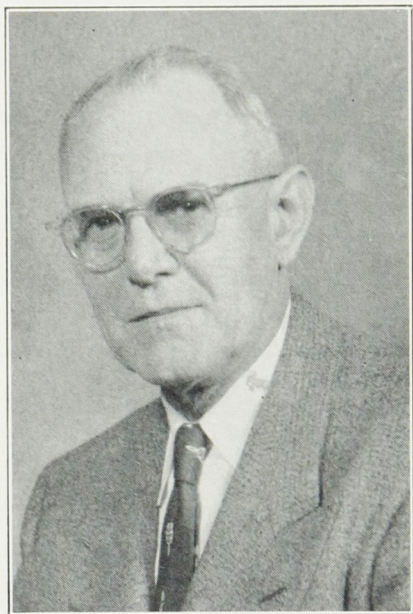

West Virginia Dean Becomes Facultate Member



Kappa Psi is proud to announce that Dean J. Lester Hayman of the University of West Virginia College of Pharmacy became a Facultate Member of the Fraternity at ceremonies conducted by Beta Eta Chapter on March 27, 1955.

J. Lester Hayman was born June 3, 1896 at the old family home located in Whitesville, Delaware. Members of the Hayman family were among the early pioneers who settled in the Colony of Delaware when it was under the proprietorship of William Penn.

J. Lester attended the Murray City High School and later Ann Harbor, Michigan High School from which he was graduated in 1915. In the fall of the same year he entered the College of Pharmacy, University of Michigan and in 1919 he received the degrees of Ph.G. and B.S. in Pharmacy. He received the *Charles R. Eckler Prize* for outstanding scholarship in the Freshman year and also served as a teaching assistant during his Senior year.

In 1919 he began his career as a teacher at the West Virginia University, Department of Pharmacy. The next year he married Miss Alice Lucille Bennett of Athens, Ohio. They were blessed with two children, both deceased. There are two grandsons.

J. Lester returned to the University of Michigan in 1925 where he served as a part time instructor while completing the requirements for the master of science degree. Returning to West Virginia University, he passed through the ranks and was appointed a full professor in 1935. In 1936, when the College of Pharmacy was established as a separate unit of the University, he was selected as the first director and two years later became dean, the position he holds today.

In his community he has had a part in many civic activities. For many years he has taken an active part in the Morgantown Rotary Club of which he was president in 1939-40.

In pharmacy he is affiliated with many organizations and he has been a member of many committees. He has been a member of the A.Ph.A. since 1924 serving as second vice-president (1935-36) and on many committees. He was president of the American Association of Colleges of Pharmacy (1948-49) and has served this association for many years. Other pharmaceutical organizations have enjoyed the advantages of his leadership.

In West Virginia, Dean Hayman has been a leader in pharmacy since he first came to the state and in 1947 he received the Beal Honor Award in recognition of his outstanding and meritorious services performed in furthering the interests of the profession of pharmacy in the State of West Virginia.

The assembly of Province III was held at the Hotel Grady, Atlanta, Georgia, April 23, 1955. Chapters in attendance included Gamma Phi, Gamma Tau, Beta Xi, Theta, and host chapter Gamma Psi. Chapters not present were Beta Eta, Iota and Gamma Sigma.

The meeting was conducted by Satrap Earl T. Brown. The chief item of business was the revision of Province III by-laws to conform to the revised model by-laws suggested by the national office. Action on the revision was delayed to give the delegates opportunity to consider the necessary revisions.

Dr. M. L. Neuroth, Second Grand Vice Regent, extended the greetings of Alpha Chapter to the convention. Dr. Neuroth reported on national developments and urged the Chapters to greater activity in scholarship, participation in the *Ray S. Kelley Award*, sending in writeups of Chapter activities, and the promotion of the Fraternity to freshman classes by good example and friendship.

Brother Don Miller of Beta Xi Chapter presented a talk on "The Responsibilities of a Pharmaceutical Fraternity to Its School." The delegates present mentioned the means which their Chapters found helpful in promoting scholarship. The real need for improving scholarship in each Chapter was emphasized by Brother Miller who reported that only 9 of 24 Brothers graduated from one group of pledges at the University of North Carolina.

A fine luncheon was served to all present at the Henry Grady Hotel. Dr. Wei-Chin Liu, a member of the faculty of Southern College of Pharmacy, gave an excellent talk on the role of the pharmacist in the handling of radio-active isotopes.

The afternoon session re-convened at 3:00 p.m. Brother Brown called for further discussion of the revised by-laws. The various Chapters expressed their ideas on the proposed revision. There proved to be a considerable variance of opinions as to the proposed revisions. Brother Brown requested that the legislative committee rewrite the by-laws, incorporating the suggestions of the members, and submit the revision to the Chapters for mail ballot.

Dr. Semeniuk raised the question of a possible geographic subdivision of Province III. Satrap Brown pointed out that the Province could not subdivide itself and that the question would have to be presented at the next national convention.

The report of the time and place committee was accepted and the next assembly of Province III will be held at Athens, Georgia, either in March or December, 1957.

The report of the nominating committee was accepted, followed by several nominations from the floor. The following slate of officers was elected: Satrap, Earl T. Brown; Vice Satrap, Dr. D. H. Johnson; Secretary, John W. Boenigk; Treasurer, Dr. Fred Semeniuk; Historian, Patrick McGuire; Delegate, Frank Lowder; and Alternate Delegate, Ronald Beaver.

Dr. Milton L. Neuroth made an inspiring address concerning the advantages of being in a fraternity and discussed the position of fraternities in the American way of life.

The attending members were guests of the Atlanta Graduate Chapter at a party held later in the evening.

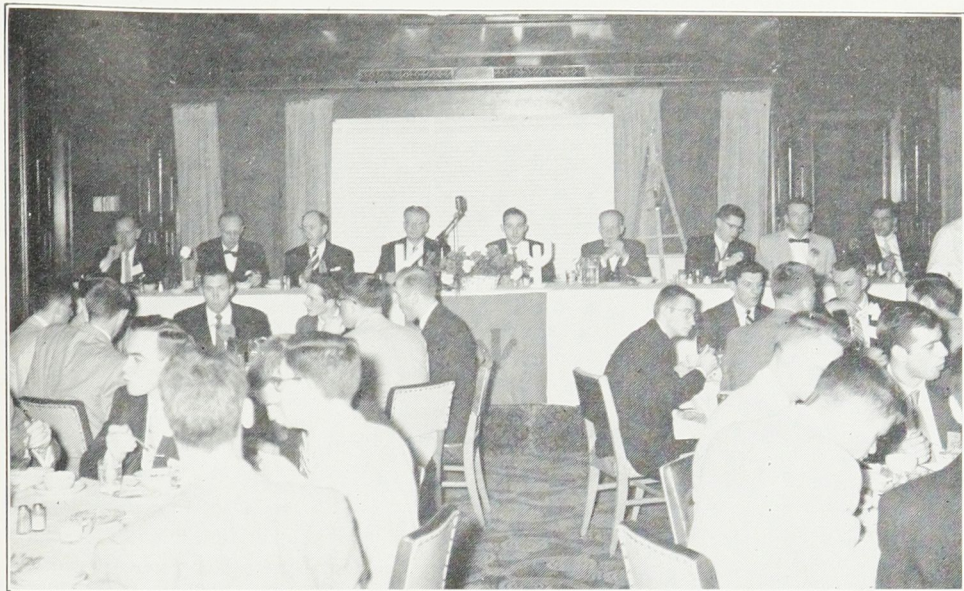

Secretary-Treasurer Richard D. Monksman reported on the status of the treasury and read the minutes of the past Assembly. The minutes were corrected and approved. The morning session was adjourned for lunch.

The afternoon session was called to order at 1:30 p.m. by Satrap Charles J. Thiel. The roll was called and the invocation asked.

A round-table discussion entitled "What About This Five Year Program," followed. The panel included Grand Counselor James Thayer; Charles E. Tucker, Kentucky Graduate Chapter; Richard M. Doughty, Kentucky Graduate Chapter; and Wayne Wheeler, Upsilon. Brother Thayer put forward the advantages, disadvantages, and frustrations of the narrowly educated person and related these to the five-year program. Brother Tucker related the pharmacist to his colleagues in allied professions and the pharmacist's obligations to broaden himself so he might hold his own. Brother Doughty related the theory of the program from the college professor's viewpoint. Brother Wheeler took the student outlook saying he felt that more cultural subjects would better fit the student for professional life. These presentations were followed with a very lively session in which the general consensus of opinion seemed to be that the five-year program will be a decided advantage to the profession as long as the additional year was devoted to broadening the educational aspect of the field and not an excuse for adding more narrow technical courses to the curriculum.

Reports of the various committees were then read. This was culminated by the report of the Nominating Committee and the election of officers followed. Officers elected for the new two-year period included: for Satrap, Col. Charles E. Tucker, Kentucky Graduate Chapter; for Secretary-Treasurer, Richard D. Monksman (reelected), Chicago Gradu-

ate Chapter; for Historian, Richard M. Doughty, Kentucky Graduate Chapter; and for Chaplain, Joseph S. Paterniti, Gamma Iota. Immediately following the election Grand Counselor James Thayer installed the officers.

A fund was established to purchase a trophy to be awarded each year to the winning Chapter in the Province IV Basketball Tourney. Upon winning such trophy three years in succession the trophy would be given permanently to that Chapter and a new trophy purchased to continue the competition.

Gamma Chi invited the Province to hold its next assembly for 1957 in Detroit. The invitation was taken into consideration by the new executive committee. Resolutions were passed commending the Upsilon Chapter for its efficient handling of the convention and its hospitality.

Another resolution was put forth to look into the advisability of holding an assembly more often than every two years. This will be discussed by the executive committee. The assembly was adjourned at 5:10 P.M.

That evening a banquet was held at the Seelbach Hotel. Satrap Tucker presided. Following dinner, short speeches were made by the new officers, the host Regent, Brother Hopkins, Grand Counselor James Thayer, and retiring Satrap Thiel. Brother Joseph T. Elmes of the Kentucky Graduate Chapter introduced Mr. Grover Page, editorial cartoonist of the Louisville *Courier-Journal*. Mr. Page gave a delightful illustrated speech including the history of cartooning and much wonderful, witty but profound, philosophy.

The assembly was a wonderful experience for those who attended in the fellowship it fostered and did much for cementing the fraternal bond among the Chapters of Province IV.

Spokane, April 30, 1955

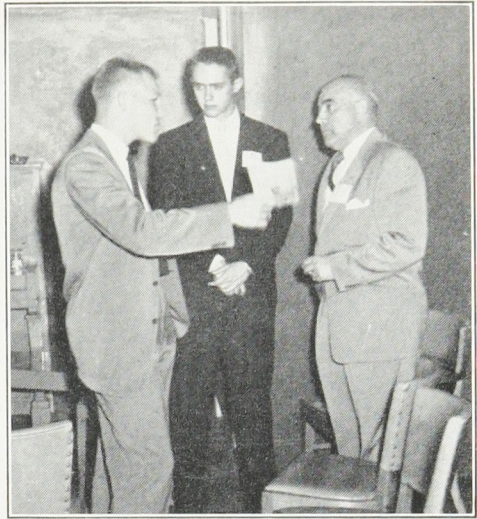

far and too time-consuming for these Brethren. Iota Chapter

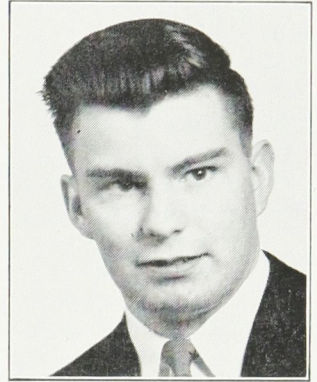

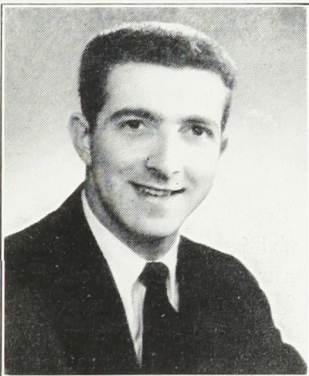
Congratulations to the Recipients of Grand Council Scholarship Awards!

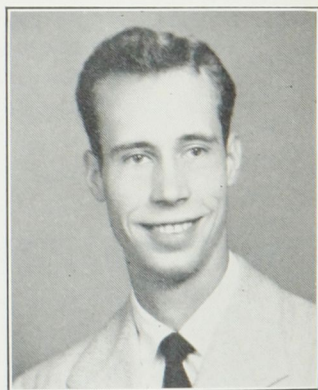
JACK JENNINGS—Gamma Omicron Chapter

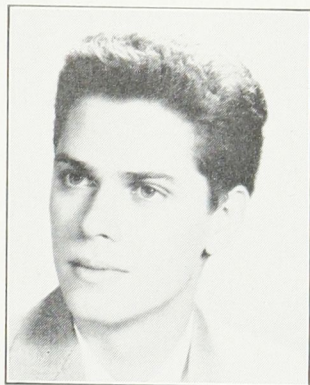

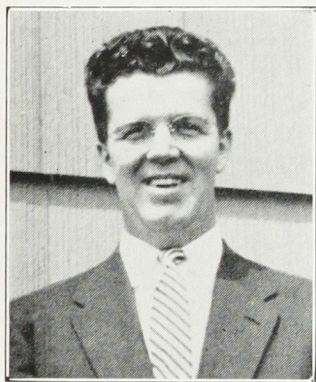
JOSEPH G. OLIVER—Beta Rho Chapter

Hospital Pharmacists Give Professional Tips on Avoiding Poisons

Miami Beach, May 2—The nation's hospital pharmacists, meeting here in conjunction with the 102nd annual convention of the American Pharmaceutical Association, gave out today with some useful professional tips to make life safer—and healthier—for both adults and children exposed to possible poisons in every-day living.

A special committee of the American Society of Hospital Pharmacists recommended that both professionals and average householders observe these precautions:

- (1) Advocate the use of locked medicine cabinets in the home.
- (2) Store all poisons, paints, solvents, detergents, and other potentially toxic preparations in a locked cabinet.
- (3) Use strip "poison" labels on bottles and other containers of toxic preparations and label them clearly "Keep out of reach of children."
- (4) Instruct patients (with the physician's permission) to destroy medications as soon as the need for them in a current illness is past.
- (5) Place "safe" date limitations on drugs that deteriorate rapidly, as some antibiotics do.
- (6) Plan and maintain for each hospital pharmacy a complete and carefully cross-indexed card file listing household and economic poisons, describing their formula and toxic ingredients and explaining proper treatments and antidotes for each.

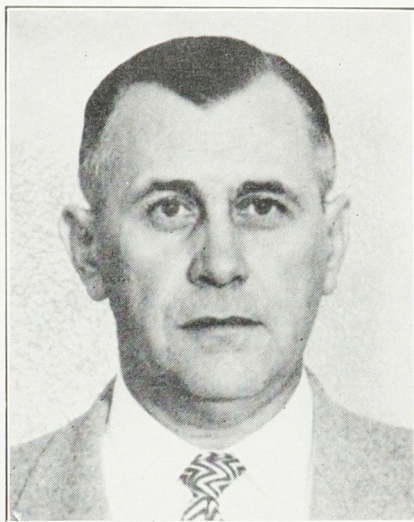

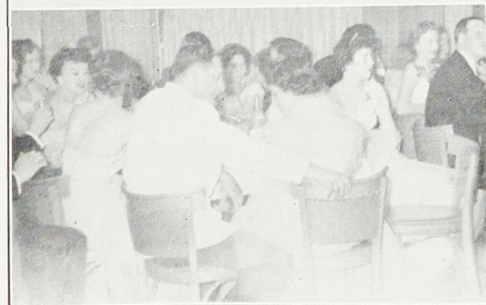
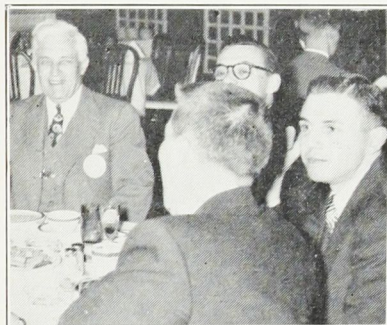
Paolini, Gus Francesci, Bob Moyer, and Bill McGrath.

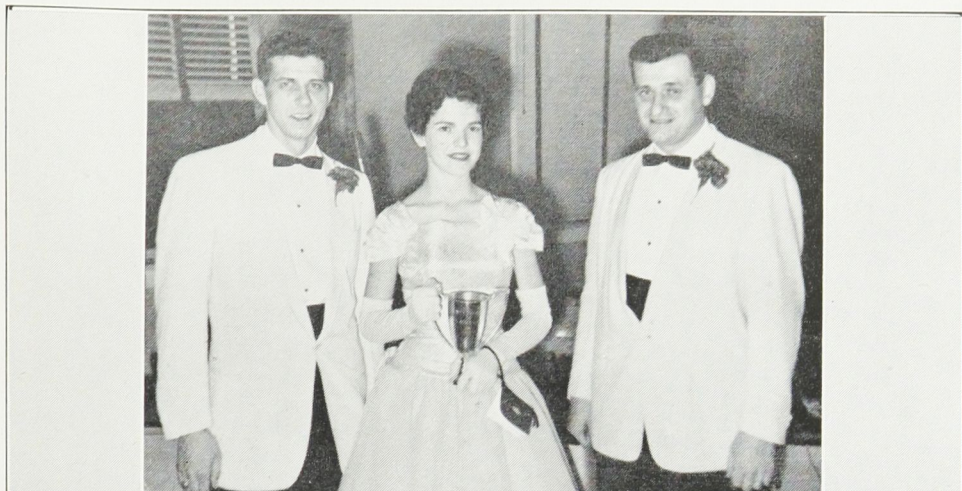
Mu Chapter has done it again. Yes, we have climaxed a most successful and enjoyable year with a "show of shows"—our annual Spring Formal.

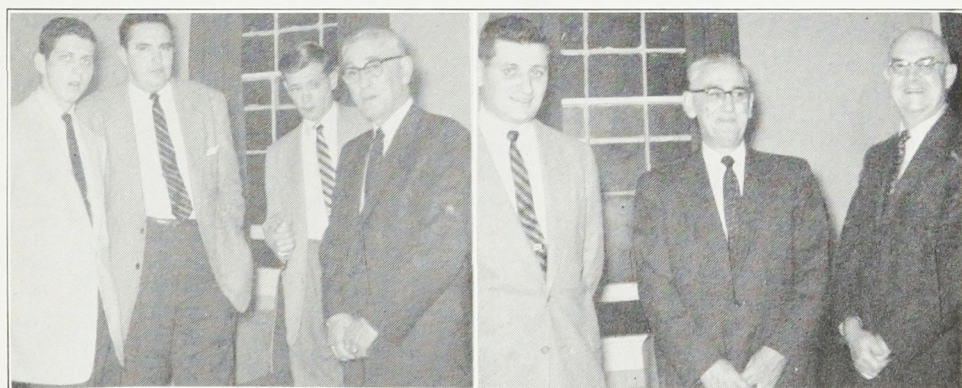

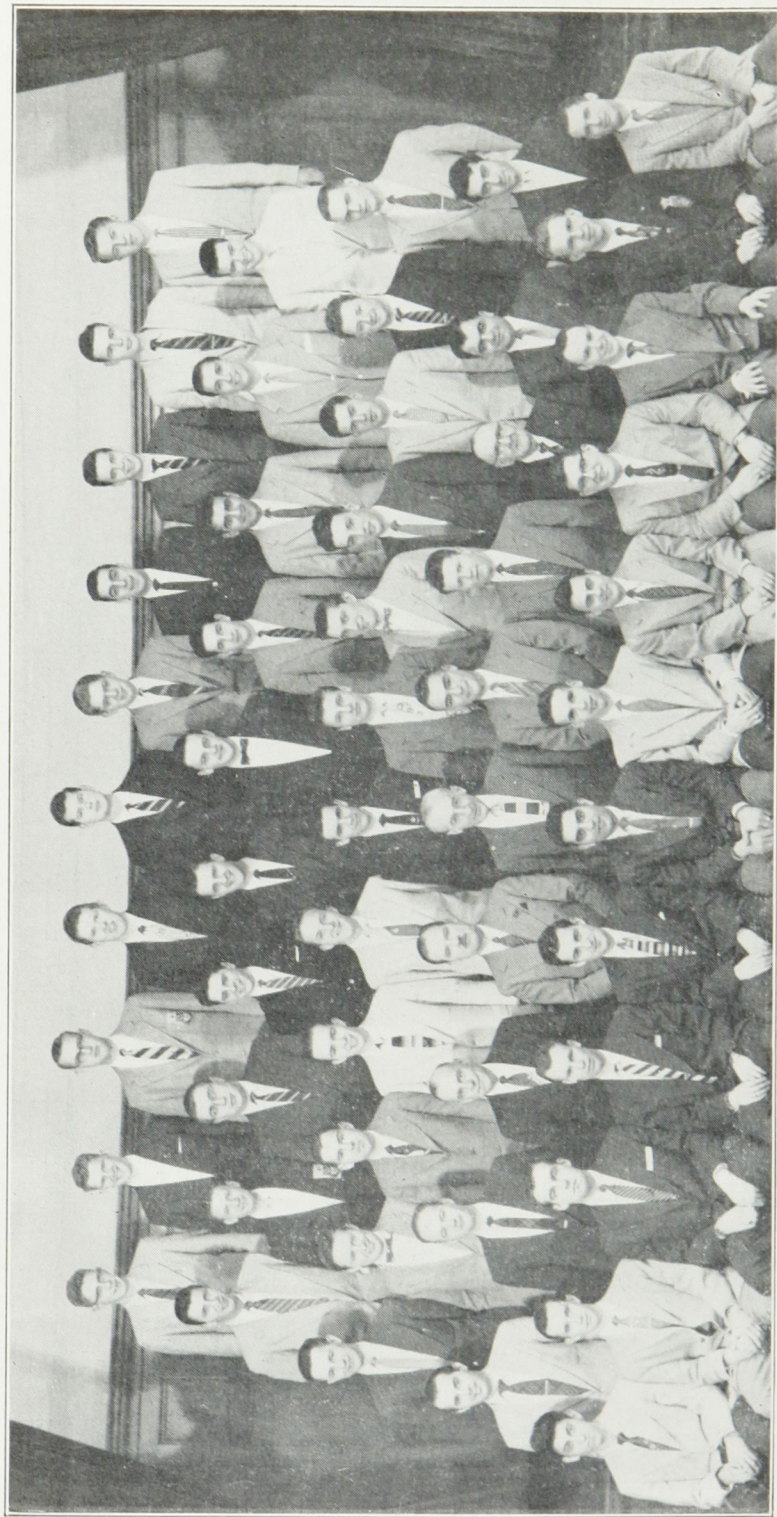


AT IOTA'S SPRING FORMAL DANCE

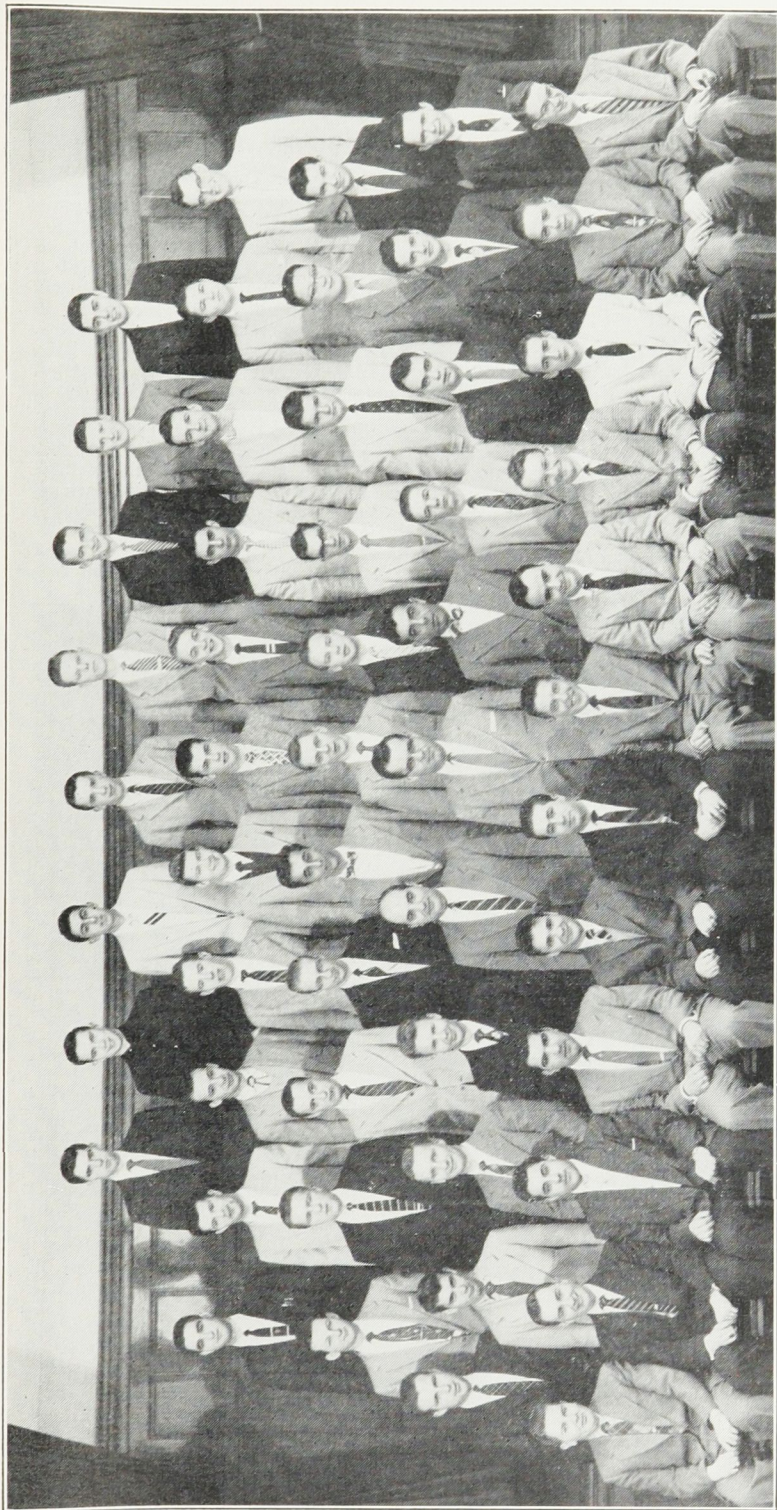

We again extend invitations for all Chapters to send representatives to see our new house in September. Until then, Nu wishes a pleasant summer and now Nu's news is old news.

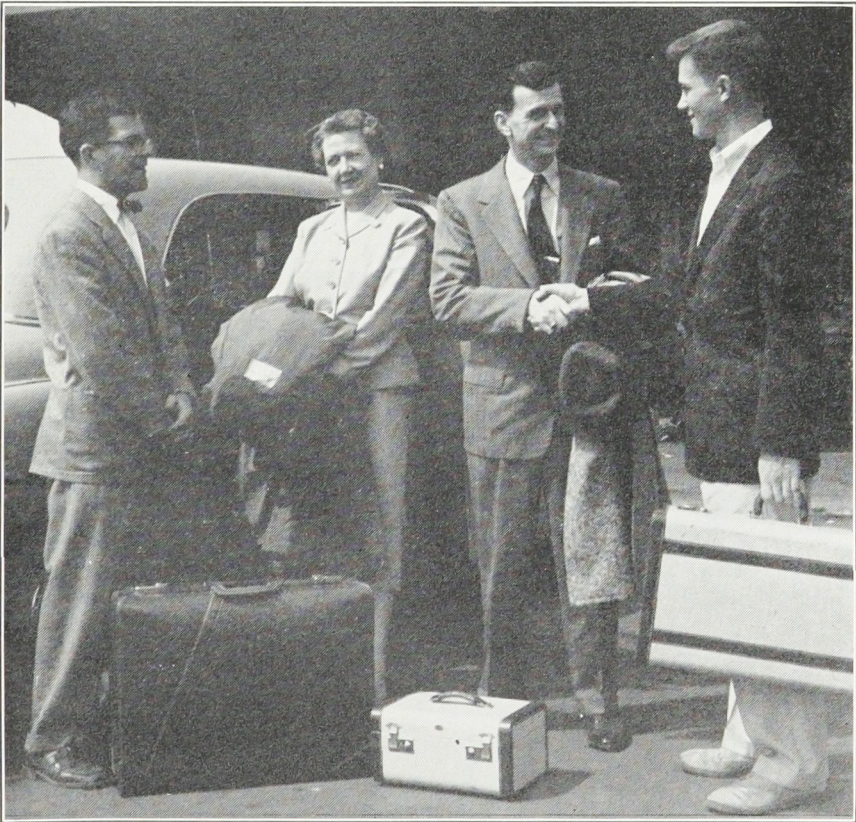

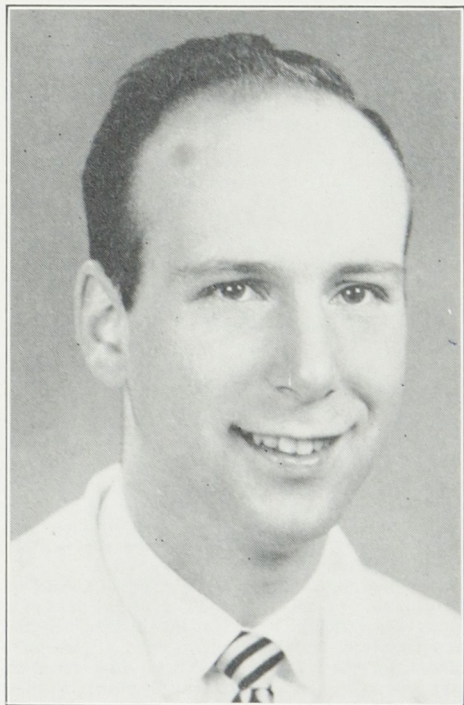

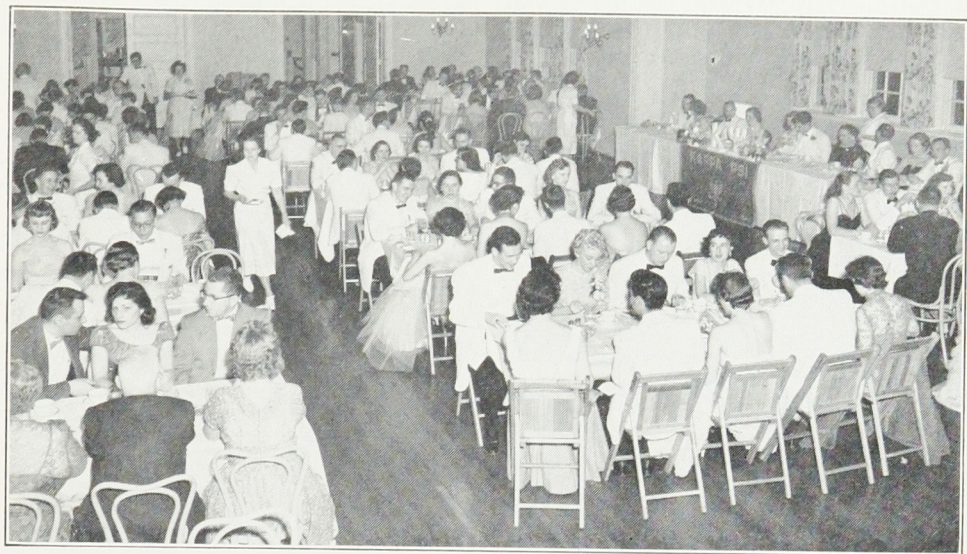

The Gamma Psi Chapter has, in the past three months, had varied occasions and activities which we feel might be of interest to our Brothers throughout the nation.

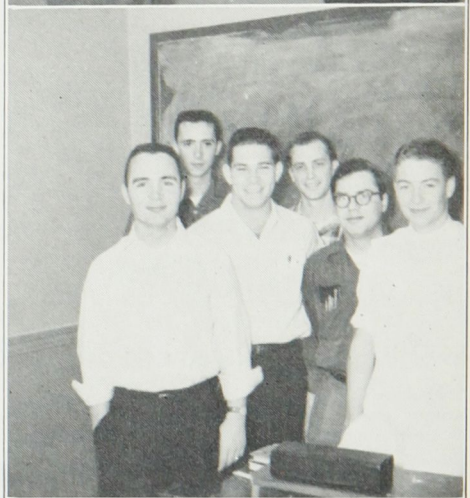
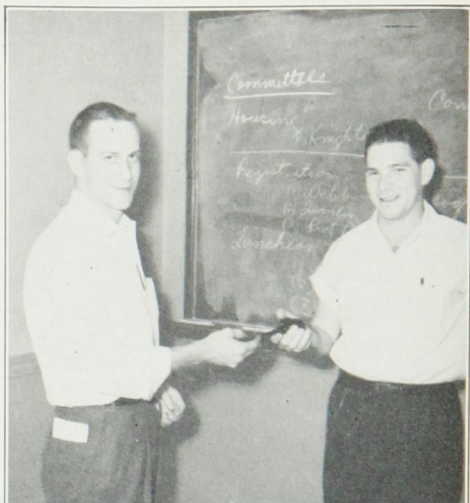

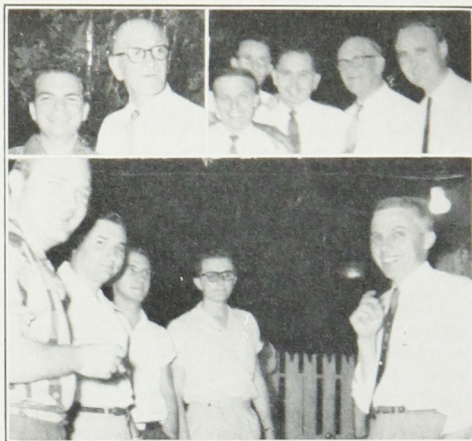
