The Kappa Psi Pharmaceutical Fraternity with forty-nine collegiate chapters, representing the finest type of professional aspirants in our colleges of pharmacy, can do a great deal for the profession of pharmacy at this time. Greater co-operative efforts are necessary at this time to preserve professional pharmacy. We have advanced professional pharmacy to a position which has the possibility of giving pharmacy professional recognition in keeping with the position occupied by the pharmacists in their respective community.

The profession of pharmacy rests upon the foundation of science

and education. Educational requirements of the pharmacist have advanced to four years of standard college training leading to the degree of Bachelor of Science in Pharmacy. The graduate should be well qualified to collect drugs as well as prepare, standardize, distribute and dispense drugs, medicines and medicinal supplies. Pharmacists are educated and licensed to protect the health of the people. Pharmaceuticals, biologicals and medicinal supplies are required to maintain and improve the public health. Many of these substances are poisonous, or otherwise dangerous; the public must be protected against their unwise use. The profession of pharmacy covers a huge field of recognized value to humanity, and partially due to the decided decrease in college enrollment throughout the United States is favorable for a greater demand for professional pharmacists. The danger lies in the pharmacist being willing to shift the technical professional work to a few who see the advantage of professional pharmacy and accept instead of the professional work just the selling of professional products. The greater portion of our profession has become engulfed in this commercial aspect which can completely disrupt our profession and lead to undirected medication.

As Kappa Psi brothers we are pledged to advance the profession of pharmacy. Since we are growing less in numbers, this must be partially compensated for by greater loyalty and efficiency. With this added responsibility, aim to pledge every student who meets the Kappa Psi standard, and as a unity, work for a better fraternity and profession.

Webster's New International Dictionary defines "*fraternity*" as: 1. State of being brothers or a brother; state or quality of being fraternal, or *brotherly*; *brotherhood*; *brotherliness*. 2. A body of men associated for their common interests, business, or pleasure; a brotherhood; a society; specif.: (a) An association for special religious purposes, for relieving the sick and destitute, etc., a religious or ecclesiastical brotherhood. (b) A fraternal society, association, or order. (c) In American colleges and schools, a student organization for social and more or less serious purposes, preserving, usually, secrecy as to its rites, and usually comprising affiliated branches, commonly called chapters, in different


institutions. . . . 3. Men of the same class, profession, occupation, character, or taste.

The foregoing definitions leave some range to choice and personal preference, and there is one (*c*) which many fraternity members would undoubtedly modify. The most appealing, satisfactory, and significant interpretation of the word "fraternity," and incidentally the synonym which is most commonly used in fraternity circles, is Brotherhood (*brotherly, brotherliness*). Webster defines "*brotherhood*" as "State or quality of being brothers or a brother." "*Brotherly*" is defined as "Of or pertaining to brothers; natural for brothers; becoming to brothers; kind; affectionate; as, *brotherly love*. Syn.—*Kind, affectionate, tender.*"

The terms "fraternity," "fraternal," "fraternalism," "brothers," "brotherhood" are often used in a careless, meaningless fashion even among fraternity members. If the true "spirit of brotherhood" permeates the members of a fraternity, then kindness, tenderness, fondness, forbearance, tolerance, understanding, sympathy and helpfulness will manifest themselves daily in the lives of such members. "Fraternity" should not be a mere word; *it should be lived*. Unless it is actually lived, it means nothing. Too many fraternity members, we are tempted to believe at times, "do not know what it is all about." It appears that some visualize "fraternity" as a one-sided matter to be lived by the "other fellow," with the "I" on the receiving end only. To many fraternity members the initiation, the wearing of the fraternity badge, the social events, the "frat house," and any prestige or material benefits which he thinks are likely to come to him because of his fraternity affiliation constitute in toto his conception of the American college institution known as "fraternity."

To *live* fraternity we must be kind, tolerant, understanding, sympathetic and helpful in our relationships with "the other fellow," and he in turn will reflect and return our manifestations of true fraternalism. If we can instill the true spirit of fraternity into our entire membership FRATERNITY will really mean something to each of us. The "brotherhood of man" and the "Fatherhood of God" will then become realities and we will *live* it.

"The Big Bad Wolf" and her whelps—the depression family—played havoc with the Fraternity World in general. The "Wolf" was not so kind to fraternities as the old Roman wolf was to Romulus and Remus! However, we may be thankful for the fact that by

stringent economy we came through session 1932-33 without "going into the red," even though it did strain our reserve to do so. *And we are not going into "the red" in 1933-34.*

The total number of active members at the beginning of last session was not in excess of 300, for chapters had been reduced to as low as 3 and 4 men. By the end of the session, the total, as indicated by our incomplete chapter reports, was not in excess of 400. Less than 70 life subscriptions were paid. Forty-four chapters were on our active roll:

Gamma, Mu Omicron Pi, Nu, Pi, Upsilon, Chi, Psi, Omega, Beta-Iota, Beta-Kappa, Beta-Lambda, Beta-Mu, Beta-Nu, Beta-Sigma, Beta-Upsilon, Beta-Chi, Beta-Omega, Gamma-Eta, Gamma-Iota, and Gamma-Omicron (20) paid the per capita tax or monthly dues for 1932-33 in full; Eta, Mu, Rho, Beta-Beta, Beta-Gamma, Beta-Epsilon, Beta-Pi, and Gamma-Delta (8) paid in part; and Epsilon, Theta, Iota, Xi, Sigma, Tau, Beta-Delta, Beta-Zeta, Beta-Eta, Beta-Theta, Beta-Xi, Beta-Omicron, Beta-Rho, Beta-Phi, Beta-Psi and Gamma-Epsilon (16) paid nothing on their per capita. As a result of the foregoing, viz., the marked reduction in the size of our chapters and the large percentage of chapters who have paid nothing or only a part of their national dues, it is not surprising to learn that less than one thousand dollars was paid last year in per capita tax. All of the foregoing doleful news is recited to show why we have cut all expenses down to "the bone," why we have made the recent issues of *THE MASK* small, why we shall be forced to continue small issues of our quarterly, why we have absolutely no assistance in the Central Office, why we have used postal cards in place of regular letters, why in short we have adopted the traditional "Scotch" technique and shall continue to practice severe economy. As we have already stated, we did not "go into the red," and the only reasons why we did not go "into the red" were (1) the fact that we had a reserve to draw on, and (2) the economy practiced. It is obvious that we must continue along drastic economical lines, for our reserve is decidedly "anemic and emaciated." We purposely

delayed our "thin" April issue; we have purposely delayed our thin July issue; we have deliberately changed the cover of this issue to save funds. We would prefer to have "thick" issues of THE MASK coming out, as we have in the past, but that plan would mean the early ultimate discontinuation of our quarterly, and the consensus of opinion is that we would prefer to have "some" MASK than no MASK at all, for it is our only means of inter-chapter and national-chapter communication. Fortunately, Kappa Psi had no officers' salaries to "cut" or to abolish, for Kappa Psi has never during its entire long history paid a national officer one cent for services rendered, a fact about which we are justly proud; and the reason why all down through the years we have not been forced to raise our national dues or per capita tax.

Economy has ever been the watchword of Kappa Psi from its very foundation. The national income is derived entirely from the dues and fees paid by active members; our graduate members pay no dues of any description. Economy will continue to be our watchword during the current session; and an economy of the most orthodox "Scotch" variety. In order to stay "out of the red" it will be necessary for our active membership to keep their national obligations paid promptly. We are confident that our active members will do their best as has been the case during the past.

The recent proclamation by the President of the United States, removing the embargo from gold automatically compels the L. G. Balfour Company to pay approximately fifty per cent more for our gold purchases from the government.

Gold Surcharge

It is, therefore, necessary to add a surcharge of ten per cent* to the price of all gold and gold filled merchandise, to partially offset our increased manufacturing costs.

Since the total price resulting from the addition of the ten per cent surcharge represents a retail selling price, the Federal excise tax of six per cent is chargeable at this final amount, in the event the regular retail price plus the ten per cent surcharge totals \$5.00 or more.

Example:

Present retail price	\$6.00
10% gold surcharge60
	6.60
Federal tax at 6%40
	Total \$7.00

Our membership will recall that a ten per cent reduction was made on Kappa Psi badges, etc., during session 1932-33, so that the gold surcharge of ten per cent referred to above will be offset. However, our

membership must keep in mind the fact that the Federal excise tax of six per cent is chargeable on the final amount if that total is \$5.00 or more.

There are but fifteen working days between Thanksgiving and Christmas, consequently if you wish to insure delivery in time for Christmas


Christmas Orders your orders must be placed not later than December 15th.

1934 is the scheduled time for the next national convention of Kappa Psi. The matter will be submitted to the chapters for discussion and for final decision. The traditional time for such meetings has been the interim between Christmas and New Year's Day, a convenient time for students to attend without being penalized

for absences from class, and a time most suitable in the minds of many because the delegates return promptly to their chapters and convey to their fellows what they have learned, experienced and absorbed without the probability of dilution and omissions. On the other hand some are of the opinion that a convention may be held advantageously in the same place and immediately before the annual meeting of the A.Ph.A. because so many graduates attend the A.Ph.A. convention which is held during the latter part of August or first week of September. Although there are admittedly some advantages, such as the foregoing, to meeting at that time, majorly for the graduate and in a more limited fashion for the undergraduate, it is our opinion that the ACTIVE CHAPTER MEMBERSHIP AS A WHOLE ought to be taken into consideration, and the time of meeting which will bring the most good and benefit to the *entire* active membership chosen, for after all the continuation of a fraternity depends upon its active membership, the immediate benefits of a fraternity come to the active membership and that properly so, and it is actually the active membership who "foot the bills," since the expense of sending one delegate from each collegiate chapter in good standing is prorated among the active membership.

We believe that a national convention ought to be held in 1934, and we hope that the collegiate membership will so decide; but we feel also that the benefits which will accrue to the entire active membership ought to be the weightiest factor in any decision to meet at a time other than during the Christmas holidays of 1934.

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
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
