KAPPA PSI EXPANSION

My Brothers in Kappa Psi:

I have been a member of Kappa Psi and have had the distinct pleasure of holding positions in responsibility in this, one of the largest organizations of pharmacy, for a number of years. I've been proud to see it grow in size and become more dynamic as the years passed by. This growth hasn't been easy and it hasn't been solely the blood, sweat, and tears of a few. It has involved all of you. You, my Brothers have made, are making and will continue to make Kappa Psi an organization of which we may continue to be very proud. We must never be satisfied with our progress to date - - but instead continually attempt to surpass our past performances. We need to think in terms of expansion, for expansion is progress. We need to "sell" Kappa Psi in order to realize chapter expansion both within and without. This should be interpreted to mean that through our many, well organized, purposeful and effective campus, community, and professional (and yes, even social) functions we will be able to create an active interest and an enviable image sufficient to attract men of high ideals who would contribute to the progress of the fraternity.

We have the means in our organization to get the ball rolling with such labeled committees as a Public Relations Committee and Graduate Relations Committee among others. Although these committees have been in the past talented in the art of developing materials for your "sales promotion," the basic ideas must come from you, the individual Brother. Successful plans result through material aid and exchange of ideas. It would seem appropriate that such committees and others in the future be strongly encouraged to contact the membership more frequently in order that more of the brothers become more deeply involved in fraternity matters. It would appear that the term "get involved" is becoming rather hackneyed, however, let me assure you that unless we all "get involved" in all matters which are concerned with Kappa Psi and its expansion, we will soon be left in the proverbial dust.

With regard to external chapter expansion, it might be wise to consider some limited visitations to schools and colleges of pharmacy without a Kappa Psi Chapter to explore the feasibility of implementing a chapter based on the advantages of having an effective chapter of a well-organized professional organization such as Kappa Psi in both the academic and professional arena.

Let me hasten to add that with expansion come additional work loads, increased expenditures, for travel and other general needs for conducting the necessary business of Kappa Psi. If we want the best of service from our Central Office and the greatest good the fraternity may be able to offer to you, then, of course, we must be expected to meet the rising costs of operation. This, I am sure, you will agree may be accomplished by a nominal increase in dues or a modification of the total dues structure if necessary depending on the actual needs. I don't think we need to be alarmed at the thought of a moderate dues increase since it will probably amount to no more than giving up a couple of Budweisers at one of your "busts" or "blow-outs" or that extra pack of cigarettes you shouldn't be smoking anyway. I have no fears about meeting any financial needs of the fraternity, since I am quite familiar with the calibre of Kappa Psi men and know the extent of their loyalty and their high regard for our motto, "one for all and all for one." I would like to recommend that the Executive Committee study our dues structure in toto and suggest changes in dues structure on all levels of membership required to maintain the fraternity on a continuous solvent basis.

We must make a concerted effort to promote the formation of additional graduate chapters and maintain those which we now have in an active, productive status. It behooves all of us to give a little of our time and effort toward the development of graduate chapters in that they are the body which will have more to do with "keeping the faith" and maintaining long-lived fraternalism among the Brothers of Kappa Psi than any other single entity once we have left our alma maters.

We need to develop definite guidelines to assist the graduate chapters in insuring successful and continued active chapters. I recommend that the Executive Committee give time to some pertinent dialogue and render positive action on the matter of establishing such guidelines.

We must increase our efforts on behalf of promoting scholarship. This is one of the most important objectives of our fraternity. The attainment of an intellectual atmosphere within an organization distinguishes from the "run of the mill" association. A functioning scholarship committee in a chapter will create a natural competitive state resulting in improvement of academic performance of each of its Brothers. I strongly recommend that the Executive Committee give consideration to the matter of encouraging all chapters to create a scholarship achievement. Guidelines should be established by a Scholarship Committee for the creation of an organized and effective Chapter Scholarship Committee.

A most crucial area of concern is communications - both within a chapter and between chapters and provinces. As a matter of fact and in my opinion, a good line of communication is the life blood of any organization. Each chapter needs to develop a newsletter of a type which is within the confines of a budget, as should each province. It has been my experience through visitations to the various chapters, that there is an understanding of the value of such an organ of communication, but that there is a lack of experience in the structuring of an acceptable newsletter. In the light of the importance of effective communications which would ultimately lead to assistance in solving some of our general problems, it would be most appropriate if a Publications Com-

mittee could set up some procedural manual or set of guidelines for the development of an effective and economical organ of communication for the chapters and provinces.

I would point out that if the various Committees of the Grand Council are to function for the benefit of the fraternity as a whole, then it is necessary that you be exact when answering questionnaires distributed by these committees and meet all deadlines in order that they be evaluated in time for the preparation of necessary reports requested by the Executive Committee.

In the interest of the development of a more productive and well informed pharmacist, the Executive Committee must give consideration to the encouragement of chapters and graduate chapters to become more involved and increase their participation in such areas as continuing education, health planning programs, environmental health, interprofessional relations, curricula - - particularly the clinical pharmacy concept, internships, ethics, drug abuse control programs, third party payment policies, and all other health matters which indirectly or directly affect the practice of our profession. Well-planned programs relative to the above-mentioned areas would result in a more informed membership regarding pharmacy education, the dispensing of pharmaceutical services, and general matters of public health. This, coupled with the fact that we are a large and efficiently operating professional organization, will increase the possibility of the acceptance of the opinions of this body on matters pertinent to our profession.

I was most pleased to learn of Brother Henney's findings relative to the possibility of a group insurance plan for the Brothers. As usual, our Executive Secretary is far ahead in his thinking with respect to the benefits for the membership. We are most fortunate to have a secretary who has experience in the area of business management. We should continue to encourage our Central Office in obtaining such fringe benefits for the Brothers when possible. Let me reiterate that we also need your thinking and ideas on such matters. If you feel that Kappa Psi should be offering its membership some fringe benefit that is within reason and is presently not available, please feel free to write the Central Office so that an analysis of your recommendation will be made to the satisfaction of all concerned. Remember, this is your fraternity.

You have elected an experienced slate of officers. They will work to maintain Kappa Psi in high esteem. The past administration has done a magnificent job and will be difficult to surpass -- but in the name of progress, this administration must attempt to do so. However, we will need the cooperation and support of each Brother. Thank you once again for affording me the opportunity of serving as your Grand Regent for the coming biennium. EDITORIAL

NOTES FROM THE 35th GRAND COUNCIL CONVENTION

The performance of the Buffalo graduate and undergraduate Kappa Psi brothers must be mentioned as exemplifying the true spirit of brotherhood of Kappa Psi. In the face of rain, heat, and a plague of visiting firemen, the Buffalo brothers made every visitor feel welcome. A great deal of credit for the success of the convention must go these men and the lovely feminine helpers.

Attendance was excellent, attesting to the continued high interest in Kappa Psi. Also important was the fine attendance and the sessions. The elected representatives obviously took their job seriously, as this attendance and the fervor of some of the discussions will indicate.

The Monday afternoon session, which addressed itself to problems not limited to Kappa Psi, demonstrated the concern of all of us for the need for some changes in education, internship and codes of ethics. There was some disagreement, as expected, but one was struck by the genuine concern of all who expressed opinions for maintaining excellence in pharmacy education, training and practice. We could not help but feel that, in some cases, more communication was needed to make all parties aware of current programs and progress. We saw evidence of acceptance by some generalities which are not only not true but dangerous.

Frequently heard throughout the convention was the need to involve the graduate members more in Kappa Psi affairs. We could not agree more that this is necessary. As a very minor example of how this might benefit us all, we would cite the possibility of the practicing graduates serving as a communications bridge between the undergraduate and faculty -- showing the former how some of the seemingly useless college material might eventually be used in practice, and the latter that some of it might not.

If all of our graduate brothers could be encouraged to play an active role in fraternity affairs, Kappa Psi, the third largest organization in pharmacy, could be an even greater force for progress in pharmacy. We hope to see *The Mask* used as a communication mechanism in this reactivation. As a start in this direction, why not pass on your copy to a graduate brother who is no longer receiving it?

THE CONTINUING HISTORY OF KAPPA PSI

THE THIRTY-FIFTH GRAND COUNCIL

Delegates to the Thirty-Fifth Grand Council will remember for years to come the experiences of Buffalo. The wonderful reception at the airport by the Buffalo brothers will dim the memory of the rain, and the quality of the convention program will make the volunteer firemen (who shared the hotel) seem like a minor nuisance.

A record number of registrants saw the meetings open on Monday with reports of committees, officers, and the Central Office. Grand Regent King reported on a successful year salvaged from the grief following the untimely death of Brother Williams. The Eby Educational Loan Fund was identified as an unqualified success. The Grand Historian recommended that his office be dissolved. Grand Counselor Atkinson reported on suggested changes in the constitution and by-laws, and the grand officers generally reported a busy year of visitations and accomplishments.

Monday afternoon saw a lively panel discussion of education, internship and ethics. While no concrete conclusions were reached, the dialogue was a healthy one and there was agreement that these are topics with which the fraternity should be further concerned.

Monday evening provided perhaps the most spirited discussions of the convention as major changes in the constitution and by-laws were discussed along with a proposal for the creation of "Little Sisters of the Mask."

In his Keynote Address on Tuesday morning Brother Joseph E. Pierce, Sr. gave the brothers assembled a realistic appraisal of the role of the professional fraternity in contemporary pharmacy. His address was followed by a discussion of graduate development (a subject frequently heard throughout the meeting) with Brother Henney, putting the fraternity on notice that an active graduate membership is a prerequisite for the continued success of Kappa Psi.

Tuesday afternoon was devoted to the problems of the undergraduate chapters, with chapter houses, grand council deputies, communications, and rushing and pledging practices discussed. This discussion was followed by a "press conference" with the candidates for the office -- a very successful mechanism for thoroughly familiarizing the voters with the views of the candidates. The seriousness of the afternoon was quickly put aside, however, on the bus trip to Niagra Falls for a breathtaking dinner at The Skylon. This event must be a highlight of recent conventions.

Wednesday saw emphasis on change as the Central Office and *The Mask* were represented as committed to this concept. A report on the I.P.S.F. Congress by Brother James Wilson rounded out the morning. The afternoon was devoted primarily to Province affairs and activities with province realignment as usual, a controversial topic. Brother Danti finished the meeting with his views on Kappa Psi expansion. The Wednesday activities were climaxed by a most impressive Ninetieth Anniversary Dinner.

The last day of the convention was devoted to reports of the committees on position papers and the report of the resolution committee. Following the installation of the grand officers, the Grand Council was a most successful meeting.

Total attendance at the meeting, was, 214 Brothers and guests.











INTERNATIONAL PHARMACEUTICAL STUDENTS

James Wilson [Eta] represented the Fraternity at the IPSF Congress in Istanbul, Turkey in July, 1969. This is his report to the 35th Grand Council Convention.

IPSF, the International Pharmaceutical Students' Federation, is an organization we all belong to as members of Kappa Psi, unfortunately most of us do not know anything about this organization and therefore are not able to participate in its activities.

"IPSF was founded in London in 1949 upon the initiative of the British Pharmaceutical Students' Association. Today, over 35 countries are members in IPSF. These young people who founded IPSF realized the importance and necessity of an organization for promoting an exchange of ideas within the profession and to encourage international understanding by correspondence, visits, and exchange of students. From the beginning it was the desire of IPSF to form a professional, nonpolitical organization which would unite national pharmacy student groups and their members. IPSF was originally sponsored by the FEDERATION INTERNATIONALE PHARMACEUTIQUE (FIP)."

IPSF serves about 30,000 pharmacy students, half of which are in the United States, yet very few American pharmacy students are acquainted with IPSF's programs and activities.

The official member of IPSF from the United States is the S.A.Ph.A., and in addition there are about eight members in association, as Kappa Psi. From the members in the United States, IPSF receives about \$100.00, which is supposed to cover the costs of one-half of the entire organization? This is impossible, and the result is that the United States is left somewhere short of its responsibilities.

What does IPSF do? In addition to its annual meetings which are held in different countries of the world each year, a winter ski camp is held in Europe to provide a vacation for pharmacy students during the long hard winter. (As if you couldn't call the annual meeting a vacation, with the travel to a foreign country, and the many hours spent with pharmacy students from all over the earth.)

The major project of IPSF is its student exchange program. IPSF arranges a place for pharmacy students to work in another country -- in retail, hospital, or industry -- for a period of one month to three months. These student exchanges are usually carried out during the summer vacation period. In addition to a different practice of pharmacy, new friends, an acquaintance with a different cultural background, and perhaps the learning of a new language, the pharmacy student can learn more about himself and his relationship with an international environment.

IPSF's drug appeal program is carried out at the executive level of the organization. Drugs received from industry as gifts, are sent to university hospitals

in developing or underdeveloped countries. Currently these drugs are sent only to medical facilities at colleges of pharmacy, to be used for the treatment of pharmacy students.

The international book appeal collects used texts in the field of pharmacy and related fields and distributes them to colleges of pharmacy in developing countries.

What can we do for IPSF? We can organize our individual chapters, or have our Kappa Psi men urge the college administration of SAPHa branch to become active members in association of IPSF. We can inquire if we can host a foreign exchange student in our home, or a pharmacist's home, and find a position in retail, hospital, or industry for an interested student. Can we make arrangements for ourselves to participate in an exchange? We can take a holiday and attend a congress or ski camp to learn more about pharmacy, and make many new friends.



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




At the beginning of second semester, the fraternity sold lab coats as a money making project.
