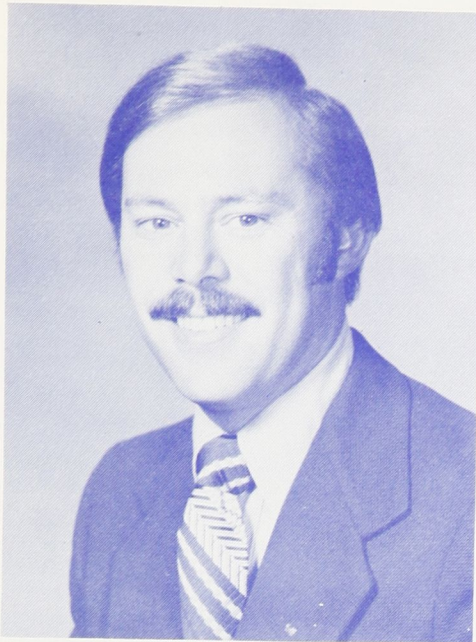
A Chapter success story is written not by the leadership alone, but also by each Brother going out of his way to become involved when and where he can to contribute to the overall success.

# From the Desk of the Executive Secretary



Dear Brothers:

I would like to take this opportunity to share with you an article that appeared in the Los Angeles Loyolan. The article is entitled: "The Frats: A Time of Change."

Even though the article, written by John Wildermuth, explains the situation that exists on the Loyolan campus, it probably explains best what has been happening on many campuses to national fraternities. The following is Mr. Wildermuth's article:

"When people are asked to describe fraternities, certain images keep reappearing. The football weekends, the huge houses with the Greek letters over the doorway and the short-haired men inside, the rowdy antics of carefree college men, in short, the whole "Ozzie and Harriet" image still holds strong.

It is that carefree, uninvolved image that has haunted fraternities all over the nation in recent years. With the radicalization of the 60's and early 70's, they were left as relics of a time that didn't exist any more. Fraternities were too closely linked to the campus to be relevant to world conscious students.

Faced with declining memberships and an increasing disfavor on many campuses, most of the national fraternities were forced to take a long look at their policies, penchants, and goals. Out of this introspection came change. Many of the restrictions on membership were relaxed or eliminated. Much of the trappings of membership, the rites, rituals, and prestige were toned down. The fraternities strove to get closer to their original ideal of brotherhood.

These changes are having their effect. Fraternities that were in serious financial difficulties two years ago due to declining number of active members are happily contemplating expansion.

Some of the reasons for this reversing trend were cited by an officer of a campus fraternity. This officer stated that "pledging is easier now or different anyway. A lot of the physical stuff is gone, which is probably for the best. It used to be just a pledge / active game. Now it is teaching, equal to equal.

The method of pledging now makes sense to the people involved in it. A freshman, pledging one of the campus fraternities felt that he has gotten something out of it. He was quoted as saying "I think that I am accomplishing something. I am learning about helping others, regardless of what it takes. I'm learning about myself."

And what is the overall value of fraternities? Like most everything else, it is different things to different people. Fraternities do play an important role on campus. Acceptance is something most fraternities are working for. The acceptance is coming, as the number of pledges this past spring showed. However, it should be noted that there are certain types of people interested in the fraternity system. It is usually a person with more than one interest. If all a student wants to do is go to school and graduate, the fraternity system is not for them. You have to get involved in the fraternity to get anything from it."

I hope you found this article informative and interesting. It confirmed my belief that fraternities have a bright future ahead as they strive more and more to reach the needs of their fellow man and the needs of our present day American society.

## In Memoriam

Frederick Grill  
1903-1972



Brother Grill was a 1923 initiate of Beta Iota Chapter, North Pacific College of Pharmacy, earning the degrees of Pharmaceutical Chemist (1926) and Bachelor of Science (1927). Both as educator and practitioner his devotion to the profession could be surpassed by few.

As a member of the faculty at North Pacific College until 1941 and later at Oregon State University until 1956, he was responsible for igniting the same spirit of dedication in countless students. As a practitioner, he was for years, the guiding influence in the Portland Retail Druggists Association which he served as Editor of its *Bulletin* up to the time of his death.

During his career, he was always an interested and dedicated Kappa Psi Brother. He served Portland Graduate Chapter in many capacities through the years, including Regent. He was also Satrap of the old Pacific Province (later Province X). All of Kappa Psi join with the Brothers of Province X in mourning the loss of this devoted Brother.

Raphel Otto Bachmann  
1921-1972

Brother Bachmann, served as Dean and Professor of Pharmaceutical Chemistry at West Virginia University, School of Pharmacy. He was a 1942 graduate of Creighton University. Following service as a naval officer, (1944-46) he completed graduate study at Purdue University where he joined Kappa Psi as an initiate of Pi Chapter.

Dr. Bachmann received his Ph.D. in pharmaceutical chemistry in 1950 and was a member of the faculty at Purdue until 1954. At that time, he accepted a position as professor and Head of the Department of Pharmaceutical Chemistry at the University of Arkansas, School of Pharmacy, a post he held until he became Dean at West Virginia University in 1961.

Brother Bachmann served as president of the American Association of Colleges of Pharmacy (1969-70). He was a regional director of the American Board of the Diplomates in Pharmacy. He was also a member of the Pharmacy Review Committee of the Bureau of Health Manpower.

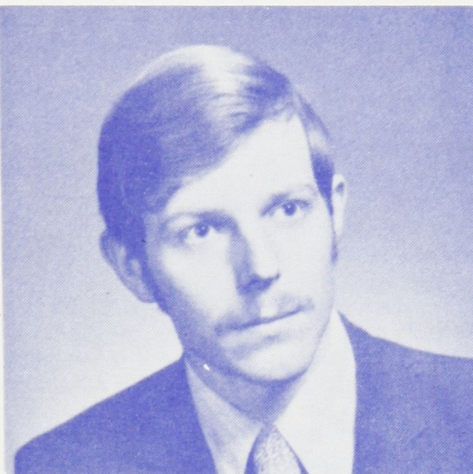

# The Provinces Report

## Province V

Venereal Disease Education Symposium

Registration for the Venereal Disease Symposium began at 8:30 a.m. Welcome and introductions were at 9:30. The first speaker was Stephen C. Elliott, Ph.D.—Professor of Biology at Drake University. He spoke on the microbiology of venereal disease. The clinical aspects in the treatment of venereal disease were then presented by Marvin A. Borsand, D.O.—Medical Director Mid-Iowa Drug Abuse Council. At 10:30 a coffee break was held.

At 10:50 John R. Doran, M.D.—Obstetrician and Gynecologist, MrFarland Clinic, Ames, Iowa, discussed preventive measures for venereal disease. Robert Harrah, B.S.—Director, Venereal Disease Division, Ia. State Dept. of Health, spoke on the incidence, prevalence, and control of venereal disease.

At 12:00 a luncheon was held in the Solar Room of Hubbell Dining Hall. Following lunch, a short tour of the pharmacy facilities at Drake was given.

The symposium resumed with film presentations at 1:00. Discussion sessions were held at 2:30 on a variety of topics dealing with venereal disease education. Two groups discussed the role of the young adult in peer education. These groups were led by Stephen Elliott, Ph.D., Wayne Merkley, Ph.D., Tim Franson, and Bruce Alexander. The role of the health professional in community venereal disease education was the topic of the group led by Kent Forbes, B.A.—Communicable Disease Control Office, Polk Co. Health Department. Karl Schilling, M.A.—former Venereal Disease Health Education Assistant led the discussion on the role of the layman in information dissemination. Lorraine Glazebrook, R.N.—President, Ia. State Educational Association, School Nurse Section, led the discussion on the special role of the school nurse in venereal disease education.

At 3:30 Phillip J. Levine Ph.D. made some closing comments to end the symposium.

At 4:00 p.m. the Province VIII business meeting was held. Satrap Mike Seifert called the meeting to order, and a welcome was given by Duane Bosch, Regent of Beta Chi. Secretary-Treasurer Dan Remund read the minutes of the fall assembly and gave the financial report.

The first order of business was to take action on the bill of \$107 owed by the province to Gamma Epsilon for the registration and room costs of the province officers at the fall 1972 assembly. Since the province treasury contained only \$62.58, the bill could not be paid. It was moved and seconded to defer all action on the bill until a decision has been reached on the proposed increase in chapter dues. After some discussion, this motion was defeated. Another motion to make a \$20.00 token payment to Gamma Epsilon was defeated for lack of a second. General discussion ensued, and the point was brought out that in the past, the province paid for the officers' registration, but not for their rooms. A motion was then made and seconded to pay \$60.00 to Gamma Epsilon to cover the cost of registration of the five province officers. The motion carried.

The secretary-treasurer stated that not all of the chapters had made replies concerning the proposed amendments to the constitution. Five chapters had replied with all votes being affirmative, except for one negative vote on the proposed dues increase.

Tim Franson suggested that the chapters get involved in an interfraternity council among professional fraternities. He expressed willingness to supply information to anyone who desires it.

Steven Pepin, Assistant to the Editor of the *Mask*, stated that it would be desirable to have more collegiate input in the *Mask*. Anyone with articles they would like published in the *Mask* should send the information to Steve.

Satrap Mike Seifert reminded the brothers that the offices of Satrap, Chaplain, and National Delegate will be up for election at the fall assembly. Chapters should start considering nominations for these offices.

Chapter reports were then given by all chapters in attendance, using mostly slide presentations.

At 5:15 Satrap Seifert called for an adjournment. A party was held at Lyons Park Saturday evening.

## IX

Reports of the Officers were presented by Satrap Hamada, Secretary-Treasurer Don Floriddia, and Province Supervisor, Larry Slater. Many topics were discussed including the initiation of a Province Newsletter.

Report of the Chapters were presented by Dave Hurwity (Gamma Rho), Bill Ingram (Gamma Nu), Pat Catania (Pacific Graduate), and Henry Stone (San Francisco Graduate). It was reported that Gamma Rho was experiencing membership problems but that plans were being formulated to alleviate the problem. Gamma Nu reported an outstanding 42 members joining its ranks in 1973. They indicated a very active social and professional program during the past year. It was reported that Pacific Graduate Chapter was suffering from inactivity recently, but the election of a new Executive Committee in a few months should solve some of the current problems. San Francisco Graduate reported that members are contacted every other year by a full mailing and that they also sponsor a dinner for graduating seniors each year.

**John Hunter**, president of Louisiana State University, believes that the college fraternity must earn its place anew. He expressed this challenge at the dedication of Acacia House on his campus. The message is reprinted from The Acacia Journal.

In the context of contemporary America and the contemporary campus one word of wisdom seems obvious: Today's fraternity must reestablish itself first and foremost as **an instrument of intellectual attainment**. To place the necessary emphasis upon intellectual pursuits demands that other aspects be subordinated to the academic purpose—note that I said subordinated, not eliminated. If it is to maintain a respected place on campus, the modern fraternity must reclaim its position as a center of intellectual endeavor, one that fosters an atmosphere of creativity for serious, maturing young adults who share similarly high goals and interests.

If the fraternity is to maintain its influence during these times of academic and campus revolution, it must align itself with the primary purposes of the parent institution. This modern revolution—with its growing enrollments and its uncompromising emphasis upon things educational—could well signal the end of any organization that is unwilling to face these responsibilities.

And the dominant responsibility of the university, of course, is to educate—as broadly as practical and as well as possible, through meaningful extra-curricular activities as well as in the classroom, library and laboratory.

If I were asked for a capsule commentary of the criteria which the modern fraternity must meet, I might suggest several guidelines. I think a fraternity must—not should, but must—help teach its membership several important facts of life. Included among them are these: To distinguish between that which is important and that which is trivial; to recognize the difference between simple pleasure and true happiness; to understand the difference between high grades and genuine scholarship, the difference between defeat and compromise, the difference between an engraved sheepskin and a meaningful education.

A fraternity that can actively supplement the efforts of the University in these respects shall have merited a place of honor on the campus.

A famous American once noted that the purpose of education is to develop the capacities of individuals, first as human beings, second as citizens and finally as competent workers—in that order. Any organization that can make worthwhile contribution in these areas is a valuable asset to the campus. A fraternity that can help a student learn to think for himself, to formulate independent judgements, and to take his place as a knowledgeable, responsible citizen has earned its right to exist.

It seems to me that the message for the fraternity system—indeed, for each individual fraternity—is clear: If the organization has merit and can demonstrate that merit, then it will live and grow. On the other hand, if it cannot prove its worth, it will not make the grade on the cam-

pus of the future.

In the final analysis, the glove has been dropped at the feet of American fraternities. If your organization expects a place on the campus of tomorrow, it must earn anew its place in the academic community. It must prove once again, beyond question, its right to exist.

The question is whether you, as 20th century Greeks, will accept this challenge in the spirit of the Greeks of old, and whether you can dispel the indictments upon this system which for almost 200 years has made its mark in American education.

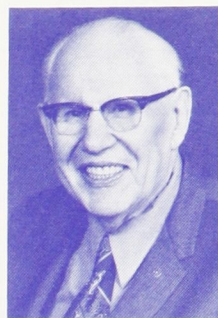

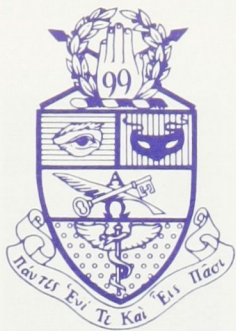
