Dr. Granberg received his undergraduate degree from South Dakota State University, and his Master of Arts and Doctorate from the University of Illinois.

Dr. Granberg accomplishments are many and include a chapter in *Remington's Pharmaceutical Sciences* on drug resources titled "Literature", he also coedited *Remarkable Pharmacists* a series of autobiographies of successful pharmacists, with William Blockstein. Brother Granberg was editor of the *American Journal* of *Pharmaceutical Education* from 1961-1974.

On March 23 Dean and Mrs. Granberg were honored guests at Beta Chi's formal. Attended by members of Beta Chi, and faculty, an award was presented to Dean Granberg in honor of his many years of dedicated service to pharmacy and to Drake University. Dean Granberg will remain in Des Moines and stay in contact with the school and the brothers of Kappa Psi.

We look forward to his counseling and would like to thank him for all his many years of service. We hope they have a bright and prosperous future.

# From the Grand Regent


Noblesse oblige (Fr) Noble birth imposes the obligation of high-minded principles and noble actions.



# Herbert S. Carlin Elected Board Chairman of The American Pharmaceutical Association

Herbert S. Carlin, Apothecary-in-Chief and Associate Director of The New York Hospital, was elected Chairman of the Board of Trustees of the American Pharmaceutical Association at a recent meeting.

Mr. Carlin, who came to the medical center in 1972, had just concluded his second three-year term as an elected Trustee of the Association on December 13, 1983. Prior to that, he had served as vice speaker of the House of Delegates from 1976 to 1978, at which time he was also a member of the Board of Trustees.

In addition to his duties at The New York Hospital-Cornell Medical Center and lecturing at Cornell University Medical College, Mr. Carlin currently serves as Clinical Professor of Pharmacy at the University of

Rhode Island, as a member of the Executive Committee of Revision of the United States Pharmacopeia, and as a member of the National Health Council Board of Directors.

A 1954 graduate of the Rhode Island College of Pharmacy and Allied Sciences, Brother Carlin received his M.S. degree from the Philadelphia College of Pharmacy and Science. He formerly served as Professor of Pharmacy and Pharmacy Administration at the University of Illinois, where he received the Service Award of the Illinois Pharmaceutical Association in 1972. In 1977, Mr. Carlin was the recipient of the Harvey A.K. Whitney Lecture Award. He has also served as President of the American Society of Hospital Pharmacists.

### Some Thoughts on Pharmacy School, Graduation and Success.

Since being asked to write for this series by Dr. Palmieri while attending the Myrtle Beach Grand Council Convention last August, many potential topics have come and gone through my brain. Some of these were brotherhood, communication in pharmacy, and my experiences at Myrtle Beach. While all of these are important to me and may have been acceptable, my situation as a graduating senior (graduated by the time this is distributed) causes my mind to be constantly occupied with thoughts of graduation, the future, the past few years in school, etc. Therefore, I decided to write some of these down in order to get the article done, make some sense of all of these thoughts, and hopefully write an essay which appropriately represents "the student's side.'

First, let me thank Dr. Palmieri for the opportunity to write for *The Mask* and encourage other students to do the same. Writing this article has truly helped me make some sense of all of my thoughts. I also believe that little (and big) victories should be celebrated before they're gone and so I will use this article in part as a celebration of my upcoming graduation. Please forgive me if it gets a bit personal.

Certainly, I would be remiss if I were to not recognize those people without whom I couldn't have made it through school. First and foremost, I think of my parents who loved me and nurtured in me a self confidence that at times seemed like the only thing that I had remaining to keep me going. Thanks to Bill Decker, my brother-inlaw, friend, confidant, personal computer consultant, and landlord. To Toni Host, my Kappa Psi brother, classmate, and main squeeze whose patience, confidence, cookies, and car helped me to get through school in my own way. To Dr. Lloyd Matheson, my academic advisor the GCD and Tom Warwick, my former work supervisor for being the excellent professional role models that they have been in a world filled with professors and supervisors who have no time for a struggling undergrad. To my brothers in Delta Zeta chapter for trusting me with two consecutive offices and helping me to make our chapter at The University of Iowa one of the best. It is to all of these people that this article as well as my diploma are dedicated.

Looking back on my sometimes rocky road through school, what advice would I give to a younger student? First, believe in yourself. If you underestimate yourself or feel that you are not as capable as someone else, you are already half defeated. As you espouse confidence, also be humble and listen to the opinions of others, especially the old & wise and the young & innocent. These people often see more clearly than

the rest of us and all of us can use improvement. Secondly, know yourself and do things your own way. If you follow the path of others, you will be able to do only as well as they have done. Further, get involved! Whether it is with sports, your church, your community, university politics or just an occasional letter to the editor. Three things which have helped me through the rigors of pharmacy education are Kappa Psi, writing, and soccer. Don't fall into the common trap of "I just don't have enough time . . . " Each semester over the last three years in school I have taken on more responsibilities, and each semester my grades have improved. Involvement and hard work don't decrease your scholastic abilities, they actually increase your motivation and abilities. It has been said that "If you want a job done right, give it to a busy man". Lastly, while you can't trust everyone, try to give everyone the benefit of the doubt. It is often the very people whom we criticize or do not understand that we can learn the most from. Remember the old Indian proverb: "Do not judge a man until you have first walked a mile in his moccasins".

So there you have my prescription: Confidence tempered with humility, an energetic free-spirit, getting involved & expressing your opinions, and honestly attempting to learn from and have a positive attitude about everyone that you come in contact with.

So far, I have been talking game plan without mentioning success. I believe success to be as individual as a fingerprint or a personality. If your idea of success is popularity, status, a pink Cadillac, or your own chain of drug stores, then that is what success is. I can remember a story from back when I was a young boy in the secure confines of Burlington, Iowa. My mother had entered me in the Cub Scouts as she had my four brothers before me. While I now look back upon scouting as a most worthwhile organization for a boy, at the time I must admit that during meetings my mind would often wander off to the weird thoughts of childhood such as why flies could walk on the ceiling but I couldn't. Anyway, one particularly memorable lesson on success that I have always carried with me was learned as a scout.

As it happened, each scout meeting had certain rituals which the scoutmaster had to perform such as the opening and closing ceremonies and the presenting of merit badges. At one point in one of these ceremonies he would always refer to the scout oath "Do your best" by asking the scouts to "Do your best, for no one can do better". This little play on words eluded me at first but month after month for literally

years, it kept hounding me. "How can my best possibly be the best?" I kept asking myself. But month after month and year after year the question was superceded by thoughts of the National Football League and the NASA space program.

And then one day it hit me square in the face with all of the "eureka" of a major scientific discovery: If I did my best, nobody could do better, whether my best or somebody else's best was better was totally irrelevant!

Therefore, the absolute best and any one individual best were one and the same.

Well, obviously this made quite an impression on me and I have taken a risk by even trying to relate it in words, perhaps this is just one of these "I guess you had to be there stories". But the interpretation is clear and I hope that my telling of it has meant something to someone.

I would like to wish the best of luck to all students of pharmacy and wish you the courage to make all of your dreams come true. All of the hard work that I have put in has already become worth the effort, and I know that Kappa Psi will be one of the fondest memories of my college life. Kappa Psi has lent me much during college and I look forward to working for Kappa Psi after graduation.

In closing let me mention one more thing about success: If you take it seriously enough that you can't laugh at it, you take it too seriously. Remember, live each day as if it were your last, for one day you will surely be right!

# Margin of Success

# "Benefits of Membership in Pharmacy Associations Outweigh the Weak Excuses"

In Texas, the majority of graduating pharmacy students become employees for a large retail chain outlet, a hospital, or a hospital pharmacy management corporation. Unfortunately, few of them make an attempt to join a professional pharmacy organization. These pharmacists have a myriad of reasons or rationalizations for shirking this responsibility, but most are merely lame excuses. Some eventually do come around maybe three to five years after graduation, but there are too many who never become involved in their profession beyond the four walls where they work.

For myself, once I got involved, it proved to be a real eye-opener. Pharmacy organizations work to maintain the high standards of our profession, monitor legislative and government agency activities on both the state and national levels, and strive to ensure that our profession will have a future!

There are numerous reasons why every pharmacist should maintain membership in these associations. First and foremost, they represent our great profession. They are our voice to legislatures, government agencies, news media, and other professional organizations. Like it or not, we are in an age of "special interest groups;; and pharmacy associations serve that purpose for you and me. An effective pharmacy association is one that carries out the wishes of its members which creates a significant problem when the pharmacists holding membership are of such a minority that the group does not represent the true feelings of the profession it supposedly serves. Minority rule is the price a profession pays when too many of its practitioners choose not to hold membership and support its causes and programs.

Let me describe how one state association has sought to gain the support of the single largest group of pharmacists there is—employee pharmacists. There has been a disturbing tendency for younger pharmacists to remain in employee level positions. This large

group of pharmacists need to be represented in some collective manner and one alternative is for them to join trade unions. The Texas Pharmaceutical Association (TPA) saw this possibility and responded by forming a special membership section for employee pharmacists. TPA realized if it was to fully represent the profession across the state, employee pharmacists would need a strong voice in the organization. Even though the Section of Employee Pharmacists is still in the embryonic stage, members are defining issues of importance to the employee pharmacist and encouraging

TPA to implement programs dealing with these concerns. One major issue that has arisen concerns the employee pharmacist's interaction with corporate management. These pharmacists must balance their standards of professionalism with the demands from all-business, bottomline conglomerates. The employee pharmacist's role is often bounded by corporate guidelines which sometimes conflict with the ideals instilled while in pharmacy school. Likewise, these intelligent, highly trained new pharmacists are usually only given minimal input into the decision-making process and many become frustrated as a result. The outcomes include communication problems with the pharmacists becoming alienated from the corporate system and worse, they begin to lose confidence in their profession being able to provide the type of people-oriented career they had desired when they graduated from pharmacy school.

The Section members have discussed

other important issues facing new pharmacists; most are akin to the profession as a whole, but they are modified by the employee's viewpoint. The use of supportive personnel in non-institutional pharmacies is an example. As viewed by many, the use of technicians would be a blessing for the profession, but potentially devastating to the employee pharmacist job market. In many instances, it would be a matter of pure economics—a pharmacist's salary vs. that of a technician. Other issues the employee group has studied are career alternatives, pharmacy school curriculum, increased consumerism, compensation for consultation, continuing education, health care costs, third-party payment plans, as well as providing standards of practice for the profession now and in the fu-

In addition to representation, another important reason to belong to pharmacy associations is that they serve to protect our profession's well being. For the unaware, there are numerous organizations and agencies who would like to diminish our health care responsibilities, increase our work load, and generally reduce our professional stature. Besides keeping vigilance on these groups, pharmacy

association are the only resource pharmacists have with adequate manpower and influence to prevent negative or harmful actions from being taken against the profession.

In another area of importance, recent surveys have revealed that job dissatisfaction or "career burnout" can be lessened when pharmacists contribute volunteer work within their com-

munity or within their professional associations. Job performance is heavily influenced by a pharmacist's emotional state of mind. To me, this volunteer work and job satisfaction formula was collaborated by a recent DRUG TOPICS survey which reported that chain store pharmacists had the greatest dissatisfaction. Perhaps it is no coincidence that in Texas, they also have the fewest active members in our state pharmacy association. I strongly believe that being an active member in a pharmacy organization provides a psychological advantage to the pharmacist.

Another reason to belong to these associations is to obtain the personal and financial benefits they provide. Associations supply their members with a variety of educational and business materials needed to keep current within our profession. This informa-

tion may consist of general knowledge of value to all pharmacists or it may be of specific importance to specialty groups that typically exist within a large organization. For example, not only does the Texas Pharmaceutical association support a special interest section for employee pharmacists, but it also has sections for pharmacy owners and consultant pharmacists in long-term care facilities.

Keeping current in the profession not only results in better patient care, but it can lead to better job opportunities, promotions, and an overall satisfaction with one's self-assessed knowledge as a pharmacist. Letting your clientele know of your involvement and participation in organizational affairs will serve to elevate their perception of you as a health professional who wants to be aware of the latest trends in drug therapy and patient management.

As I recall my experiences with Kappa Psi while in pharmacy school, I well remember that perhaps the greatest benefit I received from our great fraternity was the opportunity to develop life-long friendships and colleagueships which have carried over into my involvement in state and local pharmacy associations. No person can exist as an island in today's age of telecommunications and daily innovations, and participation in a professional association allows a pharmacist to become acquainted with fellow pharmacists who share the same problems and concerns about the profession.

Many of the pharmacists I work with today in pharmacy organizations are my Kappa Psi brothers. This should not surprise anybody since working together in a cooperative spirit of brotherhood is the very essence of fraternity life. It seems strange to me that this advantage of working together is so well accepted by pharmacy students, yet so many of them totally disregard this lesson in human nature when they become licensed and initiate their careers as pharmacists.

This pharmacist network which develops through membership in a pharmacy organization frequently results in an individual member learning about new employment opportunities and even the location and availability of successful independent pharmacies that are going to be up for sale soon. These types of contacts are important from both a professional and business perspective.

Being an active member gives most pharmacists a better feeling about their profession and an improved level of self-esteem. Should a pharmacist bring to bear all the elements and aids from their pharmacy organizations, he/she most certainly will have the margin to succeed. Let's not forget that the future of our profession will be determined to a great extent by what our associations can or cannot accomplish and that will be dependent on its members. In that context, then, there really are no good reasons for not joining a pharmacy organization after graduation from pharmacy school, but there are plenty of weak excuses!!






