
From the Grand Regent

The Executive Committee and Executive Director Robert Magarian have maintained a busy schedule during the Spring, 1988. Significant events, which are detailed in this issue, are worthy of additional comment. Some of the more important activities include: 1) Revised 1988 Policy on Hazing, 2) Installation of Delta Lambda Chapter, Campbell University School of Pharmacy, 3) Installation of Delta Mu Chapter, University of British Columbia, Faculty of Pharmaceutical Sciences, 4) Selection of Williamsburg, Virginia, as the site for the 44th Grand Council Convention, 5) Recognition of Brother George Griffenhagen during the Kappa Psi Reception at the 1988 APhA Annual Meeting.

The Executive Committee has spent the past six months reviewing the Fraternity's policy on hazing which entailed studying state laws, other fraternity policies, published articles and recommendations from attorneys, Past Grand Regents and national interfraternity councils. The March issue of *The Mask* provided extensive coverage on hazing including laws passed by 27 states to regulate such behavior. The Fraternity has taken a *prominent* position on hazing as indicated in the published policy adopted unanimously by the Executive Committee. There is no place in our fraternity for activities which cause physical harm, excessive embarrassment and mental abuse. Our fraternity was established to be of mutual benefit to the members; to advance the profession of Pharmacy, educationally, fraternally and socially; to instill industry, sobriety, fellowship and high ideals; and to foster scholarship and pharmaceutical research. Hazing is condemned in Kappa Psi. We do not condone it. We will move swiftly to investigate reports of hazing and take action assuring that hazing will be eliminated from the fraternity. Please refer to the Hazing Policy published in this issue.

It has been 25 years since the Fraternity installed two chapters in one year, and even longer since installing two chapters in the same month. But on April 23, 1988, officials of Kappa Psi, including Executive Director Magarian, Grand Historian Ritualist Paul Hiller, brothers of Beta Xi Chapter and myself, traveled to Buies Creek, North Carolina to initiate 46 pledges, install Delta Lambda Chapter and install the first chapter officers. Then one week later, April 30, 1988, Brothers Magarian, Hiller, Collegiate Member at Large Jeff Lee, brothers of Beta Omicron Chapter, including GCD William Fassett and myself traveled to Vancouver, British Columbia, Canada to initiate 14 pledges and 4 faculty, install Delta Mu Chapter and install the first chapter officers. We were bouyed by the excitement, fraternal spirit and enthusi-



asm of our newest brothers and chapters in Kappa Psi. Hardy appreciation is extended to Brother Fred M. Cox, Grand Council Deputy, Delta Lambda and Brother James E. Axelson, Grand Council Deputy, Delta Mu for their efforts on behalf of the new chapters, the new initiates and the Fraternity.

The Executive Committee was pleased to approve Theta Chapter's request to host the 44th Grand Council Convention in Williamsburg, Virginia in August, 1989. Moreover, I am delighted that Brother Edward Sypniewski, Jr., Grand Council Deputy, Theta Chapter, has accepted my invitation to serve as Convention Chairman. The Grand Council Convention (GCC) is by far the most important event conducted by the Fraternity. Much resource and effort by The Central Office, the host chapter and the convention chairman are coordinated to achieve what many brothers believe to be the highlight of their fraternal activities. It was December, 1949 when Theta Chapter hosted the 25th Grand Council Convention in Richmond, Virginia. We are confident that the 44th GCC will rival our last occasion for such fraternity business in that great state.

In March, Past Grand Regent Dewey Garner and I joined Brother Magarian, Past Grand Regent Patrick Wells, Grand Counselor Johnny Porter, Graduate Member at Large John Grossomanides and Editor of *The Mask* Tony Palmieri in Atlanta for the 1988 Annual Meeting of the American Pharmaceutical Association. Fraternity activities were highlighted by the Annual Kappa Psi Reception and visits by more than 300 graduate and collegiate brothers who attended the Kappa Psi Exhibit. At the reception, the Fraternity honored Brother George Griffenhagen by presenting him the **Grand Council Citation of Ap-**

preciation for his outstanding and unselfish contributions to pharmacy and 40 years of service on the staff of the APhA. Brother Griffenhagen was touched by this recognition and responded with cordial remarks about the longstanding relationship between APhA and Kappa Psi.

The recognition of Brother Griffenhagen reminded me of the outstanding accomplishments Kappa Psi brothers have achieved. Often overlooked are such accomplishments at the chapter, province and national levels. The Fraternity has established numerous honors and awards for the purpose of recognition. Each award has specific criteria and procedure for selection and presentation. I have asked Past Grand Regent Garner to review the honors and awards and how members, chapters and provinces may request, obtain and present them to deserving brothers. Moreover, I have asked Brother Benjamin Hershenson, Chairman of the Scholarship Committee, to prepare recommendations for increasing chapter participation in the Scholarship Honors Program. Often, there are brothers, who like Brother Griffenhagen, have given so much of themselves to Kappa Psi, or have been outstanding leaders on the campus or in the profession, or have achieved superior academic and scholastic records, or have made significant contributions to their community or service organizations. Praise is commendation which everyone, no matter what the achievement, desire and deserve. This year I implore each of you, brothers in Kappa Psi, to compliment jobs well done with praise and recognizing that accomplishment by recommending your brothers for the appropriate honor and award.

Finally, this first year of service as your Grand Regent has been an exciting and fulfilling experience. I have had the opportunity to meet and visit with so many outstanding brothers in Kappa Psi. Just recently I traveled to Beta Kappa Chapter, University of Pittsburgh, to celebrate their Diamond Jubilee Anniversary. Brothers who had taken part in 75 years of outstanding fraternity service and history participated in the celebration. Other chapters including Delta Beta, Delta Gamma and Delta Delta have celebrated their Silver Anniversaries. Kappa Psi continues its strong heritage and tradition on College of Pharmacy campuses throughout our country. And now, we have become international having installed the first Canadian chapter. Join me, brothers in Kappa Psi, by working hard for our fraternity and making it truly the very best that it can be.

Meet the Grand Vice Regent

When asked by Brother Tony Palmieri, Editor of the MASK to submit an article about myself, my first thought was, who would really want to read about me? As Tony's deadline for this issue ever so ominously approached, realizing that I could not offer any grand claims to the discovery of insulin, penicillin, or KY Jelly, I thought (or hoped) that some of the Brotherhood might find some interest in learning of some of my background, the opportunities Kappa Psi has afforded me, and of my personal feelings for the Fraternity.

I was born in Detroit, Michigan, on October 24, 1941 and was named after my maternal grandfather (who died several years before I was born), William Grant Loose, and my father, Robert Russell Smith. I spent my first 15 years living in a 3 square mile suburb of Detroit, Highland Park, which is totally surrounded by the City of Detroit. In 1957 my family built a home in a suburb North of Detroit, then known as Warren Township which was at that time mostly farmland, but is now, with a population of 200,000, the third largest city in Michigan. I finished my last 3 years of high school at Fitzgerald High School in Warren. In high school I participated in such activities as: Choir, Spartain Singers, Barber Shop Quartets, Wrestling, Future Teachers, Rifle Club, Year Book, School News Paper, Pep Club, Student Council, Drama Club, Photo Club, Journalism Club, etc. Music has always been of interest and enjoyment to me. In addition to a year of piano and two years of clarinet lessons, I spent 10 years singing in the Men and Boys Choir of St. Paul's (Episcopal) Cathedral in Detroit, beginning as a boy soprano at the age of 10.

My first taste of economic independence and exposure to the Profession of Pharmacy came at about age 12, working in a small local Pharmacy on Saturday mornings for 50¢/hour sorting empty beer and pop bottles and making deliveries on my bicycle. This princely wage, plus tips, usually provided enough money on Saturday afternoons to purchase a bleacher tick-



et (75¢) at Briggs Stadium to see the Detroit Tigers play baseball. Trolley car fare was 20¢ each way, so I usually had enough money left for a hot dog (25¢) and a pop (5¢). When the City of Detroit discontinued streetcar service in 1956, I had, at age 15, the shocking realization that I would have to give up my dream of a career as a streetcar motorman.

In 1960, I started my college studies at Wayne State University in Detroit, Michigan. In February of 1962 I pledged Kappa Psi, (probably one of the smartest and significant decisions of my life!) and was Initiated into Mu Omicron Pi on May 11, 1962. As a collegiate member of the Chapter I held the Offices of Treasurer, Regent, and Pledge Master. Aside from helping me to improve my academic studies at Wayne State University, (I received the Asklepios Key and later the Merck Award) the Fraternity functioned in broadening my horizons and assisted me in serving in other areas, such as: Editor of the Pharmic (the College Year Book), Member of the Student Advisory Board (the Student Governing Body), President of the APhA Student Branch, Secretary-Treasurer of the Region IV Student Branch of APhA, and Chaplain of Province V.

In December of 1963, traveling by train (B&O RR, and L&N RR) I attended the 32nd Grand Council Convention in Atlanta, Georgia, as a Delegate from Mu Omicron Pi, an event that changed my life for ever! To this

day, I have yet to find words adequate to describe both my anxiety and thrill of meeting such (legendary at that time) Brothers as: Jim Thayer, Herman Forslund, Nick Fenney, Frank Eby, and Glen Sperandio, to name just a few. Even then, I knew that these distinguished Brothers and many others would become life long friends. I was so impressed with the Brotherhood and work of that 32nd Grand Council Convention that I have attended each Grand Council Convention since that time, either as a Chapter Delegate or Member of the Executive Committee of the Grand Council.

In 1966 I graduated from Wayne State University and since that time have practiced pharmacy in hospital, chain, independent community, and clinical settings. Currently, I manage McDougall Pharmacy, a professional, clinical pharmacy in an inner-city medical center. I have been a Member of the Detroit Graduate Chapter for the past 22 years. Since graduation, I have had the honor of serving the Detroit Graduate Chapter in the following Offices: Editor of the Kappa Kapsule, 5 terms; Chairman of the Joint Properties Management Committee, 5 terms; Regent, 3 terms; Treasurer, 2 terms; Secretary-Treasurer, 4 terms; Historian, 1 term; Chaplain, 1 term.

In the early 1970's, I had the opportunity (thanks to Grand Regent August Dante) of serving for 1 year as a Member of the Public Relations Committee, and an additional year as Chairman. I was later honored (by Grand Regent Norman Campbell) to serve for 2 years as Associate Editor of the MASK. At the 38th Grand Council Convention in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania in July of 1976 I was elected to the Office of Graduate Member-at-Large, serving in that capacity and that of Chairman of the Graduate Development Committee for 3 years.

In 1979 at the 39th Grand Council Convention (the Kappa Psi Centennial) in Scottsdale, Arizona, I was elected to the Office of Grand Counselor. I served in this position and that of Chairman of the Legislative Committee of the Grand Council for 8 years,

being re-elected at the 40th, 41st, and 42nd Grand Council Conventions. During this period I also served as Supervisor of Province V, 1979-81; Supervisor of Province IV, 1981-83; Supervisor of Province II, 1983-87; and Co-Chairman of the 40th Grand Council Convention General Committee, 1980-81.

Between 1979 and 1987 I was particularly blessed to have Past Grand Regent Norman Campbell serve all 8 years as Graduate Member of the Legislative Committee of the Grand Council. I was, also, most fortunate to have the services of 3 fine Collegiate Brothers: Robert F. Smith (Mu Omicron Pi), Stuart T. Haines (Mu) and David Burgess (Upsilon). Between 1979 and 1983 we were able to: completely revise the Uniform Collegiate Chapter By-Laws, Uniform Graduate Chapter By-Laws, and Uniform Province By-Laws; publish a New Edition of The Constitution, By-Laws, and Uniform By-Laws (1983 Edition), the first time all of the above documents had been published in one volume in

20 years; and implement the Local Ordinances concept. Between 1983 and 1987 much time was devoted to "fine-tuning" all the above.

At the 43rd Grand Council Convention, in 1987, I was elected Grand Vice Regent. Constitutionally this also allows me to serve as Chairman of the Publications Committee. I am quite excited about service in the publication area and overall supervision of Fraternity Publications. The two principal projects that the Publications Committee will be working on are: 1) Revision of the Handbook of Kappa Psi; and 2) Compiling and editing the first proposed policy manual for the Fraternity.

I am also, a streetcar buff, specializing in the usage of "PCC Cars". I would particularly like to acknowledge the kindness of several Brothers in both Philadelphia and Pittsburgh during the last 4 years for having "chaperoned" me on several trolley car rides. Now, that is true Brotherhood!

The little boy in me still gets goose pimples at the prospect of a train ride.

Recently, I have made 2 trips by train for the Fraternity to Province I, which I now supervise. First, I had the honor of Re-activating Albany Graduate Chapter, February 20, 1988; and second, I had the privilege of attending the Province I Assembly, and making an Official Visitation to Beta Delta Chapter, March 24-26, 1988.

Over the last 26 years, Kappa Psi has been a very big part of my life. Many of my personal joys have been shared in some way with many Brothers of the Order. On those occasions of sadness and grief which we all must bear, the many helping hands of the Brotherhood have always provided a sustaining and comforting influence. Scripturally, we are told that we bring nothing into this world and will take nothing out of it. However, if we are very lucky and work very hard we may make and leave a contribution in this world. Perhaps, if I am fortunate enough, I will be allowed to leave a positive contribution to my profession through Kappa Psi.

Meet the Grand Counselor

Grand Counselor Porter was born on September 18, 1950 in Hartshorne, Oklahoma. Pledging and . . . Hazing?

Hazing, and the human tragedies, administrative problems, and legal nightmares arising from it, continue to concern student affairs administrators. Since 1970, over 30 pledges have died as a result of hazing (Buchanan, Shanley, Correnti, & Hammond, 1982; Hornbuckle, 1981: "Massachusetts Governor," 1985). The circumstances surrounding some of these deaths are as bizarre as they are tragic. One pledge died as a result of kidney failure caused by paddling. Another pledge died when a sandy grave that he was forced to dig for himself collapsed. Still another pledge died from a gunshot wound suffered while playing Russian roulette. At least nine of the deaths resulted in civil suits to recover damages and two, in criminal prosecution (Buchanan, et al, 1982). Menial hazing has also taken its toll. Purely psychological methods of hazing, such as telling pledges that they have failed fraudulent "national examinations" have left pledges emotionally affected to the point that they developed speech impediments (Horn-

buckle, 1981). Eighteen states now have statutes making hazing illegal; nine others are considering such legislation ("Fight Against Hazing," 1986).

Pledging at ACP this year has been turned completely around by the members of the Interfraternity Council members realizing that saner and a more appropriate pledge period for professional students had to be initiated. The actions of the Greek Letter Organizations had gone too far last year and a stop to such shenanigans was a must.

This year the activities were completely organized and controlled by the Pledgemasters. Not one complaint was received by the Office of Student Affairs during the pledging period. The pledge classes and the Greek Organizations are to be congratulated for taking care of a very serious matter that was getting out of hand here on campus. In the recent past this pledge period completely disrupted the educational processes for all students, teachers, and staff. This year the Brothers

did a good job and removed the distasteful events resulting in a sane progressive and professional rush period.

There still is further work to be done in preventing the hazing that does seem to take place of campus. This area must be worked on.

Whether hazing place on campus or off campus, it is against the law. Hazing is a Class A Misdemeanor punishable in New York State by up to one year in jail and/or a \$1,000 fine. No student at the Albany College of Pharmacy is to be subjected to hazing at any time in any form.

Hazing are acts of senseless endangerment on and off campus. The Office of Student Affairs is here to work closely with chapter officers to develop: positive pledge education and programs. We have come a long way together this year in the pledge period but we still have more to go together. Activities off-campus that bring about a denial of sufficient time to study must be examined and addressed by all.

SUBJECT: HAZING

1. Hazing is defined by the Kappa Psi Pharmaceutical Fraternity as any physical or mental harassment. Specifically, hazing includes but is not limited to the following:
 - A. Any form of forced physical exercise,
 - B. Any activity that might reasonably be expected to cause embarrassment or psychological harm to the individual,
 - C. Any activity that might reasonably be expected to bring physical harm to the individual,
 - D. Any activity that might reasonably be expected to degrade or otherwise compromise the dignity of the individual,
 - E. Any activity that might reasonably be expected to require an unreasonable or inordinate amount of the individual's time, or in any manner impair the individual's academic efforts,
 - F. Any activity that might reasonably be expected to make the individual an object of ridicule,
 - G. The required consumption of any liquid or solid matter, or
 - H. Any requirement which compels an individual to participate in any activity which is illegal or contrary to the individual's genuine moral and/or religious beliefs or contrary to the rules and regulations of the educational institution.
2. All acts of hazing by a chapter or any of its members or alumni are specifically forbidden. Any national officer, chapter officer, Grand Council Deputy, chapter member, or alumni who has knowledge of any incident which violates the hazing policy should within 48 hours, notify the Grand Regent of the incident with details of the incident stating which part of the hazing policy which was violated.
3. The Grand Regent will, within 5 days of the reporting, appoint an investigating officer to make a full and complete report including a list of charges and or violations of this policy and the names of the chapter officers and or members alleged to be involved in the incident. The involved person, persons or chapter will be notified and be required to attend in person or respond in writing to a "show cause" hearing within 10 days of notification to explain the alleged violations of the policy and to give reasons why any or all of the following sanctions should not be recommended to the Dean of the College of Pharmacy of the University for implementation. The Executive Director shall then prepare a full and complete report to the Executive Committee. If after careful review of the violations and the responses of the accused, the Executive Committee finds the allegations to be true substantially and verified, the Executive Committee may recommend to the Dean of the College of Pharmacy of the University any or all of the following sanctions for this consideration.
 - A. Resignation of the Regent and the Pledge educator from their respective offices in Kappa Psi. The Grand Regent, in consultation with the Grand Council Deputy, will appoint a member to assume the offices vacated.
 - B. Placing of Regent and Pledge educator on social probation which would be governed by the policy of the university involved.
 - C. Placing on social probation the individual members involved in the actual hazing which is governed by the policy of the university involved.
 - D. Suspension of the involved persons from the College of Pharmacy or University.
 - E. Expulsion of the involved persons from the Fraternity.
 - F. A written education program for the membership on hazing shall be submitted to the Fraternity and the Dean of the College Pharmacy within 30 days of the investigation.
 - G. Disqualification from any and all awards for the involved persons during the current school year.
 - H. Suspension of the Chapter from College or University activities.
 - I. Suspension of rights to pledge and initiate new members.
 - J. Requirement of chapter of involved persons to sponsor or perform community service.
 - K. Requirement of chapter to conduct anti-hazing workshops on campus.
 - L. Require all members to sign a copy of the national hazing policy.
4. Implementation. This Executive Committee Policy on Hazing shall be distributed to each and every active Chapter in Kappa Psi Pharmaceutical Fraternity. The Policy shall be sent to the Regent and Grand Council Deputy with the expectation that at the next regular meeting the policy will be read out loud to the officers and brothers of the chapter. Each Chapter Regent will be required to submit a copy of the policy signed by the Grand Council Deputy and the Regent attesting to the fact that this policy has been read to the membership of their chapter.






Medi-Span Appoints Boyd New Vice President of Operations

Beta Kappa Celebrates 75th




