The Uncertain Future: Alternatives for Kappa Psi

For centuries man has attempted to predict the future. Because of the future's inherent uncertainty, there is no single set of forecasts that one can be totally sure will occur. There are trends and events which shape the future which are often inconsistent or contradictory. Therefore it is useful to evaluate those more predictable circumstances and ask "what if." Such exercises are important in establishing the most likely scenarios which describe what the future will be for an institution. The future for Kappa Psi Pharmaceutical Fraternity will be shaped by changes within our fraternity, but even more by the larger environment; thus Kappa Psi will be shaped by pharmacy education and pharmacy education will be shaped by the profession, higher education, health care and society.


What are the alternative futures for Kappa Psi? Will there be a future of continued growth characterized by competent management, innovation and ingenuity? The rising affluence of American society encourages us that growth may be achievable. On the other hand, our future could be one of decline and stagnation marked by a worldwide deepening recession, internal unrest and difficult resource shortages. Perhaps the Fraternity will become more disciplined by abandoning some of our traditional freedoms for the sake of a tightly controlled organization. Or finally, there may be an overall transformation in which the organization becomes a dramatically different entity which may be unrecognizable to the brotherhood of today but consistent with the needs and desires of the membership and society of tomorrow.

What will be your role in determining the future for **Kappa Psi?** How have you contributed in the past to the Fraternity's present position on your campus, in pharmacy education, in the profession, in health care and in society? What are your present contributions to such positions and perspectives? Are you satisfied with yourself that you have done what you could do and should do for our fraternity? Are you pleased with the Fraternity? Satisfied that **Kappa Psi** is what it ought to be?

Does **Kappa Psi** have the broad mind, the clear vision, the pathway to an exciting future? Are we assured of continuous success? What must we do together and what must you do individually to make **Kappa Psi** even better than it is today or better than we ever imagined it has been in the past?

Each of these questions are very difficult for us to answer, yet it is our responsibility to the organization to conduct such an evaluation. And as we look to the future how will the Fraternity respond to the more predictable trends impacting our fraternity environment today? Think along with me as we review some of these changes.

Today well over 50 percent of all new students enrolling in pharmacy schools are women. In



fact some entering classes have reached a female-male ratio of 2 to 1. Such numbers speak for themselves. Women have selected pharmacy for professional careers. Gentlemen, this means long-term. They are bright, aggressive, committed and hard working. In fact, a number of women have joined the ranks of Kappa Psi and achieved the highest elected offices in collegiate chapters, graduate chapters and provinces. Others have chosen a path as Kappa Psi Little Sisters by which they make meaningful contributions to the fraternity. But, where will the opportunity and energy for future growth be derived for chapters which have not included women? In the past two years we have observed chapters which have failed, become inactive, ignoring the obvious opportunity presented by this dynamic social change in our profession and henceforth in the Fraternity. What alternative do you have for women in pharmacy and Kappa **Psi** as we proceed into this uncertain future?

Pharmacy education, like pharmacy demography, continues to evolve. Presently about 20 percent of all colleges of pharmacy have implemented the Doctor of Pharmacy as the entry level degree into the profession. The change is much more than a mere name. The professional curriculum is clearly divided into didactic and experiential components. The ratio of didactic credits to experiential credits is approximately 2 to 1. Thus, one-third of the professional curriculum in a Doctor of Pharmacy program (2 years prepharmacy + 4 years professional) is spent off-campus, on assignment in a practice setting with a preceptor. Opportunity for student oncampus activity is extremely limited. Collegiate chapters are faced with policy and procedure questions regarding attendance, participation,

dues and a variety of other concerns. These are not minor issues on these campuses. About 30 other colleges have add-on Doctor of Pharmacy programs. Most deans and administrators are addressing the question of All-Pharm.D. Thus, how will **Kappa Psi** respond to such change? Is the Doctor of Pharmacy *the* degree in pharmacy's future? Must we begin our preparation for this transition?

The decades of the '60s and '70s were marked by some of the most important social changes in American society. That era left many Americans more tolerant and more receptive to change. In addition, modern media techniques affect the velocity by which potential change is evaluated, monitored and accepted. Now, we are all affected to a greater extent by events and circumstances which in the past may not have achieved such notoriety. Our ability to manage and control ourselves is much more challenging than ever before. Some change is good. Other may be bad, depending upon one's perspective. But one thing is certain, change will take place. Therefore, it behooves all Kappa Psi brothers to fulfill our duty and responsibility of directing the Fraternity along the appropriate path to achieve our goals and assure the greatest success.

There also comes a time when change affects our personal lives more directly. During the past two years I have had the pleasure of serving as your Grand Regent. It has been wonderful to meet so many of you, to visit your chapters and to discuss fraternity affairs. The honor and privilege of this office are astounding. The responsibility of the Grand Regent can be awesome. We have had a number of occasions to address change, to plan our future, to assure a more certain destiny. I thank each of you for your support of Kappa Psi and for your commitment to industry, sobriety, fellowship and high ideals. I ask that you carefully weigh the influence that you have on our order. Address your responsibility to Kappa Psi objectively, with vision, and be prepared to adapt to change. Finally, may we always be mindful of our motto; "One for all and all for one."

BROTHER ANTHONY J. SOLOMON (BE) - GENERAL TREASURER OF THE STATE OF RHODE ISLAND

During my term as Grand Regent (1972-1974), I entitled one of my Mask articles something such as "Kappa Psi, Training Ground for Leadership." One needs only to review the leadership rosters, past and present, of every major pharmaceutical organization in this country to be convinced of the truth of the assertion contained in that title. It would be dangerous to begin listing Brothers whose leadership has contributed so much to professional societies due to the imminent danger of overlooking some person(s). The cooperative and leadership skills learned by Kappa Psi Brothers during their pharmacy school days are manifest outside of pharmacy as well.

One such Kappa Psi Brother is Anthony J. Solomon, a fellow initiate of Beta Epsilon Chapter and contemporary during my collegiate days. In January of this year, Brother Solomon returned to the office in the Rhode Island State House which he occupied previously from January 1977 until January 1985. Anthony was first elected to the post of General Treasurer (State Treasurer in many jurisdictions) in the November 1976 statewide election after having served with distinction in the Rhode Island House of Representatives for 10 years. He was re-elected to the Treasurer post in 1978, 1980, and 1982. In 1984, following a strong and successful bid for the gubernatorial nomination of the Democrat Party. Anthony lost the general election for Governor. He failed in a bid to obtain the nomination for Secretary of State in 1986. The 1988 comeback is history.

Kappa Psi honored Brother Solomon with a Certificate of Commendation from Alpha Chapter during the 75th Anniversary celebration of the Providence Graduate Chapter in February of this year.

During a recent State House interview, Anthony reviewed some of the factors which motivated this community pharmacy owner to seek public office in the first place. The story serves to emphasize the essence of what is embodied in the role of a community pharmacist, particularly if



that person also is a Brother of Kappa Psi.

Prior to entering public office in an official way, Anthony worked with the people in the neighborhood of his Providence pharmacy to develop a drug abuse education and treatment center. He was instrumental in developing a pioneer store front health center and contributed time and resources to many local organizations to assist the needy in his community.

His visibility in these activities, as well as his recognition as the pharmacist who provided services to locals, resulted in two lines forming in his pharmacy—one for prescriptions, the other for bringing him problems to be solved.

Anthony's rapport with the community came to the attention of a campaign organizer for a former Providence Mayor. He invited Anthony to join the campaign team. The rest is history!

After his election to the General Assembly, his lines in the pharmacy became fixed for the next ten years. Fortunately, Solomon family members, including daughter Donna Harrison, a pharmacist, were there to take up the slack of the professional and business side so Anthony could devote the time and energy needed to serve his constituents.

It is the business acumen that pharmacy owner Solomon developed over the years which he credits with his success in the office of General Treasurer. Who is better equipped to handle fiscal problems of increasing costs and shrinking resources than a pharmacy owner?

Since leaving the Treasurer's office in 1985, Anthony has been specializing in the area of public sector financing to bolster further the expertise which won him recognition of his peers and election as President of the National Association of State Treasurers in 1981.

How does his modest, effective politician and Kappa Psi Brother put his public service in perspective? When asked why he entered politics initially, he responded, "I enjoy it!"

Saski Authors text


Dr. Witold Saski (Gamma Epsilon) has recently authored a text Crossing Many Bridges, memoirs of a pharmacist in Poland, the Soviet Union, the Middle East, Italy, the United Kingdom and Nebraska.

In 1951, Dr. Saski emigrated to the U.S. and for the next 24 years served as Professor of Pharmacy, first at the University of Montana for a year and then at the University of Nebraska.

A Fulbright Scholar and U.S. National Academy of Sciences Exchange Scientist, Dr. Saski's nearly 350 publications include four co-authored editions of a laboratory textbook and foreign scientific abstracts. He is a Fellow in the A.Ph.A. Academy of Pharmaceutical Sciences.

William R. Straughn (Gamma Sigma) was recently promoted to captain in the Medical Services Corps of the U.S. Navy. He has been selected to assume the position of Executive Officer of the Naval Hospital Great Lakes, Illinois this summer.

Dr. Robert A. Magarian, Executive Director and Professor of Medicinal Chemistry, was selected by the Pharmacy Students at the University of Oklahoma for the 1989 College of Pharmacy, Alumni Association Teaching Excellence Award.

This award was presented to Brother Magarian during the Pharmacy Day Awards Banquet on March 31, 1989.

Gene Riley named distinguished alumnus at Duquesne

A native of Washington, Pa., Dr. Riley received his B.S. degree in Pharmacy in 1952. He received his Ph.D. in Pharmacology in 1961 and stayed on first as an instructor and later assistant professor in the Department of Pharmacology at the Case Western Reserve University School of Medicine.

Dr. Riley returned to Duquesne's School of Pharmacy in 1966 as associate professor of Pharmacology. He became a full professor in 1972 and was appointed Chairman of the Department of Pharmacology-Toxicology in 1970, a position he held until 1987.

During his 22 years at Duquesne he has taught all or portions of the undergraduate courses in Anatomy and Physiology, Pathophysiology, Pharmacology and selected topics in Prescription Drug Counseling. He also taught the Pathology course for the School of Nursing for eight years. In the areas of graduate education he taught complete or partial courses in pathology, clinical pharmacology, advanced pharmacology and drug mechanisms.


