


Just What Should We Do?

Recently I was reading a fraternity publication and found an article entitled "The Crisis Facing Fraternities." Prior to reading the article, I conducted some selfevaluation of Kappa Psi. What are the crises in this fraternity? And what are we doing about those crisis? Initially I couldn't identify what might be considered major problems/crisis. But, there were three items which I believe we need to do better, especially Grand Officers and the Central Office. These activities include (1) communication, (2) planning and (3) leadership education and training. The major emphasis in the article, however was the rash of hazing events which today plague the social fraternity system to the point where several entire fraternity systems are under study by faculty/administrative committees.

Pressure is mounting to do away with fraternities on many campuses. Such pressures are not reserved for the social fraternities. When discussing chapter reactivation with some Deans, I am frequently confronted with concerns about activities often identified with fraternities no matter how far fetched, obsolete or mythical. When fraternity difficulties arise and become public, the entire fraternity system, both professional and social, are held accountable. Unfortunately, public trust in fraternities is fragile. Likewise insurance companies take very conservative positions when discussing fraternity risks and underwriting those risks. In fact, some groups have found that liability insurance for fraternities is either not available at all, or very expensive, and/or carries exclusions against hazing and other behavioral problems that may render the policy virtually worthless. Therefore it behooves all of us; collegiates, graduates, Grand Council Deputies, other faculty advisors, and Deans; to be mindful of these emerging circumstances and be prepared as best we can to avoid problems.

Should a tragedy occur, what steps should be taken? This topic was addressed in a bulletin from the national office of one social fraternity. The bulletin was distributed to the collegiate chapter presidents and copied to the faculty advisors. I've included part of the article for your attention. "The recommended procedure is as follows:

1. Be certain that every chapter member knows that you (the president) are in charge of the situation involving a serious accident. In your absence, have a ranking order of officers established and be sure they know where to find these instructions.



2. If the tragedy is a serious injury or death, your first call is the emergency number for an ambulance. If a fire, the fire department must be called. Don't take chances thinking that the members have the situation under control by agreeing to transport an injured party to the emergency room or by having a fire under control. Make the calls to professionals. Both ambulance services and fire department numbers should be posted by all telephones.

3. Immediately call your chapter advisor. Also call your house corporation president especially if the injury or fire occurs on the chapter's property.

4. Assemble your members in a group. Explain to them that there is an emergency situation and that the house is closed to outsiders. Instruct them not to make outgoing calls. Depending upon the situation, it might be necessary to call in out-of-house members and pledges. Seek advice from your chapter advisor. Instruct your members to make NO statements to anyone.

5. If the injury is serious, call an attorney within 24 hours and make a full report to him. Follow his advice. You will probably need to obtain written statements from everyone who witnessed the accident.

6. Only you or your chapter advisor, if he agrees, should make statements to the media. If a fire, all questions should be referred to the house corporation president. Again, seek advice from your attorney regarding information or any prepared statements which should be released to the media.

7. Notify university officials as soon as possible. They will be contacted by the media and perhaps government officials.

Many universities will also provide further guidance and support. Cooperate fully with the university and government authorities on reasonable requests, and be truthful on the facts.

8. Do not notify parents. If a serious accident or illness, the medical personnel will notify parents and advise them of the student's physical situation. If a death, ask university officials to provide notification.

9. Do not admit or in any way imply responsibility for the injury as a chapter. It is especially important that the chapter not pay or offer to pay medical or other expenses. This implies an admission of responsibility.

10. In the event of a fire, the house corporation president should contact the fire insurance agent as soon as possible.

11. Notify the national office within 24 hours providing the following:

- a. full name, address and telephone number of the injured party,
- b. description of the incident,
- c. description of the property damage, if applicable,
- d. date and time of the incident,
- e. name, address and telephone number of any witnesses,
- f. chapter name, address and telephone number, and
- g. name, address and telephone number of person who will act as the official contact for the chapter.

Once the above information is received, the national office will make an official report to the liability insurance company. Further advice will also be given by national office personnel. Of course, it is proper to make hospital visits and to send sympathy cards and notes, flowers, etc. If a funeral, it will mean a great deal to parents or relatives if members attend."

Some of these procedures might sound harsh. I hope we will never need to follow them, but tragedies do occur. Your comments on this topic would be appreciated. Should the Executive Committee adopt such guidelines as recommended procedures for Kappa Psi Chapters and Brothers. Please share your thoughts with me.

Finally some announcements are in

1. Last summer, chapters from **Provinces V** and **VI** petitioned the **Executive Committee** to merge. The Committee approved the merger pending no dissent from chapters upon further notification. The deadline for such notice passed on November 1, 1988 with no dissent. Therefore the Provinces are officially merged and shall henceforth be called **PROVINCE V.** We look

forward to more dynamic activities from these chapters and their contributions to the brotherhood and to the Fraternity.

2. The strategic planning continues. Unfortunately, most collegiate and graduate chapters have not returned their information after not one but two mailings and requests. To date, almost 70 percent of the **Deans** and 50 percent of the **Grand Council Deputies** have responded. Why will only 28 percent of the collegiate chapters reply to this request for information vital to planning the future of **Kappa Psi**? Ask your **Regent** or **Secretary** if they have completed and returned the survey. If not, do so immediately!

3. The **44th Grand Council Convention** will be held on August 5–10, 1989 in Williamsburg, Virginia. It is not too early to begin your plans for attendance and participation. By far, this is the most important event conducted by the Fraternity. Be there and learn more about **Kappa Psi** in five short days than you will know in the total of your previous fraternity experiences. I guarantee you will have the time of your life.

4. Keep your Dean and Grand Council Deputy informed about what goes on in the chapter. Often Deans remark to me that they are unaware of your activities. Keep in mind that they have a variety of diverse responsibilities. It is your responsibility, not theirs to keep them abreast of what Kappa Psi is doing. Believe me, they want to know what's happening. Frequently they are asked the same questions by alumni, "How's the Kappa Psi Chapter?" What do you want them to say? Take control of the message by routinely providing your Dean and GCD with details about chapter accomplishments, events, officers and programs.

5. SCHOLARSHIP: This year we want to increase the number of chapters participating in the Scholarship Honors Program. Notices have been distributed to each Collegiate Chapter and Grand Council Deputy informing them of the recognition program for brothers deserving scholastic honors. The rules and procedure are provided in the program announcement. There is no expense to the chapter, school or GCD. Just identify the brothers who

have earned a cumulative B average or better over the past academic year and submit their names to the **Central Office**. Please review the rules carefully. But, don't deny this worthy recognition for deserving brothers.

6. Congratulations: Chi Chapter, the University of Illinois, Chicago, has been reactivated. See details in this issue of THE MASK.

7. Finally, I hope to see all of you at the Annual Kappa Psi Reception at the Annual Meeting of the American Pharmaceutical Association in Anaheim, California. All of you are welcome to this event on Sunday evening, April 9, 1989. Please come and bring your Brothers.



Roberts selected

UNIVERSITY, Miss.—Dr. Kenneth B. Roberts of Memphis has been selected as the new dean of The University of Mississippi School of Pharmacy after a national search for a successor to retiring Dean Wallace L. Guess.

The announcement was made when Dr. Roberts was introduced at a Friday pharmacy faculty meeting. Chancellor R. Gerald Turner will submit Dr. Roberts' name for approval by the Board of State Institutions of Higher Learning, and he is expected to assume his new post on July 1.

A noted lecturer and author, the 44-year-old Roberts is presently associate dean for academic affairs at the College of Pharmacy at the University of Tennessee in Memphis as well as professor of pharmacy administration and director of the Center for Pharmacy Management and Research. He also serves as an adjunct associate professor of health care administration at the Ole Miss School of Pharmacy, a position he has held since 1984.

"This was a search that resulted from input from a number of people," said Chancellor Turner. "Dr. Roberts is a professional who is widely respected by pharmacists in all aspects of the profession in Mississippi. We are particularly pleased that someone with his professional standing and skills will be assuming this post."

Dr. August G. Danti, professor of pharmaceutics, was awarded the David C. Silverstein Memorial Civil Award by the Monroe, Louisiana Chamber of Commerce for 1988 for his voluntary efforts on behalf of civic and charity organizations. This is the most prestigious award offered by the Chamber of Commerce. Dr. Danti is an active member of 33 civic and charitable organizations, serving on the Board of Directors for 24 of those organizations, holding the presidency of five, the vice-presidency of two, and the treasurer of one. In 1988 he received the Volunteer of the Year Award from the American Red Cross for his promotion of AIDS Education and the Citizen of the Year Award from the National Association of Social Workers.

garian our Executive Director, and I have put in a lot of time to prepare for this Convention. We have been at work since early April 1988. The Williamsburg Hilton and National Conference Center was submitted and accepted by the Executive Committee because of the exceptional facilities and wide variety of activities that this location, nestled in the Virginia forests, has to offer. Its location is equidistant from Richmond and Virginia Beach. Therefore, air travel arrangements can be made to the destination airports of either Richmond, Virginia Beach/Newport News or Patrick Henry, based on best airfare.

The meeting facilities at the Hilton are very spacious and accommodating. The hotel offers an indoor/outdoor swimming pool, two outdoor tennis courts, two indoor racquetball courts, a whirlpool spa and sauna, an exercise room for men and women along with a recreational room equipped with 3 pool tables and a ping-pong table. Numerous restaurants are within short driving distances, featuring entrees ranging from seafood delicacies to steak. An outstanding brunch is available at the Hilton on Sunday. Colonial Williamsburg, one of the first settlements in the New World, and Busch Gardens, an extraordinary amusement park that features thrilling rides, evening concerts, various representative "countries" and restaurants from England, Germany, France and Italy, are both readily accessible by tram from the Convention Center Hotel. The Anheuser-Busch brewery, which offers daily tours, is within walking distance. The first settlement in the New World, Jamestown, as well as Yorktown, the location of the final surrender ending the Revolutionary War are both a short drive away. Several plantations are open for visitation and tours, daily. There are a number of meticulously groomed golf courses in the area including the Kingsmill Golf Club (River Course) which is the home of the annual Anheuser-Busch Golf Classic.

For those brothers interested in more water than that offered by the hotel pool, Watercountry USA, with its numerous high chutes and water "rides" is a 5 minute drive from the

convention center. For others who want to enjoy the "sea breeze," Virginia Beach is just one hour's drive east of Williamsburg. This area not only offers great beaches on the Atlantic Ocean but also appetizing seafood dining. Anyone desiring to visit Washington, D.C. can do so during the free day offered in the convention schedule. A two-hour drive from Williamsburg will place you on the steps of the Capital.

As you can tell, Williamsburg has it all! To all Kappa Psis, let's keep that spirit alive! See y'all at the convention!

For two years, Brother John Russell, Associate Dean for Student Affairs at the University of Illinois College of Pharmacy has been searching for a promising occasion to launch the reactivation of Chi Chapter. Pilger to Bike Across America

Kappa Psi has meant a lot to me over the eight years since I pledged Delta Zeta at the University of Iowa. Indeed, several people who know me well will testify that Kappa Psi was one of the things which kept me going through a tough period in my life when I was struggling academically. One semester, our meager little chapter elected me (I may as well be frank and say appointed me) Vice Regent for the following year. If I remember correctly, we had 11 members and nine of those would be seniors. (I'm very happy to report that Delta Zeta has had a tremendous resurgence since those days and now is among the largest and most active chapters.) About this same time, it was becoming a very real possibility that I may not even be a pharmacy student the following semester due to poor academic performance.

Well, I accepted the job of Vice Regent, and squeaked by the GPA requirement that semester. Though I never did set the world afire with my grades, they kept improving and I'm now doing quite well as a clinical "satellite" pharmacist at the Medical College of Georgia. I will always look back on that time as my "turning point" in school. Knowing that the chapter had invested their faith in me to hold office made me feel a responsibility to other people which was exactly the little boost I needed to increase my motivation and my studies. Kappa Psi has helped me in other ways as well. Our public service projects let me get my feet wet in serving the public. I have always felt that helping others was among the noblest things a person could do.

On very rare occasions in life we are offered a chance to live our dreams. One of my longest held dreams is to ride a bicycle across the United States. I feel that just to talk with the local people and smell the air as I ride from state to state would be extremely fulfilling. I have pictured myself as a kind of self-propelled Charles Kuralt. Several accounts of adventures of selfawareness such as "Zen And The Art of Motorcycle Maintenance" and "A Walk Across America" have fueled my longing for such an experience. I had just begun to feel that there would never be a better time in my life than the present, and had sketched several northern routes on an old road atlas when a letter arrived with my future



in it.

The letter was from the American Lung Association and described a fundraising transcontinental bicycle ride that they were having this summer. The route that they would take paralleled my sketches almost mile for mile! I felt a calling like never before in my life. I could share my dream ride with others of like mind, and raise money for a most worthy cause at the same time.

The 3rd annual ALA TransAmerica Bicycle Trek will be from June 5th to July 21st and stretches 3,357 miles from Seattle to Atlantic City over mountains and rivers and cities and little hamlets. Around 400 riders from high school age to retirement age will pedal the northern U.S. sleeping in tents and spreading the word for the American Lung Association. Each of us MUST raise \$5,000 to go on the ride, but I have taken this task to heart and set my goal at \$10,000.

The ALA is the oldest voluntary health care organization in the U.S. They receive no money from government or from the United Way. Most of you know them as "the Christmas Seal People." But the annual Christmas seal campaign cannot keep pace with the many and varied programs from which we all benefit. Programs to fight smoking in our workplaces and pollution of our air. Educational shows to help keep kids from smoking (tobacco AND marijuana) and research dollars for lung cancer, emphy-

sema, and other pulmonary illnesses. It is hard to imagine a more worthy cause for anyone, and especially for health professionals.

I am trying to raise half of my goal through the health professions, and I know that I can count on Kappa Psi. If half of you who have taken the time to read this could send \$25, my goal would soon be reached. But please don't depend on the "other guy." Send whatever you can and make the fraternity proud. If you prefer, a pledge (to be collected later) can count toward my goal as long as I have your mailing address. Then the ALA will send reminders next summer. I would like to challenge each chapter to hold a special fundraiser or set aside a percentage of funds raised and donate at least \$100 to this cause. I can accept donations and pledges even while on the ride, but would prefer to have them by mid-May.

All donations and pledges should be mailed to me, but checks should be made out to the American Lung Association. NONE of the money that I raise will go toward my expenses or help me in any way except by helping me reach my sponsorship goal. Please write to me if you have any questions or comments, and thank you all in advance for your help in this crucial fundraising effort.

Increasing Job Satisfaction

The following letter was sent in by a Kappa Psi Brother.

I am a satellite pharmacist at a major medical center in New York. In the eight years that I have been registered, I have practiced a year as an independent retail pharmacist and almost two years as a chain store pharmacist.

Occasionally I have a day or two when I feel really good about being a hospital pharmacist and I experience a high level of personal satisfaction. Most days however, I find my work to be frustrating, repetitious and unrewarding.

Since I have experienced these feelings in every pharmacist position I have ever held, should I change careers?

A hospital pharmacist, New York

I read two articles about nine years ago that really made a lasting impression on me. Since you indicate in your letter that you are unhappy with your work and that you are considering a career change, I would like to tell you about them.

The first article appeared in a monthly national business publication. It reported that the average worker makes three significant job changes during their lifetime—one of which, may be a change from a previous vocation. The other article came from a regional business journal a few months later. It stated that as high as ninety percent (90%) of the American work force is unhappy with whatever it is that they do for a living. The point I want to make is that being dissatisfied with your work is as much a part of having a job as is receiving a paycheck—even if you make three significant career changes!

I am sure that you can recall many instances which illustrate the frustrating, repetitious and unrewarding nature of your work. You may even consider these situations to be responsible for your present discontent. However, it is more likely that your job dissatisfaction is due to changes which are occurring in workplaces all across the nation and which are beyond your control. For example:

• Employers routinely reduce their labor force and demand greater



productivity from their employees when their profits decline;

- Employees want more authority in determining how they actually do their work; and
- Technological advances, which demand that people become proficient at new work procedures.

In addition to these trends, other factors may contribute to your job dissatisfaction: your salary may be too low considering your lifestyle and your expectations; your co-workers may possess mannerisms that make your work more difficult; or you may have a demanding schedule that restricts your social activities and takes time away from your personal responsibilities. Any of these situations would be enough to make you dissatisfied with the best job you can imagine, when they occur in combinations they will make even your ideal position undesirable. Unfortunately, unless you were to actually make a change it is unlikely that you would ever be able to determine whether or not the same, or possibly a worse situation exists in a different field or position.

Whether you continue to practice as a hospital pharmacist or you switch careers it is important that you learn how to minimize whatever job dissatisfaction you do encounter. So here's an exercise that can help you:

- Make a list of every work related activity you have ever enjoyed.
- Identify the basic skills and abilities that make up each activity you listed. Write them in the column next to each activity.
- Think of ways that you can inte-

grate these skills into those work related responsibilities you do not enjoy. Enter your possibilities in the column next to each skill.

 The next time you have to perform a work related activity which you do not enjoy, refer to this list to learn how you can make it more enjoyable!

As you become more experienced at using this skill integration exercise, you will find that your personal effectiveness also increases.

Despite your unhappiness with your work as a pharmacist there must be something about your job that you find appealing; otherwise, you would not have worked as a hospital pharmacist for as long as you have. In view of this, you would be wise to determine what that something is and to remain alert for opportunities that allow you to use it more frequently in your present duties—before you saddle yourself with the responsibility of having to get established in a new career.

Although reducing your job dissatisfaction may be the solution to your problem, you should be aware that you may be in a situation where it is in your best interest to change careers. How strongly you identify with the following warning signals will indicate whether or not you should change vocations, as well as employers.

- You recognize that your work performance is not as good as it could be, or should be. You have no desire to improve it.
- You have no interest in improving yourself, personally or professionally.
- Your work related responsibilities and activities create pressures which threaten your marriage, your emotional stability or your physical health.
- You have trouble getting along with your family and close personal friends, as well as your coworkers.

If you decide to make a career change, seriously consider a career which requires you to use the specific skills and abilities you identified earlier—those which you enjoy using, as well as those which you know you do well.

Establishing yourself in a personally

satisfying career demands that you know yourself, that you discipline yourself and that you persist. Whether or not you are eventually successful and how long it takes you will be determined by how well you understand the ever changing nature of your workplace.

As a beginning to this most important project of developing a positive attitude towards scholarship within your chapter, we offer four ideas:

* Provide motivation:

- Follow Fraternity and university grade requirements.
- Advertise and promote chapter, campus, and National Fraternity scholarships, awards and honoraries.
- Do not be afraid to restrict social and intramural privileges of those members who do not meet minimum performance levels.
- Provide other individual incentives within your chapter for excellent scholastic performance.

- ★ Set examples as Leaders:
 - Establish grade requirements for officers and committee chairmen.
 - Never downplay the importance of scholarship.
- ★ Teach your members to change bad habits:
 - Require members to attend campus workshops on improving study habits, test-taking and time management.
 - Have alumni, faculty or chapter advisors speak to your brothers and pledges about how they developed a positive academic attitude.
- ★ Provide continued support:
 - Use university programs, manuals, etc., and make this information available to your members.
 - Design tutorial programs for members having trouble or for those members who want to improve their performance.
 - Provide other written information that will promote a positive attitude within your chapter.

Remember, as brothers we are students first, and Greeks second. Social enjoyment should be a reward for a job well done.

Ways to Cope with Criticism

Unless you're perfect, you'll probably be criticized at some time. How well you handle that criticism could determine how far you go in your career. Here are some tips to help you effectively handle criticism:

Be honest with yourself. Realize that you have faults. If you remain humble, criticism won't jar you too much.

Put yourself in the place of the person criticizing you. If you had that person's job, would you have the same reaction to whatever prompted the criticism?

If you're convinced the criticism is unfounded, discuss it with the person offering it. Get it out in the open or you'll harbor resentment that's bound to come out elsewhere.

Don't apologize unnecessarily. If the circumstances warrant, of course apologize.

Don't whine during or after the criticism. No one likes to work with a whiner.

When being criticized, stop talking as soon as you feel your stress level rising. Do anything to give yourself time to think. Think of what you want to say before you say it.

Disarm your critic and encourage helpful advice by asking how you might have done better.

Focus your efforts on following justified critical suggestions to upgrade your job performance.

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
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
