THE 1937 MEETING

The 1937 National Meeting of K Ψ will be held in New York City in August during the period of the meetings of the American Pharmaceutical Association and Allied Bodies. The exact date or dates cannot be announced at this time because the dates of the A.Ph.A. meetings have not been selected. The April issue of THE MASK will carry all details. The election of Grand Officers will be carried out by mail, as decided by the vote also of the collegiate chapters, during early April, and those elected will be formally installed in office at the New York City meeting of K Ψ in August.

In order that all readers of THE MASK may be acquainted with the series of events which followed the decision of the chapters concerning the scheduled 1936 convention, as announced in the July, 1936 issue of THE MASK, the series of three letters concerned with the matter follow:

I. LETTER OF OCTOBER 30, 1936

*(The Success of the National Convention Depends upon a Reply NOW)
Fellow Kappa Psi:*

This communication goes to you, an officer or past officer of a chapter, because we are confident that you will attend to the two most important matters found below, and that *promptly*. If this should go to *somebody* else, PLEASE get it to him NOW. Thank you very much.

Matter No. 1: Your chapter has received THE MASK (July) announcing the National Convention of 1936 (December 29 and 30, at the Coronado Hotel, St. Louis, Mo.), and the details concerned therewith. In order to send out official instructions, forms, etc., it is absolutely imperative that the form at the bottom of this page be filled in IMMEDIATELY and returned AT ONCE to this Office. PLEASE look after it NOW. Thanks.

Matter No. 2: Please hand your chapter *treasurer* the inclosed printed National Dues Form, and instruct him to attend to this matter AT ONCE. Remember that the *National Monthly Dues* or "*per capita*" consist of 50c per month per member for October, November, December, January, February, March, April and May (8 months only). Also that for each new initiate, the *Grand Council Membership Fee* of \$2.00, and the *Life Subscription* to THE MASK (\$10.00) should be paid. The Treasurer MUST return the Form, properly filled in with ALL data requested in each column, to this Office, together with money order or check for the amount due. THE DUES FOR OCTOBER AND NO-

MEMBER ARE DUE NOW. Chapters not in good standing with the Grand Council are NOT entitled to representatives at St. Louis.

Improved economic conditions are already reflected among Kappa Psi chapters. One chapter reports 20 pledges! That is fine work indeed. Let's all get our share of the best freshmen NOW. We are anticipating the best Kappa Psi session since 1929! Please accept my best wishes and kind regards, and remember me to all the boys.

II. LETTER OF NOVEMBER 30, 1936

IMPORTANT! Demands immediate Attention!

Dear Brother in Kappa Psi:

On October 30 this office sent an important letter concerning the 1936 National Convention (scheduled for St. Louis during the approaching Christmas holidays) to all chapters, requesting that certain necessary information be reported to this office at once. We have waited until today in order to give all chapters an opportunity to reply, but to date only 13 chapters have done so; viz., Eta, Mu Omicron Pi, Nu, Pi, Psi, Omega, Beta-Beta, Beta-Gamma, Beta-Mu, Beta-Sigma, Beta-Upsilon, Beta-Omega and Gamma-Zeta. We thank these "faithful few," and wonder what is the matter with the remainder of our at least 37 active, collegiate chapters!

The N. Y. Central R. R. system furnished us with the just-announced holiday rates from the cities in which our chapters are located to St. Louis and return. These data, together with the information provided by the 13 chapters mentioned above, plus data estimated from last session's chapter records, have enabled us to estimate closely the expenses which our collegiate chapters must meet in holding the scheduled National Convention in St. Louis.

The Constitution provides that the railroad fare of one delegate from each collegiate chapter in good standing shall be met by dividing the total railroad fares of such collegiate delegates by the total number of active members in the collegiate chapters, and assessing each member of each and every collegiate chapter that pro rated amount. (Chapters may send a second voting delegate, but such second delegate's expenses must be met by the individual chapter itself.)

Now to get "down to figures." The total cost of round trip railroad fares for the following chapters' delegates will be \$1345.60: Portland, Birmingham, Philadelphia, Detroit, Baltimore, Newark, Omaha, Des Moines, Ada, Buffalo, Chicago, Boston, Richmond, Toledo, LaFayette, Cleveland, Corvallis, Fargo, Indianapolis, Oklahoma City, San Francisco, Pittsburgh, Minneapolis, New Haven, Lawrence, Memphis, Albany, Valparaiso, Pullman, Cincinnati and Austin, Texas.

From the data available, there are not more than 330 active, collegiate members at present in our chapters.

From the foregoing figures (\$1345.60 divided by 330) it is obvious that it will be necessary for each and every active collegiate member of each and every collegiate chapter to be assessed at once \$4.08 to meet the total expense (railroad fares) of one delegate from each collegiate chapter.

In addition to the railroad fare, delegates who must travel over night will have a Pullman charge; and then there is the matter of hotel room. The Coronado Hotel has granted us the special rate of \$2.00 per man, two men to the room. It will not be necessary for anybody to spend more than two nights at the Coronado, since the scheduled convention lasts but two days. However, chapters must take these two items into consideration, since Pullman fare and hotel bill are not pro-rated in the expense referred to above, but instead are met by the individual chapter. Meals, of course, constitute another item to be met by the individual chapters or by the individual delegate himself.

There are some who believe that, with the expenses before them, many of our chapters will feel that they cannot put their members to this routine convention expense right at this time. IT IS IMPORTANT THAT WE DETERMINE AT ONCE WHAT OUR CHAPTERS AS A WHOLE WISH TO DO. We have made *tentative* arrangements with the Coronado Hotel, and these arrangements must be confirmed or cancelled before the end of the week. CONSEQUENTLY, you MUST ACT and act AT ONCE.

There are some, also, who believe that the collegiate chapters may

desire, in lieu of the scheduled St. Louis meeting, to hold in its stead an election of National Officers by mail by chapter vote, and thus save the expenses attending a national meeting right at this time. These elected national officers would be formally installed during the meetings of the American Pharmaceutical Association to be held in New York during August, 1937, at a called meeting of Kappa Psi in attendance. Chapters would be given the right to send delegates or proxies (graduate or faculty members of their chapters who plan to attend the A.Ph.A. meetings anyway, and thus save chapter expense) to this called meeting, and in that fashion a substitute for a national convention held.

PROMPTNESS must be observed in this matter, and we are putting the matter of securing your chapter's desires in this situation up to you. THE INCLOSED POSTAL CARD should be filled in at the earliest possible date (today—certainly tomorrow at the latest) signed and mailed back to this office "pronto." Each chapter will be promptly informed of the result of this canvass.

III. LETTER OF DECEMBER 9, 1936

Dear Brother:

A sufficient number of replies to our communication of November 30, concerning the planned national convention tentatively scheduled for St. Louis during the Christmas holidays, has been received to date to warrant an announcement concerning the result.

Twenty-four chapters have voted in favor of having an election of national officers by mail and formally installing them at a meeting of Kappa Psi to be held in August, 1937, during the sessions of the A.Ph.A. in New York City.

Only four (4) chapters, to date (Pi, Beta-Chi, Beta-Omega and Gamma-Delta), voted *not in favor* of this plan, and wished to proceed with the plans for the St. Louis meeting.

Since a majority of the chapters have, therefore, voted in favor of the mail election-August meeting plan, this communication is being sent to you and your chapter to formally announce that the tentative plans for meeting in St. Louis have been abandoned, and that soon after the Christmas holidays, a formal ballot for voting on Grand Officers will be sent to your chapter. The results of the election will then be announced, and definite plans for installation and a meeting in August also made well in advance of the New York meeting, so as to afford all chapters an opportunity to be represented at that meeting, as pointed out in our letter of November 30.

Please accept my best wishes for a joyous holiday season, and for the

realization of all your hopes and ambitions during the approaching New Year of 1937.

During February our chapters install their new officers for 1937-38. We congratulate all new officers, and thank the retiring officers for their aid during the months past. We invite the new officers to call on this office for all aid we are in a position to render. The information below is published for their use.

New Chapter Officers

At initiation each initiate, according to the Constitution, should be provided with a copy of the Constitution and By-Laws, and urged to study it. Officers on assuming office should carefully read the duties of the officers as set forth in the Constitution. Copies of the Constitution are sold at less than cost—25 cents per copy. Chapters should hold brief study periods during which the Constitution is studied. Hundreds of our graduates have never seen a copy of the Constitution. Here the fault lies with chapter officers who are not acquainted with those things they should know. Would that more chapter officers would seek to inform themselves.

The only sources of income of the national body are: (1) *The Per Capita Tax* or monthly national dues of 50 cents per active man for the months of October through May of each session. Kappa Psi has never changed this amount—the smallest of any national fraternity of any description (except some of the honorary societies, and they, of course, are not “fraternities” in the usual sense of the word). It is on this that the Fraternity depends for income to run the national business of the Fraternity, to pay for stationery, postage, the printing of membership, pledge and file cards, the printing of revisions of the Ritual and of the Constitution (when such becomes necessary), the printing of the perforated secretary's and treasurer's sheets, the purchase and stamping of officers' record books, telegrams, post office box rent, expenses of national officers and faculty or graduate members appointed to make official visits to chapters (this has been temporarily and unfortunately abandoned during the depression because of the expense), other minor office supplies like typewriter ribbons, etc., and the rest of the everyday, simple, and individually inexpensive items required by any office organization—costing not much individually, but over a period of a year making a total which is not “a few pennies.”

(2) *The Life Subscription to THE MASK*: The \$10.00 for this is to be

paid by all initiates. Thus far this year very, very few have paid this item, probably because the bulk of the initiations will come during the second semester. We have had many experiences of this kind, too: A member pays to the chapter his life subscription; the chapter is supposed to send it right on to the Central Office; but it appears that many times this is not done—the chapter needs funds to pay a note on its house or furniture or for coal or for food or whatnot—apparently believing for the time being that “a bird in the hand is worth two in the bush!” Then the matter is forgotten, but Brother Smith, who has paid his life subscription to his chapter, graduates, and presently he recalls that he has been out of college three or four years and has never received a copy of THE MASK during all that period—he writes the Central Office complaining about the matter—we look the matter up in our records and files and find that the chapter never sent the life subscription for Brother Smith. This happens all too often—and it is poor business on the part of the chapter which does it. That is why we urge all initiates to get receipts for their payments and keep them. The marked fall-off in the payment of life subscriptions is the major reason why the Grand Council ordered “thin” issues of THE MASK until general conditions pick up and bring an increase in the number of Kappa Psi initiates, and an increase in the number of members actually paying their life subscriptions.

(3) *The Grand Council Membership Certificate Fee:* This is a fee of \$2.00 which should be mailed to the Central Office together with the life subscription and one of the white membership cards for each and every new member initiated. This is the only means this office has of recording initiates. Numerous initiations have been carried out without the chapter sending in the membership card of the initiates, let alone their GCMF and life subscription fees. In such cases the national body has no record of the initiations. This fee is to pay for the membership certificate (engraved), the penman, the mailing tube or the mailing envelopes (with the new style the envelope is used) and the mailing. It about covers these items. Here again, due to the fact that some chapters collect this \$2.00 fee from the initiate but forget to send it in, many a graduate complains about non-receipt of his certificate.

(4) *The Agora Assessment:* “The Agora” is the Fraternity directory, which is revised about every five years, and which gives the names and addresses of all members—by chapters and geographically, a short history of Kappa Psi, etc. To help pay for these revisions of over ten thousand names and addresses, each chapter pays (February 15) *once a year* the sum of four dollars out of the chapter treasury.

Annually, a detailed report of funds received and expended and balance on hand, properly audited and certified, is made at the annual meetings of Kappa Psis held during the A.Ph.A. convention, or at conventions when such have been held. Copies of such reports are mailed to the individual chapters for their permanent files.

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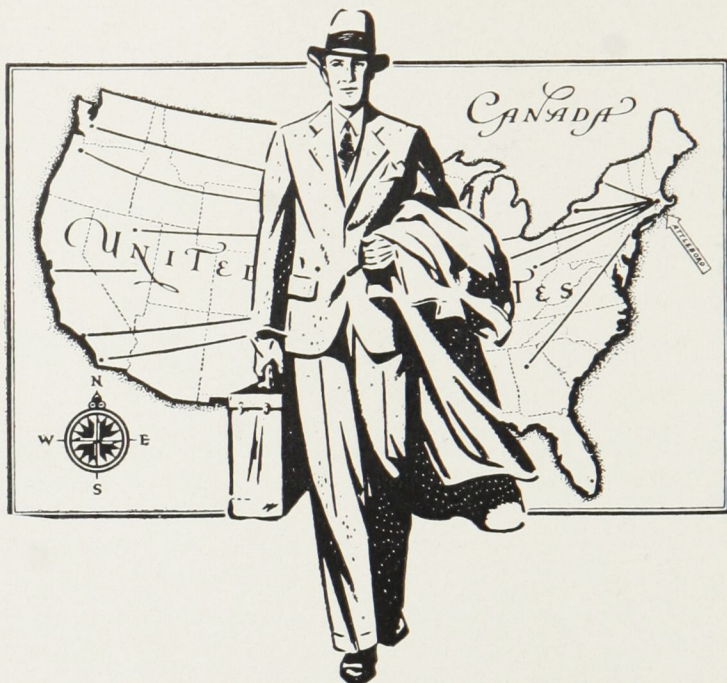
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
