THE 1953 GRAND COUNCIL CONVENTION



Another important chapter in the annals of Kappa Psi Pharmaceutical Fraternity will be written on December 28, 29 and 30, 1953, when the TWENTY-SEVENTH GRAND COUNCIL CONVENTION will be held at the Sheraton-Park Hotel, Washington, D.C.

We believe that the 1953 convention will be the largest and the most interesting of all Kappa Psi conventions. A visit to Washington at any time is a grand experience but to attend a national convention of one's own fraternity in the Nation's Capitol is a rare event which should serve to attract, in this instance, a record number of Kappa Psis.

A national convention is not just another large fraternity meeting with emphasis on a good time. It is actually an important occasion when the work of past years is reviewed and evaluated, and when sound plans for the fraternity are formulated for future years. It is also the time when the warm fellowship of fraternity life appears at its best; when old friendships are renewed and many new and lasting friendships are made. Our good Brothers in Gamma Tau Chapter and the District of Columbia Graduate Chapter have been working for months on plans for the convention and they promise that it will be Kappa Psi's finest. They expect delegates from all Collegiate and Graduate Chapters and are looking for large delegations of members from any of the Chapters. See that your chapter does not disappoint them.

HANDBOOK FOR PLEDGES

Last December (1952) the new HANDBOOK FOR PLEDGES in temporary form was distributed to all Collegiate Chapters. It was suggested that each chapter use the Handbook as a guide in the pledge training program and also study it carefully with the idea of suggesting improvements for the revised edition which probably will be published next year. The Handbook has satisfied a definite need within the Fraternity as has been shown by its enthusiastic acceptance. It will certainly be a very important aid in future pledge training and for this reason chapters should study the Handbook and be prepared to present, at the national convention, recommendations for additions, deletions, and revisions which they regard as essential for the improvement of the revised edition.

MANUAL FOR PLEDGES

For some time the Grand Regent has entertained the opinion that a Kappa Psi MAN-UAL FOR PLEDGES was essential to insure a program of training which will be uniform in teaching to all pledges, the basic principles of our fraternity.

Recently a committee composed of representatives of Eta, Omega, and Beta Omega Chapter have been working with the Grand Regent and as a result have prepared a Manual for Kappa Psi Pledges. This will be reviewed at the next meeting of the National Executive Committee and if approved, will be presented for consideration at the Grand Council Convention.

KAPPA PSIS IN THE ARMED FORCES

Many of our Brothers on completing the course in Pharmacy have been called into the Armed Forces. To all of you who have the privilege of serving your country we say "Godspeed" and a prayer that you may soon return to your families and a successful career in Pharmacy.

From the Desk of the Editor

Maynard W. Quimby

This issue of THE MASK represents the final number of the fiftieth volume. For a half century members of Kappa Psi have been kept informed of the various activities of our organization through the pages of this, our official publication.

Unfortunately few members have an opportunity to examine the early issues, and it appears that few complete sets of the fifty volumes of The Mask exist. While we have not seen the set, it is our understanding that there is a complete one in the New York Public Library. The Mask office will be very pleased to learn of the existence of any other complete files of our publication. Even the Central Office set is not quite complete, although it is being supplemented by the addition of photostatic copies of missing numbers.

If you do have a chance to look through any of the early issues, by all means do so. There's much of interest to be found there.

In this and in some future issues of The Mask it is our plan to include certain material of interest from and about the publication over the years.

The Mask hasn't always been a quarterly. At least Volumes One and Two each consisted of six issues. The first number of the initial volume was dated January, 1904, and Press Eldridge, Jr. was the editor. His address was given as 19 West Eighteenth Street, New York City. (A picture of a photostatic copy of the cover of the first number appears on the opposite page. Editor.) Listed below the name of the editor in the first issue are the names of six assistant editors, one from each Collegiate Chapter then in existence. These assistants, their chapters, and their schools were:

F. H. Smith, Beta Chapter, University College of Medicine, Richmond, Va. Frederic(k) W. Rugg, Gamma Chapter, New York College of Pharmacy, New York, N.Y.

H. Phillip Hill, Delta Chapter, University of Maryland, Baltimore, Md. Frank I. Born, Epsilon Chapter, Maryland Medical College, Baltimore, Md. Leo F. Byrnes, Zeta Chapter, Georgetown University, Washington, D.C.

Eugene M. Hollyrod, Eta Chapter, Philadelphia College of Pharmacy, Philadelphia, Pa.

Later in the same year some of these members were replaced by other members of the respective chapters.

On the editorial page of the initial issue the following brief statement was made concerning this new journalistic venture.

Happy New Year

Born with the year 1904 the Kappa Psi MASK makes its appearance and asks you for your approval.

Not unlike the new-born babe, it must be nursed carefully and clothed properly, and everything possible must be done for it, in order that its growth may be healthy and rapid.

We trust The Mask will fill a long felt want. We hope it will make itself indispensable to the Fraternity, and we earnestly pray that every Active, Passive, and Honorary Member will subscribe to it.

Another report of interest in Volume One tells of "the annual convention of the Fraternity . . . held in Washington, D.C. on November 26 and 27 last, under the auspices of Zeta Chapter. . . ." Of course the year was 1903, fifty years ago this month.

In addition to the January number of Volume One, other issues appeared in February, March, April, November, and December, 1904. The entire volume consists of 88 pages,

less pages 74 and 75 which were omitted due to an oversight on the part of the printer. Brother Eldridge served as editor of the first five issues, and Frederic W. Rugg, then and now residing in Portland, Maine, edited the sixth as well as several subsequent issues. His address was given as 145 Spring Street, Portland.

Throughout this volume it is evident that considerable attention was given by chapters to means of keeping graduates ("Passive Members") interested in the Collegiate Chapters.

An interesting account of the installation of Theta Chapter on March 19, 1904, is included in the April number.

The first evidence of any statistical data concerning the geographical distribution of Kappa Psi members appeared in November, 1904. The report stated that "already we have given the liberty of the Agora to men hailing from twenty-eight different States and Territories in this country, as well as Canada, Bermuda, and Puerto Rico." Distribution as of that time is shown by the following tabulation:

The 1904 annual convention was reported in the December issue. This conclave was held in Philadelphia on November 24 and 25, with Eta Chapter as host.

In examining this initial volume of The Mask one also observes a number of other interesting features. Among them are chapter newsletters, a variety of advertisements, personal items about graduates, medical state board questions (from states of Pennsylvania and Minnesota), and an article concerning bovine tuberculosis. Only one picture appears in this volume, and that is of George L. Holstein elected Grand Secretary and Treasurer at the Philadelphia convention mentioned above. He was a member of Eta Chapter.

It is hoped that this information will prove of interest to our readers. If present plans materialize we shall include other write-ups of this type in some future issues of The Mask. Comments from the members will be welcomed.

AMERICAN PHARMACEUTICAL ASSOCIATION INVITES NOMINATIONS FOR IODINE RESEARCH AWARD

The 1954 Chilean Iodine Educational Bureau Award is scheduled for the convention of the American Pharmaceutical Association which will be held at Boston, Massachusetts the week of August 22, 1954.

The Award consists of \$1,000 and a diploma setting forth the reasons for the selection of the recipient.

Any member of the American Pharmaceutical Association may propose a nominee by submitting eight copies of each of the publications to be considered in the competition and a biographical sketch of the nominee, including date of birth and a list of his publications.

Nominees must be residents of the United States or Canada and must have done outstanding research work in the chemistry or pharmacology of iodine and its compounds as applied in pharmacy or medicine.

Additional information regarding the Award is given in the enclosure and it will be appreciated if those to whom this Bulletin is addressed will make the enclosure available to individuals who might be interested in submitting a nomination for the Award.

All nominations should be addressed to the Secretary of the American Pharmaceutical Association, 2215 Constitution Avenue, N.W., Washington 7, D.C., and must be received on or before January 1, 1954.

Gamma Gamma Chapter Tops in Scholarship at University of Texas*

Scholastic averages for the various campus organizations maintaining houses have been released by the office of the Dean of Men.

Kappa Psi fraternity is the leader with a scholastic average of 1.962, or nearly a "B," for the total membership. Halstead House is second with a 1.923 average.

The various group averages are interesting to note. The All-Girls' Co-op average is 1.695; the all-sorority mark is 1.601; and the all-women's median is 1.592.

For the men, these averages were recorded: Men's Co-Op: 1.442; fraternity: 1.335; and the all-men's mark was 1.331.

For the entire University the average is 1.409.

The compilation of scholastic averages is achieved by dividing the total number of hours completed by the members of the group into the total number of grade points earned on these hours. Dropped courses and courses receiving other symbols, such as P, Q, R, W, and X, are not included. Grades are evaluated with A equalling 3 points; B is 2; C is 1; and D and F with no point value.

After the two leaders, these groups rounded out the top 15: Powell—1,912, Shangri La—1.875, Whitehall—1.824, Kappa Alpha Theta—1.820, Kappa Kappa Gamma—1.755, Pi Beta Phi—1.752, Alpha Epsilon Phi—1.708, Zeta Tau Alpha—1.667, Chi Omega—1.651, Alpha Phi—1.627, Alpha Omicron Pi—1.603, Delta Delta—1.599. These were all women's organizations. A men's organization, the Tejas Club, with a 1.590 mark, finishes up the top fifteen.

Richardton, North Dakota.



THE PUBLIC PRESS AND FRATERNITY STORIES*

We have been convinced for a long time that fraternities are subjected to a good deal of reaction of the writer in stories which appear about them in the public press. Two recent stories confirm this opinion.

The Dean of Men and Dean of Women at the University of Illinois have recently completed an intensive study of costs of attending the University. The study goes into real detail as to types of housing and points out a range of budgets of minimum, average, and above average amounts. One of the conclusions of the study is that at present cost levels living in a fraternity or sorority costs just about the same as living in a University-owned dormitory.

One of the Chicago newspapers picked up the story and stressed only the fact that living in a fraternity or sorority costs considerably more than living in a rooming house or cooperative house. It is unfortunate that newspapers print partial stories in this manner.

One of the local papers published a brief article during the month of June to the effect that an individual was suing a chapter of the Elks Lodge for \$12,500 charging that he was seriously injured during an informal initiation ritual. The suit charged further that the initiation took place in the Champaign City Building. This story was published locally and had no further repercussion. If it had been a case of a similar story coming out of a fraternity initiation stunt, it would probably have been front page news from coast to coast.
