

You Should Know.



Charles W. Bliven

CHARLES WATSON BLIVEN, dean and professor of pharmacy of the George Washington University, was initiated into the Gamma Epsilon Chapter of Kappa Psi in 1930, while a student at the University of Nebraska.

Born at Dakota City, Nebraska, November 22, 1911, he received his elementary and high school education in this northeastern Nebraska town. In 1928, he attended the Wayne State Teachers College at Wayne, Nebraska, and in 1929 enrolled at the College of Pharmacy at the state university. After a two-year interruption of his program, he returned to the University of Nebraska in 1933 and received the bachelor of science degree in 1934. He remained there during the next four years, receiving the master of science degree in 1935. Dean Bliven served as graduate assistant and assistant instructor while doing his graduate work and then as instructor from 1936 to 1938. In addition to his studies at Nebraska, he studied at the University of Michigan during the summer of 1936, and at the George Washington University. He married Marjorie Bennett Brew in June, 1938, and they have two children. Mrs. Bliven also received the master of science degree from Nebraska.

In 1938, Dean Bliven joined the analytical staff of the Geo. A. Breon Co. of Kansas City and served there until going to George Washington as assistant professor in 1940. He was appointed acting dean in 1946 and dean in September, 1947. His research has

been in the areas of enteric coatings and analytical procedures. During World War II, he served one year with the Maritime Service pharmacy school at Sheepshead Bay, New York. In December, 1943, he received a commission as lieutenant, junior grade, in the Naval

Reserve and was discharged as lieutenant in March, 1946. Dean Bliven is a member of the American Pharmaceutical Association, City of Washington Branch of the A. Ph. A., District of Columbia Pharmaceutical Association, Sigma Xi, Phi Lambda Upsilon, and Rho Chi Society. He is a past-president of the D. C. Pharmaceutical Association, is now serving the University Chapter of Sigma Xi as vice-president, and is a member of the Executive Committee of the American Association of Colleges of Pharmacy.

Brother Bliven's hobbies are gardening and roses.

CLIFTON E. MILLER, formerly professor and chairman of pharmaceutical chemistry at the North Dakota Agricultural College, was recently appointed dean of the School of Pharmacy at that institution. Brother Miller replaces dean William F. Sudro who retired July 1, after 48 years of service to the College.

Dean Miller joined the School of Pharmacy in September, 1939, at the rank of instructor, becoming an assistant professor July 18, 1940. In July, 1941 he became professor of pharmaceutical chemistry. From Sept. 6, 1941 to Oct. 4, 1945 Brother Miller was an organic chemist with the research laboratories, Chemical Warfare Center, Edgewood Arsenal, Maryland, with the rank of Captain. He is now a Major with the Chemical Corps Reserves.

A native of Davenport, Washington, Brother Miller attended Davenport High School and began his undergraduate work at the University of California before transfering to the University of Washington, where he received a bachelor of science degree in 1935, his master of science in 1936 and doctor of philosophy in 1939. Dean Miller held Teaching Fellowships at the University of Washington from 1936 to 1939.

In addition to being a member of Kappa Psi, Brother Miller is a member of Rho Chi, Phi Sigma, Sigma Xi, American Pharman ceutical Association, the American Chemical Society, the North



Milestones from "The Mask" Files

TEN YEARS AGO November, 1945

This issue of The Mask announced that First Grand Vice Regent Horatio C. Wood was assuming the duties of Grand Regent C. Leonard O'Connell who temporarily retired because of illness. . . . A total of 38 collegiate chapters were listed, of which 34 were active. . . . The Grand Officers of Kappa Psi were W. B. Philip (Grand Regent), F. J. Amrhein (Grand Vice Regent), P. W. Eldridge, Jr. (Grand Secretary-Treasurer), A. R. Bliss (Grand Registrar and Editor), and L. K. Darbaker (Grand Historian). . . . The issue of The Mask was dedicated to the support of the Pharmacy Headquarters Building Fund.

FORTY YEARS AGO

November, 1915

A total of 36 collegiate chapters were listed, of which 25 were active. . . . The three original Academic Chapters were listed in The Mask with a notation that they were "out of existence," namely, Russell (founded 1879 at the Russell Military Academy, New Haven, Connecticut), Cheshire (installed 1879 at the Cheshire Military Academy), and Hillhouse (installed 1894 at the Hillhouse High School). . . . An article appeared in this issue written by Dr. W. Bruce Philip giving strong reasons why a pharmacist should fill prescriptions given by a doctor over the telephone.

FIFTY YEARS AGO

December, 1905

In addition to Alpha Chapter, a total of 8 collegiate chapters were listed, namely, Beta (University College of Medicine, Richmond), Gamma (Columbia University, New York), Delta (University of Maryland, Baltimore), Epsilon (Maryland Medical College, Baltimore), Zeta (Georgetown University, Washington, D.C.), Eta (Philadelphia College of Pharmacy, Philadelphia), Theta (Medical College of Virginia), and Iota (University of Alabama, Mobile). . . . An article appeared in The Mask describing the Eighth Annual Convention of Kappa Psi which had just come to an end in New York City with Gamma Chapter acting as the host. The Grand Council was the new name approved at that Eighth Annual Convention in place of "Grand Chapter." Also, plans were made to have the next Annual Convention in Richmond, Virginia, under the auspices of Theta and Beta Chapters.

The Four Points of the Square

At the last Kappa Psi Convention held in Washington, D.C. in 1953 our Connecticut delegation arrived on a Sunday evening previous to the first day of the Convention. After checking into our rooms and removing the vestiges of travel we repaired to the Hotel Lobby to meet some of the other early arrivals. More than one member of our group commented on the ease with which one could spot a Kappa Psi Member from among those occupying or passing through the lobby. It was but a matter of moments

before introductions had been made and new friendships already started.

After this very gratifying experience, the author could not help but search his memory and past experience for a "raison d'etre" or a common denominator which made the Kappa Psi Man such an outstanding person in any group of people. Why should there be a certain undefinable quality about a member of an organization such as our Fraternity, a quality which made young men from all quarters of this Country and with such varied backgrounds stand out in any group of individuals? No doubt there are a number of factors involved in the experiences gained when a young man engaged in the study of Pharmacy aligns himself with and becomes a Brother in Kappa Psi. For example, there are the commonly known attributes of fraternalism in general—good fellowship, cooperation with one's Brothers both near and far, mutual aid and association with others of similar likes and dislikes. But there must be some one factor or common experience which serves to distinguish a Member of Kappa Psi from the general run of fraternity men.

Following some thought on the subject, the author finally settled upon one facet of the early training of a Kappa Psi Member which he considered to be a most influential factor in producing what we recognize as the typical Kappa Psi Man. Granted that the reader may recall many other factors which, in his own experience, have influenced his conduct since becoming a member of our Fraternity, but every member will recall one group of lessons learned in common by all of us who have become privileged to wear the badge of Kappa Psi. These lessons referred to are the "Four Points of THE SQUARE." These points which are introduced essentially in this form in the Ritual of Initiation are the following:

1) Industry 2) Sobriety 3) Mutual Fellowship and Esteem and 4) Courage of Mind and Heart. Not only are these introduced early in the training of the Kappa Psi Initiate, but whenever his Chapter meetings are properly conducted according to ritual the lessons are constantly brought again to his attention and soon become so firmly fixed in his thinking that they act as an unconscious guide in his

nearly every word and deed.

Now while each of us may have slightly differing ideas of the exact definition of each of the above terms or phrases, most of our definitions would have certain basic ideas in common. It is mainly in the application of the definition that we find some divergence of opinion. To stimulate some thought and discussion, therefor, the author would like to briefly express his own thoughts on these fundamental definitions as follows: Industry-signifies wholehearted application of one's energy and talents to the job at hand which may be your studies, a Chapter officership, a committee assignment, performance on the field of sports or any one of the myriad of activities which young men in college undertake either by choice or by assignment. Sobriety-does NOT necessarily mean complete abstinence from those actions and activities from which we may derive pleasure and which society may label as undesirable or harmful, but rather moderation in all our thought and action. It implies a rational weighing of all considerations, both pro and con before we speak or act and then the governing of our speech and actions by what we consider best for ourselves, our associates, our community and our nation. Mutual Fellowship and Esteem-signifies one of the fundamental building blocks upon which true fraternalism is built. It means the joy of working with others whose standards of conduct and action agree with your own. But even further it means the willingness to overlook the minor faults and breaches of faith to which all humans at one time or another fall prey; the sincere desire to seek out the best in our Brothers and encourage the struggle against indolence, thoughtless behavior and actions which we know are not to the best interest of the group or to ourselves. Courage of Mind and Heart-signifies a willingness not only to assert but even to fight for what we know is just and right. It means also the courage to correct a Brother when we know he is in the wrong, the fortitude to admit one's own mistakes and to accept and profit by constructive criticism. In other words a sincere desire to place the welfare of our Brothers, our Fraternity and of society as a whole above self.

In conclusion, let us not infer that every Kappa Psi Man at all times correctly interprets these FOUR POINTS or lives up to their precepts infallibly. But by continual striving and encouragement from his Brothers, the average Kappa Psi Member has demonstrated in countless instances that these lessons inculcated early in his contact with Kappa Psi have made him a better citizen, professional man, and

member of society.

On Chapter Visitations

James R. Thayer, Grand Counselor

One of our very good Kappa Psi traditions is that after Chapter Visitations, the visiting officer is obligated to make a public report of his findings. I had no intention of violating this tradition but I have been so slow that I suspect the members who were active at the time I visited the Chapters, are

tripping over their beards and telling tall tales to their grandchildren. In view of my ineptness I feel obligated to make some sort of atonement. With this objective I aim to amble through some of my observations with respect to Chapter Visitations. I hope you will be broad enough and wise enough to realize that no segment of Kappa Psi shares or is responsible for these deleria.

One of the things I feel worthy of mentioning is the cordiality with which Grand Officers are received by all segments of the Chapters visited-Officers, Collegiate Members, Facultate Members and even non fraternity persons. To this I might add that I have never found a dean who was not thoroughly cooperative. My honest impression is that this cordiality is genuine and not feigned. I believe this is significant because it indicates a fine relationship between all of the elements of the Fraternity.

Admitting the possibility that a little extra "spit-and-polish" is assumed by the Chapter visited—with the purpose of making an impression-what is wrong about that? It is healthful for any individual or any organization to assume tails and a white tie on occasion. I don't believe your visitors demand or

expect this but I do believe they welcome it because they feel that it is good for you.

One of the major problems of a large and widely spread organization such as Kappa Psi-is to engender a real feeling of kinship. To the average fraternity member-National Officers are no more than names in The Mask, I suspect that you often feel that they are not even people. This is not your fault and it is not their fault-it is most unfortunate. It is a fascinating study in psychology to observe the sparring that takes place between the visitor and the visited. Despite this initial bashfulness I have never found it difficult to penetrate the barrier. It could not be difficult-after all, our purpose is to be mutually helpful and constructive. We are all trying to contribute to Pharmacy and to Societythrough Kappa Psi.

My concept of Visitations has been that we come not as critics but as missionaries, as counselors and helping hands. I have always felt that if the Chapters were strong individually the Fraternity could not avoid being strong nationally-provided there was a network of pipelines joining all elements of the Fraternity. This network is a must because through it we have access to all of the genius and all of the power of the Fraternity, I have always felt too that the establishment of this network was our number one problem. Regretting the inability to make my dreams come true-when I visited Beta Chi, Rho, Gamma Epsilon and Gamma Omicron-I dreamed that through my visits a few slender elements of this network would be laid. I know this was a dream but I also know there is no emotion

more effective than good intentions.

Summing this up I believe that the greatest good derived from this program of visitations lies in

convincing the Brothers that all of us in Kappa Psi are interested in you.

I suspect that we have aviated long enough, Let us not come down with a thud-merely putting two feet per man on the ground. Fundamentally the problem is simple-and harsh. In carrying out this program we are spending your money-money which you or some one else sweat to get. Money for which a score of interests are competing-your personal interests. If you are spending your money in this way because of convention—you are making a very poor investment. Unless you are actually deriving some benefit you are making a poor investment. The welfare of Kappa Psi depends upon the wisdom of your investments—investments in the widest possible sense.

I am sure I am being entirely accurate when I say that the times your Grand Officers spend with you are among the happiest moments of their lives. I am also sure that the wine would turn to vinegar if we felt these visits did not justify their cost. There is a simple question involved for which you

should find an honest answer-is it worth it?

UT Grades Down; Kappa Psi Is High

(Editor's Note: The following is a reprint of a news item that appeared recently in the newspaper of the U. of Texas.)

The all-University scholastic average for the 1954-55 school term was 1.34, a drop from last year's 1.39. It was the lowest average in recent years.

The averages compiled by the office of Jack Holland, dean of men, revealed that thirteen fraternities and one men's co-op fell below the required 1.25 average for such organizations. One women's co-op fell below the requirement.

Those organizations falling below the 1.25 average are subject to a year of social probation, keeping them from engaging in any social activity under the name of the organization.

A bright spot in the average was the 1.98 compiled by Kappa Psi, honorary pharmaceutical fraternity. It was the second straight year for the organization to lead in the averages, though their average dropped from their 2.08 in 1953-54.
