THE TWENTY-NINTH GRAND COUNCIL CONVENTION



The Twenty-Ninth Grand Council Convention is scheduled to take place in St. Louis on December 28, 29 and 30. The biennial Convention program is designed to help charter the course of our Fraternity with a sound, purposeful program planned, this year, to revitalize the Convention programs of previous years. Your Grand Regent has been in attendance at the last four Grand Council Conventions and is firmly convinced that certain portions of the program needed changes since they had become completely static.

Therefore, a new orientation program format has been arranged in the form of prepared papers and panel discussions by chapter delegates, National Officers and Executive Committee Members.

Grand Secretary-Treasurer Eby has assisted in the assignment of topics and participating chapters represent all sections of the United States.

For the purpose of brevity the complete program is not being published here, but to indicate the scope of this revitalized program the following topics have been assigned:

1. "How to Sell Kappa Psi Fraternity to Prospective Members"

2. "How We Train Our Pledges"

- 3. "How to Organize a Successful Rushing Program"
- 4. "The Significance of the Ritual of Initiation"
- 5. "Responsibilities of the Kappa Psi Chapter in the College of Pharmacy"
- 6. "How to Promote and Conduct Successful Community Service Programs"
- 7. "How the Five Year Program of Pharmaceutical Education is Likely to Affect Kappa Psi and Other Pharmacy Fraternities"

In addition a special Sunday morning program entitled "Symposium on Fraternity Life" is to be conducted.

With the scope of assigned topics covering such a wide range of pertinent subjects, it is the hope of your Grand Regent that those in attendance at this Twenty-Ninth Grand Council Convention will take back to their respective chapters an enlightened viewpoint on fraternal matters in general, and specifically, a greater appreciation of the advantages of our outstanding professional Fraternity.

Farewell Message

The above heading is a clue to a decision I made before I ever acquired the title of Grand Regent. Having long since decided that a single term as Grand Regent was all that I would seek, I feel this is the proper time and place to state some of my reasons. They are based upon strong convictions that no man is indispensable to a fraternal organization and that new ideas are forthcoming with new leaders. I further believe that one cannot assume obligations of National importance in fraternal work for extended periods of time and still do justice to his teaching duties, along with other local and National commitments as well. Furthermore, pressures of extended services often tend to create dictatorial attitudes and tactlessness. These, above all, I wish to avoid.

My remarks are not directed toward any person or persons but to all men who seek office for extended periods. Even our beloved ministers leave the fold and go to new fields (Continued on page 178)

Late in September the Central Office distributed to all of the Collegiate Chapters, copies of our latest publication, INSTRUCTIONS FOR CHAPTER OFFICERS. Although it has been a routine procedure for some years to send each of the principal chapter officers brief instructions relating to their duties, no previous effort has been made to develop an instruction booklet such as the one recently published. In its present form, the booklet of instructions is brief yet complete. It should be a valuable aid to better understanding and management of chapter affairs. Serving as a chapter officer can be a stimulating experience—it can be a valuable experience when the duties of an officer are performed in an

orderly manner by a thoroughly informed officer. We hope that the present officers have received the booklets that have been forwarded to the Secretary of each Collegiate Chapter.

ABOUT NU CHAPTER AND BETA PSI CHAPTER SCHOLARSHIP ACHIEVEMENTS-

Not too many scholarship records for chapters are received in the Central Office but we want to compliment Nu Chapter and Beta Psi Chapters for their fine records last year at the University of Connecticut and University of Wisconsin respectively. Nu Chapter with fifty members ranked fourth in the twenty-two fraternities on the campus. The grade point average for the members of the chapter was considerably higher than the average for all men and higher than the average for all fraternities. Beta Psi Chapter with fifty-one members ranked seventh in eleven professional fraternities and the grade point average was higher than that for all men and also higher than the average for all students in the University. We are very proud of these scholarship records and trust that all of our other chapters will make every effort to attain scholarship records that are a credit to Kappa Psi Fraternity.

ABOUT CHANGES IN THE LOCATION OF KAPPA PSI CHAPTERS—

During the past summer two of our old chapters moved to new campuses because the schools where they were chartered originally ceased to function. On July 1, 1957 the Rhode Island College of Pharmacy and Allied Sciences closed its doors and at the same time the College of Pharmacy at the University of Rhode Island was established. Beta Epsilon Chapter was approved immediately at the University of Rhode Island where the chapter is now taking an active part with the other Fraternities and enjoying Fraternity life. On July 1, 1957 the College of Pharmacy at the Detroit Institute of Technology affiliated with Wayne State University. Mu Omicron Pi Chapter was approved at the opening of the fall term and is now a recognized campus organization. The chapter was honored by being approved for membership in the Interfraternity Council of the Wayne State University which is fine recognition for Kappa Psi Fraternity. During the summer Upsilon Chapter of the University of Kentucky moved from its old location in Louisville to the University campus at Lexington. To each of these chapters we extend the compliments of ALPHA CHAPTER and wish for each in its new environment, the same fine success they have enjoyed for many years.

Special Convention Bulletin

The Central Office forwarded to each Chapter Secretary early in November, full information relating to the Grand Council Convention. There were some items which required immediate attention and appreciation is expressed to the chapters which responded promptly as requested. A few chapters have failed to report to the Central Office on one or more of the following items:

- (1) The names of the delegates and alternates.

John B. Lewis Died September 28, 1957

The Installation of Gamma Theta Chapter at University of Kansas City






UNIVERSITY OF RHODE ISLAND, COLLEGE OF PHARMACY (Pastore Laboratories)—KINGSTON, R.I.

Newly Appointed Collegiate Members of Executive Committee


Editor's Comment: Collegiate members of the Executive Committee are appointed by the Grand Regent in July of each year. Those below will serve until July, 1958.

Province V Assembly

Lima, Ohio, April 5-6, 1957

A Province V Assembly was held on April 5-6, 1957 at Lima, Ohio. The meeting was called to order at the Argonne Hotel by Satrap John A. Pringleton. After the invocation by Chaplain Raymond Ratai (Gamma Delta), the delegates were welcomed by Dean A. C. Smith on behalf of the University and by Regent James L. Spahr (Gamma Delta) on behalf of the host chapter.

Raabe of Ohio Northern University, College of Pharmacy.

At the afternoon session the following committee reports were given: Executive, Legislative, Extension, Auditing, Scholarship, and Entertainment and Publicity. The Nomination Committee report preceded the election of the following officers: Satrap, Roger Cain, Xi; Vice-Satrap, James Spahr, Gamma Delta; Secretary-Treasurer, Robert J. Schlembach, Beta Lambda; Historian, Don Arthur, Gamma Iota; and Chaplain, Daniel Murphy, Gamma Chi.

Following the installation of the new officers, a recommendation by the Time and Place Committee was received and passed that the next Province Assembly be held in Buffalo, New York, with Gamma Iota as host chapter. The exact time and date to be governed by the Province By-Laws and the known circumstances at the time.

Recommendations by the Resolutions Committee were received and passed: 1. That the Province meetings be rotated among the chapters of the Province; 2. That a committee be appointed to set up intramural athletic competition between the chapters of the Province; 3. That a committee be appointed to study and to determine the effects of the 5-year program upon rushing and pledging programs of the Fraternity; 4. That all the chapters of Province V be available to assist Mu Omicron Pi reestablish their chapter at Wayne State University; and 5. That the members of Gamma Delta Chapter of Ohio Northern University be commended for their excellent hospitality and for a successful Province Assembly.

The delegate elected for representation of the Province at the National Convention at St. Louis in December, 1957, was Lawrence Woodford (Beta Lambda).

The Province V Assembly adjourned at 3:50 P.M.

Dr. LeRoy C. Keagle Appointed President and Dean of the New England College of Pharmacy

LeRoy C. Keagle, Ph.D. (Kappa Psi), educator and pharmaceutical scientist of Cranford, N.J., has assumed the duties of president and dean of the New England College of Pharmacy in Boston.

Under the amended by-laws of this 30 year old college, which was incorporated in 1940 and is one of two remaining privately endowed colleges of its kind in the country, the Board of Trustees voted Dr. Keagle broad powers. For the first time, a president of the New England College of Pharmacy will have complete charge of the college's curriculum, faculty and academic program.

Dr. Keagle returns to the teaching field after four years as Senior Scientist in the Pharmaceutical Research and Product Development of the Warner-Lambert Pharmaceutical Co., of Morris Plains, N.J. In this capacity he was directly responsible to the department head for new product formulations, special flavor problems, development and stability studies on improved old products, preparation of materials for clinical inventigation, packaging studies, pilot plant and large scale production methods for marketing of products.

Before entering private industry, Dr. Keagle was assistant dean of the University of Buffalo, School of Pharmacy, July 1950-June 1953 and professor of pharmacy and chairman of the Department of Pharmacy at that University from February 1949 to June 1953. As assistant dean he was in charge of staff appointments and departmental operations. He taught dispensing and manufacturing courses; was chairman of the Committee on Graduate Studies and Degrees; chairman of Curriculum Committee; chairman of Public and Professional Relations Committee, co-chairman of Committee on Admissions and member of the Executive Committee of the Graduate School of Arts and Sciences.

From November 1945 to January 1949, Brother Keagle was assistant professor of chemistry at Rutgers University College of Pharmacy where he taught organic chemistry, assisted Dr. Ernest Little in qualitative and quantitative analysis and was chairman of the Committee on Athletics. In December 1944 and March 1945 to November 1945 he was a postdoctorate fellow in pharmaceutical chemistry at Purdue University. He received his Ph.D. degree in November 1944 from the University of Maryland where he majored in pharmaceutical chemistry and minored in physical chemistry and pharmacology. He was awarded the degree of B.Sc. in Pharmacy in June 1940 from Rutgers University.

The new president of the New England College of Pharmacy was born Feb. 18, 1919 in Bloomington, Pa. He was married in 1942 to Jane A. Beckman and has three children, Douglas Lee, 11; Pamela Jane, 9 and Cynthia Ann, 6.

Brother Keagle is a veteran of the U. S. Army and a licensed pharmacist in Maryland

and New Jersey. He is a member of the American Pharmaceutical Association, American Chemical Society, American Association for the Advancement of Science, Rho Chi Society, and the Linden, N.J., Masonic Lodge.
