

From the Desk of the Grand Regent

James R. Thayer

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
Alexander Pope was sort of a misfit, like many of us, which is probably the reason I like much of his writing. One bit sticks in my mind (I checked Bartlett before I committed myself) "The proper study of mankind is man." I want to build upon this but at the moment I have neither bricks, mortar nor scaffold.

I have found, with considerable bitterness, that loss of physical fitness to carry on is forcing a readjustment and reevaluation of the values of life. I always do things the hard way. This has resulted, or perhaps more accurately is resulting, in certain things coming into focus and certain other things acquiring a new significance as a result of altered perspective.

Despite lack of riches or renown I have lived a most enjoyable life. I hate to admit this but I deserve little or no credit for this enjoyment. I had the tremendous good fortune of liking and being interested in people—from my inherited genes. You will immediately stand in protest and say (1) Why is this so darned important? (2) If it is important and I wasn't born that way how can I acquire it?

In answer to these very logical questions I will say that I think this is much more important today than it has ever been—to the individual—to our country—to our civilization—to the future of mankind. It is very easy to misunderstand people and it is even easier to become prejudiced against people we do not understand. This chasm is not confined to those who speak a different language or have a different religion than mine—it includes my neighbors and everyday acquaintances. Added to this our shrinking world has essentially brought everyone under one roof. We have the obligation of living together without the knowledge and experience of knowing how to do so. Don't get me wrong. I have as many phobias and prejudices as anyone. However I am honest in saying that I still try to be fair to the people and things that I dislike. I think there is a word for it—tolerance. I do not believe that I have achieved tolerance but I keep trying. In being tolerant I am not willing to accept abuse (our philosophy versus Red philosophy). I do feel that I must try to understand and try to improve alien philosophies. I suspect that if a million Americans could meet a million Russians, or Chinese, or Congolese—on previously unprejudiced grounds—both groups would find a lot of merit and decency in the other group. Of course this can not happen but I can try to understand the guy I see in church or sit across the table from in a restaurant. Believe me it is a fascinating experience. I can not see how studying, trying to understand and being tolerant of the other fellow can strip me of any of my power or prestige. I do believe that we have to achieve this understanding and tolerance to solve our problems both locally and internationally. Let us get one thing straight—I am not advocating pacifism.

I was a little shocked the other day to have one of my very good friends, who is a professor in a large university and not a radical in any way, express the belief that all Greek-letter organizations had outlived their usefulness. I did not agree but my conviction was not strong enough to justify an argument. I will go so far as to say that if we in Kappa Psi are going to continue to justify our existence, we will have to make a significantly greater contribution to both the individual and society. Certainly we should make a realistic appraisal



Fifteen recipients of this award for 1961 are listed in this issue of *THE MASK*.

Kappa Psi has long emphasized the value of recognition for worthy achievement by its members but only in recent years has it expanded its system of awards to include recognition in areas other than scholarship. The national organization has developed a broad system of awards. It may present these awards directly for outstanding achievement or services, or the awards may be presented by the chapters at the local level as part of a good public relations service.

The oldest Kappa Psi award, the GRAND COUNCIL SCHOLARSHIP GOLD KEY, was established in 1917. A few years ago a special certificate was approved and this now accompanies the gold key. This fine award is presented annually to the members of Kappa Psi Fraternity who graduate with highest honors in the entire class of graduates in the respective schools and colleges of pharmacy.

The SCHOLARSHIP HONORS CERTIFICATE is issued by authority of the Grand Council but it is presented directly by the individual chapters to their members who maintain a grade point average of 3 or equivalent B average for either or both of the last two years of the course in pharmacy. Membership in the Fraternity for a full year is also required of recipients. More than two hundred of these certificates are awarded each year without cost to the chapters and each is fully engrossed with the name of the recipient, the school, the chapter and the year of the award.

The ASKLEPIOS KEY is an approved award which is available to chapters for presentation to their members for scholarship achievement on any basis determined by the chapter. It has space for suitable engraving.

THE CITATION OF HONOR CERTIFICATE is a special mounted certificate that is presented to chapters in recognition of the FIFTIETH ANNIVERSARY of their founding.

HONORARY MEMBERSHIP CERTIFICATES are presented to persons for outstanding contributions to pharmacy at the national level, when Honorary Membership is conferred on them. Chapters nominate outstanding persons and when approved by Alpha Chapter, the honor is conferred usually at a special meeting.

The CERTIFICATE OF APPRECIATION is presented to members of the Fraternity for outstanding contributions to the Fraternity or the profession of pharmacy. Recipients must be approved by Alpha Chapter.

THE CITATION OF APPRECIATION is a new certificate available for the use by chapters where they wish to indicate their recognition of important contributions to the chapter or important services to the school or profession. It may be presented to persons who are not members of the Fraternity as well as to those who are members. The individual chapters select recipients of this award and approval of the Grand Council Deputy is required in each instance. Chapters are urged to write to the Central Office for full details.

The New Kappa Psi Fraternity Directory

(The National Agora)

On November 1, 1960, the Executive Committee of Kappa Psi Fraternity approved the publication of a new national directory (National Agora) and authorized the Grand Secretary-Treasurer to proceed with the necessary preparations including arrangements for publication. This will mark the first edition of the Agora to be published since 1940.

For almost a year, the Central Office was busy compiling by chapters, the lists of approximately twenty three thousand (23,000) members whose names are on record. Through the years, sixty six chapters received charters in schools and colleges of pharmacy. The records of some of these chapters are incomplete and this is particularly true of a number of chapters that were organized before 1920. Compiling the records of the dormant and inactive chapters represented a difficult assignment but in all cases the Central Office has checked every source of information in order to insure authenticity.

In the case of all active chapters, faculty members and other responsible persons have checked the various typed lists as supplied by the Central Office in order to have each list as complete and accurate as possible. The very valuable assistance of those who took time to check chapter membership lists, some of which had as many as one thousand names, was important help and is sincerely appreciated by the Central Office.

Copies of the new directory should be distributed early in 1962 and all chapters are urged to study their respective membership lists with the idea of developing their own accurate and up to date mailing lists.

Kappa Psi Fraternity Revises Its Publications

During the past year Kappa Psi has revised all of its publications except the Constitution and new editions of each have been published.

The Third Edition of the HANDBOOK was published last December but was revised only to a limited degree in order to bring it up to date as a result of the addition of new chapters to the chapter roll.

The RITUAL BOOKLET was revised and published following a four year period of study. It is now a more impressive and meaningful publication. Credit for a careful and exhaustive study of the First Degree goes to former Grand Ritualist Glen J. Sperandio and the present Grand Ritualist John W. Martin who prepared the new material and distributed it to a number of chapters for trial. Clarification of the entire Ritual of Initiation and other procedures were made possible through the work of the Grand Secretary-Treasurer and the assistance of Grand Ritualist Martin and Mask Editor Nicholas W. Fenney. All chapters have been supplied with copies of the Ritual Booklet and we are hopeful that a careful study of the revisions have been made so that necessary adjustments can be effected.

THE OFFICERS INSTRUCTION and CHAPTER INFORMATION BOOKLET was also completely revised by the Grand Secretary-Treasurer following a survey in which a number of chapters were called on for constructive suggestions. The booklet is now organized into two parts in order to make it more useful. The first part is devoted to instructions for chapter officers and the second part contains a variety of useful information which will make chapter management more effective. The easy to read style of the booklet should appeal to chapter officers, make them more conscious of their responsibilities and develop a greater interest in chapter efficiency.

Dr. R. D. Gibson Succeeds Dr. Burt as Dean of College of Pharmacy, University of Nebraska

Succeeding retiring Dean Joseph B. Burt at the University of Nebraska College of Pharmacy is Dr. Robert D. Gibson, former associate professor and chairman of the department of pharmacology at the same institution.

Brother Gibson was born in Utica, Kansas on July 2, 1922. He graduated from the Lane County Community High School at Dighton, Kansas in 1940. After obtaining his bachelor's degree in pharmacy the master of science degree in pharmacy was conferred upon him from the University of Kansas in 1950. In 1954 he was awarded a doctor of philosophy degree from Purdue University with a major in pharmacology and minors in physiology and chemistry.

Dr. Gibson held a fellowship award from the American Foundation for Pharmaceutical education during 1952-1954.

Among the various societies and organizations that he is a member of are Sigma Chi, Rho Chi, Phi Lambda Upsilon, Sigma Phi Epsilon, Kappa Psi, APhA, American Association for the Advancement of Science, and the American Association of Colleges of Pharmacy.

Brother Gibson's professional experience includes an assistant instructor in pharmacy at the University of Kansas, 1948-1950; instructor in pharmacy at the University of Kansas, 1950-1951; associate professor of pharmacology at Southwestern State College, 1954-1957; and associate professor and chairman of the department of pharmacology at the University of Nebraska from 1957-1961.

Dr. Gibson is married and has two daughters, ages 12 years and 5 years, and one son, age 10 years.

Scholarship and Kappa Psi

This issue of THE MASK is dedicated to a principle and to those Brothers of Kappa Psi who are helping make that principle one of the great strengths of our Fraternity. Scholarship is the principle to which all men of Kappa Psi subscribe and upon which the future of the profession of Pharmacy may depend; and Kappa Psi in turn expects and encourages its members achieve scholastic recognition. When superior accomplishments are reported, they are rewarded with scholarship keys and suitable certificates.

It is gratifying to find the number of award winners growing each year. This is proof positive that our profession and our Fraternity are continuing to recruit men of high calibre and ability who will become the leaders of American Pharmacy in the next decade. Scholarship is the reward of hard work; leadership is an obligation incurred with scholarship. Men of Kappa Psi across the country are accepting roles as leaders in their communities because they have been prepared by academic disciplines to take on new problems and challenges and satisfactorily cope with them.

The point of this article is this: scholarship is more than just making good grades; scholarship is an asset to successful living that no professional person can do without. Through scholarship one learns to *understand* what he studies and to apply it to the problems of everyday living; and through application of his knowledge one is able to share it with others with mutually beneficial results. Every man who holds membership in Kappa Psi should develop a program which will help him get the most out of his educational career so that he will be able to competently build his professional career.

Scholarship is a trait that can be consciously developed. For some people it is relatively easy to study and learn new ideas; for others, it is very difficult to assimilate knowledge of any kind. However, an organized study program, bolstered by self discipline, will help anyone improve his scholastic standing. Many students plan their social life in college with extreme care, and have precise scheduling for their extra-curricular activities; equal care should be exercised in planning scholastic activities. I firmly believe that the average college student can raise his index one whole point if he will schedule a fixed program for his studying and other academic work—and then sticks to it.

A sincere interest in learning, an enthusiasm for his studies, and a willingness to work, as well as a desire to share his experiences with others—these are the marks of the true scholar. In a broad sense, these are synonymous with the four principles of Kappa Psi: Industry, Sobriety, Fellowship, and High Ideals. Let every Brother build his career with scholarship as its foundation.

of "how to be," and even more importantly "why." A scholar is a learned person. It may be assumed that a true scholar is basically rather well endowed with scholastic capabilities, but this is certainly not sufficient evidence in itself to insure that the desired academic goal will be reached. The objectives of university life are many, scholarship is the most important one.

"How to be" needs to be considered in a bit more detail. The story is told of a herd of cows grazing in a field located along one of the superhighways. A milk truck was passing on the highway in front of them. The side of the truck was painted with the words "pasteurized, homogenized and vitamin enriched." One of the cows remarked: "makes one feel a bit inadequate." One does not need to feel inadequate on "how to be" a scholar as it relates to some of the mechanics of allocation of effort and time necessary for the pursuit. The use of an organized plan of study is a prime prerequisite to academic achievement. Most students find it necessary to budget their finances to provide the most advantageous use of their available funds. Every university enrollee must budget his time, probably in a manner more rigid than ever before necessary in his experience, to allow sufficiently of his time and energy to be expended in his total area of activities. It is of no value to budget the necessary time needed for study and then deviate from the planned program. A study outline is meant to be followed. An ideal period of concentrated study must be of sufficient length to become thoroughly acquainted with the work lesson but regulated so that excessive mental or physical fatigue does not take place. A short period of study, repeated often, will provide a better grasp of subject matter than will a single lengthy period of study. Everyone has the same one hundred and sixty-eight hours a week available to them. Budget the time into study and recreation periods for the entire week. Stick with your schedule. Very few people, perhaps none, are able to attain any degree of commendable scholarship without expending considerable effort. Someone has defined a committee as a group that "keeps minutes but wastes hours." This is the antithesis of a scholar—no time should be wasted by anyone, even minutes.

The last addendum to Hamlet—"Why"—is worthy of consideration. It has been said that if one plants for one year, plant grain; if one plants for thirty years, plant trees; and if one plants for one hundred years, plant men.

A scholar will speak the words of truth. He is aware that the power of education is much more of a steady and continuous force in civilization than is a "single" effort. He is not likely

I believe that this is only a beginning in this last objective but that our association in Kappa Psi does teach us tolerance and perhaps unconsciously the obligation of trying to understand other people. Even though this is unproven and much too tenuous—I think it justifies our existence. I think that we as individuals and as chapters should promote discussions about the good things and the bad things in pharmacy and the good things and the bad things about the organizations which represent pharmacy. I am not intelligent enough to draw up blue prints or gifted with prophetic vision but I honestly believe that unless we learn, and understand a common language we will live to see another fall of the Tower of Babel.



to become an extremist, but is well aware that a full consideration of all views of a topic or problem must be considered before a final defensible stand can be taken. He knows too much to become ultra-conservative or a radical. He would not be satisfied with either of these. A scholarly atmosphere is most likely to reproduce its own kind. The Fraternity is planning for a long period of time. We need to plant men who are scholars.







Austin, Texas, September 30, 1961




