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

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

## THE MEANING OF FAITH IN OUR FRATERNITY

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By faith, three things are meant. First, we mean religion. When we speak of a man's faith, we may well be referring to the religious group to which one belongs.

The second thing we mean by faith is belief. When we say, "I have faith that such and such is true," we mean, "I have a belief that such and such is true."

The third thing we mean by faith is trust. If we trust someone, we have faith in him.

I wish to discuss this subject with you, but not to involve religion in any way. The intent is to have us think together about the ability of each of us to be of assistance to the Fraternity today, tomorrow and in the years to come.

Sometimes all of us have trouble with our faith. I wish to mention three things about faith. First of all it must have its *feet on the ground*. We all have heard of the group of ten people who travelled in some of the less well developed areas of the world and refused to be vaccinated. All of them died of smallpox. You or I perhaps would have leaned on some kind of a religious belief to a certain extent and kept OUR INNOCULATIONS UP-TO-DATE. The method used by the group of ten can be called blind faith. Blind faith is not faith at all. It is irresponsible conjecture. You and I need to have confidence in and have some knowledge and understanding of the work of those members of Kappa Psi who have preceded us. From them we have received the charter of the Fraternity, the aims, objectives, the initiation ceremony and other things. We should appreciate their efforts to better pharmacy. We can keep our "innoculations" up-to-date by recognizing a true appreciation of the efforts of our earlier brothers in Kappa Psi.

The second thing I want to say about faith is that it must encompass high ideals and efforts. It is said that there was a sign in the Sikorsky airplane factory which read: "according to recognized aerotechnical tests, the bumble-bee cannot fly because of the shape and weight of its body in relation to the total wing area. The bumble-bee doesn't know this so he goes ahead and flies anyway." This perhaps could be our invitation to be creative, to try something new, to follow out a hunch. You can be creative. Something new can be tried. You may have a good hunch. If you have ideas of how to have a better Fraternity in any way, send along your ideas.

The third thing I want to say about faith is that it not only must have its feet on the ground and must encompass high ideals and efforts, but it must go into action. What is your faith? What action does it inspire in you for the betterment of your Fraternity? You cannot afford to pass.



Always remember that fraternities exist because of colleges and universities, therefore, our first loyalty as an alumnus is to our Alma Mater.

### A Deadly Menace to Fraternity\*

Granting that every fraternity or sorority counts among its loyal members persons of divergent political faiths, we have a feeling that all loyal members, no matter what their political leanings, should be lined up pretty solidly these days in opposition to some of the recent proposals of Federal handouts to higher education. We feel that the greatest possible menace to the fraternities exists in the trend represented by some of the political philosophy behind these proposals. The fraternity at its best breeds competent individualism—and not conformism. Some of the high places of government these days are overrun with political philosophers who don't like this. They are already hurting us far more than we realize.

There are still a few oldtimers who remember the famous case of *Waugh v. Mississippi University*, in which the United States Supreme Court, in upholding the right of the Mississippi legislature to prohibit fraternities in the educational institutions of the States, pronounced as follows: "The legislature is in control of the colleges and universities of the State, and has a right to legislate for their welfare . . ." and consequently also had a right to require that students "renounce affiliation with a society which the state considers inimical to discipline. . . ."

Mississippi's antifraternity legislation was repealed, because of the efforts of a sizable force of dedicated fraternity men and friends of fraternities. In South Carolina, the state also prohibited fraternities for a time. In 1954 in New York a board of regents order killed the national fraternity chapters at member colleges of the State University of New York system; the same order killed other chapters *ex post facto* when this July the University of Buffalo became a member of the State University system.

It is quite true that the situation in New York State is not a representative one. And admittedly most state legislators, many of them good fraternity men, do recognize that the good fraternity chapter is a character-building influence of the best sort which ought to be encouraged—still, what happens under Federal control? What, pray, might happen to the college fraternity if the United States Supreme Court should require students on a national scale to renounce affiliation with a society which the nation considers "inimical to discipline"? And Heaven only knows what other charges might be brought.

No one can deny that federal officials are, more and more, trying to exercise control in many areas of State activities that receive federal support. In a case which arose

under the Morrill Act, the Supreme Court, considering certain action of the State of California pursuant to the Act, said: "So long as its action is within retained powers and not inconsistent with any exertion of the national government and transgresses no right safeguarded by the Federal Constitution, the State is the sole judge of the means to be employed and the amount of training to be exacted for the effective accomplishment of these ends." This means, plainly enough, that the State has control *until* the federal courts say that it has transgressed some right safeguarded by the Federal Constitution. Ay, there's the rub!

And so we are faced with quite an issue, friends. What do we do about it? Well, we must learn to conduct our lives again as we were expected to conduct them when our republic was first founded—by and for ourselves and for each other, and not for an overwhelming central government. And there are many wholesome ways to assist higher education effectively besides the federal way.

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## Gamma Theta Chapter Establishes Kappa Psi Ring Award

To give recognition to a sophomore member who has contributed greatly to the University of Kansas School of Pharmacy, the American Pharmaceutical Association, and to Kappa Psi Fraternity, Gamma Theta has established the Kappa Psi Ring Award.

James (Jim) Osborne is the first to receive the award which consists of a University of Kansas City ring with the Greek letters 'Kappa Psi' encrusted on a ruby stone.

Only sophomore members of the chapter are eligible to receive the award which is to be continued on a yearly basis until 1967 when the chapter will celebrate its 10th anniversary.

The winner of the award is chosen by the point system, and on recommendations of others. Points are accumulated for participation in student activities on a local, province, and national level. In choosing the winner the Executive Committees of the APhA and Kappa Psi indicate on individual ballots the candidate each believes most deserving of the award. The Grand Council Deputy tabulates the results and with recommendations from the dean of the School of Pharmacy, the president of the APhA, and the Regent of Kappa Psi, he decides the winner.





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# THE GRAND SECRETARY-TREASURER HAS THIS TO SAY

## ABOUT SOME IMPORTANT OBJECTIVES, OUR RESPONSIBILITIES AND GOOD CHAPTER MANAGEMENT

The frequent changes in the membership of our collegiate chapters reminds us that we must occasionally call to the attention of these chapters the matter of keeping some important objectives always in clear sight; of recognizing the fact that we must meet important responsibilities and that to operate a chapter successfully, we must employ good business methods.

Each year as a result of graduation, the older and more experienced members of the collegiate chapters are lost which necessitates the passing of chapter management to younger and less experienced members. Frequently the installation of new officers comes so late in the fraternity year that the retiring officers have no opportunity to discuss objectives, responsibilities and management problems. This may mean a serious loss to the chapter. Since we are already well ad-

vanced into the early weeks of the 1962-63 year, we are hopeful that all chapters are cognizant of the responsible positions they occupy on the fifty-two campuses where Kappa Psi Chapters exist. We trust that they have reviewed most carefully some fundamental fraternity objectives and that they have given special attention to the several that we have listed below. In order to obtain the ultimate in chapter growth and success it is necessary to encourage:

1. **LOYALTY TO THE COLLEGE OR UNIVERSITY** through participation in campus affairs which have a bearing on the successful development and increased prestige of one's Alma Mater.
2. **A SENSE OF RESPONSIBILITY TOWARD THE PROFESSION** demonstrated by a high standard of professional conduct and participation in local chapters and branches of important pharmaceutical bodies.
3. **INTELLECTUAL ACHIEVEMENT** provided through the development of a good scholarship program in each chapter.
4. **EXEMPLARY CONDUCT** demonstrated by the good taste and sound morals which distinguish the true fraternity man.

Recently we distributed copies of our newest publication "The Responsibilities of Membership in Kappa Psi Fraternity." This booklet should be read by all members but especially by the officers. It gives such a clear and concise picture that chapters would do well to devote part of one meeting to a careful review of the entire booklet. On a number of previous occasions we have discussed chapter as well as member responsibilities and we have emphasized the fact that no member or chapter can achieve any degree of success or satisfaction in fraternity life where they do not have full appreciation of their responsibilities.

With regard to chapter management, we must recognize the fact, and many chapters do, that the same basic principles which are essential for the operation of a successful profession or business also spell success for a chapter when properly applied. Unfortunately there is no special set of "short cut" rules for the management of a chapter, especially its finances, or at least we have not heard of any. We do know that shoddy business methods are just as unsuccessful in a chapter as they are in any business. It is just that simple.

To the individual himself—while good scholarship may be no absolute guarantee, it is almost certain insurance that he will be successful in whatever field of endeavor he may choose to work. Contrary to what many persons may think, the good scholar's talents are needed in all the areas within the field of pharmacy. He can contribute just as much to the practice of community pharmacy as he can to industry or the field of education.

To his fraternity—the scholar brings honor and prestige. A fine scholarship record is one of the best forms of public relations which a fraternity can possibly present within the institution to which it is attached, not only with its fellow Greek letter societies (both professional and social) but with the entire student body as well as with the faculty and the administration.

To their chosen profession—in this day of intensified pressures and of increased competition on all sides, the learned pharmacist is sorely needed to expound new ideas and to propose solutions to some of the many problems besetting our profession. They are much more apt to be the type who have learned to temper theory with practice. These are men who can think clearly, judge wisely and keep their feet on the ground.

Our sincere congratulations to each individual recipient, to his respective chapter, to his alma mater, his family, his community and to his chosen profession. His is a job well started and augurs well for those who in the future will be his associates.

# The Increasing Importance of Scholarship in Pharmacy

Things change rapidly in the space age and the practice of pharmacy is no exception. The present-day pharmacist has little opportunity to practice the art of the apothecary, but opportunities to utilize his expert knowledge of drugs in the role of adviser to both physicians and laymen are constantly increasing.

If one person is to function as an adviser to another on a particular subject, it is obvious that the advisor must know more about that subject than the advisee. Therefore, before the role of drug expert may be assumed successfully by the community practitioner of pharmacy that individual must acquire a vast amount of factual knowledge about all aspects of the medicines currently employed in the treatment and prevention of disease. Since progress in this field is rapid, he must also form habits of learning which will cause him to seek to gratify his curiosity concerning any medicinal agent with which he is not familiar.

True scholarship implies not only a depth but also a breadth of intellectual curiosity, and the modern pharmacist has numerous duties and obligations outside the prescription room. Recognition that he must be adequately prepared to assume a leading role in community affairs led to the development of a mandatory five-year curriculum leading to the baccalaureate degree in pharmacy. The student is strongly urged to make use of this additional time to explore the liberal arts and other cultural offerings of his institution. This cannot help but result in a better-informed, more knowledgeable individual who will become not only a better pharmacist but also a better citizen.

With the acquisition of various types of knowledge assuming such a fundamental role in the successful practice of pharmacy, it is easy to see why good scholarship is of such importance to future practitioners of the profession.

Recognizing this fact, Kappa Psi Pharmaceutical Fraternity has long been, and continues to be, concerned with the scholastic performance of its members. In the past, numerous incentives to good scholarship, including the coveted Scholarship Key, have been made available. A Scholarship Committee is continually using every means at its disposal, including this issue of *THE MASK*, to bring the importance of scholarship to the attention of the Brothers.

All of this effort is of little avail if the individual members of the Fraternity are not aware of the importance of good scholarship. For this reason it is extremely important for every student to realize that his success as a pharmacist in the future is dependent in large measure on his present scholarly application and the habits of scholarship which he forms today. Changes now under way in the practice of the profession will ultimately mean that the pharmacist who is not a life-long student will also cease to be a pharmacist. Now is the time to recognize the important function of good scholarship in pharmacy of the future.

## What Is a Scholar?

To me, the term scholar has a deeper, more comprehensive connotation than one who attains high grades or otherwise demonstrates a thorough knowledge of a given subject. It is true that a scholar does have a comprehensive knowledge of the material with which he is concerned. In addition to this, a scholarly pursuit usually has its beginning in an

inquisitive mind. This desire to *understand* the *why* leads to more intensive study into a subject, consequently a greater understanding. It may be seen then, that a scholar is not one who has the ability to memorize and correlate a mass of facts, and then reproduce them on demand, but truly one who *comprehends* the facts, their reasons, and possible extensions.

It is true that some students appear to be able to make outstanding grades with a minimum of effort. A thinking person will readily be able to deduce that there may be several reasons why this is true. Avoiding at this time a discussion of these reasons, suffice it to say that a true scholar does not attain good marks for good marks' sake. He does it because he has a true thirst for knowledge for knowledge's sake.

The pharmacy student has five years in which to master a massive amount of material. It is a natural tendency for modern students to master "just enough to get by." The future of our profession and our way of life demands that this attitude on the part of most students be quickly abolished. The men of Kappa Psi are a chosen and select group among pharmacy students and it should be a proud responsibility of each Kappa Psi Brother to promote in many different ways a true scholarly approach to his studies. In order to do this, one must of necessity begin this approach as early in one's career as possible for the obvious reason of obtaining a proper foundation for the understanding and comprehension of more difficult materials. As this foundation develops, one will be surprised at how easily one is able to master more and more material. As one's knowledge increases, one's inquisitiveness grows because one becomes more interested. If these habits are acquired early enough, and are practiced long enough, they will soon become a part of one's everyday life. Surprisingly, one will also become more interested in a wider variety of subjects, and knowledge will be quickly gained here, too.

These are the makings of a true scholar.

## You Are Interested in Scholarship

During the "be kind to animals week," a little boy who desired to do his part said: "I kicked the boy who kicked his dog." All of us want to do our part in the promotion of scholarship within our professional fraternity. In the process we do not wish to take the negative approach as the little boy did during the 'be kind' week.

A man had been a gateman at a federal reservoir in a rather remote area. The dam was located about 45 miles from the nearest town where he could get supplies and needed medical care. He had spent almost 30 years on the job. In his first years at his job he could reach town only by horseback. The keeper was asked if he had to do it all over again, what would he do differently. He thought a while about the long trip to the dentist to have his teeth fixed. He said, "I would have all my teeth pulled and dentures made before I would have come up here in the first place." This too certainly is the negative approach.

The fact that only about half of the brightest high school graduates go on to the universities has drawn wide comment and concern, but the tremendous and often needless drop out of capable university students before they get their degrees is equally tragic. It has been estimated by competent authorities that more than half of the students who drop out of universities are "just as capable academically as the ones who graduate." Such findings "do not support the concept that the non-graduate is inferior academically." Approximately 390,000 young men and women received university degrees last year in the United States, but the more than 100,000-plus who could have, but didn't graduate seems to take away some luster.

Both you and I are interested in our own scholarship and the scholarship of fellow pharmacy students. It has been said that "you can't change human nature." The implica-

tion in this case would mean that one is not interested in helping promote scholarship among fellow students. This would lead to more competition and would not be good for the one who promoted it. Take the matter of habits, for example. They do become fastened upon us, and they are hard to shake. Habits exert a great deal of control over our behavior. A four-year old boy announced to his mother that he didn't like home anymore. She told him he could pack up and leave. So he got his things together and started out. Later, a neighbor saw him walking up and down by the side of the street, carrying his suitcase, and asked: "where are you going, Charles?" "I'm running away from home." "Well, you will not get very far staying on this side of the street." "Yes," said Charles, "But I'm not allowed to cross it." His impulse to leave was strong, but the habit pattern of staying on his side of the street was stronger. You will grow in stature and in satisfaction if you continue to cultivate the habit of good scholarship for yourself and encourage good scholarship in your brothers.

Consider now for a second thing that not only our habits, but our attitudes can change. Over a period of time our attitudes do change more than we realize. Many people find it difficult to change their attitudes. Having developed a certain pattern of thinking, they find it hard to shake themselves loose from it. They get that way about political matters, religious ideas, or personal convictions about life in general. You will grow in stature and in satisfaction if you can continually change your attitude to one of more tolerance toward those who appear to be better scholars than yourself and to assist in every way possible those who can be encouraged towards better scholarship.

The third thing that can be pointed out is that we can change our loyalties. Everyone has sworn his allegiance to one thing or another: some to wealth, some to family, some to pleasure, etc. Some people never get beyond narrow loyalties. If we are devoted to little things, we become an insignificant and little person. If one becomes aware of the fact that he is often selfish, perhaps unkind, etc. it is time to change one's loyalty. This means to change the central orientation of his living. Alfred Kazin, the writer, said recently, "The only kind of change in life which means anything because it transforms everything in its path, is that which changes peoples' thinking, their deepest convictions, that which makes them see the world in a different way." You will grow in stature and in satisfaction if you can change your loyalties to permit a fuller allegiance to the promotion of scholarship of others as well as of yourself.

Every chapter of our Fraternity has a scholarship committee. The Grand Council committees include one on scholarship. The proper habits, attitudes and loyalties—these are the positive approach.

## "Look Fellows—I Made the Dean's List"

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When genuine enthusiasm is expressed in words something like those in the title of this article, we will have arrived at a significant milestone where scholarship is concerned. When it becomes as much of an accomplishment to gain election to an Honor Fraternity or Society or to make the Dean's List as it is to earn a letter on a Varsity squad, we will have accomplished a real feat in collegiate training.

The one reason that any College or University exists is to train and educate its youth to become productive citizens. Outside activities may be interesting and valuable experience, but they are not the reason we send our boys and girls to college. I hasten to state that I am an ardent supporter of extracurricular activities as may

be checked by articles published over my name. In no way should this come first, we must not allow the "extracurricular tail to wag the academic dog."

The spirit of competition learned in a sport could well be transferred to advantage to the classroom. It should be as much fun to excel and to win in academic competition as it is on the playing fields. This record of academic proficiency is of vital interest to employers when they visit our campuses to interview prospective employees.

All fraternities have been and still are under careful scrutiny and are faced with the need to justify their existence. They should not be there solely to furnish shelter for members, or to act as a social center for their activities or even to supply a pin for a coed to wear. Fraternities must do much more than this if they are to be an asset to a campus.

It is worth while and desirable to teach and encourage correct social behavior, and to develop and foster qualities of leadership and responsibility, but even more valuable to pledges and members alike to organize study halls and set up programs to aid the slower learner to develop good habits of study. I suggest sponsored tutoring as one of the responsibilities, not merely the furnishing of old examination papers from a weather-beaten file. This is important and should not be abandoned for some members would do no studying if these were not available.

No fraternity and especially a professional group, can justify its existence when it places far down on the list in fraternity academic standings published twice a year by the Personnel Divisions of a University. With a common interest as a bond, with motivation theoretically high in a pharmacy fraternity—scholarship should be of a high order of accomplishment. Pharmacy fraternities, particularly Kappa Psi chapters, should never find themselves below the "above average" listing. If this is so, they have failed in one of their major responsibilities for their existence.

A good fraternity program can help its members "unlearn" bad habits of study. I refer particularly to the freshmen and other pledges who all suffer to a greater or lesser degree from the "four freshman diseases" brought to the College or University from Preparatory or High Schools. The former do a better job usually than the average high school in this matter of developing good habits of study. They are unable to budget their time, they have to overcome poor habits of reading and finally they are unable to write an examination, other than the modern types. The first mentioned "disease" is by far the worst. Not one in a hundred students I interview knows how to study. The only technique they know is to increase or decrease the amount of reading time accompanied by attempts to memorize. Few if any write and outline their lesson after first reading the new material through for its general content. I can tell you that in science, certainly, if you tell me how many pounds of scrap paper and pencils you have used in preparing your work I can tell you your mark in the course. This is accurate to an uncanny degree of prediction.

Pride of excellence in scholarship should be a major aim of Kappa Psi Fraternity, as well as any other fraternity worthy of its name. To revere a member who excels in the classroom or laboratory rather than at a tavern is a standard which I should like to see Kappa Psi establish.

Those of us in administrative work usually remember two kinds of students: those who excel in the classroom and the trouble makers. We would prefer a greater increase in the number of the former classification. Seldom do undergraduates realize the value of a good academic record and as well, a reputation as a good campus citizen. It is too often true that a student with a poor record in class and out, will ask for a "clean bill of health" in a recommendation in the years following their graduation. No administrative officer can afford to do anything but tell the truth in writing a recommendation to a prospective employer or to another school. Should any other policy but complete honesty be followed it will backfire and cause trouble for the school in placing future candidates for positions in the company that has been sold short by this method.

Finally, never in my 39 years of association with academic work have I seen standards being raised to the extent that they are being now and will be increasingly so in the years immediately ahead. The sheer force of numbers trying to gain admission to all schools will force higher standards and the criteria for reasonably successful measurements are the high school record and that of the score on the College Board Examinations. Tell your younger brothers and sisters that the only way to gain admission to the college of their choice is first to excel in scholarship and second contribute something to the activities of the school. What I say about getting in to a college or university is equally true of the ability of the college trainee to stay in. There will be far less of a tendency to clutter up the classrooms and laboratories with the playboys, the dilettantes, the loafers or those not motivated or willing to sweat a bit for training for a life vocation. Don't expect your tears to keep you in, it will be your record that will keep you headed toward a career in pharmacy. It won't be "who you know" in getting or staying in, but rather "what you know" and how hard you work to improve yourself in the techniques and skills of our public health profession.

Let us make scholarship fashionable in our drive to hold our own in the international race for well trained and educated citizens of America against the communistic world where excellence in learning is well recognized and highly rewarded. We can excel, but only through hard work—it cannot be had by osmosis or by playing records of factual information as we sleep.

# Chapter Scholarship Activities

(EDITOR'S COMMENT: Compiled and prepared by the Chairman of Scholarship Committee—Second Grand Vice Regent Walter R. Williams.)

The table presented here is the result of a questionnaire sent to each collegiate chapter through the Grand Council Deputy in late spring. Some of the data collected on the questionnaire could not be used because of incomplete returns. For example, it was intended to include a listing of those Kappa Psi Brothers who were pursuing graduate studies with the aid of scholarship or fellowship grants, but lack of sufficient data precluded this. In spite of some deficiencies this report is presented with two objectives in mind: one being to honor those chapters which have set up an enviable record of scholastic achievement as a group, the other to encourage more chapters to accelerate their scholarship programs by establishment of (or activation of) an effective scholarship committee and by the offering of scholarship awards both to members as well as to all pharmacy students.





# Dr. Robert M. Leonard Appointed Dean of Pharmacy at George Washington University

Dr. Robert Meyer Leonard, Gamma Tau 1952, has been appointed dean of the School of Pharmacy at The George Washington University after serving as acting dean for the past year. Brother Leonard succeeds Brother Charles W. Bliven, who has resigned to serve as full-time secretary of the American Association of Colleges of Pharmacy.

A native of Pocatello, Idaho, Dr. Leonard comes from a family of pharmacists. His father, Eugene O. Leonard, is a pharmacist and dean emeritus of the Idaho State College of Pharmacy. In addition to his membership in Kappa Psi, Dr. Leonard is a member of the A.Ph.A., American Society of Pharmacognosy, A.A.A.S., Rho Chi, D.C.Ph.A., and affiliated organizations. He has served the City of Washington Chapter of the A.Ph.A. in various capacities since 1951, including president for 1953-55.

Dean and Mrs. Leonard and their three children reside in Silver Spring, Maryland.

Greetings to all our Brothers in Kappa Psi






