

### Description of Sweetheart Pin


In many respects it is a miniaturization of the official Kappa Psi Badge but with significant features:

The eyeholes in the mask are heart-shaped and are red enameled.

The pin is 10 karat yellow gold in three parts: pin, stem and revolving safety catch on the back.

The pin is jeweled with 20 small half pearls, close set to halo the center panel with a delicate aura.

The black vitreous enamel panel reveals the Greek letters; and the mask with the twin heart-shaped eyeholes in red enamel reveal the Sweetheart symbol.

## From the Desk of the Grand Regent

### EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING—1968

On Friday, September 6th, the members of your Executive Committee arrived in St. Louis to tend to the matters which keep our Fraternity moving ahead between the sessions of the Grand Council. In addition to the "regulars," the effectiveness of our meeting was enhanced by the presence of those Grand Officers who have not been members of the Committee and the two newly appointed members, Brothers Glenn Appelt and Carl Trinca. The Coordinator of Graduate and Province Affairs, James Seymour, was also invited to attend.

The meeting was called to order early Saturday morning to consider the multitude of matters which are a step in the progress of Kappa Psi. Although the minutes of our meeting probably have been received by your chapter already, there are a couple of Committee actions that bear reiteration.

The first order of business was to fill the vacancy in Alpha Chapter. By the vote of the Executive Committee, the Second and Third Grand Vice Regents, Brothers Norman Campbell and August Danti, were elected to the offices of First and Second Grand Vice Regents, respectively. Executive Committee Member Edward Krupski was then elected to fill the office of Third Grand Vice Regent and the Coordinator of Graduate and Province Affairs, James Seymour, was appointed to the vacated position on the Executive Committee. These are all men who are genuinely interested in working for *you*, and I know that you will join me in welcoming them to the "official family" of Kappa Psi Pharmaceutical Fraternity.

When I assumed the office of Grand Regent in February, I indicated an earnest interest in having *all* of the elected members of Alpha Chapter become a part of the Executive Committee. My reasoning was that these officers are elected by you to represent you and should, therefore, have a full voice in the operation of the Fraternity. Further, this is one of the methods by which all of the officers can be kept fully informed of the operation of the Fraternity. By unanimous vote, the Committee approved the proposed amendment which would implement this concept. By this time, you will have received copies of the approved proposed amendments and I sincerely hope that you have concurred with our feeling on this amendment to the Constitution.

Of special importance to the Chapters and Provinces is the approval of proposed Uniform By-Laws for the Chapters and Uniform By-Laws for the Provinces. Because of technical reasons, these could not be presented to the 34th Grand Council Convention last year. As a result, a number of Chapters and Provinces are still operating under By-Laws designed after suggested models which were based on earlier revisions of the Constitution. The Chapters and Provinces will find these new models most helpful in updating their by-laws so as to be in accordance with the Constitution now in effect.

The subject of Province realignment has been brought up again. While I have always been reluctant to change Province alignment, except by request and agreement of the chapters and provinces involved, there seems to be some feeling that certain weaknesses in the province structure can be strengthened only by some shifting in province alignment. A committee will be appointed to study the present alignment and to present their findings at the next Grand Council Convention so that it may help the Grand Council to make a final decision on this matter.

This most successful and productive session of your Executive Committee was adjourned shortly before noon on Sunday, September 8, 1968.

## MY THANKS TO ALL IN KAPPA PSI!

This message is directed to all brothers in Kappa Psi as I am about to retire as Editor of our quarterly publication *THE MASK* following this October-December number. This issue is our 264th, the first being that of January, 1904. On page 125 of this issue appears a reproduction of the cover of that first copy.

It was during the summer of the final year of my two-year tenure as Grand Regent that our previous Editor of *THE MASK* informed me that he had decided to retire from the position and not being successful in obtaining a replacement, I was encouraged to undertake the editorship by the then Grand Secretary-Treasurer Frank H. Eby. His confidence in my being able to conduct simultaneously the position of Grand Regent and that of Editor plus the fear that a lapse in the continuity of our publication might result had much to do with my ultimate decision to accept. Consequently my first issue as Editor of *THE MASK* was that of the October-December, 1953. Now, thirteen years and fifty-two issues later, I have requested to be relieved of the editorship. As I look back I find those years as Editor of our quarterly to have been filled with great satisfaction not only as far as the challenge in editing a fraternity publication, but also that of the associations I have made with the hundreds of brothers in our Fraternity.

To the many Historians, Secretaries and other brothers of the various Collegiate and Graduate Chapters who have been most cooperative in supplying Newsletters and reports of other activities, may I say "Thank You." Without your help *THE MASK* could not have survived. I also wish to recognize the excellent cooperation and encouragement given me during these past thirteen years by our Grand Officers with special thanks to our former Grand Secretary-Treasurer Frank H. Eby and our present Executive Secretary Gerald C. Henney.

As my task as editing *THE MASK* will now be turned over to someone else, I trust that the members will give him the same fine support that was afforded me over the years.

And so, as I put my editor's pen aside, I offer the brothers in Kappa Psi my sincere thanks for the opportunity of serving the Fraternity and for the many ways all have helped in making *THE MASK* the fine publication it is.

## Law of Gravity

It's easy for a good chapter to get into difficulty by choosing officers from among the "nice guys" in the house—running a popularity poll rather than picking men because they have the tough qualities of leadership. It's easy, too, for alumni to drift away from a chapter that indicates directly or indirectly that it has no problems and doesn't need alumni intruding on the scene.

It's a lot, lot harder . . . later on . . . to dig up strong undergraduate leader-

ship in a badly weakened chapter, and it's pretty difficult, too, to bring alumni back into a disheartening situation after they've been rebuffed once or twice.

The law of gravity, as it applies to chapters, is inexorable. It postulates that it's much easier to go down than up. So, it follows that prevention is much easier than cure.

Strong chapters need strong leadership. Chapter office can never be a popularity prize.

Strong chapters need strong alumni, too. If the chapter doesn't realize it, the alumni must. They just have to stay in there and pitch—even when the undergraduate reaction at times is less than encouraging.—ORVILLE H. READ, Δ Υ, in *Delta Upsilon Quarterly*

## Second Grand Vice Regent Makes Visitations

Gamma Omega, Psi, and Beta Rho Chapters were visited by Second Grand Vice Regent, Dr. August G. Danti on October 7, 8, 9 respectively.

The membership status was comparable to that of 1967 (The total membership for the Chapters at time of visitation is 123). The Chapters were in fair to good financial condition and had a good financial status with the Central Office. There was a total of 13 scholarships and one Scholarship Key issued to the Chapters last year.

Neither of the Chapters have a house, however Psi has a building fund with plans to own a house in the future.

The activities either sponsored by the Chapters or in which they participate are many and varied and involved the campus, school of pharmacy and the community. In all Chapters it was noted that the brothers held offices in the APHA student chapter, Rho Chi and student government. The Deans of the school of pharmacy indicated that the Chapters fully co-operate with the administration.

Attention to scholarship and affiliation in graduate chapters will be given high priority by the Chapters. Bylaws are being reviewed and revised by the Chapters for more efficient operation. Well organized, dignified, and sensible pledge and rush programs were evident.

The visiting officer received the utmost co-operation from all those concerned with the visitation. He was also received with the graciousness and fraternalism for which Kappa Psi is noted.




## Grand Council Scholarship Key Recipients for 1968







## Hazing of Pledges to Kappa Psi Pharmaceutical Fraternity Prohibited

(Adopted by the Executive Committee, September 8, 1968)

Hazing of pledges to Kappa Psi Pharmaceutical Fraternity, by members, individually or collectively, formally during a Chapter's Pledge Program, or informally outside a Chapter's Pledge Program, is prohibited. Any member responsible for, or who engages in, the hazing of pledges, shall be subject to immediate expulsion from the Fraternity, as provided in The Constitution, Article XV, 27. Sec. 1. Furthermore, any Chapter of Kappa Psi Pharmaceutical Fraternity which engages in hazing of pledges to the Fraternity will have its Charter subject to revocation, as provided in The Constitution, Article IX, 55. Sec. 3.

Hazing includes any act or acts which may result in personal injury, which reflects upon the prestige or reputation of the Fraternity, or which may reflect on the character and professional integrity of its members. Specifically, hazing includes:

1. Complete disrobing of any pledges during the Initiation of pledges or any pledging activities precedent or subsequent to the Initiation.
2. Any act of physical force or violence against the pledge at any time.
3. Any threat of physical force or violence against the pledge at any time.
4. Any conduct which may be morally offensive.
5. Any acts required of a pledge which may be illegal or immoral or any acts, although not illegal or immoral in themselves, may result in a consequential act which is illegal or immoral.
6. Any acts required of a pledge which a reasonably prudent person can presume may result in circumstances, conditions, or conduct which will reflect upon the character, or professional integrity of its members.

## 1968 Executive Committee Meeting St. Louis, Missouri September 7-8, 1968

At the call of Grand Regent James C. King, the Executive Committee met at The Central Office for its 1968 Meeting. All members of the Committee were present except Editor of *THE MASK*, Nicholas W. Fenney. Brother Fenney is recuperating from an injury, which precluded his attendance. The Grand Officers and Coordinator of Graduate and Province Affairs also attended the meeting.

The Committee filled the vacancies in Grand Office created by the passing of our late Grand Regent Walter R. Williams, and the election of First Grand Vice Regent James C. King to the Grand Regency. Second Grand Vice Regent Norman A. Campbell was elected as First Grand Vice Regent; Third Grand Vice Regent August G. Danti was elected Second Grand Vice Regent; and Executive Committee Member Edward Krupski was elected as Third Grand Vice Regent. Grand Regent King appointed Coordinator of Graduate and Province Affairs James D. Seymour to fill the unexpired term of Executive Committee Member Edward Krupski.

The Committee accepted the Report of the Executive Secretary, the Financial Reports for 1967 and approved the Budgets for 1969 and 1970 as proposed by Executive Secretary Gerald C. Henney. The Executive Committee terminated the present contract of the Executive Secretary (which was effective until June 30, 1969) as of December 31, 1968. Executive Secretary Henney was offered a new contract for the period January 1, 1969 to December 31, 1970, which was accepted.

The Committee approved a substantial number of amendments to the Constitution of Kappa Psi Pharmaceutical Fraternity and adopted a Uniform Constitution and By Law for the Chapter and Provinces. These have been distributed by the Central Office for appropriate action by the Fraternity.

Other matters discussed by The Executive Committee included a revised Ritual for Province Assemblies and Opening and Closing Chapter Meetings, where a chapter meets in a public assembly area; a format for Chartering Ceremonies for Graduate Chapters; a preliminary review of Province alignment; expansion of the Fraternity in Collegiate and Graduate Chapters; a review of Fraternity publications; a discussion of *THE MASK* and a review of problems associated with jewelry and certificates as supplied by The L. G. Balfour Company.

Finally, the Executive Committee adopted a written policy on "hazing." Although Kappa Psi Pharmaceutical Fraternity has always prohibited "hazing", this is the first time this policy has been delineated and published.

A complete report of the minutes of the meeting has been distributed by the Central Office.

In summary, The Executive Committee had a most productive meeting. Their decisions have been routine in some cases, but historic in other cases. The Fraternity should be proud of the efforts of the Grand Officers and Executive Committee Members in continually improving upon a strong Kappa Psi Pharmaceutical Fraternity.

I wish to express my appreciation to everyone for their continued support of Kappa Psi through the Central Office. I would be remiss in not expressing my appreciation for my new contract, the confidence it expresses in my efforts and the opportunity to continue serving Kappa Psi Pharmaceutical Fraternity.

Dr. William J. Kinnard, Jr., formerly professor of pharmacology at the University of Pittsburgh, School of Pharmacy, has been named the new dean of University of Maryland's School of Pharmacy.

Dr. Kinnard is widely known for his research in neuro-, behavioral, and cardiovascular pharmacology. To date, he has produced, either alone or in collaboration with others, over sixty publications in the area of pharmacology.

Gibson, Washington State University; Vice Satrap—Fred Grill, Portland Graduate Chapter; Secretary-Treasurer—Richard Johnson, Oregon State University; Historian—Dr. Wendel Nelson, University of Washington.

Beta Omicron will host the next assembly that is to be held in Seattle, Washington during October 1970.

For a number of years Province X has been meeting in a half-day session. Two years ago it was decided that this was not long enough and more benefit would be derived from a full day meeting. This assembly was therefore a full day meeting and was deemed so successful that it was resolved to continue this policy at subsequent assemblies.
