## THE GRAND REGENT

### THIS FRATERNITY OF OURS

Brother Satrap, grand officers, brothers of Province I, and friends:

It is indeed a pleasure to have been invited to Boston to share with you a most successful meeting and fellowship. I bring you greetings from Alpha Chapter, the Executive Committee and the Central Office. I am with the people who are nearest to my heart and the organization in which I would choose to remain a member if I was compelled to make a choice among those with which I am affiliated, and I mean to say -- Kappa Psi.

There is a great sense of close association "esprit de corps" and true fraternalism in Kappa Psi -- and in close association there is strength and unity. Intimate association and frequent contact is healthy for us since we are social beings and can only develop through association. This most basic need was the very impetus, the motivation which gave birth to Kappa Psi in 1879. Since then we have grown to a magnitude whereby we are in a position to contribute greatly to the profession of pharmacy in general and leadership in particular. Today, we are in need of conscientious, dedicated and sincere leaders who will take the profession of pharmacy and its ever-changing aspects and fuse them into an amalgam of professionalism and dedication for the distribution of improved pharmaceutical services for the betterment of public health and welfare.

My dear Brothers, you are those leaders. Kappa Psi has always been the producers of great leaders -- respected, professional, dynamic leaders. The record speaks for itself!!

The last Grand Council Convention in Buffalo, New York proved to me that the potential in Kappa Psi for the continued success of pharmacy is as potent as the nuclear bomb. We are going places! In the next two years we are going to set a blaze of activity which will illuminate the professional sky for years to come. Notice, my Brothers, I said WE; for the strength of Kappa Psi lies in the continued activity and contributions of the chapters. You are the spark plugs which create the energy that keeps the Kappa Psi machine turning . . . which the Executive Committee, (and Alpha chapter), in turn steer toward a hopeful course of progress and success.

Do you know why we are difficult to surpass as a dynamic and productive organization? Because we believe in Kappa Psi that the emotional elements of true brotherhood are the love that binds our hearts in fraternal affection, the charity which is quick to praise and see virtues in an individual and slow to rebuke his faults, and esteem that is respectful to the honest convictions of others and that refrain from treading upon that which is sacred to spirit and conscience. Kappa Psi believes that genuine character and good scholarship are necessary prerequisites for affiliation and must be maintained throughout the life of an individual. I will ask the Scholarship Committee to formulate guidelines for the successful creation of a Scholarship Committee in each of our chapters to include recognition for scholastic achievements. Our objectives and principles include maintaining a high standard of moral, social and professional conduct during the days we spend in college which are excellent habits to form and lead ultimately to better citizenship and respect from members of our profession and society in general.

I once remarked that we are a strength to the profession of pharmacy -- only if we abide by the principles in which we were founded. We are strong in number also. With our 58 collegiate and 29 graduate chapters we are the third largest pharmaceutical organization in the United States. Members of Kappa Psi are found in every state in the United States and in many foreign countries.

In order that a large organization such as Kappa Psi function smoothly and efficiently, it becomes necessary, better still, compulsory that its members attend chapter meetings, Province assemblies, and participate in national meetings. Aside from fellowship, these various meetings are instruments for the dissemination of information, expression of the desires of any one segment of our fraternity in a democratic way in which we Americans practice our policies, and offer an opportunity to exchange ideas.

We must not take these meetings lightly, since what is decided at these assemblies may well change the future structure of the organization as a whole, sometimes, of course, for the best. Much sad experiences have taught us that the future has in store exactly what has been placed in store for the future. In our individual chapters we must be certain that issues are scrutinized carefully and logically before presenting its arguments at a general assembly. This means that near 100 per cent attendance is required at every chapter meeting in order that democratically, each member may express his opinion and be informed as to what transpires in our great fraternity. Delegates should be well versed in all issues and a separate meeting be called to inform the membership of the activities which transpired at a Province meeting or a Grand Council Convention. Incidentally, this is exactly how the pharmaceutical organizations function relative to local, state and national meetings.

If we are to realize a strong "union" of men, we must exercise the responsibility of appointing or electing individuals, whichever the case may be, who will be capable of performing an assigned task with the utmost efficiency and competence. It is dead wrong to choose a Brother for a position simply because he's a close friend, a nice guy, a relative, drives a sports car, etc. Never allow personal feelings to govern your choice for the "man who can do the job." I believe that in Kappa Psi this is not prevalent, otherwise, we would not have existed this long.

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Another entity which makes Kappa Psi great is the ability of the Brothers to perform a task when need be and not to procrastinate until told to do so or wait until "George gets here -- and he will do it." We can't afford to develop this habit -- the profession of pharmacy is dynamic and it waits for no man; it can't afford to do so. If we are bound to form a habit of "laissez faire," it would certainly take root in the period of our Kappa Psi years in college.

Remember, too, that the future of Kappa Psi, and Pharmacy for that matter, lies in the pledges we choose to follow in our foot steps. We must select prospective leaders on the basis of the maxim, namely, "what can I do for Kappa Psi and Pharmacy and not what can Kappa Psi do for me." This is a monumental responsibility and must be a matter to which a great deal of thought be expended. It must be an honor to be "Kappa Psi" and not just an empty gesture." One of the greatest privileges and pleasures in life is the feeling of "belonging" -- and Kappa Psi offers to all members the pleasure of good fellowship, the prestige of professional recognition, and the inner pride of acceptance on a basis of personal qualifications.

Let us not forget that since we are professional we must continue to look and act the part. We don't want to be just one of the more than 30 professional fraternities of the Professional Interfraternity Conference, we want to be the best. We are obliged to endow a professional climate to any campus and to be ready to cooperate with the administration of the colleges and schools of pharmacy and other campus organizations in bringing about this professional atmosphere. We can inject an "esprit de corps" in the very lifeblood of pharmacy itself through our professional efforts. No Kappa Psi Brother should ever be involved in legal action due to misconduct in any phase of the practice of his profession. This is the only area in which we do not choose to compete for recognition.

### The Governing Body

The Brothers of Kappa Psi are governed by the Grand Council which is the supreme legislature, judicial, and executive body of the Fraternity. Those at the chapter level or the Province level, must work closely with our governing body for the good of the Fraternity. The elected and appointed officers are capable and competent individuals and at times deem it necessary to depend in part on the opinions of the constituents of the Provinces and the membership of the chapters. This is a healthy situation, a most democratic viewpoint. Therefore, it behooves us to give our full support to the governing body and help to institute actions which would be beneficial to the whole organization, although it may seem at times to disrupt a perfectly good "status quo" condition. If we are to be representatives of a future strength in our chosen profession, we must be tolerant, wise, and organized in depth.

### Communications

It might be stated at this time that communication between chapters is most critical in view of the above. We must be aware of what transpires at all times and be kept abreast of the activities of Kappa Psi in general as well as on the local and Provincial level. This calls for some medium by which to disseminate current and future events. Aside from our *Mask*, the Province Newsletter and

some of the Chapter newsletters are most informative. All efforts must be made to keep these newsletters in print. This calls for chapter participation at the Province level. Let's contribute as often as possible. There are many activities in your locale which other chapters would like to read about, and be informed as to the progress being made in your particular area, both in the Fraternity and in the profession.

### Graduate Chapters

Once we leave college and begin to practice in our chosen endeavor, let us not forget that we are Brothers of Kappa Psi for life. The Graduate members of Kappa Psi in good standing enjoy all the rights and privileges of collegiate members. The friendships and fraternal ties which we make while in college lead to the formation of Graduate Chapters to continue in a sense, the sharing of this wealth of fraternalism we have amassed. We should all look forward to the day when we can be an active participant in a Graduate Chapter and help to enlighten the Collegiate Brother in the ways in which he can promote cooperation among fellow pharmacists for the mutual benefit of the Brothers and the professional as a whole. The Graduate Chapter is a "big brother" and should be prepared to give guidance and assistance to the "young" Collegiate in every way possible. A strong Graduate Chapter can be a definite influence on the profession of pharmacy . . . a voice with which to be reckoned.

We now have an Assistant Executive Secretary for Graduate Development in the Central Office. He is Brother William Fitzpatrick. His responsibility will be to assist in every way possible the growth and development of graduate chapters. We also have a Graduate Development Advisory Committee and of course the advice from the Advisory Committee who are experienced passed Grand Regents of Kappa Psi.

We shall see satisfactory progress in this area in the future.

### Summary

The Chapters and Provinces must continue to contribute to the progress of Kappa Psi in the future as they have in the past. Irrespective of any realignment to which we may be subjected, the many worthy activities of a most dynamic Chapter or Province must never cease. If we live up to our objective of inspiring in our members a deep and lasting pride in Kappa Psi and in the profession of pharmacy, then we can't help but be a strength in our profession. We only realize from an organization what we are willing to put into it. We can only reap, what we sow. Let our harvest be abundant!!! Thank you. Good luck! It's been a grand meeting.

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## EDITORIAL . . . . .

THE PROFESSIONAL FRATERNITY AS A MODEL  
FOR THE PROFESSION

Two of the definitions for a "fraternity" given in *Webster's Seventh New Collegiate Dictionary* are:

1. A group of people associated or formally organized for a common purpose, interest or pleasure; and,
2. The quality or state of being brothers.

Both of these definitions are intended by *Kappa Psi*.

The same dictionary refers to a fraternity as consisting of "men of the same profession". Of course the men of *Kappa Psi* are all simultaneously members of the profession, but there is a message to be found in this part of the definition. Traditionally, true professional people behave as though they were members of a strong fraternity. This behavior is partly aimed at protecting the members, but more importantly it is aimed at protecting those whom the profession serves by the mechanism of self-control.

Theoretically, at least, the professional fraternity is unnecessary for other than social purposes. A profession should demand of its members all of the standards of conduct and professional attitude which are now spelled out in the *Kappa Psi Declaration of Principles*. In fact, however, we recognize the schisms in the profession, the confusion of backgrounds and goals, and the changing relationships in the emerging types of professional practice have prevented pharmacy from behaving as a "professional fraternity".

*Kappa Psi* has essentially been ahead of its time. While the rest of the profession has been recognizing the need for a change from product-orientation to people-orientation, the *Principles* have quietly noted the importance of "the acquisition of a knowledge of men and a proper concept of their relation to one another." While some sort of code of conduct is certainly desirable, it is hard to envision anyone improving upon the basic *Principles* of "sterling character".

In the final analysis, each of us is our "Brother's Keeper" and in the larger sense, and individual guardian of the profession. We would submit that any conscientious member of the profession of Pharmacy —

could hardly do better than to adhere in his practice to the principles and objectives of *Kappa Psi – A Model for the Profession*.

## GUEST EDITORIAL . . . . .

**THE ROLE OF THE PROFESSIONAL FRATERNITY  
IN CONTEMPORARY PHARMACY**

We feel privileged to have been asked to provide your membership with some suggestions concerning the role of the professional fraternity in contemporary pharmacy. We commend you for your concern that *Kappa Psi* is not playing an important enough role in pharmacy's future, and for wanting to do something about it.

[We know that you take pride in the fact that *Kappa Psi* not only has the distinction of being the first professional fraternity in pharmacy, but today . . . as it begins its 91st year, maintains the largest membership of all the pharmaceutical fraternities. With more than 32,000 members, it can also point with pride to the fact that it is presently the third largest organization in pharmacy in terms of numbers of members.]

We are impressed with the fine objectives of your fraternity, particularly (c) which reads: *To support all projects which will advance the profession of pharmacy and to actively participate in them*”, and (d) which reads: *To inspire in its members the deep and lasting pride in their fraternity and in the profession of pharmacy.*”

Before I make some suggestions in regard to the role of *Kappa Psi* in the advancement of the profession, I would like to relate to you a story which was printed in a recent issue of the Journal of The New Hampshire Pharmaceutical Association. Perhaps herein lies the tale of why our profession has failed to address itself to the need for it to assume a more important “patient oriented” role as members of the total health team, and why only about 15% of its practitioners have adopted a patient or family prescription record system.

The story goes like this . . . . Once upon a time there was an old man who had seven sons. There was discord among them and the father was greatly troubled. One day he called the boys to his side and to each he presented a light piece of wood.

“My sons”, he said, “I wish to test thy strength. Break the sticks.” The sons fell to; each broke his stick with ease. The old man then took seven more pieces of wood of like size. These he bound firmly together with thongs, making a bundle. It was handed to each son in turn with the request that he again break the sticks. Even though each one tried mightily to demonstrate his strength, none could break the united sticks.”

“Let that be a lesson”, warned the father. “Do you see how important it is to work together? Do you not see that coordination would multiply your strength many times?”

Pharmacists . . . like reeds, more persuasively present their influence when “bundled together” with substantial bonds of common purpose. (G. A. Moulton, 1936)

I think this story best illustrates the great potential for significant accomplishment when professionals band together to achieve their objectives. If, in unity there is strength, it is my firm belief that because of the bonds of fraternalism which bind them together, *Kappa Psi* is in a unique position among pharmaceutical organizations in this country. I believe that if it were to initiate a major emphasis program on *the pharmacist's role in the prevention of adverse drug interactions*, thousands of additional pharmacists . . . especially in community practice, could be made to recognize their responsibilities to both the patient and to the physician, and would make such a record system an integral part of their daily practice.

Dr. Thomas W. Dunphy, writing in the *American Journal of Hospital Pharmacy*, (Vol. 26, July, 1969) in regard to the pharmacist's role in the prevention of adverse drug interactions state that “The multiplicity of drugs available for use and a persistent increase in the average number of drugs being taken per patient have led to the emergence of unique problems in drug therapy. One of the most prominent of these is the effect of one drug on the action of another. Many recent article point out the potential dangers which some of these interactions pose for the patient and urge pharmacists to become active in their prevention. Hartshorn has suggested “*that expert knowledge of drug interactions and communication of infor-*

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*mation to other members of the health team may be one of the most important professional contributions of the pharmacist."*

A recent communique from CLIN-ALERT reported that drug reactions occur frequently (involving 1.5 to 2 million persons in the U. S. every year), are costly to the patient in terms of suffering and added hospital expense, are life-threatening, and may be fatal. It is not surprising, therefore, that one out of every five U. S. physicians have at some time been involved in a legal action. In fact, the rapid increase in malpractice suits threatens to become a national crisis, according to a Senate investigating committee. Huge amounts are involved, with individual assessments against physicians, hospitals, *pharmacists*, and drug manufacturers often reaching or exceeding \$1,000,000.00.

Thousands of *Kappa Psi* members are learning through clinical pharmacy experience, to communicate about drug therapy with physicians, nurses, patients, and other members of the health team, and understand the why, when and how drugs are selected and used in a clinical situation. They are gaining experience in observing the pharmacologic effect or lack of effect of drugs on patients, and are becoming acquainted with the evaluation and interpretation of all chart information and laboratory values for a better understanding of the total needs of the patient. This broad and realistic educational background will be invaluable, and they will be better able to function effectively with other members of the health team in providing optimal health care, no matter where they choose to practice their profession.

It seems to me that we must look to these young people to do a selling job on those practitioners in community pharmacy who have failed to recognize their professional responsibilities insofar as possible drug interaction is concerned. We must become patient-oriented and become involved, not only in the dispensing of the prescription, but also in advising the patient on the proper use of medications, whether on prescription or over-the-counter.

Through the use of the Family Prescription Record, many pharmacists have noted instances of unintentional use of medications that might be categorized as "drug abuse". There have been also many instances where a patient has conscientiously sought medical advice and treatment from a physician in more than one area of specialization. The patient has not always indicated to the physician

that he or she has consulted with another physician and the resultant medication prescribed may duplicate or unfavorably interact with that prescribed by another physician.

Imagine if you will how grateful is the Internist who receives a call from the pharmacist who tells him that his new patient for whom he has just prescribed "belladonna" is also in the care of an Ophthalmologist and is routinely using 4% pilocarpine in the treatment of her glaucoma. Without a Family Prescription Record, the patient might well have lost her sight.

I should like to cite a quotation from Thomas Percival's book on "Medical Ethics" which was published in 1803, and even though the role of the Apothecary has changed somewhat during the past 165 years, we believe that what was said in 1803 is also appropriate for the pharmacist who would expand his role to meet the challenge of the Seventies:

"A connection peculiarly intimate subsists between the physician and the apothecary, and various obligations necessarily result from it. On the knowledge, skill and fidelity of the apothecary depend, in a very considerable degree, the reputation, the success, and usefulness of the physician . . . . This amicable intercourse and cooperation of the physician and apothecary, if conducted with the decorum and attention of etiquette, which should always be observed by professional men, *will add to the authority of the one, to the respectability of the other and the usefulness of both.*"

Pharmacy looks to *Kappa Psi* to help insure that "the knowledge, skill and fidelity of the apothecary" will be equal to the challenge of the Seventies.

**RESOLUTIONS ADOPTED BY THE 35TH  
GRAND COUNCIL CONVENTION**

1. *WHEREAS*, in general the accommodations were far from satisfactory, and whereas the elevator service was inadequate to accommodate the guests, and whereas a lack of courtesy by some hotel personnel and a lack of supervision by hotel authorities to safeguard our female guests making it necessary for these guests to be accompanied by an escort within the hotel at all times.

*BE IT RESOLVED THAT*, the Executive Secretary be directed to inform by mail, Mr. Conrad Hilton with a carbon copy to the Hotel Management of the aforementioned criticism, but let it be clearly understood that this does not reflect upon Gamma Iota Chapter and the Buffalo Graduate Chapter.

**Implementation:** Letters were sent by the Central Office to the Honorable Frank Sedita, Mayor of the City of Buffalo, New York and Mr. Barron Hilton, President of the Hilton Hotels Corporation. The Fraternity received the \$800.00 indemnity from the Buffalo-Hilton Hotel for our inconveniences.

2. *WHEREAS*, the best facilities and accommodations should be provided for Grand Council Conventions, and whereas such are becoming less obtainable in hotels.

*BE IT RESOLVED THAT*, this Convention suggests that the Executive Committee explore the possibility of utilizing a first class motel for our next Convention.

**Implementation:** The Executive Committee has been aware for several years of the increasing problems with hotel facilities and had hoped to obtain a motel for the 35th Grand Council Convention. However, although there may appear to be a multiplicity of motels in major cities, there are not a large number which are equipped to handle a meeting the size of the Grand Council. The problem is not sleeping rooms, but rather having sufficient meeting rooms in size and number to accommodate the Fraternity.

The Executive Committee selected New Orleans, Louisiana as the site of the 36th Grand Council Convention. Although New Orleans is a frequented tourist city, the problem of sufficient motels with adequate space has once again arisen. The Hilton Inn, Kenner, Louisiana has been selected as the meeting place for the 36th Grand Council for a number of reasons.

a. Inasmuch as Kappa Psi has no Chapter in the City of New Orleans, transportation of delegates to and from the airport becomes a problem of staggering proportion. The Hilton Inn is located directly across from the New Orleans International Airport, eliminating this problem.

b. The Hilton Inn has 294 sleeping rooms and four large and medium size meeting rooms which have been committed to Kappa Psi. This automatically precludes us from having to share the facilities with any other convention. All rooms are located on two levels eliminating any worry over elevator service. Parking is self-parking at the door avoiding the problems experienced at Buffalo. The rooms are large and will accommodate quads (four to a room) comfortably.

c. The Hilton Inn has two swimming pools plus a wading pool for children. The public pool is large and is available at all times for public use as well as ours. The inn also has a patio pool which we can reserve for our exclusive use whenever we desire so to do. This automatically provides us with a reserved facility and provides an opportunity for unique social activities.

I should point out that in selecting the Hilton Inn, one problem does arise, but when related to the other matters which have to be considered it is not irresolute. The location of the Inn is about 15 miles from the French Quarter. However, it is a few minutes to Interstate 10 which provides a fast, high speed route to the French Quarter. I feel it unnecessary to remind the Brothers who may object to this, that the Grand Council is a working meeting to further the Fraternity and not a visit to the French Quarter for four or five days.

One other motel was considered, but having 500 rooms and an eight story section with smaller rooms, this property was ruled out. There is no guarantee that we would have to share the motel with another convention, which is a major objection after our experience in Buffalo. This motel is in midtown New Orleans, and a distance from both the Airport and the French Quarter. Other properties considered were hotels, and these were eliminated on the basis of price, no swimming facilities, charge for parking, no self-parking and size.

I think I should call attention to the fact that as a tourist city, prices in New Orleans are considerably higher than other cities. However, I hasten to add that the rates quoted in Buffalo were unrealistic, especially when related to the facilities offered. The rates for the Hilton Inn are confirmed as follows:

Singles: \$14.00 to \$23.00 with eight price ranges available  
 Doubles: \$20.00 to \$29.00 with eight price ranges available  
 Triples: \$28.00  
 Quads: \$28.00

I realize that there will be criticism for having returned to a Hilton Hotels Corporation facility, but I must point out to the Brothers that there is a great deal more than just saying we will have a Grand Council Convention. With this in mind, the Central Office pledges that all efforts will be made to avoid any unpleasantries for the delegates.

3. *WHEREAS*, Former Grand Secretary-Treasurer Frank H. Eby was

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not able to attend the Thirty-Fifth Grand Council Convention of Kappa Psi Pharmaceutical Fraternity for reasons of health.

*BE IT RESOLVED THAT*, this Thirty-Fifth Grand Council Convention express its disappointment, and express its hope that Brother Frank H. Eby will be able to join us at the Thirty-Sixth Grand Council Convention.

*AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT*, a copy of this resolution be sent to Brother Eby by the Central Office.

**Implementation:** A copy of this resolution has been sent to Brother Frank H. Eby.

4. *WHEREAS*, the purpose of this Grand Council is to conduct the business of the Fraternity in an orderly and efficient manner.

*BE IT RESOLVED THAT*, the Grand Regent appoint a rules committee to review Robert's Rules of Order, and abstract appropriate rules of conduct for Grand Council Conventions, and

*BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT*, these rules be printed and submitted to the Chapters at least sixty days prior to the next Grand Council Convention.

**Implementation:** The responsibility for the development of the Robert's Rules of Order manual for Grand Council Conventions has been assigned to the Grand Counselor and the Executive Secretary.

5. *WHEREAS*, a majority of the members of the Grand Council appear in favor of establishing a female service order,

*BE IT RESOLVED THAT*, this subject be explored by the Executive Committee for consideration and implementation.

**Implementation:** At its meeting following the 35th Grand Council, the Executive Committee adopted the Constitutional amendments necessary to establish the order, but did not assign a title to the order. The Central Office was instructed to poll the Chapters for a vote on the action of the Executive Committee as is required by the Constitution. If the Chapters approve the action of the Executive Committee, the program will be implemented and an appropriate title will be assigned.

6. *WHEREAS*, the maintenance of adequate health care is being seriously jeopardized by the current draft law, the Brothers of Kappa Psi Pharmaceutical Fraternity do hereby resolve that the profession of Pharmacy is necessary for the maintenance of adequate health care in the United States.

*BE IT RESOLVED THAT*, it is in the national interest to include students of pharmacy along with students in medicine, dentistry,

veterinary medicine and optometry as students who receive guaranteed student deferments while attending their respective professional schools, and

*BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT*, a copy of this resolution be sent to the American Pharmaceutical Association.

*BE IT RESOLVED THAT*, this Thirty-Fifth Grand Council Convention assembled give a standing ovation to Brother Joseph Miletta, his Committee and all who participated in these arrangements to entertain our ladies.

**Implementation:** The Executive Committee voted a Citation of Appreciation for the Buffalo Graduate Chapter and Gamma Iota Chapter for the outstanding manner in which all Brothers of these Chapters worked so long and diligently in their efforts to make the Thirty-Fifth Grand Council such an outstanding success.

8. *BE IT RESOLVED THAT*, the next Grand Council Convention in 1971 be held at such motel that has a swimming pool for the Brothers' enjoyment.

**Implementation:** See Resolution 3.

9. *WHEREAS*, there have been some changes in the Ritual, and as a new Ritual is in press, and further, the effective use of the Ritual in the Fraternity varies greatly,

*BE IT RESOLVED THAT*, the Executive Committee seek to send the Grand Regent, or his deputy to at least one Assembly of each Province within the next biennium with the expressed purpose of furthering the effective use of the Ritual in the Fraternity.

**Implementation:** During the most recent biennium, each Province Supervisor attended the meeting of his Province when possible. This practice will continue and the functions of placing emphasis on the effective use of the Ritual is the responsibility of the Province Supervisor.

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10. *BE IT RESOLVED THAT*, this Thirty-Fifth Grand Council Convention commend Executive Secretary Gerald C. Henney for superior performance of his man duties, and that our appreciation for his devotion be entered into the records of the Thirty-Fifth Grand Council Convention.

11. *WHEREAS*, the International Pharmaceutical Students Federation is the vital link in communications among pharmacy students in the many countries which hold membership in the Federation, and Resolutions Adopted by the 35th Grand Council Convention,

*WHEREAS*, Kappa Psi Pharmaceutical Fraternity, a Member in Association of the International Pharmaceutical Students Federation, must provide the stimulus necessary to fulfill its commitments as a Member in Association of the Federation,



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

## PROVINCE X


The 1969 Province X Assembly was held in Las Vegas, Nevada on November 1, 1969 at the Landmark Hotel.


### CONNECTICUT GRADUATE CHAPTER



Nieforth; Treasurer James Miller; Newsletter Editor Dennis Sullivan and Province Supervisor Benjamin R. Hershenson. The minutes of the 1968 Assembly, which had been previously distributed, were accepted without a reading. Reports of the Province Officers were presented and committees were appointed by Satrap Pierce.

The Second Session was devoted to reports by the Chapters and the reports of the various Committees. 

## SEATTLE GRADUATE CHAPTER





After a summer of rest and relaxation, the brothers of Beta Pi Chapter are getting back into the swing of school and Kappa Psi activities.



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
## A DAY AT THE GAME . . . . .

## THE LAST WORD . . . . .

Sometimes we tend to feel that our problems and our thoughts are unique and that they are appearing for the first time anywhere. Those who are called upon to defend the costs of prescription drugs would find it difficult to improve upon those words of Adam Smith from his *Wealth of a Nation*, published in 1776:

“ Apothecaries profit is become a bye-word, denoting something uncommonly extravagant. This great apparent profit, however, is frequently no more than the reasonable wages of labour. The skill of an apothecary is a much nicer and more delicate matter than that of any artificier whatever; and the trust which is reposed in him is of much greater importance. He is the physician of the poor in all cases, and of the rich when the distress or danger is not very great. His reward, therefore, ought to be suitable to his skill and his trust, and it arise generally from the price at which he sells his drugs. But, the whole drugs which the best employed apothecary, in a large market town, will sell in a year, may not perhaps cost him above thirty or forty pounds. Though he should sell them, therefore, for three or four hundred pounds, or at a thousand per cent profit, this may frequently be no more than the reasonable wages of his labour charged, in the only way in which he can charge them, upon the price of his drugs. The greater part of his apparent profit is real wages disguised in the garb of profit”.
