Upjohn's present policy includes national and state association journals and school of pharmacy journals. Apparently, *The Mask* has not been interpreted as a school journal although a significant portion of the readership and content of *The Mask* is collegiate. In screening the ads *The Communicator* was thought to be a school ad and thus slipped through in the process. Don stated to me that the one viewed by those at Gamma Nu and one at Auburn have since been dropped.

I plan to talk with Don when he visits our school on December 1 about a future policy change. I believe the readership of *The Mask* would be in line with their current policy as the Brothers of Kappa Psi overlap greatly the national and state association journals and the school publications and would add, at the most, five national professional pharmacy association publications to their current list, probably less as I don't think two of the organizations have a national publication.

CONTINUING EDUCATION

ACETAMINOPHEN

Several articles have appeared recently in the lay press which have condemned a cetaminophen because of the toxic symptoms it can produce if taken in large quantities. Some writers have even suggested that legislation be enacted which would reclassify the analgesic-antipyretic as a legend drug. Acetaminophen is a very useful drug and is toxic only when ingested in large amounts. The ingestion of 10 Grams of acetaminophen can produce serious toxicity. While experiencing acute toxicity, the patient may demonstrate nausea, vomiting, excitement, delirium, convulsions, and ultimately central nervous system depression. He may seemingly improve for 3 to 5 days but then symptoms of hepatic damage may become evident. Gross elevation of liver enzymes and some elevation of bilirubin levels may be noted. Ultimately the patient may succumb. The hepatotoxicity is due to the accumulation of acetaminophen metabolites. Normally these metabolites are readily inactivated by hepatic glutathione, but when large amounts of the compound are consumed there is insufficient reserves of glutathione to detoxify these active arylating substances and they interact with the macromolecules of the liver. The liver can be protected against this damage by administering cysteamine, but it causes nausea and vomiting, and generally is not available in most pharmacies. Investigators have found that one can help protect against this toxicity by administering 2.5 Grams of methionine every four hours for four doses. Therapy must be started within 10 hours of the ingestion in order to produce the best results. As with anything, excesses can be damaging. Acetaminophen is a useful drug and should not be reclassified as a legend drug.





Thomas H. Lake, (Beta Omega), president of Eli Lilly and Company, has announced plans for retirement, effective December 31, after thirty-one years of service with the company. He will continue as a member of the Board of Directors, to which he was elected in 1965, and will serve as its vice-chairman.

Mr. Lake joined Eli Lilly and Company as a salesman in Cleveland in 1946. Transferring three years later to Eli Lilly International Corporation, he served in sales posts in Puerto Rico and Portugal.

Appointed associate sales director of the Latin American area in 1954, Mr. Lake became executive vice-president of Lilly International in 1956. For more than three years, beginning in 1961, he held executive positions in the United Kingdom, first as general manager and chairman of the board of the Lilly affiliate in Basingstoke, England, and later as group vice-president in the London office, with responsibility for the United Kingdom, European, and Mediterranean areas. He assumed the presidency of Lilly International in 1964.

A native of Pennsylvania, Mr. Lake was graduated from Saltsburg (Pa.) High School in 1936 and received a Bachelor of Science degree in pharmacy and chemistry from Temple University in 1941. He was awarded an honorary Doctor of Science degree by that university in 1967 and received similar degrees from Butler University and Duquesne University in 1975.
