









When our esteemed Editor of *The MASK* asked me to contribute to this series of articles by Past Grand Regents, my first thought was that I'm way too young to be writing an article titled "Remembrances"! Then I sat back and admitted to myself that I have indeed been at this for quite some time. In fact, this year marks my 25th year as a brother of Kappa Psi, making me a member of the Bob Magarian Order of the Silver Mortar. My, how time flies.

I recently had the opportunity to revisit my undergraduate chapter, Beta Chi, at Drake University in Des Moines, Iowa. It was fun to see how successful the chapter has become and, more importantly, how close the brothers seem to be with each other.

When I was initiated into Kappa Psi in 1981, Beta Chi chapter was an all-male chapter of barely 30 members. The chapter is now coed and has grown to at least double that number after having some really lean years in the late 1980s. Although much has changed at Beta Chi, much is still the same. Most of the professional activities I did as a Beta Chi pledge and brother, such as volun-

teering at the local Ronald McDonald House, are still being conducted by the chapter today.

That visit brought back a flood of memories regarding my involvement in Kappa Psi. My first thought is about the day I went to my first formal rush function. I remember sitting in the audience listening to these brothers discuss the various aspects of Kappa Psi. Each committee chairman and officer diligently and proudly described how what they did fit into the Fraternity as a whole. I could tell that they were proud of Kappa Psi, and it made me want to be involved with such a noble group. Their pas-

sion was contagious, and it's a passion that I could somehow never shake.

The most memorable moments in one's life are the times you experience something for the first time, and that holds true for me regarding Kappa Psi. Whether its my first rush event, my first meeting as a brother, my first meeting as regent of Beta Chi, or my first Kappa Psi event with brothers from other chapters, each event is a unique experience that continues to remind me how special Kappa Psi is.

The first time I ventured outside the comforts of Beta Chi chapter was my trip to Omaha for the Province VIII fall conclave in

1981. I remember walking into the meeting hosted by Gamma Epsilon chapter at the University of Nebraska. The meeting was held in one of the lecture rooms at the college of pharmacy, and a significant number of participants were smoking...including the province supervisor! The most memorable portion of that meeting, though, was on Saturday evening. With no official plans for the night, we (the five Beta Chi attendees) invited the brothers staying at the hotel over to our room. There were more than 20 people in our room that night, laughing and joking until all hours. Needless to say it was a lot of fun, and these were mostly people whom I had met within the previous 24 hours.

An interesting thing happens when Kappa Psi brothers meet other brothers from across the country: With a single handshake, you know something about that person. You know what oath they took, you know what promises they made to their current and future brothers, and you know that you can trust them. I learned that at my first province meeting and continue to learn it every time I attend such events.

I have since been to 45 Province VIII conclaves and meetings at countless other provinces, and it never ceases to amaze me how close brothers can become in a 48-hour period. Several of those friendships have even blossomed into lifelong partnerships. In fact, I have attended several of those weddings.

My first Grand Council Convention (GCC) was in 1987 in Orlando, Florida. Several weeks before that meeting, I got a call from Brother John Grossomanides, a graduate of Beta Epsilon at Rhode Island and a brother whom I had never met, asking me if I needed a place to stay at GCC. I ended up rooming with John and his group and, through that, met even more brothers who would soon become lifelong friends. Of particular note were several long discussions with Brother Paul Hiller who eventually became Grand Regent the same term that I joined the Executive Committee as Grand Ritualist in 1993.

I spent 10 years on the Executive Committee holding several offices, eventual-

ly having the honor to serve as your Grand Regent from 1999 to 2001. It was quite an honor to hold that office during the celebration of the 2000 millennium. In fact, celebrate we did by inviting the entire Fraternity to Minneapolis for a New Year's Eve gathering hosted by the brothers of the Minnesota Graduate chapter. I told Minnesota Grad that if they hosted the event, I would lead everyone in singing *Auld Lang Syne* at midnight. We both held up our ends of that bargain, and well over 100 brothers had to listen to me sing as the clock struck 12.

Grand Regent is an interesting job. There are two different and distinct roles that one performs in that office. On one hand, you are the chief executive officer administratively for the entire Fraternity. That role requires one to look at Kappa Psi as a business and try to steer the Fraternity in a positive direction, while keeping an eye on the past, hoping to make those before you proud. The other role is that of the primary representative or "face" of the Fraternity for two years. Both roles can be challenging, but both roles can be equally as rewarding.

My biggest memories of my role as administrator were of moving the Central Office from Oklahoma City down the road to Weatherford, Oklahoma, in January 2001. Halfway through my term, my friend and mentor, Robert Magarian, retired as our executive director after 20 dutiful years. In 2001, the Executive Committee hired Brother Scott Long to assume that role for Kappa Psi.

We should all be proud of both of their services to this Fraternity in a role that often doesn't get the recognition it deserves.

My role as the primary representative of Kappa Psi throughout the nation took me many, many places. Fifty years before my term, a brother named L.K. Darbaker chartered numerous chapters within a two-year period, some of which were chartered during the same trip by train across the Midwest and Mid-South. I had the honor of representing Kappa Psi 50 years later as each of these chapters celebrated their golden anniversaries. Add those events to province meetings, chapter visitations, and even a retirement party for Brother Norman Campbell (Grand Regent 1972-1974) and it made for a busy travel schedule.

What makes this whole experience special as I move through my various roles in the Fraternity is the people you meet and get to know along the way. Meeting people like Brother Porter and Brother Hiller early in my Kappa Psi life made me want to serve as a national officer for this Fraternity. Meeting mentors like Brother Magarian and Brother Dewey D. Garner (who was Grand Regent when I pledged) made me want to continue my professional education. Meeting and having dinner with brothers like Glen Sperandio (Grand Regent 1963-1967) and William R. Smith (Grand Regent 1989-1991) made me realize the dedication that has existed throughout the entire history of this great Fraternity.

Today, though, it's different. Those I meet who are most memorable are those far younger than me. I now get to watch our young leaders boldly stand in front of fellow brothers at chapter or province meetings, proudly proclaiming their goals and commitment to Kappa Psi from a different perspective—that of a guy old enough to write a "remembrance" article! As I watch them, though, I smile. I smile knowing that the Fraternity is in good hands, and I smile knowing what lies ahead for those who maintain that passion past their graduation and far beyond.







Graduate brothers also attended chapter meetings and the Epsilon spring dinner meeting. Starting this


school year, graduate brothers will host a dinner for collegians who have perfect attendance at chapter meetings.


