The State of the Fraternity 2020–2021

It's been a year of challenges and of adaptation as the COVID-19 pandemic continued to intensify and created additional disruption to our usual activities. Throughout the changing landscape on campuses, within healthcare, and throughout society, our Kappa Psi chapters and brothers stepped up to support their communities and each other with a focus on our ideals and a commitment to service.

One year ago, we were addressing the ongoing changes in our communities and our schools that were impacting all of our chapters and brothers. Plans and recommendations were changing frequently. We didn't know how things may evolve or how long some of the adjustments we were making would need to be in place. Our student leaders were called upon to make difficult decisions under unusual circumstances and they showcased the sober-minded decision making we promote. As universities made the decision to move to virtual or a hybrid of virtual/in-person learning for the fall, rushing and pledging events were modified or changed to virtual structures. New processes for chapter meetings were explored and we learned new ways to keep connected despite being apart.

Although many of our chapters remained off campus or under pandemic restrictions, we continued to find ways to make an impact. Our first-ever Service Week was held October 4-10, 2020, and it was an impressive kickoff. More than 700 brothers joined Service Week activities with over 75 events being held during the week. Activities hosted included health clinics, blood drives, book drives, food drives, and flu vaccination clinics. During this one week, our members prepared more than 7,300 meals,

donated more than 400 boxes of food, and provided financial donations to various charities totaling \$10,659. Seeing the chapters sharing their work as the week progressed, highlighted how much we can accomplish when we work together.

Our partnership with Reach Out and Read has continued to strengthen this year with a series of challenges developed by the Philanthropy Committee. The new Kappa Psi donation portal became a key piece to participate with these efforts as it made virtual events and donations easier to complete (classy.org/campaign/kappa-psi-pharmaceutical-fraternity/c250984). Following a general donation challenge, the fall semester brought a virtual Read Together challenge with brothers creating videos reading stories. The videos were made available for virtual distribution by Reach Out and Read. Our final challenge was a donation event that coincided with the annual year-end fundraising efforts. In the two years since the 59th Grand Council Convention ended, Kappa Psi has raised more than \$40,000 for Reach Out and Read.

The chapter also partnered with elementary schools in the Atlanta area to assist teachers as they adapted to the challenges and changes in curriculum during the pandemic. The chapter also hosted blood drives with the Red Cross and provided consultation during Men's Health Month.

As the spring semester remained with most of our chapters in virtual or hybrid education, we continued our community support. While many of our brothers turned their individual efforts to volunteering at COVID vaccination clinics, our chapters continued their service efforts with the development of new projects. Mu Omicron Pi, at Wayne State University, focused on support of children by combating food insecurity as well as improving childhood literacy through a series of events. The Professional Fraternity Association (PFA) recognized their work by naming them the recipient of the 2021 PFA Outstanding Professional Program Award. Kappa Psi also confirmed our commitment to service with the continuation of the Service Grant program started in 2018–2019. Ten chapters received a \$1,000 grant each to assist in developing projects that require some capital to get off the ground.

While much of our efforts over the past year have been focused on assisting our chapters adapt to new virtual structures, we are moving ahead with plans for the future. One of the new initiatives Kappa Psi announced this spring is diversity, equity, and inclusion education and training offered through the Professional Fraternity Association (PFA). The content was developed specifically for professional fraternal organizations and Kappa Psi's membership in PFA allows all our members to take advantage of this training. The initial rollout is education on unconscious bias and additional training will expand as our members complete this first step.

We have learned ways to adapt over the past year, but there are ongoing disruptions we still face, Given concern for the continued risk of COVID-19 infection and uncertain vaccination rates prior to the planned 60th Grand Council Convention in July 2021, the International Executive Committee made the decision to postpone the event to July 2022. While this delay is best for the safety of our members and the ability to achieve our goals with the convention, the time between meeting in person comes with decreased ability for brothers to interact and increased complexity to provide needed support to our chapters. Many of the previous challenges for Kappa Psi remain. We also face new concerns to address due to the lengthy time off campuses and the not yet resolved impact of the continuing to evolve pandemic. The development of new chapters for Kappa Psi was placed on hold when schools moved to virtual learning. It is unknown if that work will be able to continue for most of the groups prior to the next Grand Council Convention. Most notably, the reduction in applicants to pharmacy programs at Kappa Psi host institutions will continue to greatly affect the near future of the Fraternity. We don't yet know the impact COVID will contribute, but the expected reduction in overall membership due to decreased enrollment on campuses is expected to continue and potentially accelerate. As such, the International Executive Committee (IEC) has continued to focus on creating strong operational guides and structures to support chapters and their activities. In addition to impact on chapter activities, decreased membership comes with decreased revenue at the chapter, province and international levels. In 2020, the IEC approved a budget that planned for reduced revenue due to an expected 7% reduction in new members by the end of 2020. It's difficult at this time to evaluate how much our member reduction is due to issues related to COVID changing on campus activities compared to decreased pharmacy enrollment. Regardless of the cause, we plan for the financial impact to continue and are adjusting our financial goals with an eye to chapter support.

One year ago, while planning for unexpected situations, I would never have guessed at the year we were to have. We experienced great successes and unexpected setbacks. Times of comradery and celebration were intermixed with moments of frustration, anxiety, and grief. It was an unusual experience but we've learned so much. I've been inspired by the creativity of our members and the innovative solutions that have been developed. I know we will be stronger in the future as we incorporate what we have experienced this year into our future goals. As always, I'm so grateful to the many volunteers who have given their time to keep our Fraternity strong. We don't yet know what the next year will look like, but I'm confident that we will rise to the challenge and continue to advance our mission.



Report from Executive Director

Since this time last year, the world has been turned upside down. Masks, lockdowns, vaccines, and mandates have affected each of us in a different way. Kappa Psi followed that same road, but we have now turned a corner and the new road does not look quite as bumpy as last year. The Central Office will continue to operate in a manner that will insure the best possible outcome for the Fraternity, for the maximum benefit of all brothers, to enable the Fraternity to grow and prosper and to operate in the easiest way possible for the Brotherhood. We will strive to continue to deliver the level of service that you are accustomed to receiving.

The Fraternity has experienced a few issues during this period, but the Executive Committee and I, through careful planning and budgeting, managed to keep any disruptions or other issues associated with the loss of revenue and decrease in number of brothers to a minimum.

First, let me assure that the Fraternity is on sound footing. We have a positive cash flow with less than \$1,000 in debt. The Audit Committee has finished the annual examination of our books and credit cards and in one or two weeks, the report for this year will be sent to the Executive Committee for review.


As of August 1, 2021, there are 5,930 brothers returning to classes this fall. Our chapters initiated 1,317 new brothers in the 2019–2020 school term and 1,710 in the 2020–2021 school term. Our collegiate brothers are to be congratulated for all the effort and work associated with the recruitment of new brothers during the pandemic, given all the restrictions of the government and universities. I realize that conditions under Zoom meetings, non-contact pledging, and no in-person meetings are difficult at best. But to recruit and make your chapter stronger and more viable under these conditions is nothing short of amazing. But you did it and for that, we owe you our appreciation and thanks!

Now that the fall term is in full swing, we will be facing new challenges on all fronts. That being said we, cannot let up on our recruitment of new brothers for the fall, because it is the lifeblood of our Fraternity. But recruitment must be done in a safe and appropriate manner. Universities and local authorities may have differing advice or demands. New recruits may be more cautions about safety. Many questions will be asked about procedures and practices. Be prepared to answer honestly with the latest information from reliable sources or university or local procedures.






Epsilon Omicron holds a very successful initiation toward the end of the school year, giving the initiates their jerseys and announcing their names and numbers! Welcome new brothers!



Fifty students participated from Howard University ranging from their 1st-4th years. The panelists spoke on how they reached their current field of practice and emphasized how important building professional connections is toward building a successful career. Additionally, involvement in organizations, volunteering of time, and perspectives on the current pharmacy market were also topics of discussion by the panelists as well. Most exciting, each of the panelist members expressed in the final moments of the event how the Fraternity is still an integral part of their careers and lives. They expressed how their continued involvement allows them to give back to students and how the Fraternity at large has allowed them to "climb career ladders"

Jacksonville Grad has been participating in an annual "Children's Holiday Drive," helping out by adopting families in need in the local area. 



Navigating Regency During a Global Pandemic

"Congratulations Houston, you have won the regent election." Those words were the beginning of one of the most difficult yet rewarding years in my pharmacy school career. The world had started to stand still, and at that time, no one knew what the next year had in store. Due to the ongoing global COVID-19 pandemic, we had to face countless unprecedented hardships and challenges. Having an active role in leadership within Kappa Psi over the past year has allowed me to grow both personally and professionally while developing leadership skills alongside my fellow brothers. This reflective piece is a result of a question-and-answer session with the GCD of the Upsilon chapter, Dr. Kenneth Record.

Utilizing aspects of various leadership styles proved to be pivotal in dealing with difficult times. Through many trials and tribulations, our chapter had to make a lot of changes and restructure our plans for the entire year. One of those monumental changes was transitioning a primarily social and professional pharmaceutical fraternity into a fully virtual format. We, as brothers of Kappa Psi, in a time when we could have easily given up and accepted defeat, battled adversity while still maintaining the core values of brotherhood. Having the title of regent meant fostering a sense of belonging, facilitating networking opportunities, actively participating in open communication between brothers despite being unable to see them in person, and bringing realization to the saying "One for All and All for One."

Over the past year, I learned countless valuable lessons that I will carry with me throughout my final year of pharmacy school and into my future career. One of those lessons is about adaptability. As the everchanging year progressed, I learned that I needed to be able to change ideas and plans while remaining open to feedback. Our chapter operated in accordance with the strict guidelines enforced by the CDC, the Commonwealth of Kentucky, and the University of Kentucky College of Pharmacy (UKCOP). We continuously switched between in-person events, virtual meetings, and a hybrid format. Another crucial lesson I

learned was about effective communication. While I knew that open communication would play a vital role in the success of my time as regent, I quickly learned that this could not be done alone and was going to be a team effort. Our chapter made sure we utilized different platforms including Zoom, email, Instagram, Canvas, and the Remind app. It was very important to be transparent and honest about COVID policies and procedures, planned events, and updates from the Great Lakes Province (GLP) and Kappa Psi Central Office. This experience highlighted the value of taking time to check on brothers and their mental health during a time when many of us were in isolation. By encouraging brothers to check in on one another, our chapter grew closer in ways we didn't know were possible.

One of my greatest accomplishments during my term as regent was that our chapter continued to build on our success from previous years and we were still able to initiate 28 new members. I was ecstatic to see that my brothers remained engaged despite the challenges we faced. While we did not get to have

some of the staple events that our chapter usually holds (e.g., a scavenger hunt and our fellowship retreat in Gatlinburg, Tennessee), we created a few new socially distanced inperson events. This was made possible by determining that our chapter had a 95% vaccination rate via an anonymous survey sent out during the spring semester. We had more than 30 events this past year, most notably the new events, including a bonfire with s'mores and an ice cream social. Our chapter remained dedicated to our ongoing philanthropic efforts by our commitment to the Lexington Humane Society, our annual book drive for Reach Out and Read, and being active supporters in local COVID-19 vaccina-

tion programs through UKCOP. These efforts strengthened the bonds that have been built within our chapter of Kappa Psi and instilled in our new members the true meaning of brotherhood.

If I had to do it all over again and could give my past self one piece of advice, it would be to keep a journal throughout the year. This would have allowed me to keep track of everything that was going on and would have helped me hold myself accountable along the way. It could have been a resource of my thoughts and ideas that I could pass on to the next newly-elected regent. When I started my regency, my biggest fear was that my brothers would not enjoy Kappa Psi. However, this fear pushed me to think outside the box and to be creative with plans and events. The guidance from Kappa Psi Central Office allowed chapters to share their innovative ideas for ways in which to proceed through the year. These interactions with other regents provided a space for everyone to bounce ideas off one another and figure out what events did not work, as well as which events were a success. Utilizing a trial and error-based approach, we were able to pioneer a good foundation for the virtual format in case a need for it arises in the future.

Now that this door is closing for me and another one is opening, I would like to give a big thank-you to the UKCOP faculty and staff, the GLP Executive Board, my fellow regents, and each brother who remained active and played a vital role in making this year a suc-

Mind, Heart and Soul:

Doctor of Pharmacy student Joseph Paul Javier gives everything his all


Joseph Paul Javier almost died. Ten vears ago, he was hospitalized in the Philippines, sick enough that a priest was beckoned to administer last rites. Sick enough that he called his parents in the U.S. for a tearful goodbye. Sick enough that he was bargaining with fate.

On his deathbed, Javier swore that if he somehow managed to survive, he would spend the rest of his life doing as much as he could to help keep others alive as well.

People who aren't familiar with this story are astounded by everything Javier manages to accomplish in any given day-on top of making his way through Wayne State's rigorous Doctor of Pharmacy program in the Eugene Applebaum College of Pharmacy and Health Sciences. His email signature block lists no fewer than 15 affiliations and leadership positions below his name. Among them. he is:

- President of the Student National Pharmaceutical Association, which has mobilized to address the growing trend of violence toward Asian American and Pacific Islander communities across the country.
- President of the WSU chapter of the Academy of Managed Care Pharmacy, which recently hosted a three-part seminar series to broaden the horizons of fellow students and whose team made it to the national finals in this year's Pharmacy & Therapeutics Competition.
- Vice president of the Student Pharmacists Diversity Council, which hosted a panel discussion on health disparities and systemic racism during Black History Month.

- Pharmacy intern for World Medical Relief's Prescription Program and Pathways to Better Health, an educational program for underserved diabetes patients in metro Detroit.
- A member of the Michigan Pharmacists Association, which featured a video created by Javier and fellow Pharm.D. student Johnie L. Bailey to salute the state's pharmacy heroes during the group's annual convention this year. Because of his expertise in integrated marketing communications and public relations, Javier also was recently appointed to the MPA Communications Workgroup to provide strategic direction.
- International vice president of the American Pharmacists Association Academy of Student Pharmacists, through which he earned first place in WSU's APhA-ASP Patient Counseling Competition earlier this year.
- Board member and co-chair for marketing and communications at the Council of Asian Pacific Americans, which worked to donate masks, gloves, surgical gowns and other PPE to local hospitals during the height of the COVID-19 pandemic.
- A newly inducted member of the Phi Lambda Sigma pharmacy leadership society, selected by peer recognition.
- One of the directors of the Philippine American Cultural Center of Michigan, which is in the process of vaccinating its community with support from WSU student pharmacists.

A connecting thread through all of these commitments is the Kappa Psi Pharmaceutical Fraternity. In addition to serving as historian of Wayne State's Mu Omicron Pi chapter and sitting on the Fraternity's Great Lakes Province Executive Board, Javier is the chapter's unofficial ringleader, organizing and motivating his brothers to participate in a range of philanthropical efforts. "Joining Kappa Psi was one of the best decisions of my life," Javier said. "A fraternity is all about lifting each other up—you can accomplish so much with a team of brothers at your side."

One for All

Despite being nearly twice the age of most of his Fraternity brothers, Javier brings youthful enthusiasm to an industrious brotherhood. In addition to promoting childhood literacy through the national Reach Out and Read philanthropy campaign, helping staff health care clinics and volunteering with Detroit nonprofits, Kappa Psi has for the past two years participated in the national Up to Us competition, which raises awareness about the U.S. national debt and its impact on future generations. Since arriving on campus, Javier has served as the team's executive director, leading them to sixth place and an award for most creative campaign.

"Joseph has been a vocal leader and organizer from the beginning," said Kappa Psi's faculty advisor, Pharmaceutical Sciences Assistant Clinical Professor Philip Pokorski. "Many of the brothers are active in community and university events, but Joseph elevates both his and the chapter's involvement to a totally different level with his infective enthusiasm and commitment to the Fraternity, Wayne State and the Detroit community. Joseph is mega-active in so many different aspects of giving back to the community and has represented Kappa Psi at the highest level."

And Javier isn't just busy. He's good. His superpower is organizing and motivating others, and his finely honed leadership skills are due in part to the fact that he is a secondcareer student. After beginning college at age

16—he studied at Harvard for a semester but chose to major in biology as a Presidential Scholar at Wayne State-he veered onto another path.

"I was doing math and science before I could walk," Javier laughed. "Then when I got to college, I was rebellious and didn't go to class."

Looking for a fresh start, he left WSU and moved to the Philippines to live with an aunt and study integrated marketing communications at the University of Asia and the Pacific. During a night of karaoke with his cousins, Javier was discovered by a talent manager, which ultimately led to a 15-year career in radio, TV, PR and journalism.

"I was a columnist for the Manila Bulletin, editor for The Manila Times and taught students at the Manila Times School of Journalism. I ran my own PR and events man-

agement company while I worked as a broadcaster on a top radio show, which was syndicated across the Philippines and around the world. Our program was eventually developed for television and my co-hosts and I would fly to different locales in the Philippines, China, Singapore and Korea to film. It was all so surreal," he said. "My life seemed picture-perfect. But then I got sick and almost died."

Not even a high-profile media personality can get the level of medical care in the Philippines that is available in the U.S., so Javier's parents flew him home. He had lost a lot of weight as well as the use of his legs, and it took him a full year of treatment and physical therapy to recover from severe nerve damage. During the time he was bedridden, Javier began online classes through Oakland Community College, and then graduated summa cum laude from Oakland University's Honors College in 2018.

He finally had the biology degree he had started in his teens and was fueled by his deathbed promise to make a difference. Javier considered applying to medical school but his uncle-Dr. Pedro Saavedra, who earned a pharmacy degree from Wayne State in 1980—suggested that the Pharm.D. program would be a quicker path to a health care career.

Javier says he broke down in tears during his WSU Applebaum admissions interview: "My life has never gone in a straight line. I'm really thankful it's led me to Wayne State."

All for One

This month, Javier is participating in the Up to Us Mentorship Summit, which offers the top 20 teams in this year's competition the opportunity to glean industry advice from Up to Us alumni and the Clinton Global Initiative University. He is serving as the event's Political Science and Public Policy moderator, joining other innovators to discuss their experience advocating for legislation that supports sustainable economic growth and equitable health outcomes for all Americans.

Being part of the Up to Us alumni community has led to numerous opportunities, including a scholarship to Harvard Business School. Along with Kappa Psi Brothers Hussein Safaoui and Noah Trotter, Javier completed online courses and now holds Harvard certificates in business analytics and sustainable business strategy—coming full circle after studying at the Ivy League university in the '90s. Just last week, Javier was awarded another Harvard scholarship, this time for a certificate in global business.

He thinks he may put those business lessons to use by opening a pharmacy one day. "I love having my finger on the pulse of my community, and I'd like to have patients who become familiar faces," he said, adding that one of the reasons he is involved in so many organizations is to try on different hats for the best fit. "I want a job where I'll have the biggest impact—maybe with a government agency like the FDA or CDC."

Javier recently served as a legislative intern for Michigan House Rep. Padma Kuppa, who added him to her team after she was appointed to the state's Prescription Drug Task Force. "I sat in on task force meetings, worked with pharmacists to provide better access to lifesaving medications, and helped Rep. Kuppa respond to constituents who contacted her about medical or science issues," he said. "Because one of my skill sets is networking and mobilizing people, working in policy might be the best way to make a difference by giving more Americans access to health care and medications that would improve their quality of life—or save lives."



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Mu Omicron Pi, Brotherhood and Tradition

Located in one of Detroit's most historic neighborhoods.

the chapter house of Mu Omicron Pi stands proud and tall ... weathered, but resolute. This home, which was built more than a century ago, is testament to a story of brotherhood, triumph over adversity, and an enduring commitment to building a legacy which has spanned generations. Erected in 1908, the three-story brick mansion at 719 Virginia Park St. has served as the home of Kappa Psi brothers for 50 golden years. The uneven avenue leading to the 16-room Colonial Revival belies a time when horse and carriage were still the only form of transportation. The first Model T automobile was manufactured at the nearby Ford Piquette Plant shortly after the mansion was built. The nation's first paved road was constructed about two miles away on Woodward Avenue a year later. Less than 500 feet away from the Mu Omicron Pi chapter house is the lot where the last minority-owned hospital of the city once stood (Hope Hospital founded in 1952) which served people of color during a time when they could be refused care at Detroit's major hospitals. Down the street is where the Algiers Motel once was, the site of a bloody clash with police during the 1967 Detroit Uprising which intensified the fight for racial equality during the United States Civil Rights Movement. And just a few miles away from Virginia Park is the modern Detroit Medical Center, home to the largest single-campus medical school in the country via Wayne State University and where the first mechanical heart was created more than 50 years ago.

719 Virginia Park, lovingly known as the 'John F. Radtke House' by the brothers of Mu Omicron Pi, speaks volumes to the history of the Motor City as well as the Detroit chapter of Kappa Psi Pharmaceutical Fraternity.

Before Mu Omicron Pi joined Kappa Psi

At first glance, one may find it peculiar that Wayne State University's designation for its Kappa Psi chapter is composed of three Greek letters while all other Kappa Psi chapters have only one or two. The reason

behind this distinction is that the traditional method of naming chapters was not used for Mu Omicron Pi. From its very inception, chapter Mu Omicron Pi has been unique. Mu Omicron Pi Fraternity was founded by 14 members on May 12, 1926, as its own independent fraternity at the Detroit College of Pharmacy. Fourteen members were on the General Assembly which was comprised of executive members President John H. Conlin, Honorary President Dean Esten P. Stout, Secretary & Treasurer Kenneth C. Owens, and Faculty Advisor Dr. Walter J. Wilson. Mu Omicron Pi was born from this group of men who met one another two years prior. They noticed that each possessed similar tendencies and wanted to excel in the College of Pharmacy as well as in a drug store. The goal of Mu Omicron Pi was to uplift the campus with school spirit and to excel socially within the Detroit College of Pharmacy.

From its beginning, Mu Omicron Pi had much success recruiting members with its bi-weekly luncheons. On November 15, 1926, Mu Omicron Pi elected Francis J. Koelzer as president, C. Anderson for secretary & treasurer, M. Quinin as publicity chairman, F. Kurczewski as membership chairman, and F. St. Amour as social chairman. Emphasis was placed that the fraternity's purpose was to sponsor campus functions to elevate the social rating of their college through the cooperation of the more active members of the pharmacy school.


On March 10 of 1927, Mu Omicron Pi entertained its newest member, Ray Parker, at a luncheon. After the meeting, Brother Cole of Kappa Psi Fraternity gave a presentation on the benefits of Kappa Psi with the hopes of chartering a Kappa Psi chapter in the Detroit College of Pharmacy. Brother Cole approached Dean Stout and J. Verne Crandall, who were brothers of Mu Omicron Pi, to gauge if there was any interest in becoming a chapter of Kappa Psi. Dean Stout and the rest of the brothers of Mu Omicron Pi expressed that they would not join Kappa Psi unless certain conditions were met. The Mu Omicron Pi fraternity brothers were very proud of the organization they founded and demanded that Kappa Psi let Mu Omicron Pi keep their letters of Greek designation as well as their local traditions. If these conditions were not met, there would be no charter of Kappa Psi allowed at the Detroit College of Pharmacy. Prodigiously, these conditions were agreed upon and Kappa Psi chartered Mu Omicron Pi at the Detroit College of Pharmacy on May 14, 1927. Kappa Psi's Grand Historian, Brother K. Darbaker, conducted the installation ceremony for Mu Omicron Pi. Soon after, with the assistance of brothers from Beta Beta chapter, Beta Lambda chapter and the Cleveland Graduate chapter, Brother Darbaker directed the initiation of the new members. Dean Esten Powers Stout, J. Verne Crandall and Joseph L. Dorian of the faculty were included among charter members initiated.

On July 1, 1957, the Detroit College of Pharmacy merged with Wayne State University in Detroit and Mu Omicron Pi was transferred to its new institution. "I cannot express how thankful we are to our Mu Omicron Pi Founding Fathers and all the brothers who came before us," says Brother

Noah Trotter, current regent of Mu Omicron Pi. "We've made countless memories as a brotherhood throughout the years and our chapter has done much to uplift the profession of pharmacy. Because of the foresight and wisdom of these brothers, we have built our fraternity into a diverse organization that brings us all together to accomplish our goals. They built for us a foundation as well as a home that has been integral to my pharmacy school experience." In the fall of 1957, a chapter house was obtained for Mu Omicron Pi at 815 W. Warren in Detroit. Later, the chapter occupied the property at 1120 Forrest St., the former home of

Charles Lindbergh, This property was acquired by the Detroit Graduate chapter as a chapter house for both the collegiate and graduate members in Detroit. In 1970, the chapter finally moved into its current house at 719 Virginia Park.

John F. Radtke and Brothers of Distinction

The house at 719 Virginia Park was dedicated in honor of Mu Omicron Pi Brother John F. Radtke on May 28, 1982, and remains as the chapter house of Mu Omicron Pi and meeting place for the Kappa Psi Detroit Graduate chapter. On Friday, May 15, 1982, Brother Radtke was presented a plaque commemorating the chapter house dedication during a gala at Detroit's Hotel Pontchartrain to celebrate Mu Omicron Pi's 60th anniversary and the Detroit Graduate chapter's 50th anniversary. "I want to say thank you. You know, this is a lovely honor," Brother Radtke said during his acceptance speech at the gala. "Of course, I won't forget it. I can't. But my wife and I had no children, and then one day, they (Kappa Psi) gave me a houseful. And I haven't regretted it one moment. I've lost my dear wife, but I've still got a houseful of kids and Kappa Psi. Thank you." These were his last words to the Fraternity. Unexpectedly, Brother Radtke died the following evening. "I was the last brother to see John F. Radtke alive," says Brother Paul Cyprus (fall 1979 pledge class) who drove John home after the gala and later saw John on his hospital

deathbed. "He had the corniest jokes and always made us laugh. John could go up to any brother and be able to talk to them, even though he might have been 30 or 40 years older. John had a real talent with people." "John F. Radtke was a very distinguished brother of Mu Omicron Pi. He was Detroit's 'Mr. Kappa Psi' and it is only befitting that our chapter house is named after him," adds Brother Kenneth Kochajda (summer 1982 pledge class). "He was a very dynamic individual. He was always proud to be a member of our Fraternity and John was an exceptional pharmacist. John F. Radtke was like a father to the brothers of our chapter."

Inside the John F. Radtke House, there are several plaques dedicated to prominent brothers who have gone above and beyond to help build or support the chapter. They are displayed proudly and prominently in various rooms and hallways within 719 Virginia Park. Aside from Mu Omicron Pi's Founding Fathers who have awards named after them, one brother who has touched the lives of so many Kappa Psi brothers is Brother Francis Facione. An award was named after Facione to honor the Detroit Graduate Chapter Man of the Year. Better known to his brothers as 'Father Frank,' Facione studied pharmacy at Wayne State University and was initiated into Mu Omicron Pi. He earned a B.S. in pharmacy in 1962, a M.S. in pharmacy administration in 1974, and a Ph.D. in pharmacy administration in 1982. Father Frank eventually taught at the Wayne State pharmacy school and became an integral brother at Mu Omicron Pi and for Kappa Psi as a whole, ultimately serving on the National Executive Board and becoming editor of THE MASK. Realizing his calling, Facione

entered the Old Roman Catholic Church and was ordained a priest on July 14, 1974. Father Frank rose to become the presiding bishop of the Old Roman Catholic Church in North America before passing away on June 14, 2019. "I had the honor to call Father Frank my mentor. He was known as 'Mr. Mu Omicron Pi' because of how much he cared for and loved the Fraternity," says Brother CJ Zarecki (fall 2012 pledge class). "Father Frank was a longtime pharmacy law professor at the university and everyone knew him. He always talked about Kappa Psi. It's impossible to replace Father Frank and all the wisdom and knowledge he shared with our Brotherhood."

A most special honor is reserved for Mu Omicron Pi's most distinguished

brothers—having a specific room dedicated to them in the John F. Radtke House. The library is named after Brother Joseph Holden who was once regent of the Detroit Graduate chapter. The living room is dedicated to Brother Leo J. Jezewski, past treasurer of Mu Omicron Pi. And the back parlor room is dedicated to Brother Walter R. Tilson, past regent of the Detroit Graduate chapter. However, the most prominent room at 719 Virginia Park, the front sitting room that houses the chapter's charter, constitution, and other historic documents, is dedicated to William R. Smith, the first and only Mu Omicron Pi brother to have served as Kappa Psi's Grand Regent. Father Frank Facione served as pledgemaster to Brother William R. Smith when Smith decided to join Kappa Psi and the two became the best of friends up until Brother Smith's passing. "Father Frank always had stories to tell about William R. Smith," continues Brother Zarecki. "One of the stories really hit hard for me. Father Frank recounted when he first met William R. Smith. William came to the Lindbergh house to pledge Kappa Psi wearing a coonskin cap. Father Frank said he looked like Davy Crockett. William was younger and Father Frank helped guide William R. Smith before and after pharmacy

school. It was amazing to hear how close they became over the years. Father Frank became his close friend and also his mentor. Eventually, I heard the story of how Father Frank was there at William R. Smith's funeral and how he carried William's casket to his grave. This relationship alone speaks to what kind of fraternity we are. It's more than just a fraternity or organization. Mu Omicron Pi is built on brotherhood, friendships that last a lifetime. What we have here is special."

Men Of Principle: Paying it Forward

The most recent room to be named after a brother at 719 Virginia Park is one of the second-floor bedrooms. Room No. 3 is dedicated to Robert S. Rembisz. Brother Rembisz was a beloved member of Mu Omicron Pi and graduated from Wayne State Pharmacy School in 1993. He lived his life by the philosophy of service to others. If a brother needed help or if something was needed for the Fraternity, Brother Rembisz would drop everything to help the chapter. The John F. Radtke House meant a lot to Robert and during times when the house went into arrears, he would step in to cover costs until the chapter could raise the necessary funds. Sadly, Brother Rembisz was fatally wounded by a gunshot on November 30, 1995. He was only 27 years old. The Rembisz family established the Robert Stanley Rembisz Memorial Pharmacy Scholarship in honor of Brother Rembisz. Through a generous endowment, Kappa Psi brothers who exemplify Robert's dedication to academics and service can benefit from this scholarship every year. "Mu Omicron Pi has always been about brotherhood. Being there for your brothers, connecting with them and supporting them," says Grand Council Deputy Michael Wodecki (fall 2009 pledge class). "This is something that our chapter has done well, by the brothers before me and by the brothers who have come after me. We've been blessed to have our graduates support our collegiate brothers." "The struggles, trials, and tribulations, our joys, accomplishments, and successes all go hand in hand. It is all about brothers paying it forward," adds Brother Michael Gozdzialski, Detroit Graduate chapter

house manager (initiated spring 2012). "Everything stems from our chapter house. It is an amazing asset that keeps our grads connected to the active chapter. The John F. Radtke House is the reason why I am still active as a grad. It's the reason why I keep coming back. Thankfully, the brothers before me had the forethought to keep a house for our chapter. Mu Omicron Pi is blessed because of the generosity of our brothers." "We've been here on Virginia Park for 50 years and we want to be here for 50 more years," says Johnie L. Bailey, Mu Omicron Pi's current house manager. "It isn't easy maintaining a very old, historic mansion while coordinating with the schedules of all the brothers who live here. It really is a labor of love. It's imperative to maintain this house for the brothers who will come after us and preserve the history of our Kappa Psi chapter. 719 Virginia Park is more than just a house. For the brothers of Mu Omicron Pi, the John F. Radtke House is our home."




