Dedicated to Service


Brothers,

She was **The Match!**

Mallory White Harris (Beta Rho) signed up on a whim in 2013 with Be The Match. Five years later, she was notified that she had matched to donate life-saving stem cells to an anonymous 23-year-old woman.

NORMAL AFTERNOON: 2013

Mallory and a friend were walking back to their dorm rooms after class when they ran across a P2 classmate who was signing up students for the Be The Match bone marrow registry as part of his required service project. Operated by the National Marrow Donor Program (NMDP), for more than 30 years, Be The Match has managed the most diverse marrow registry in the world. The registry gives hope to the thousands of people who are diagnosed with life-threatening blood cancers like leukemia and lymphoma. Mallory and her friend looked at each other, shrugged their shoulders, and said, “Why not?!” Mallory had already flagged her driver’s license to be an organ donor. Why not stick herself in this system too? They spent a few minutes getting their cheeks swabbed and then filled out a form.

At the time, Mallory had some sciatic nerve issues, so she recorded that on the form. The P2 student who was running the registry commented, “Are you sure you want to mention that? They’ll probably not take you then.” But, she felt it was important to answer the questions honestly.

SEPTEMBER 2018

Mallory hadn’t heard anything back from Be The Match and as the years went on, she forgot about it. She graduated from The University of Mississippi School of Pharmacy in 2017 and worked briefly for Omnicare before a position opened up as a pharmacist in her hometown Kroger. As she checked her email one evening, she saw a message from The Match Registry. It said she was a potential match for a searching patient and asked if she were still interested in donating.



Mallory was excited, but skeptical. She thought, “There has to be tons of people who had received a similar message. I’m sure I’m not the closest match.”

She called the number in the email and was connected with Cathy, a donor represen-

tative, who told Mallory that a young woman with ALL (Acute Lymphocytic Leukemia) needed a life-saving transplant. Cathy carefully explained the process they would need to take for further testing, including donating more blood for testing and filling out a com-

prehensive questionnaire about her medical history. Mallory completed the testing within a week, but then did not hear back until several weeks later. When Cathy did contact her again, she let Mallory know that the patient was too sick to complete the transplant and they were withdrawing the request for further match lab work. Cathy did ask Mallory if she wanted to be left on the short list for her, in case things changed in the future, but the way Cathy sounded, it didn't seem likely that she would go forward with treatment. Mallory hung up thinking it was likely the last contact she would have with them.

She was disappointed and thought often about that stranger who was in desperate need of a bone marrow transplant and prayed she would get stronger and find someone who would be a close enough match for her.

SEPTEMBER 2019

Almost exactly a year later, Mallory had a call come in to her cell phone at work. She never answered her cell phone while at work, but something made her step to the back room and take the call. It was Cathy! She explained that the 23-year-old woman whom Mallory had matched with before had gotten stronger and her doctor felt it was time to try the potentially life-saving procedure. The additional screening that was done in 2018 had solidified that Mallory was an even better match than they initially thought. Cathy said they were ready to move forward if Mallory was still on board.

Mallory was thrilled! This stranger whom she didn't know had become like a family member to her. She had thought of her often during that past year. Mallory walked out of the back room and told her coworkers, "I've matched." She called the scheduler at Kroger to explain and they were very willing to let her off for the transplant. Things moved at a very fast pace from there.

The people at Be The Match set everything up for Mallory. There were no clinics with availability to do the procedure on such short notice in her home state of Mississippi, so the organization arranged her flight to Dallas. They set up a hotel stay, meals, and gave her a Lyft code for Mallory and one support person. Her husband, Brother Todd Harris (Beta Rho) was also a pharmacist at Kroger and couldn't also take off work. Kroger didn't have enough floaters to cover

his store and Mallory's store, but Mallory's mother, Emily White, was able to go with her.

Meanwhile, Mallory had additional bloodwork done for testing and an extensive physical to make sure she was healthy enough to donate. She was instructed to take filgrastim injections for 3–4 days to try to ramp up her stem cell production. Fortunately, since Todd was a pharmacist, he was able to do those injections for her at home.

DAY ZERO: November 20, 2019

Mallory and her mom were due at the clinic in Dallas at 6:30 the morning of the donation. The intake process included the normal check of vital signs and then one more boost of filgrastim. It took 30–40 minutes to get her hooked up for the donation. Bone marrow donations are done in two different ways. One method is a surgical procedure that takes place in a hospital operating room. Doctors use needles to withdraw liquid mar-

row from the back of the donor's pelvic bone. The other is the method that was used for Mallory, where blood is removed through a needle in one arm and passed through a machine that separates out the blood-forming cells. The remaining blood is returned to the donor through the other arm.

The procedure was fairly routine, except for the length of the process. Mallory told us the biggest problem was she couldn't use her arms. The 18-gauge needles that were in her arms were about 2 inches long, so she couldn't use her arms at all. The procedure was expected to take 4–6 hours. They anticipated she would be done early afternoon, but meanwhile, she couldn't feed herself and she needed a lot of help to use the restroom.

The nurses commented as they looked over the paperwork that they were surprised and worried by the amount of blood-forming cells that were needed from her for this particular transplant patient. Based on her height and weight, it appeared Mallory may need to extend her time on the machine. She learned smaller women produce less stem cells than a larger man would. As the afternoon went on, her hands started to swell and she felt some dread and panic as the staff pulled blood to send to the lab and check to

see what quantity they had. It had been a long day already. It was getting closer to evening. Would they even get enough for the transplant to work?

She thought of this person somewhere who wasn't waiting for a procedure to end so that she could eat a sandwich. This stranger whom she'd grown so close to was waiting for life itself! Mallory was her best (and possibly only) match and chance to get well. She prayed there would be enough cells!

When the results came back, the nurses were blown away by the amount of stem cells that Mallory had produced. Plenty and then some! The procedure was a success.

BACK TO 'NORMAL'

When *THE MASK* staff asked if Mallory had any complications, she said nothing major. She was tired, of course. It took a few days to regain her strength. Just the flight and whirlwind preparations were tiring. She did say her bones ached some from the shots of filgrastim. She added, "The Be The Match organization was fantastic about making me feel well cared for. They followed up with me two days, one week, one month, and six months after the donation to ask about any lingering side effects or issues. Cathy was always available to answer any of my questions or ease any worries or fears."

When asked if she were ever scared, Mallory said she was naturally apprehensive a bit, but mostly just thrilled for this stranger whom she didn't know. As part of the process, she was invited to write an anonymous letter to her recipient. Mallory did, but found that to be a very emotional process. She felt a connection with this stranger whom she shared so much common genetic material. It was emotional to think they were so similar that she could produce the thing that she needed to live. Mallory said, "It was like I had a soul sister connection to this person whom I didn't know." She commented that, while at the clinic, one of the nurses had asked her if she knew what blood type her recipient was. She didn't know. The nurse went on to tell her that after this transplant, whatever blood type Mallory was, the recipient would be too.

When asked if she would do it again, Brother Mallory quickly said, "Yes! It was a powerful experience and I would definitely do it again." ■

MATCHING THE DIVERSITY OF NEEDS IS CRITICAL

For most patients in need of a bone marrow or stem cell transplant, their best match is someone in their immediate family. However, for the many patients without a familial match, their best hope to find a bone marrow or stem cell donor is the Be The Match national donor registry.

Successful matches are often found between donors and patients of similar ethnic backgrounds. But because of a lack of diversity on the Be The Match registry, some ethnicities have difficulty finding a compatible donor. Increasing the diversity of donors on the national bone marrow and stem cell donor registry is paramount.

According to the Be The Match website, here's the likelihood of diverse patients finding a matched donor on the registry:

- African American or Black – 23%
- Asian or Pacific Islander – 41%
- Hispanic or Latino – 46%
- American Indian or Alaska Native – 57%
- Caucasian or White – 77%

Increasing the diversity of the registry is a matter of life or death for many patients.



Speaking of matches, Brothers Mallory White and Todd Harris met while working in the pharmacy at Kroger before they attended The University of Mississippi School of Pharmacy. Mallory was in the process of applying to pharmacy school and Todd was finishing the classes necessary to apply. The pharmacy staff would sometimes do lunch or gather after hours to socialize and the two hit it off. They both went on to pledge Kappa Psi, Mallory in 2013 and Todd in 2014. Both became leaders in Beta Rho Chapter.

Mallory was Beta Rho Regent (2014–2015), Gulf Coast Province Chaplain (2015–2016), Province Assembly Planning Committee Chair (2015–2016), Gulf Coast Province Secretary (2016–2017) and Beta Rho Vice Regent (2016–2017)

Todd was Beta Rho Regent (2015–2016), Province Assembly Planning Committee Co-Chair (2015–2016), Gulf Coast Province Parliamentarian (2017–2018), Gulf Coast Province Chaplain (2018–2019), National Collegiate Development Committee (2015–2017) and National Legislative Committee (2017–2019).

Armbruster Receives ACCP Adult Medicine PRN Clinical Practice Award

Anastasia Armbruster, Pharm.D. '09, FACC, BCPS, BCCP, associate professor of pharmacy practice at University of Health Sciences and Pharmacy in St. Louis, was recognized with the American College of Clinical Pharmacy's (ACCP) 2021 Adult Medicine Practice and Research Networks (PRN) Clinical Practice Award during the organization's annual meeting in October.

Each year, ACCP's Clinical Practice Award recognizes an ACCP member who has developed an innovative clinical pharmacy service, provided innovative documentation of the impact of clinical pharmacy services, provided leadership in the development of cost-effective clinical pharmacy services or shown sustained excellence in providing clinical pharmacy services. Members of ACCP's Adult Medicine PRN are engaged in optimizing pharmacotherapy outcomes through the promotion of excellence and innovation in clinical practice, education and research by enhancing the knowledge, skills and productivity of PRN members.

Armbruster currently serves as a faculty member in the Department of Pharmacy Practice at UHSP and a clinical pharmacist specialist in cardiology. She has a clinical practice site at Missouri Baptist Medical Center where she specializes in cardiology, collaborating with Washington University Advanced Heart Failure to optimize medication therapy, provide patient education and improve transitions of care.

"While my practice is now focused in cardiology, I completed a PGY2 residency in internal medicine, so I've been engaged with the ACCP Adult Medicine Practice Research Network throughout my career," said Armbruster. "The PRNs serve to connect focus groups of clinical pharmacists to enhance professional support and collaboration. I've always held the Adult Medicine PRN in high regard, and it's an honor to be recognized by this group for excellence in clinical practice which is such major focus of my professional work."

In her role with Missouri Baptist Medical Center, Armbruster serves as a resource for all cardiologists seeing patients at the facility. She has collaborated with the hospital's community pharmacy to increase utilization of a meds-to-beds program for cardiac patients, and she works closely with the cardiac catheterization lab to improve safe medication use. In addition to an inpatient consult service, she also collaborates with her team in the outpatient setting, seeing patients after they are discharged from the hospital in clinic. At her practice site, Armbruster also serves as a preceptor for P4 students from the University.

"Providing excellent patient care is of the utmost importance to me, and being recognized with the Adult Medicine PRN Clinical Practice Award for the high level of care I'm providing means a lot," noted Armbruster. "This is also an award granted by my clinical pharmacy peers, so this recognition represents a special milestone in my career."

Regent William Markle (2023) led volunteering efforts with Ben Stevens (2023) and Seth Morris (2023), Orod Motevalli (2023) and Ryan Masak (2024) at our main philanthropy, the Center for Healthy Hearts. The brothers removed plaster from the walls so new paint could be applied sufficiently.

Brandon Acors (2023) and Daniel Wong (2023) assisted VCU's SNPhA chapter in their volunteer efforts at CARITAS, a shelter program that provides aid to individuals and families

dealing with homelessness in the Richmond area. Brandon performed motivational interviewing for combating substance use disorder and poor nutrition among homeless men. Daniel provided vaccine education and assisted a nurse practitioner on medication counseling.

Pharmacists are crucial in providing vaccines to the community, especially during the fall when influenza cases spike. Theta brothers have been working tirelessly to give central Virginia herd immunity against both seasonal influenza and COVID-19. The ticketed event required everyone to be vaccinated against COVID-19 and we donated our proceeds to the Center for Healthy Hearts. Many students competed and faculty Brother Dean Joseph DiPiro and other faculty acted as judges for the competition. Our judges

The student must come within 15% of the correct blood pressure to pass the OSCE. During the third year of our program, pharmacy students have to complete a final presentation on a clinical topic. To help the P3 brothers in our chapter, our tutorial chair put together a practice session every week during the time our brothers presented. Whenever it

was their assigned week, our brothers were able to present in front of the Brotherhood and get feedback to help improve their presentation. This was a great way for our Brotherhood to bond not just between the brothers on campus, but with our brothers who were on rotations as well. We hope to make this an annual event for our chapter.





Several Denver Grad brothers participated in this year's Service Week by donating to Reach Out and Read and cleaning up around the neighborhood or in streets and parks.


