The Case for bone marrow transplant

Seven years after registering, our brother gives life-saving donation

For Ethan Case, a South Dakota State University pharmacy student, March 22 was a great day to save a life.

Be The Match, the world's largest bone marrow transplant organization, promotes the message "Today is a great day to save a life." Case's "today" came March 22 when in a Seattle Be The Match facility he donated 500 milliliters of peripheral blood stem cells to an unknown leukemia patient.

Whether Case's healthy white blood cells actually made a life-saving difference, he won't know for at least a year.

One year after the procedure, the recipient is given the donor's contact information. "It would definitely be neat to meet him or at least send him a letter," said Case, a member of the Gamma Kappa chapter of Kappa Psi. However, he isn't too focused on meeting the recipient. "I know that I did what I could to help the patient out."

Registered during first days on campus

Case's Be The Match story begins in 2014 when he was walking through the SDSU Student Union early in his freshman year.

"There was a big booth for Be The Match. I signed up and took a cheek swap. They send it in and your human leukocyte antigen information (a blood protein) is entered into their data system," said Case, who graduated May 7 with his six-year Doctor of Pharmacy degree. He also earned a bachelor's degree in biology in 2018.

In June, he started a postgraduate residency with the University of Kansas and Balls Food Stores in Olathe, Kansas, as he pursues a career in ambulatory care pharmacy.

"Today is a great day to save a life" is the message donors see when visiting a Be The Match facility.

Apart from an occasional email, Case didn't hear from Be The Match again until December 2021 when he got a phone call.

"You're a preliminary match for a patient in need of a bone marrow transplant. Are you still interested in being a donor?"

The passage of more than seven years had done nothing to weaken Case's resolve to help. Next step was a blood draw to better define the match. Afterward, Be The Match told him to expect a call in 30 to 60 days. "I went on with my life," which largely involved five-week rotations at medical facilities

around the state as he finished his final year of pharmacy school.

The call: "You are the best match"

"On the 60th day (Feb. 17), they called me and said I'm the best match," Case said.

What followed was more blood work appointments, an extensive physical and detailing his medical history. Because Case was in good health, not on medication, hadn't been out of the country recently and was the desired age range (18–35), he was an excellent donor candidate.

Most recipients don't need actual bone marrow but peripheral blood stem cells.

The same blood-forming cells (sometimes called blood stem cells) that can be donated from the bone marrow are also found in the circulating (peripheral) blood, the Be The

Match website explains. Before donating, a donor takes injections of the drug filgrastim to move more blood-forming cells out of the marrow and into the bloodstream.

Then the donor's blood is removed through a needle in one arm and passed through a machine that separates out the blood-forming cells. The remaining blood is returned to the donor through the other arm. This process is similar to donating plasma.

Normally, a person has 4,500 to 10,500 white blood cells per microliter. By the time of the procedure, Case's count had reached 50,000, he said.

Be The Match funds donor costs

He received injections daily from March 18 through March 22. The last two were in Seattle at the hands of Be The Match. After

the March 21 injection and some discussion about the following day's procedure, Case and his dad explored Seattle and enjoyed chowder at the historic downtown Pike Place Market.

Be The Match funds all donor costs—blood work, transportation, lodging and food as well as the cost for a companion to accompany the donor.

Donating the peripheral blood cells was a four-hour procedure, but far from strenuous. Case had an IV in each arm, a TV to watch, and his dad and medical personnel to chat with. He said he preemptively took Claritin to ward off potential inflammation and experienced slight back pain from the elevated stem cell production.

Otherwise, he had no physical symptoms from being a donor and was flying back to South Dakota the following day.

Transplant can equal cure

Case said, "The nice thing about a bone marrow transplant is it is a cure, not necessarily just prolonging things. It's a cure if you can wipe out all their cancerous cells and reintroduce new healthy blood cells." He noted that by the time patients are needing a transplant, other treatments have been tried and they're down to their last hope.

Case added there is a possibility he could be the best match for someone else or that his March recipient may later need another transplant.

Following her gut (and training) to help save a life

My very first APPE rotation was in the Emergency Department at Baptist Hospital in Memphis, Tennessee. Each day was special as I got to impact patient care and learn from my two incredible preceptors, but one day was exceptionally memorable. I responded to a potential code stroke, as I had all month on my rotation. The medical resident was examining and evaluating the patient. She was clearly in distress, struggling with words, and was very confused. She mentioned “hearing voices,” which prompted a nurse to ask her what they were saying. The patient responded, “I can’t understand them.” The medical resident decided not to call a code stroke and categorized the patient with a psych issue. The patient was moved to one of our psych rooms and a STAT CT was ordered as well as some Haloperidol.

Meanwhile, I still believed the patient was having a stroke. I monitored her room, waited for the CT scan results, and advocated for her to not get the Haloperidol since the patient was now calm. As soon as her CT came back, the results read “an acute infarct in the occipital region.” I waited a few minutes to see if the neuro team was called in. They were not. I decided it was time to consult with my pharmacist. I told her how they presented, their history, my thoughts, and the CT results. Thankfully, she was on board with me. She took my concerns to an attending physician who was very alarmed by the patient and initiated a code stroke. Our neuro team came down, did a CT and indeed found an occlusion. The patient was still in the window for thrombectomy. The stroke team was so proud, they let me go watch the thrombectomy. I was able to learn from the neurointerventionalist throughout. He also informed me that if intervention had not been made, my patient would have been paraplegic within hours. It was amazing being able to meet her when she was partially recovered.

There are no words to describe how incredibly grateful I am that this patient will have the opportunity to live a full life as she has now returned to her baseline. I am so grateful for everything I was taught throughout the month by my pharmacists, physicians, nurses, and more. I could not have asked for better preceptors to teach me everything they possibly could throughout the month. Pharmacists are a vital asset to the healthcare team, which was demonstrated by this incident.

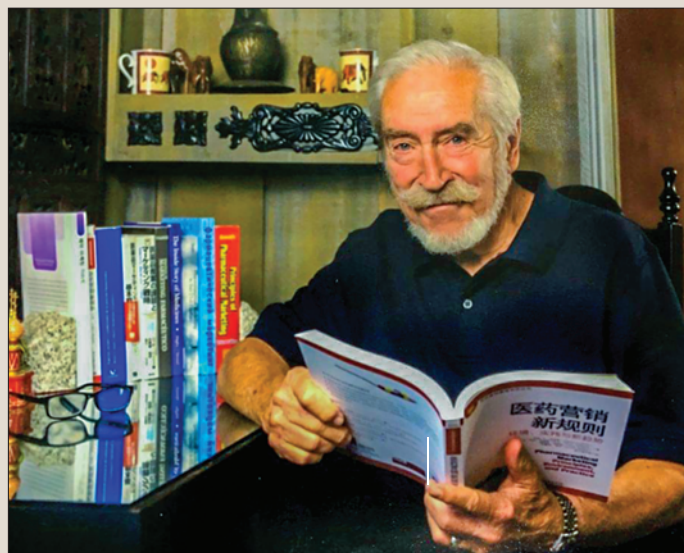

Tribute to Dr. Mickey C. Smith

Former editor of THE MASK

Dr. Smith was born on December 9, 1938, in Jefferson City, Missouri, where he attended high school. He died at his home in Oxford, Mississippi, on July 5, 2022.

Dr. Smith received his B.S. in pharmacy from the St. Louis College of Pharmacy in 1960 and his M.S. in pharmacy administration in 1962, also from the St. Louis College of Pharmacy. His thesis was directed by Dr. Gerald C. Henney who was the full-time Executive Secretary of Kappa Psi from 1965–71. In 1964, Dr. Smith received his Doctor of Philosophy degree in pharmacy administration from Ole Miss (the University of Mississippi) School of Pharmacy. His dissertation director was Kappa Psi Brother Dr. Charles Hartman, dean of the School of Pharmacy. In 1963, Mickey was initiated into Beta Rho as a graduate student.

After two years with the Swedish drug firm, Pharmacia, Dr. Smith returned to Ole Miss as the first chair of the Department of Pharmacy Administration, beginning a 37-year teaching and research career at the University. He also served as the director of the Center for Pharmaceutical Marketing and Management, associate director of the Bureau of Pharmaceutical Services, and held a joint appointment in the Department of Management and Marketing in the School of Business.

A prolific writer and editor, Mickey wrote and edited 21 books. Two of his books reflected his hobby, “Old Time Radio,” about which he published numerous articles. His professional papers numbered more than 400 in 100 different research and professional journals, and he served on the editorial boards of more than two dozen journals. Perhaps his single most significant accomplishment as an educator,

Dr. Smith directed more than 75 master's and doctoral students, five of whom later served as deans of pharmacy schools.

Recipient of numerous state, national and international awards, he received the Distinguished Pharmacy Educator Award from the American Association of Colleges of Pharmacy in 1981—the first time the award was given—and, for the first time, in 1969, the Rufus A. Lyman Award for scholarly writing. Additional honors included the Research Achievement Award from the Academy of Pharmaceutical Sciences, the Stimulation of Research Award from the American Pharmacists Association, and the Lifetime Achievement Award from the Southwestern Marketing Association. He was awarded an honorary doctorate by his alma mater in St. Louis in 2012.

An avid traveler with his wife of 58 years, Mary Hopkins Smith, he visited 100 countries as well as all of the continents and the 50 states. Some travel was by invitation, including talks in Japan, China, and frequently, in England. He was a great lecturer at 20 colleges of pharmacy.

Dr. Smith was also a big baseball fan and a lifetime supporter of the St. Louis Cardinals. He was even named for major league catcher Mickey Cochrane.

Dr. Smith leaves a legacy that is unmatched and is best expressed by former colleagues, students and friends.

“He was one of the most prolific authors in the discipline of pharmacy administration and is widely credited with being one of the pioneers in studying the social and behavioral aspects of pharmacy and health care. If he isn't the father of pharmacy administration, he's the wonderful uncle who made everything possible,”—Dr. Mick Kolassa, former associate professor of pharmacy administration and a household name in the pharmaceutical industry

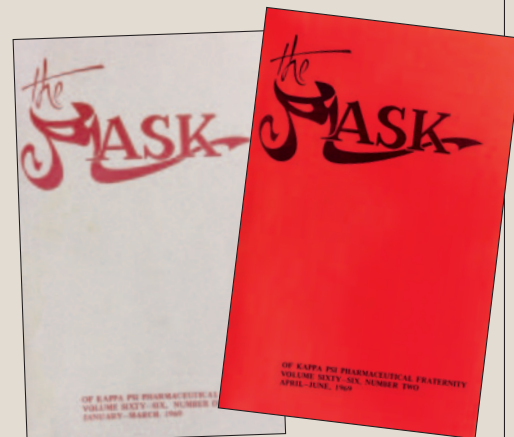

Honoring Our Past to Shape Our Future

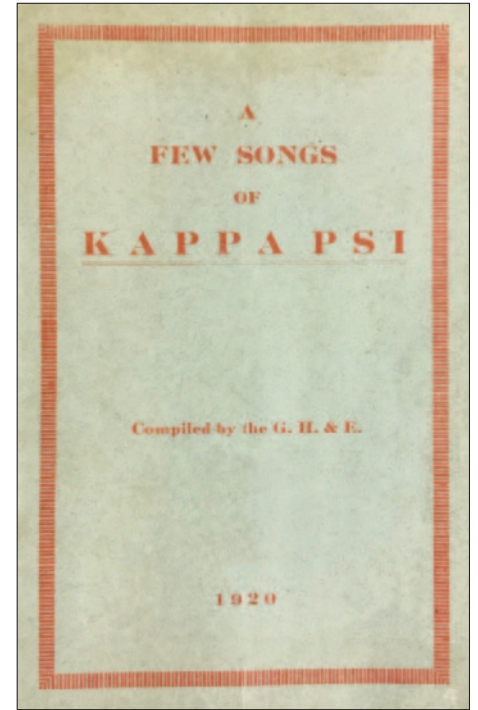

Our founder, F. Harvey Smith, along with his colleagues, recognized the advantages of belonging to a group that today continues to enhance professional careers and social relationships while simultaneously providing leadership and service for our communities. For over 143 years, Kappa Psi has served to enhance and strengthen the bonds of fellowship and professional advancement. The impacts of our leaders inspire us today to live through our motto: “One for all, and all for One.”

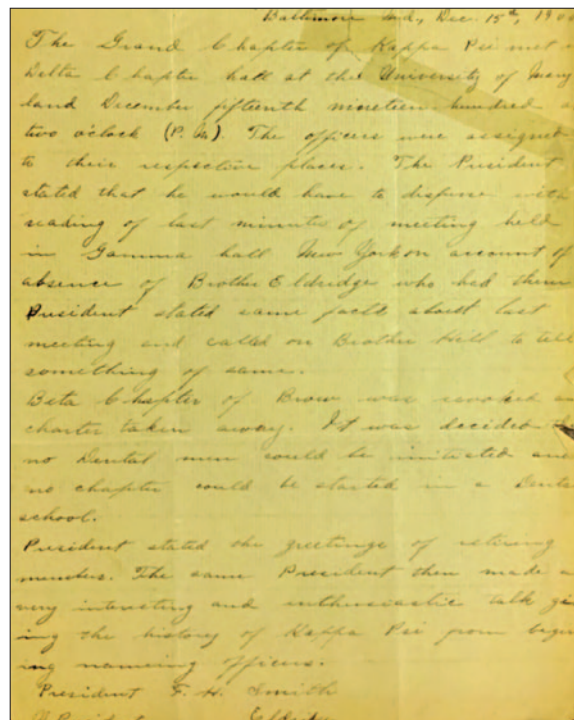
During the Grand Council investigation of 1912, Grand Regent Grant, Grand Historian and Editor Bliss, and historian of Gamma chapter DiLiguori set out to research the early years of the Fraternity. As part of that investigation, the brothers visited the home of F. Harvey and talked to his mother, Harriet. Through their investigation and that of others, including Grand Historian

Emeritus Garner, we learned the address of his parents of 203 Crown Street in New Haven, the names of his two sons, Raymond and Merrill, the 1870 U.S. Census listing his parents and their son ‘Frank,’ and some of his addresses throughout his life including Holyoke, Massachusetts, and Los Angeles, California.

With increased access to information and the ability to search databases, a vision of mine was to find additional information about our founder. For the first time, we officially know that Franklin ‘Frank’ Harvey Smith was born in Wolcottville, Connecticut, on August 12, 1865. He was a civil engineer in New Haven before marrying his first wife, Emma Gertrude Wade, on June 15, 1887, and moving to Springfield, Massachusetts. They welcomed their first child, Merrill, in 1888 followed by their second child, Raymond, in 1889. In 1900, Franklin moved briefly to



Wilmington, Delaware, to work for the Franklin Health Society. During this period, the local newspaper reported that F. Harvey and Dr. J. Harmer Rile attended the chartering of Beta chapter in Richmond, Virginia. In 1904, F. Harvey was living in the Boston area as his mother, Hattie, visited him while attending the G.A.R. Convention.

The 1910 U.S. Census report has Franklin living in Los Angeles, California. On July 17, 1913, Franklin married his second wife, Natalie B. Rutherford, in Los Angeles. The certificate of marriage listed his occupation as a salesman. Franklin Harvey Smith passed away on March 3, 1924, due to complications of tuberculosis. His death certificate listed F. Harvey as divorced at the time of his death. His obituary states that he was a member of the Elks and was buried in the Elk's plot in the Inglewood Cemetery. His obituary also included him living in Stockton, California, and working for the Santa Fe Railroad.

Having the ability to connect with our history is important to shape our future. Launched in June 2022, the Digital Archives of Kappa Psi allow brothers to honor our past and celebrate the achievements of our leaders. Included in the archives is the 1905 Constitution and the handwritten minutes from the second meeting of the Grand Council in December 1900. During that meeting, it was determined that no chapter would be installed at a dental school. Also at that meeting, it was decided to incorporate the Fraternity. The archives also include profiles

The State of the Fraternity

2021–2022

Looking back since our last Grand Council Convention, I could not have predicted the path we have traveled. This past year has been one of hope, conflicts, excitement, and reconnection. Last summer brought us the end of the first wave of mass vaccination efforts for COVID-19. While it allowed a return to more traditional structures for some, it was followed quickly by surges in infection rates due to the Delta variant. This variant led to an overwhelming increase in hospitalizations due to COVID-19 in most areas of the country and halted the return to campus for many. On March 11, 2020, when the WHO declared COVID-19 a worldwide pandemic, our chapters began dealing with the greatest disruption to our organization in decades. I have been ever impressed with our student leaders as organizational structures were recreated every six months since that time to address changing health concerns and university rules. While we faced challenges and disappointments, I have also seen incredible creativity and innovation. We will be stronger in the future because of the techniques we have developed to adapt during this time.

Our work with Reach Out and Read continues to remain at the heart of our service efforts. As an official literary partner, we supported their fundraising work by joining their end-of-the-year campaign as well as by continuing to host our own events. By July 2022, Kappa Psi members had donated over \$51,000 since the last Grand Council Convention and over \$101,000 since our partnership began in 2017. Our commitment to service is again supported with the distribution of service grants to our chapters to start new projects in their communities. Congratulations to the 2021–2022 recipients on their \$1,000 grants: Beta Kappa, Gamma Delta, Gamma Lambda, Gamma Psi, Delta Delta, Delta

Lambda, Delta Tau, Delta Phi, Epsilon Rho, and Mu Omicron Pi.

Despite many of our chapters remaining off campus or under continued pandemic restrictions, we continued to find ways to impact our communities. Our second Service Week was held October 3–9, 2021, and we showcased how strong we are when we work together. A total of 377 brothers submitted their participation for over 500 hours of service during the week. Book drives, virtual fundraisers, virtual book reading activities, school supply donation drives, blood drives, roadside

cleanups, food center volunteering, clothing drives, food drives, and toiletry kit distributions were just some of the events our chapters organized. And new activities this year were the Kappa Psi Foundation virtual 5K walk/run and the many hands helping at COVID-19 vaccination clinics.

Over the past two years, new chapter development was put on hold. But in June, we added our first new collegiate chapter since 2019. Eta Beta chapter was installed at Texas Tech in Dallas, Texas, on June 4, 2022. New and returning graduate chapters were also approved with the chartering of Anaheim Graduate scheduled for September and the reactivation of West Virginia Graduate planned this October.

Our chapters' innovation and adaptation over the past two years have been the key to keeping us successful during a difficult period. We face additional work ahead as Kappa Psi has started to see the impact of the continued reduction in applicants to pharmacy programs at the Kappa Psi host institutions. The number of applicants is even further reduced for this fall and the effects are expected to be felt more acutely and by an increasing number of our chapters. The initial expected impact is a reduction in overall Kappa Psi collegiate new members. This comes with concerns for increased work for our student members and our faculty advisors. The International Executive Committee (IEC) is continuing to focus on creating operational guides, reducing redundancies, transitioning to electronic reporting, and moving services to new platforms to enhance operations for all members and The Central Office.

In addition to impacts of reduced student admissions at all schools and pandemic activity restrictions, there have been several schools closed or announced as soon to be closing. These issues have combined to create a significant loss in collegiate chapters this term. In 2021–2022, Epsilon Phi, Zeta Psi, Zeta Sigma, and Nu chapters have all become dormant. Along with the loss of collegiate chapters, the following graduate chapters were also declared dormant due to inability to maintain chapter activity requirements: Appalachia, Birmingham, New Jersey, New Mexico, Middle Tennessee, North Alabama, North Florida, Philadelphia, Ringgold, and South Texas.


Along with an increased burden of work for our members, the decreases in collegiate membership will come with decreased revenue at all organizational levels. We are currently budgeting for 1,200 less students on campus than in 2019, a reduction of 18% in less than four years. The IEC has looked to reduce unnecessary costs and will also be seeking changes in the dues structure at the upcoming GCC as dues have remained unchanged for 15 years and new member fees have remained static for the past 21 years. Enhancements to member services have been reviewed and plans are approved for an association management software implementation pending a final budget evaluation following GCC.

This spring semester, we felt the excitement of being able to meet and gather in person outside our chapters once again. Province assem-

blies were held in hybrid format with small in-person groups combined with virtual attendance in the winter with a transition to fully in-person events in the spring. Connecting again with brothers at these events has been a highlight for many over the past few months. While we prepared for a Grand Council Convention with a 40–50% reduction in attendance, I am thrilled that over 480 brothers, family, and friends have registered to attend the convention. While learning about Kappa Psi may be even more important this year than in the past, what has been the common thread everyone is excited about is the time to sit and interact with their friends from around the country and meet our many new brothers attending their first meeting.

While we started returning to campus this spring, we really aren't going back to normal. The reality is that the path ahead will look different from any point in the past. While chartering a new path is challenging, it's exciting to think of the opportunity to shape the future with renewed energy as we work toward new goals. The future challenges we face will be made easier by working together, sharing ideas and stories, and creating bonds that will last into the future. We have struggles ahead, but I'm endlessly proud of the work that is being done by our chapters and I know the future of Kappa Psi is in good hands. We will emerge stronger than before from everyone's efforts.

The State of Kappa Psi is good and getting better. As you can see, the Fraternity is on very stable footing. We are financially strong and well positioned for growth in the future. Financially, we are better off than at any time in our 143-year history. I can leave knowing I did everything I could do to keep our Fraternity in sound financial condition. As Frank Eby once said, "Just do it right and do it the best you can as things can go south in a hurry." Wise words from a wise brother.

So, the numbers as we sit today, we have 5,951 brothers on campus. That will change as soon as you get back to school and begin pledging and initiating new brothers, with 1,702 of those scheduled to graduate between now and January 1, 2023. This number is a bit lower than past fall terms but as I have said before, we are just now beginning to see how much the COVID pandemic affected Kappa Psi and all organizations on your campus. I have faith in you that these numbers will just climb faster than we ever believed possible.

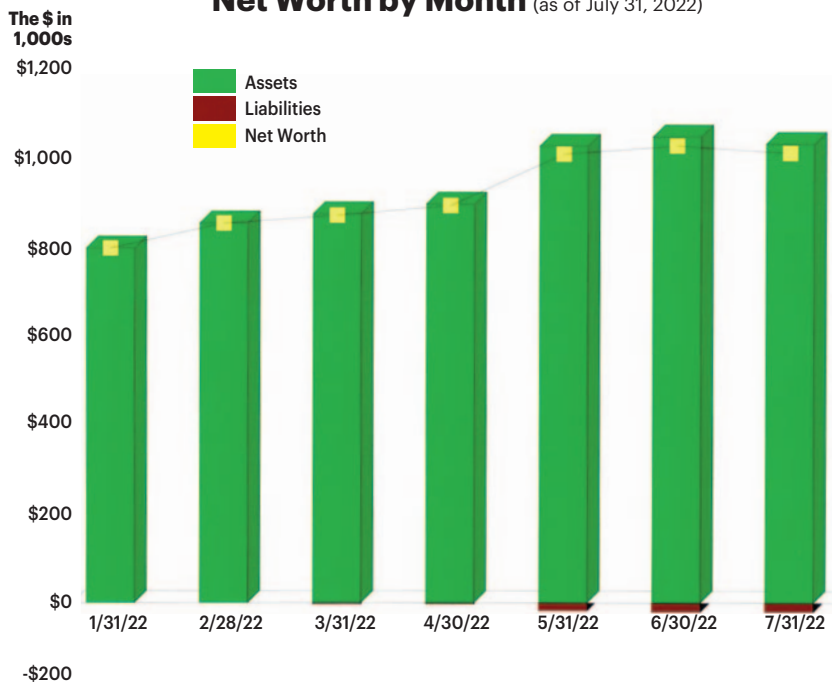

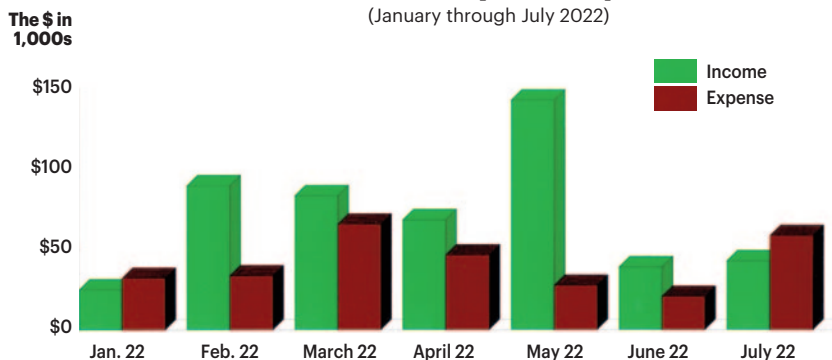

and COVID vaccination clinics, participated in blood drives, and promoted awareness and education for Breast Cancer Awareness Month.

The Committee revamped the Kappa Psi Service Grant Application and corresponding review process in 2019 and made further adjustments to streamline the process through 2022. The co-chairs have submitted their recommendations to the IEC for approval. The major changes for the 2022 cycle include a pending change to overall dollar amount awarded per grant recipient, a focus on projects being completed over the Annual Service Week, and a random draw to select recipients of all applicants meeting minimum application requirements.

Throughout the term, the Committee concentrated a majority of its efforts on promoting and supporting Reach Out and Read. Since the launch of the new donation website in January 2020, Kappa Psi brothers and their supporters have exceeded the goal of raising another \$50,000 for Reach Out and Read! Since the Fraternity raised an initial \$50,000 prior to the 59th GCC, Kappa Psi has now donated more than \$100,000 since our official partnership with Reach Out and Read! The Committee is proud to have helped Kappa Psi become a six-digit donor!

The Philanthropy Committee continued to encourage chapters to participate in local community philanthropic efforts as well. The two International Service Weeks have been very successful despite pandemic constraints. The Third International Service Week is scheduled for October 2–8, 2022. The Committee has completed three Service Grant cycles and has begun to work on the next cycle as well.

In order to continue the scholarship tradition, the Foundation needs the support of all of our graduate brothers! We sincerely thank these brothers who have contributed to our mission.

On March 15, 1992, seven graduate brothers met during the 1992 APhA annual meeting in San Diego and approved by-laws and elected officers for the Kappa Psi Pharmaceutical Foundation, with Dr. Norman A. Campbell being elected as the first President. The Foundation was officially incorporated on February 16, 1993 and was granted a tax-exempt status under Section 501(c)(3) of the IRS Code.

One of the initial goals of the Foundation was to develop a scholarship program to help deserving Kappa Psi brothers complete their pharmacy education and become contributing members of the pharmacy profession. This goal was first realized in 1995 when the first two scholarships were awarded in the amount of \$500 each. Since that time, the Foundation has grown and now contributes \$12-\$14,000 in scholarships every year to deserving collegiate brothers.

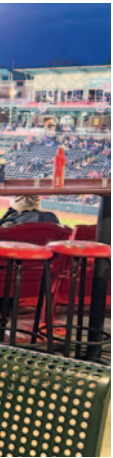

Leadership in the Cracked Rear View

After a year of shutdowns and isolations due to the COVID-19 pandemic, hearing that school would return in person resulted in a comforting sense of relief... followed by a flood of panic. As the newly elected regent for Upsilon chapter, I was now in charge of leading an organization that I had almost no in-person experience with. Due to the pandemic, the previous year's meetings had been moved to a virtual format. In fact, I never had the opportunity to attend even one in-person chapter meeting my entire first year as a brother, and neither did the rest of my executive officers and committee chairs. In addition to that, it had been a long two years since we had experienced our own pledging process and initiation, and we had a steep learning curve to climb in planning, implementing, and executing it.

While jumping headfirst into the unfamiliar role of chapter regent, I was concerned with not letting down my chapter or brothers. I scheduled a meeting with our chapter's immediate past regent. As we talked, I must have asked what seemed like an endless number of questions, trying to learn everything I could to ensure I would be able to provide a successful in-person year for my brothers. Likewise, I established a strong rapport with the chapter's Grand Council Deputy (GCD) and regularly met with him to discuss chapter affairs. Little did I know this experience as regent would be one of the most demanding and stressful, yet worthwhile and rewarding, experiences I could ever imagine.

Amazingly, during this past year of COVID craziness, our chapter's membership numbers had risen and were higher than they had ever been. Starting the semester off strong, we only lost about 1% of our current membership. In recent years, and especially under the impact of the pandemic, our existing membership loss rate was sometimes closer to 8%. Because of our improved retention rate, we were able to grow our chapter as we initiated just under 50 additional new brothers. So, how did we do this?

Coming out of a year of all virtual events, I knew re-establishing the social and fellowship aspect of our chapter would be a priority. Many of our brothers had spent the past year seeing each other only on Zoom, and we all needed more social interaction. How could we expect our chapter to have a strong brotherhood if our brothers did not really know each other? Going into the new school year, we planned more than 15 in-person events for our brothers and pledges to attend. Between regular school obligations and Kappa Psi functions, our calendar was packed with opportunities for brothers to get to know each other. People were anxious to get out and socialize, and we wanted to give them the chance to do so. We emphasized that all our events would be in-person to encourage socializing and that was met with great enthusiasm in the chapter.

In addition to our usual events, we were able to restart our in-person philanthropic events with the Lexington Humane Society, our local Ronald McDonald House, and participated in Kappa Psi's International Week of Service by providing a different service event for each day of the week. We were having fun while helping our community. Talk about a win-win!

In our socially packed calendar, we were also able to add new events such as a Diversity and Inclusion Potluck. Due to COVID restrictions within our college, we were unable to serve food; however, we were still

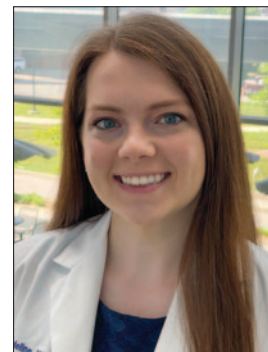
able to conduct an event focused on diversity and inclusion. Our university is very progressive with regard to Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) and our chapter wanted to match that level of support. This was the first DEI event our chapter had hosted. We had a great turnout, received positive feedback from brothers, and look forward to hosting similar events in the future.

In an effort to leave our chapter in the best position possible, our incoming regent, Candy Lu, incoming vice regent, Jahnvi Bhasker, and I all worked together to create a Policy Manual. While our Policy Manual is not officially ready for use, it is written and under review with our Province leaders. After helping to write this manual, I know the chapter is starting the year off on the right foot and will subsequently be better prepared for the years ahead.

As productive as we were this year, there are issues that will require more time to figure out as we return to our new routine. While our chapter provided all in-person events, turnout was not as great as it could have been. For instance, we struggled to find candidates interested in executive officer positions. The last two years, our chapter has held its officer elections online. This year, we decided to move our elections to an in-person format. The decision to do this was not taken lightly, but it felt like the right thing to do. Doing this may have influenced the reluctance to run for an officer position, as candidates are required to address the membership. There is always room for improvement and being able to recognize where we fall short is a step in the right direction. Going forward, our challenge is to rekindle the interest in the leadership opportunities Kappa Psi offers.

Reflecting on my time as regent, I realized I had pushed myself to a whole new level and out of my comfort zone. I had never experienced a role with such a large responsibility, and not only did I survive and grow, but I also saw tremendous growth in the chapter. As this year draws to a close and I hand off my role as regent, I reflect on what a journey it has been. Because of my time as regent, I see myself in a different, more positive light. Where I used to sit back and observe, I now participate and accept new opportunities. I have been given the opportunity to serve as a delegate for my chapter at the 60th Grand Council Convention in Phoenix. I look forward with great excitement to use this event to network, connect, and develop my ties within Kappa Psi and the pharmacy profession.

Moving into the next chapter in my life, I will always carry with me the things I have learned from Kappa Psi. I have learned more than I could have ever imagined about myself, and have so many wonderful people to thank for that. I cannot find the words to express how much I appreciate the faculty and staff at UKCOP, especially our chapter's Grand Council Deputy, my fellow Great Lakes Province Executive Committee and regents, the Office of Student Organizations and Activities at UK, the Upsilon executive officers, and every brother who contributed to navigating us from the cracked rear view.
